# From Rabbi Jana

**Beignet Zion** In the mid 1980s I learned that the University of Chicago held an annual "scholarly" debate about which is better: latkes or hamantaschen. The debates have been held every year since 1946 and other universities and institutions have begun their own local versions. Over the years many well-known academics have participated. It is something that students, faculty and the community look forward to each year. I found this description of the history and guidelines of the debate:

Several long-standing customs are observed at the University of Chicago: the debaters must have gained a Ph.D. or an equivalent advanced degree, arguments are encouraged to be made using the specific technical language of their discipline, participants must present themselves in academic regalia, and the debaters must include at least one non-Jewish individual. Discussing the event's original purpose at the University of Chicago, Ruth Fredman Cernea observed that scholarly life discouraged exploration of Jewish traditions and did not facilitate ethnic relationships between students and faculty: "The event provided a rare opportunity for faculty to reveal their hidden Jewish souls and poke fun at the high seriousness of everyday academic life." On a practical note, Cernea commented that examinations and term papers would cause stress in the student body and that the event served to help alleviate such tension around final exam time.

Most of us are thinking about latkes and sufganiyot (jelly donuts) for Hanukkah, and don't think about hamantaschen until Purim. Well, now you are thinking about hamantaschen – at least for a moment. Perhaps the debate should be about hamantachen compared with sufganiyot.

This debate is incredibly entertaining – and even somewhat informative. Imagine an expert in a field like physics trying to argue on behalf of a pastry or a fried potato -- or a lawyer, or an insurance agent, or a geologist, or a computer programmer. You see where I am going. What if we had a debate like that here. Which side would you be on, and how would you make your case?

Hanukkah and Purim both represent holidays that emphasize survival against great difficulty. Perhaps we need to acknowledge that it is a miracle that we have come up with tasty foods that represent these struggles – or our victories.

You know that Hanukkah means "dedication" and it also comes from the root in Hebrew for "education." Throughout the ages we have found pleasant ways to teach our history including giving meaning to foods we eat: like latkes reminding us about the story of the Miracle of the Oil, sufganiyot (jelly donuts) reminding us of clever ways to survive. We have also found other enjoyable ways to remember history, against all odds – for example by playing with a dreidel.

In Louisiana we might argue that adding tasty food to a holiday celebration is "*Lagniappe*." There is a possibility that some Lagniappe for our Oneg Shabbat during Hanukkah will be another way of adding Louisiana flavor to our celebration by making our jelly donuts to be *beignets* filled with jelly instead of donuts.

In the spirit of a latke vs. hamantaschen debate I would be on the side for changing our congregation's name from "B'nai Zion," which means "Children of Zion" to "Beignet Zion," because it is uniquely a Louisiana way of .acknowledging the importance of Judaism to us – plus some Lagniappe – the sweetness of the beignet.

So what do you think: latkes or hamantaschen? Beignet Zion? While you are celebrating Hanukkah this year, perhaps these questions give you... food for thought.

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# From Our Educator, Helaine Braunig

December already? It hardly seems possible, yet here we are almost mid-way through a school year. December means Hanukkah; December means family get-togethers; December means standing on the brink of a secular New Year. For children December is full of the joy of celebration. For parents December is often full of busy-ness and a need for quiet and calm. For the Religious School and its teachers, the month is a catch-your-breath and look-ahead time of year: How much have we accomplished? How much more do we want to do? How can we do things better? With an extended break that is correlated to our public school vacation schedule, it is also a time to look for ways to live our Jewish values even if classes are not in session. Where can we volunteer? How can we make a difference? What can we do as a family to increase the Jewishness of our lives? Please know that I am here to help you answer those questions. I hope you will



reach out to me and let me know how I can help you establish some new practices or help you find opportunities to serve others, in our Jewish community and in the general community. Maybe you'd like to learn to cook some Jewish foods or watch a Jewish movie or talk about Jewish perspectives on issues that are in the news every day. Please email me (braunigw@aol.com) or text me (318-469-0945) or even call me to tell me what you'd like to do. I'd be happy to meet you for coffee or go for a walk to talk about how best to use the month-long break in our Religious School year. Classes will NOT meet on December 24, 31, January 8 or 15.

