

Let's Get Ed^{JEW}cated



You may know that I have been renovating my house, and I look forward to being back in my own space – and getting used to the new space. When I have at least some furniture, and once I unpack at least some boxes, I hope you will visit and see my new space.

This past year we had a record number of Bar Mitzvah and Bat Mitzvah services. I have spent almost every weekday afternoon teaching individual and group classes. I can't begin to explain how much I love learning with these students – and how much I miss our time together when they get to their big day. As of now, we have two students scheduled for Bar/Bat Mitzvah in 2016, and they both turn 13 next summer. That frees up a lot of afternoon hours for me to visit with congregants, and teach other classes, and work on some of my other projects.

Last month our Confirmation service was inspiring and spiritual. The Confirmation class chose each prayer and translation, and then smoothly led us all in worship. This class combined students who will be in tenth and eleventh grades next year. That means that I won't have a Confirmation class to teach. That gives me extra time on Sundays to spend with the other classes, and to teach other courses.

Last month, thanks to the Board's support and the congregation's approval, I have been given the opportunity to serve as your Rabbi for six more years. Everyone who knows me knows how much I love this congregation and love my job. I am not sure how many people know how much time I spend thinking of ways to try to do more for the congregation and the community.

This summer I am extremely aware of the potential that these opportunities bring for me – and for you. I am motivated to get "edJEWcated." The group who have been active in the Chai Mitzvah program are each trying to learn something new about Judaism, trying to add a Jewish ritual, and trying to do at least one new Mitzvah. You don't have to be part of the group (although, if you aren't, there is another one scheduled to start in the fall) to appreciate how wonderful it is to add these new things to your life. I want to learn with you and I want to help you learn.

I have been approached by a number of people this year who have a strong desire to learn about Judaism – many want to become Jewish, and many already feel they are Jewish. I plan to, once again, offer a Basic Judaism class, because they will need it to learn to become Jewish. It also helps for the spouses and friends who are not Jewish, but want to understand more about being Jewish – even if they have no intention of becoming Jewish. Even people who have been Jewish since Abraham should always be trying to learn more about Judaism. What is it that you feel you want to know? Specific prayers (like the Kaddish or the Torah blessings or the Shabbat candle blessing and Kiddush)? How to read Hebrew? The nuances and varieties of Jewish music or Jewish languages or Jewish foods or Jewish jokes? How can you be a "good Jew" and not believe in God? What do Jews believe about God? About an afterlife?

Please join me Sunday, June 7 from 5-7 PM to talk about the ways you want to be edJEWcated. What times work for you? What subjects? Do you want to teach/learn? If you can't make it to that meeting, email me or call me or text me with your ideas.

Get ED-JEW-CATED. I will make sure that everyone who comes learns something. Bivrachah (with Blessings),

The State of B'nai Zion

This month's spiel is either the last one of my first year or the first one for my last year. Either way, time has flown by as we have really been busy. There is so much happening that I don't believe any one person could do it all. That, in itself, has made my job most rewarding. Thank you for allowing me to serve. I want to recap some of what was said at our annual meeting for those who were unable to attend.

Our congregation is in good shape and I don't foresee any significant changes in the foreseeable future. As Todd has mentioned, our finances are holding steady. With a strong endowment fund and a good, safe



investment strategy under the guidance of Jack Selber, our funds manage to grow. Despite the fact that we spend more than we take in, we manage quite well. Thank you Todd and Ardis for handling the day-to-day finances.

No surprise, but our numbers are shrinking. Currently we are incorporated by the state as three entities. There is B'nai Zion Congregation, B'nai Zion Foundation and B'nai Zion Cemetery Trust. Our board has suggested that we close the Foundation and Cemetery Trust and merge them into the Congregation. The reason is simple. We do not have enough interest nor the manpower to organize and run three separate boards of directors, have meetings and carry on fiduciary responsibility for the funds in each account. Our goal is NOT to merge the funds. We will keep the money separate and segregated as before. We will use funds as spelled out in the previously defined by-laws. However, by merging them with our congregation, we can manage these funds as a committee. It just makes sense. We will continue to manage the finances as before and carefully watch our spending of your money. We accept the gravity of this responsibility. We need to also think about our spiritual future. Our Rabbi's contract expires in one year. Your board of directors has unanimously

recommended that we extend her contract for an additional five years. The congregation has agreed to her contract extension. She will now have to put up with us for five more years!

Finally, we take safety issues around our building very seriously. We will continue to upgrade our security cameras and fire systems as needed. In addition, there will be times when the building will be locked up, even when we are inside; for example, during Sunday School and other events. We are trying to find a solution to ensure safety during services and weekends. Any suggestions? However, we realize there are currently no specific threats.

