What We Do

We have been celebrating holidays that have us re-Jew-venated about Tikkun Olam: taking care of and repairing the world.

We celebrated the birthday of the trees, and realized how important trees are to us, and how much they need our help so that they can continue to provide food, shelter, oxygen and so much more.

I was involved with events such as the MLK Baptist Minister Conference Commemoration, speaking at a service at All Souls UU Church dedicated to show solidarity for our Muslim neighbors, and getting to better understand the people in our community who practice different faiths. I was honored, encouraged, and yet a bit sad and humbled. It is great to get together and realize how much we have in common, and realize that we are all committed to helping to take care of our world, and fix the things that shouldn't be broken anymore: social injustice, religious intolerance, depleting our resources, and what seems to be an overwhelming continuing list of other problems.

However, as wonderful as singing together, praying together, and learning from each other is during the events, often the very next day everyone goes back to their respective lives, and very little actually changes to fix the problems.

This month, I want things to be different. This month I want us to continue to find some time to make a difference each day. The B'nai Zion congregation will continue to offer ways for us to do this together, since sometimes it seems overwhelming to fix the world by ourselves. In fact, almost everything we are planning to do will make the world a better place. Sometimes it is on a personal level: by learning in our classes or participating in our discussion groups. Sometimes it is on a spiritual level when we join together in prayer with our other congregants and our visitors. We also plan specific Tzedakah Mitzvah projects, including opportunities to help in the community, and to sustain Fair Trade businesses from far and wide.

Our congregation may not be big compared to others – or even compared to our numbers from years ago. All it takes is someone who sees something that can be done, and sharing that goal with the rest of us, and then if even a few people join the effort, we can make a difference.

Every one of us has something we can do to make the world a better place. For some it will be time, for others it may be financial. Everyone who comes to services, everyone who comes to classes, everyone who joins in discussions, everyone who shares our messages, everyone who is proud to be Jewish, are not only part of our B'nai Zion family, but also part of our constant effort for making our world a better place, and making our lives more meaningful.

Look in the bulletin for details about how we can help in the neighborhoods near us, as I invite you to join me on a Community Renewal bus tour on February 9. Donate blood or volunteer to help us on February 21. You can also come to our Fair Trade Market that day. We will have merchandise on sale that is produced by companies that make sure to treat their employees fairly, and use resources wisely, and try to make a positive impact in the world. Come to connect with women from neighboring Reform Jewish congregations, so that each of our small communities can realize we are part of something much larger. Study with us, worship with us, volunteer with us, socialize with us.

I look forward to making the world a better place together with you.

From our Educator, Helaine Braunig

The February calendar brings us an extra day, that once-in-four years Leap Day on February 29. Lots of people make the day special by doing things they haven't gotten around to, as in "Oh, I wish I had another day this week. There's never time to catch up." Others make the day special by forgetting everything they have to do and taking a day "off" for personal enjoyment, as in "I have an extra day in my life to do just what I want." I hope you'll use your extra day in whatever makes you happy.

However, you should also know that the Hebrew calendar sometimes gives us an extra month! Now that's something really special – an extra month that this year will be between March 11 and April 8. That extra month explains why the High



Holy Days seemed early and Passover seems late. Without a lot of fancy explanation as to why and how leap months occur, I'd just like to suggest that we adopt the mindset of having an extra month to be involved in the Jewish activities that we love most or the ones we "hope to get around to." Perhaps with a little long-range planning Adar II can be a special time for you and your family – a time for studying something about Judaism, a time for engaging in a tzedakah project, a time for celebrating Shabbat or Purim by hosting a Shabbat dinner for friends or baking hamantaschen or other treats to be shared during Purim. Might I suggest that you and your family make an "Adar II" calendar so that you actually include some things that are "extra" in your lives during our "extra" month? I think it could be both fun and fulfilling.

In the meantime the month of February will finish out the Hebrew month of Shevat and bring us to Adar I. In that space we will focus on the Jewish teaching that "to save one life is to save the world." Our life-saving activities will include a blood drive for our LifeShare Blood Center; a Fair Trade Day that will support the economic lives of third world women and farmers through sales of fair trade crafts and coffee; and even an effort to save the lives of animals through sales of Rescue Chocolate. Please look at the articles throughout the bulletin that details these events that will take place Sunday, February 21.

The same weekend that includes our Blood Drive and Fair Trade Sale will also be a weekend with our ISJL fellow Abby Klionsky. Abby will help with services and Torah study, meet with our youth group and our Religious School teachers and students, and hopefully get a chance to have fun with our Toddler Social Club families, those whose children are still infants and toddlers. Please take advantage of the activities that involve Abby – she is smart, creative, and fun-loving. She loves to hike, so we may have a family outing to one of our nature centers (Red River or Walter Jacobs), and she loves to cook, so we may have a food-centered event as well.

By the time you read this, our 8th and 9th grade civil rights trip to Birmingham will have taken place. We will share with you some of our experiences and reflections at an upcoming Shabbat service or Sunday morning breakfast. The civil rights struggle continues in our country with concern now over policing issues, voting rights issues, and rights for all kinds of marginalized people. Our Reform Jewish movement is always on the forefront of respecting differences and extending safe spaces to all who live in our great country.

