Just Crumbs

As we finish the Jewish leap year, and I am finally finished celebrating my three birthdays this year, I realize that I had my share of cakes and other goodies. The last of my Jewish birthdays (4 Adar II) was also Pi Day this year. The

mathematical number pi goes on for what may be an infinite number of decimal places, but the first few numbers are 3.14159, which can be rounded to 3.1416. On 3/14/16 instead of cake, we had pie in honor of pi day. I had chocolate pie, and all that were left were the crumbs.

Adar II also had us celebrating Purim and eating Hamantaschen. Thank you to everyone who made these delectable treats. Once again, we ate our fill and were left with just crumbs.



When Purim is over, it is my cue to start eliminating chametz in my house and car and office. The Torah describes a zero tolerance policy for chametz crumbs, so I clean every nook and cranny, scrub pantry shelves and drawers, vacuum under cushions and beds. I work hard not to leave any crumbs.

This process reminds me that sometimes in life getting something mostly done is good enough, but sometimes we need to strive for "all the way."

From cleaning for Passover, I do realize that crumbs can be a blessing. The crumbs left on the plate when I finish my cake, pie, or hamantaschen remind me how blessed I am to have food—even fun food. I am immediately reminded of people who have so little food day to day that just crumbs would be appreciated. Each year when I clean the chametz out of my food closets, refrigerator and freezer I donate as much as I can to places where people have limited resources for acquiring food. My chametz turns into tzedakah, or perhaps we could call it, "just crumbs," as in extra food used in a just/righteous way. B'nai Zion this year is suggesting that you bring your chametz and help us with a food drive for the Food Bank. We will collect food—not limited to chametz — until Sunday, April 17, and deliver it before Passover.

That brings us to Passover when we remember each year what it was like to be slaves, and rely on crumbs for food. We finally experience freedom – which brings the crummiest food of all...matzah. Some people love matzah and eat it all year long. I reserve matzah eating for Passover. I recognize that this freedom food creates more crumbs than possibly anything else I eat all year. Each time I eat matzah I am reminded that I am part of a people. We were slaves together. We were freed together. We experienced signs and wonders together. Now we celebrate together, and break matzah together, and drink wine, and sing songs and say blessings together. We create new and clever ways to make yummy food out of this crummy stuff.

We also start a count-up (as opposed to a count-down) to the awesome moment when we accept the laws (Shavuot) and guidance about how / what we eat and what we do and how we treat each other that make us not just a people, but a just people.

So every day I am reminded when I think about food, and when I think about my life, that I don't see just crumbs, but I learn to see just crumbs.

Wishing you and yours a zissen (sweet) and a kosher Pesach, and I hope you find just crumbs.

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From Our Educator, Helaine Braunig

The extra month of Adar has given us a moment to catch our breath. Though spring seems to have arrived early this year, we still have a chance to stop and take stock of our lives before Passover arrives. Most of us have been very lucky in recent weeks. We escaped unscathed during the flooding, watching events unfold on tv, but only mildly inconvenienced. However, at least one Religious School family had to evacuate their home in Bossier, and one of our former students who is now a resident of Monroe had floodwaters in her home. Those two families were forced to take stock quickly, deciding what to take out with them and what could be left behind. I'd like to suggest that all of us might benefit from planning for the next unanticipated natural disaster. In doing so, we would also be forced to acknowledge that the things we own are not as important as the relationships we have and the



experiences that we cherish as memories. Even so, photos, letters, and objects passed from generation to generation need to be preserved, and while we have the technology to scan those photos and letters, have we done so? Can we locate the precious keepsakes as well as the important papers? As I look ahead to cleaning my house before Passover, I have decided not only to remove the leavened products, but also to bring together not just the important documents, but also the things that link me to my grandparents and parents. For me, Passover is the ultimate experience of Jewish family, and I want to be sure my children and grandchildren have the opportunity to cook from my grandmother's recipes and set the Pesach table with candlesticks and dishes that have been used for generations. Perhaps you, too, may want to stop in the next few weeks to focus on what you have inherited – not just the physical objects, but the values and traditions. And, if your generation is the first to embrace Judaism, this is a great time of year to consider the practices that you'd like to start so that there will be traditions you can share with family and friends.

In addition to Passover, April will bring us our annual Mitzvah Day on Sunday, April 17. We are working on plans that we hope to share soon. In the meantime, know that at least part of our Mitzvah Day will be focused on collecting food for the Food Bank of Northwest Louisiana. Our Seder reminds us to "let all who are hungry come and eat," and we can help provide food for the hungry in our community by packing our non-Passover grains (chameitz) and other non-perishables for donation to the food bank. We can take our children shopping and teach them to buy with nutritional value as well as economic value in mind. Let's help our children learn to be smart shoppers as we stretch our dollars to feed those less fortunate than ourselves.

Finally, April brings us to a time to begin to evaluate the successes of our Religious School year and our hopes for ways to improve in the next year. We have had very effective lessons in the classroom, holiday celebrations in our homes and synagogues, and mitzvah and tzedakah opportunities to bring our values to life. Please consider what your role has been. Have you been a quiet behind-the-scenes helper? Have you taken charge of a major celebration or project? Have you contributed your time? Have your contributed your money? There are so many ways to support our students and our faculty. I invite you to think about how you might help us next year – in the classroom or from outside the classroom. We need everyone's participation and ideas.





Eleven candles will be lit in memory of the Eleven million lives lost during the Holocaust.

Cantor Neil Schwartz of Agudath Achim Synagogue will present musical selections.

We will share prayers together in memory and solidarity.

Our special guest speaker will be Joe Rosenbaum, one of 'the Tehran Children.'