Thanks to Brett Lake, Charlton Meyer and Randolph Kallenberg for serving on our Board of Directors. Their work with house and grounds as well as budget and finance has been most helpful. We could not manage without their assistance. (Continued on page 6)

From our Educator

The end of Religious School and the start of summer vacation do not mean that Jewish learning has to be "on hold" until September. In fact, with less-structured days there's a greater opportunity to learn new and interesting things about Jewish life and practice. There's more time for taking on the Summer Mitzvah Challenge! See the list in another part of the bulletin that gives you some ideas for getting started. There's more time for learning about the Jewish calendar and attending the Picnic and Havdalah and Star Party at the American Rose Center on Saturday evening, June 20. There's more time for learning "what's Jewish about spiders" and "what's Jewish about friends" on Sunday afternoon, July 19, a program not limited to, but including *Charlotte's Web* – yes, the old 1970s movie version. There's more time for Shabbat worship and celebration with family



and friends. There's more time for reading Jewish books. If you have young children and you're not getting PJ Library books, contact me right away so that you don't miss this awesome gift to your family. If you're an adult, consider reading with the Jewish Community Book Club this summer. The bottom line: Summer is a magical time for parents and children—and grandparents and children—to enjoy informal Jewish learning in new places and unaccustomed times.

The June 20th program will be at the American Rose Center. Since the stars and moon can't be viewed until after dark, this evening of food and learning and fun will best be enjoyed by families with kids who don't need to be in bed at 7:00. The tentative plan is to gather at the Rose Center at 6:30 for bring-your-own picnic dinner followed by learning "what's Jewish about the moon and the stars," celebrating the end of Shabbat with Havdalah, and viewing the skies through the telescopes provided by the Shreveport Astronomy Club.

The July 19th program will be geared toward our very young children (2 to 5 year olds) and our lower elementary kids (Grades K-3). We will gather at a home with a larger screen TV (call me if you'd like to volunteer yours) for snacks and learning "what's Jewish about spiders" and "what's Jewish about friends," while meeting both Sammy Spider and Charlotte. We will have crafts and food and fun. For those who have the appropriate attention span, we will conclude with a movie party – *Charlotte's Web* runs about an hour and a half.

For both of these programs, I need help – creative help and the legwork necessary for gathering supplies. If you can help in any way, please email me at braunigw@aol.com.

Finally, back to the Summer Mitzvah Challenge. Many of you already do the suggested mitzvah projects, but I hope you and your family will take on something new for June, July, and August. Do not be limited by my list of suggestions. Have a Shabbat dinner early in June (or a family discussion at ANY dinner) and decide on some things that you will do as a family (pack boxes at the food bank, for example) or some things that you will do as individuals (young children pick out gently-used toys and clothes for donation to Providence House or another organization while older children and adults prepare a meal and visit someone recuperating from illness or celebrating a happy occasion). Catch the Mitzvah Magic – one mitzvah leads to another and the satisfaction of *living a Jewish life* grows with each one.

Enjoy your summer. See you at our regular worship services and at our special programs. If you want additional activities, please suggest them – we will try to make them happen.

Technically Speaking at BZ

As we mentioned at the Annual Meeting, during the summer we plan to be implementing new technologies so that certain tasks that serve the congregation become more efficient.

-One Call Now: When important news needs to get to everyone in the congregation, we will be able to send the information by telephone, text or email using this one efficient service. When we make the phone calls, everyone will receive the call within a minute of each other. We can even have the call ask for information. For example, if we wanted to remind you about the Passover Seder, and see if you are coming, we could have the Rabbi call using the service. You would hear her voice, and the caller ID would show that it is B'nai



Zion calling. She would remind you what day the Seder is, and ask you to respond by saying "yes" or pressing "1" if you are coming. If you prefer to communicate via email, your message would be sent via email. If you prefer to communicate via text messages, that is how you would be notified. It takes us just a few moments to prepare the message, and send it to everyone. We hope to use the service for joyous announcements, and happy reminders, but obviously we can use it to inform you of deaths, etc.



If you were at the Annual Meeting you received your Questionnaire. If you didn't attend, you will be receiving it soon in the mail, or you may get a phone call asking about your preferred method of having us communicate with you, and a backup method. We also need to be sure that we have birthday and anniversary information correct in our system. The questionnaire is looking for other specifics as well. Please get it back to us as soon as you can, or call the office to help us keep your information accurate and current.

- Membership Management on the Web: The program we use for keeping track of everything from how to contact members, to who has made donations, and which Yahrzeits are coming soon. We are in the process of turning some of their functions into online components. One of these benefits will be an easier way to make payments online on a secure website. You will be able to log in to our website, and see if you owe dues, and pay them from the comfort of a computer, cell phone or tablet anywhere. Friends and relatives will be able to make



donations wherever they live, without having to contact the office. This service will also allow members to update personal information online, and even be able to have access to an online directory of all of our members.



– Shop online and B'nai Zion gets a percentage. We are working on connecting to some online sites that will allow us to earn a percentage of the sales. This will be similar to when you shop at Kroger and buy what you want, and B'nai Zion gets a percentage, however this will be with online merchants.