Last, but not least, February brings Bill's and my 45th wedding anniversary. How can that be right? I must have married at age 12! No, we are indeed old enough, but I don't want the occasion to go by without thanking Bill for supporting me throughout what has turned out to be a long and fulfilling career at B'nai Zion. No one except me knows all that he has done or what it has meant, but you do know that he continues to teach Religious School, cook for lots of occasions, help families with cemetery needs, and he does it all with a smile on his face and love in his heart. I am so grateful to him, and I just wanted to say so "in public."








ISJL Education Fellow Weekend Visit


Our Goldring Wolenberg Institute of Southern Jewish Life Education Fellow, Abby Klionsky will join us February 19-21. She will lead Shabbat services and Torah study, do workshops with our teens, meet with our teachers for curriculum enhancement, and work with our students during Religious School. Abby will also be joining us for our Blood Drive, and Fair Trade Fair.

The Shreveport Jewish Community Religious School uses the ISJL curriculum, which focuses on ten key content areas: Community, Culture and Symbols, God, Hebrew and Prayer, Israel, Jewish History, Jewish Holidays, Jewish Lifecycle Events, Mitzvot and Jewish Values, and Tanach (Torah, Prophets, and



Writings). The Education Fellows are well trained, enthusiastic proponents of Jewish learning and Jewish identity. Please join Abby at Shabbat services and Torah study, and you will understand not only why we love the ISJL curriculum so much, but you will be "re-Jew-venated" by her enthusiasm and knowledge. This will be her last visit to B'nai Zion as an Education Fellow from the ISJL.

People of the Book



Our next book is *The Last Jews in Berlin* by Leonard Gross. "Very well researched and readable at the same time." Though perhaps best read alongside other books on the Holocaust, *The Last Jews in Berlin* is a powerful and gripping portrait of life in Berlin during the Second World War. The meeting date is 7 p.m. Tuesday, March 8.

The book that will be discussed in April or May is the latest winner of the National Jewish Book award: *The Last Flight of Poxl West* by Daniel Torday. A stunning novel from award-winning author Daniel Torday, in which a young man recounts his idolization of his Uncle Poxl, a Jewish, former-RAF pilot, exploring memory, fame and story-telling.

All his life, Elijah Goldstein has idolized his charismatic Uncle Poxl. Intensely magnetic, cultured and brilliant, Poxl takes Elijah under his wing, introducing him to opera and art and literature. But when Poxl publishes a memoir of how he was forced to leave his home north of Prague at the start of WWII

and then avenge the deaths of his parents by flying RAF bombers over Germany during the war, killing thousands of German citizens, Elijah watches as the carefully constructed world his uncle created begins to unravel. As Elijah discovers the darker truth of Poxl's past, he comes to understand that the fearless war hero he always revered is in fact a broken and devastated man who suffered unimaginable losses from which he never recovered.

The Last Flight of Poxl West beautifully weaves together what it means to be a family in the shadow of war— to love, to lose, and to heal.

Learn Hebrew From Day One with Rabbi Jana



It is time to learn Hebrew with Rabbi Jana. The first step is learning the Aleph-Bet. Rabbi Jana wrote a method that uses the first day of the Creation Story from Genesis and the Decalogue from Exodus to teach every letter and vowel. Not only does she teach the letters in a way that is fun and easy to remember, but she also reveals surprising insights that you gain from reading the Torah in Hebrew.

Classes will meet Thursday evenings from 5:30-6:30 PM, beginning February 11. The Beginning Hebrew class will meet for six lessons in February and March. Tuition is

\$36 per person (scholarships are available, if needed—speak with Rabbi Jana.)

This class is a perfect for anyone who has no Hebrew background, or who wants to improve their Hebrew reading fluency. Many people take this class multiple times—not because they didn't learn the first time, but because there are new insights every time. This is an important Basic Judaism class if you are interested in learning about Judaism, but is also great for Jewish students who are ready to learn or increase their Hebrew knowledge.

How Do You Know?

We are trying to make sure that you stay informed about the important information at B'nai Zion.

We have initiated the One Call Now service that allows us to call everyone with news and information. There are many congregants who do not use computers or smartphones and have sometimes missed hearing important information, because we did not have an efficient way to contact them. We have received a lot of positive feedback about these calls. If you do not want to continue to receive the calls, follow the prompt at the end of the call, or contact the B'nai Zion office.





We will continue to send emails. We are able to send you details and links in emails that keep this method the most effective way of providing you with information we need to share. You can choose to continue to receive emails, whether or not you want to receive calls or texts.

We also can use One Call to send text messages. Some people prefer text messages to calls or even emails. We write one short message, click send, and everyone who has opted in for text messages gets it at the same time. They are received as separate individual messages, so you are not part of a group message. THE ONLY WAY for you to receive TEXT messages from One Call is if you OPT IN. Follow these instructions:



In a new text message, where it says:

To: Type the number: 22300 For the message, type: Alert

Then click Send

This may seem confusing, but the best part is that you can let us know specifically how you want to be notified for each kind of event. For example, you may want class/school news by text only, but congregational news by email only (or phone). You may want a call about funeral arrangements for someone connected to our congregation, but everything else by email. Whatever your preference, let us know, and we will do our best to accommodate your request.


