Mind-full
Anyone who has spoken to me around the High Holy days knows that it is a very stressful time for me. I need to write two sermons for Rosh HaShanah, one sermon for Shabbat Shuva, at least two sermons for Yom Kippur, and a bulletin article. That's about seven or eight inspiring compositions in less than two weeks. Plus there are lots of things that I am trying to coordinate getting everything ready for all of the holidays in Tishri. We try to make it go smoothly, but there is a lot of effort that needs to be put into the process in order for it to look and feel effortless. There is so much to remember, that even when I write notes about everything, there are things that get left out, or cues that get messed up. I apologize for all of my mistakes. It feels like my brain is overflowing with the details. I am trying to be in the moment, and mindful of what is going on around me – the powerful music, seeing everyone at services, the inspirational prayers, and even the cooler temperatures, the larger moons, the earlier sunsets, and so much more. I think that even though I am trying to be mindful, sometimes it feels like my mind is full – it feels overflowing sometimes.

Then after Yom Kippur we have to immediately build a Sukkah - finally, we have a chance to sit down. We have to sit, and we have to take the time to at least eat in the sukkah. The need to build it so soon is stressful too, but at least we are expending physical energy. I usually feel totally drained after Yom Kippur, yet somehow there is enough energy to build the sukkah. Eating in the sukkah is a very refreshing thing. I feel like it is a mini vacation just to be able to sit outside and eat a meal. Even when I have appointments and obligations, and am preparing for more services and more sermons, the fact of sitting outside to eat suppresses the stress temporarily. Of course, it is a little stressful to try to eat every meal in the sukkah, and it is stressful to eat in the sukkah in Shreveport, because it is really hot, and there are mosquitos that won't quit, and I am really afraid of the fire ants...

The wonderful thing about the Jewish calendar is that it builds in other stress relief. Once all of the Days of Awe are finished, and at the end of a week of outside things – it is hard to believe - we dance! With the Torahs! (The plural of Torah should be Sifrei Torah, which translates to "Torah scrolls," but I liked saying "Torahs"). We are supposed to be celebrating that we have finished reading the Torah and are beginning it again. I love that part of the service – when EVERYONE gets an Aliyah: the men, the women AND the children! When I am dancing with the Torah scroll in my arms I am thinking about how much I love the Torah. I am not even thinking about all of the words and letters and stories. I just love the Torah! I love that it is a physical reminder that we are in a covenantal relationship with God. At that moment all we think about is the joyful connection. We dance! For thousands of years we have danced to show our joyful connection with God. We join all of the Jews who have come before us, and all of the Jews everywhere in the world, and we dance. I would call that: Dancing with the Jewish Stars.

Of course, the stress isn't gone, because I am still preparing for Yizkor. Memorial services are difficult. I used to leave the room, since I didn't have any immediate relatives who had died. By the time I was ordained a Rabbi, I had lost my father. Now, even though we are told that Jewish tradition says that mourners only should say Kaddish for immediate relatives, I also think of all of my grandparents, and all of the people for whom I had the responsibility of honoring their memories by officiating at their funerals. The second Yizkor of the year usually barely has a minyan, since it is usually on a weekday, and most people feel they can't take off any more work. We use the Memorial Books that are prepared for Yom Kippur, and I try to keep everyone in my heart as we say the

memorial prayers.

When all of these festivals are over, I miss them. The good news is that we still have Shabbat every week. I get to stay mindful... and mind-full.