Mr. Rosenbaum was born in Cologne, Germany on March 25, 1931. During the rise of Hitler, and while his father was in America, Joe, his mother, and younger sister were expelled in October 1938. Suffering for several years in Siberia labor camps, when Germany attacked Russia in June 1941, the deportees were freed along with the Polish army. Sent southward to Tashkent, they eventually ended up in Pahlevi on the Caspian Sea, and then were moved to Tehran. The Jewish Agency negotiated the children's evacuation (now numbering over 900) to Palestine, by ship and then by train across the Sinai desert, arriving at Atlit detainee camp on February 18, 1943. After five long years Joe had reached freedom. During his new life in Israel, Joe met and married Rina and moved to America and began a career in sales. They now live in California, surrounded by their children and grandchildren. We are honored that he has agreed to share his story with us.

More than 100 essays and poems from local middle school and high school students, and research papers from college students were submitted for our Holocaust Literature contest. Awards will be presented to the winners, and to participating teachers.

This is intended as a non-denominational opportunity for the community to come together to remember and find strength to prevent injustice in the world.

Count On It

We are commanded to count the days and weeks (seven times seven weeks until the 50th day) from the liberation we celebrate at Passover through the receiving of Torah we celebrate at Shavuot. We remember that each of our days is numbered, and now that we are free, we can do something with each day to make the world a better place.

Here's how to do it:

Starting with the second night of Passover, Saturday, April 23, every night, after dark, say the following blessing, and then count the proper day:

בָרוּך אַתָּה ה', אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, אֲשֶׁר קִדְשָׁנוּ בְּמִצְוֹתִיו, וְצִוְּנוּ עַל סְפִירַת הָעוֹמֶר.

Ba-ruch Atah A-do-nai Elo-hei-nu Me-lech Ha-olam, Asher Kid'sha-nu B'Mitz-vo-tav V'tzi-va-nu Al S'fi-rat Ha-'Omer.

Blessed are You, Eternal our God, Ruler of the Universe, Who has made us holy with Commandments, and commanded us concerning the counting of the Omer.

Then we count the days and the weeks saying, for example: "Today is 12 days, which is 1 week and 5 days of the Omer." To help you count, you can purchase Omer counters, make your own design, find apps for your phone or computer, or go to Rabbi Jana's Passover resources page: www.hebrewdoc.com/Holidays/Passover.

- **★** Passover Morning service at B'nai Zion will be Saturday, April 23 at 11 a.m..
- ★ The commandments in the Torah for Passover include eating matzah and NOT eating chametz for the whole week (some people observe the holiday for eight days)



* Start counting the Omer beginning Saturday night,

April 23. Continue counting for seven times seven weeks (49 days) until we arrive at the holiday of **Shavuot.**

- ★ The seventh day of Passover we will have morning services which will include Yizkor / Memorial service. The worship will begin at 10 a.m. Friday April 29. We will use the Memorial Books that were prepared for 5776 that we began using on Yom Kippur this year, and all Memorial plaques will be lit.
- **★** Go to the B'nai Zion website (www.BnaiZionCongregation.org) to find more materials for Passover, including a family friendly Haggadah, songs, links, videos, etc.

Passover Seder Table Checklist

So you want to make your own Seder at home?... Here is a brief checklist of what you need:

- ★ Three Matzot covered (plus extra for munching during the dinner)
- Haggadot, including any that you purchased specially for your children and/or that they made in school (or print the one Rabbi Jana uses by going to the Links page on the B'nai Zion website and clicking on Holiday Resources)
- ☆ Wine and/or grape juice
- **⋄** Seder Plate
- **⇔** Bowls of salt water
- **☼** Extra maror and charoset for the sandwiches
- Extra karpas for dipping in salt water
- ★ Extra hard boiled eggs not technically part of the seder, but I can't imagine a seder without a hard boiled egg!
- ☆ Kiddush cup for the leader and wine cups for each place setting
- **⋄** Saucer or plate for spilling or dipping out the ten plagues
- ♥ Kos Eliyahu (Elijah's cup)
- ⇒ Have you heard of the Miriam's cup (filled with water) or the Orange?

 Look them up or ask Rabbi Jana
- ⇒ Props for the 10 Plagues (optional, of course)

DELEGATION OF POWER OF ATTORNEY FOR SALE OF CHAMETZ

KNOW YE that I, the undersigned, fully empower and permit Rabbi Dr. Jana De Benedetti to act in my place and stead, and in my behalf to sell all CHAMETZ possessed by me (knowingly or unknowingly) defined as claimed by The Torah and Rabbinic Law (e.g. Chametz, doubt of Chametz, and all kinds of Chametz mixtures), as well as Chametz that tends to harden and to adhere to a surface of inside of pans, pots and cooking and usable utensils, and all kinds of live animals that have been eating Chametz or mixtures thereof, and to lease all places wherein the Chametz owned by me may be found, especially in the premises indicated below and elsewhere.

Rabbi Jana De Benedetti has the full right to sell and to lease by transactions, as she deems fit and proper and for such time which she believes necessary in accordance with all terms detailed in the general authorization contract which is in the possession of Rabbi Jana De Benedetti authorizing her to sell Chametz; on behalf of others. (Submit at least three days before Passover. It is customary to include a tzedakah donation with the form).

Where's Chametz?



Chametz is any food product made from wheat, barley, rye, oats, spelt, or their derivatives, which has leavened (risen). Our sages have determined that flour from any of these five grains that comes in contact with water or moisture will leaven, unless fully baked within eighteen minutes. As we are commanded by the Torah, if a food contains even a trace of chametz, we don't eat it, we don't derive benefit from it, and we make sure not to have any of it in our possession for all the days of Passover. Search for Chametz... find your Jewish self.