Summer Mitzvah Challenge

CALLING ALL FAMILIES - VACATION MITZVAH MAGIC



Summer is here, and with it comes the chance for us to perform mitzvot during vacation. Find some mitzvot from the following list, or make your own list. Then DO the mitzvot and document in some way that you have done them – parents can initial the list, you can take a photo that shows you at work, etc. Keep track of how many you do, and at the end of the summer, we will add up how many mitzvot have been performed by the students and families in our school. I'm sure we will exceed 613 total mitzvot!

Here's what you need to do:

Email Helaine at braunigw@aol.com and tell me that your family will participate. We will then email you a mitzvah-tracking worksheet. Mitzvot can be performed by the family as a whole or by individuals.

Have a discussion about mitzvot with your family. If you need information, just ask us for it – or use the internet to learn about kinds of mitzvot. Your children can do this – try MyJewishLearning.com.

Get started! One mitzvah leads to another!

Here are just a FEW ideas:

Clean out your pantry for unexpired food OR make a shopping trip to the grocery store to get food for the North Louisiana Food Bank. Then deliver the food to the food bank. You can also find out about taking your family there to pack boxes.

Visit or send a card or prepare food for someone who is ill or recuperating.

Attend Shabbat services.

Celebrate Shabbat at home by having a special meal together after lighting candles, making Kiddush, blessing bread, and blessing your children. Need help with any of this? Just ask.

Clean out your closets and donate gently used clothing to Goodwill or Providence House or any number of organizations that provide help.

Make tzedakah donations to organizations that you admire. You can designate the proceeds from a family garage sale or a lemonade stand, etc.

Affix a new mezuzah on a doorpost of your house. Need help with the blessings or the instructions for doing it? Just ask us. We can even send someone to help.

Increase your Jewish knowledge. Read a Jewish book, watch movies related to Jewish life or history or practice.

Help older neighbors or friends with household tasks or yard work.

Volunteer at a pet shelter.

Welcome a new neighbor by taking food or inviting them to do something with your family Honor parents and grandparents by writing letters to them, thanking them for their love and support.

You get the idea! And start by putting Mitzvah Day on your calendar.

Friday Film Festival

After services on Friday evenings we will be showing movies that are entertaining and have some connection to Judaism. Movies will begin after the Oneg Shabbat (approximately 7:30). We will serve pizza and popcorn and drinks with the movies. There is no fee for attending or eating, but you are welcome to make a donation to help us cover our costs. Please, no donations on Shabbat. Some of the movies are favorites that have been shown before, and some have not. We are also considering showing movies at another time. If you have suggestions about movies or when they should be shown, please let the office or Rabbi Jana know.

June 5: Frisco Kid (PG 1:59) 1979 A rabbi (Gene Wilder) from Poland goes to America to lead a Jewish community. When he arrives in America he is hijacked and has to work his way across the country. On the way he meets up with a bank robber (Harrison Ford) and they form a friendship, have many (mis)adventures including being captured by Indians.

June 12: The Apprenticeship of Duddy Kravitz (PG 1:22) 1974 The younger son of a working-class Jewish family in Montreal, Duddy Kravitz (Richard Dreyfus) yearns to make a name for himself in society. This film chronicles his short and dubious rise to power, as well as his changing relationships with family and friends. Along the way the film explores the themes of anti-Semitism and the responsibilities which come with adulthood.

June 19: A Serious Man (R 1:46) 2009 Larry Gopnik, a Midwestern physics teacher, watches his life unravel over multiple sudden incidents. Though seeking meaning and answers amidst his turmoils, he seems to keep sinking. A clever Coen brothers movie.

June 26: This is Sdom (Zohi S'dom – Hebrew movie with English subtitles) (NR 1:27) 2010 One of the most popular comedies ever from Israel. When ancient Sodom is doomed to destruction due to its people's corrupt ways, Lot is the only righteous man

destined to be spared. Shown this year at the Federation's Film Festival.

July 3: (not scheduled – American holiday weekend)

July 10: (not scheduled - Rabbi out of town)

July 17: The Jewish Cardinal (Le métis de Dieu – French movie with English subtitles) (NR 1:36) 2013 The Jewish Cardinal tells the amazing true story of Jean-Marie Lustiger; the son of Polish-Jewish immigrants; who maintained his cultural identity as a Jew even after converting to Catholicism, joining the priesthood, and being appointed Archbishop of Paris by Pope Jean Paul II.

July 24: O Jerusalem (R 1:01) 2006 A tale of friendship between two men, one Jewish

and the other Arab, as the state of Israel is being created.

July 31: Oh God! (PG 98 min.) 1977 When God (George Burns) appears to an assistant grocery manager (John Denver) as a good natured old man, the Almighty selects him as his messenger for the modern world.