With Hanukkah on the horizon and Martin Luther King Day coming up in January, and having just returned from a visit to the National Civil Rights Museum in Memphis, human rights are on my mind - religious rights like the ones the Maccabees fought for, but also civil rights that today extend beyond race, though race is still something we must talk about and work to understand. However, we also must have the conversation about gender rights and immigration rights and rights for the disabled. The one thing that struck me when I visited the Civil Rights Museum was just how much I was unaware of at the time events were happening. I was a young child when the Civil Rights movement began in earnest with Brown vs. Board of Education and a prayer march in Washington, DC in 1957. But though I was old enough in the early 60s to be aware of marches and sit-ins and boycotts, and I did see news reports about them, I wonder now about the overall silence about racism that characterized much of my youth. I don't recall the Jewish community's being involved in a public way. I don't recall meetings at B'nai Zion to talk about inequality and to demand change. I don't recall an outcry against injustice or support for our African-American brothers and sisters, even though most of us had domestic help in our homes. Can you help me remember? I'd like to find out that I'm wrong about all of this, that I was simply too young to be aware of what was happening. In the meantime, I feel more committed than ever to acting on behalf of those whose rights are threatened today, and I want to be sure our children know what we stand for and why.

In just a couple of weeks I will attend the URJ Biennial, and there I will seek opportunities to learn what Reform congregations in other cities are doing to be actively involved in social justice. I hope you will want to join me in becoming better educated about issues and learning what we can do to help repair our world. We always talk about *tikkun olam*, but we must do more than talk. And, we must be sure that our children hear us talking and see us taking action. I don't want them to look back, as I'm doing now, and wonder why what I saw on tv or read in the newspapers didn't resonate more fully in my life.

One place we can start is with educating ourselves. Please join us beginning Sunday, December 3 through Sunday, December 17 at our Fair Trade Bazaar. Even if you do not shop, come and learn with us about economic realities for those who live in third-world countries. We can make a difference in their lives. And by all means, enjoy Hanukkah, with an emphasis on the *why* we celebrate – and what freedom really means.


# **People of the Book**

### **Dreidel Game Instructions**

<u>Hanukkah Dreidel Game</u>
from the De Benedetti Family

Dreidel: the Yiddish word for a spinning top with four Hebrew letters representing the four words for the Hebrew phrase: a Great Miracle Happened There. In Hebrew the words are get for Dreidel is אַרוֹל הָיָה שָׁם Nes Gadol Hayah Sham. The Hebrew word for Dreidel is אַרוֹל הָיָה שָׁם S'vivon. In Israel the S'vivon says: A Great Miracle Happened Here (בָּס גָּדוֹל הָיָה פֹה). The miracles of Hanukkah include the few simple Jews defeating the Greek-Syrian army, and the small amount of oil burning for eight days.

When the play the Dreidel Game:

# Who Invented Hanukkah Gelt?

### Theories Tracing the Hanukkah/Gelt Connection by Tina Wasserman



Scholars have offered several theories as to the inventor of Hanukkah gelt (chocolate coins, usually wrapped in gold foil). One traces the tradition back to the decision of the Hasmoneans to mint their own nation's coins after their military victory over the Greek Syrians. Another theory focuses on the name of the holiday. Although *Hanukkah* means "dedication," it is linguistically related to *hinnukh*, which means "education." Perhaps for this reason, some Jewish communities chose Hanukkah as the time to celebrate the freedom to be educated Jewishly. Revered Jewish scholar Maimonides made the education/gelt connection when he described gelt as "an incentive for you [children] to study Torah properly."

Writing in the early 18th century, a disciple of the Ba'al Shem Tov (the founder of Hasidic Judaism) noted that it was customary for rabbis to make educational pilgrimages to remote villages during the Hanukkah season to strengthen the Jews' study of Torah. Initially the rabbis rejected payment for these services, but subsequently they came to accept coins as well as whisky, food, and honey as compensation for lost time away from home - in effect, a gift of Hanukkah *gelt*.

It wasn't until the 19th century that Hanukkah *gelt* was given primarily to children. In Sephardic and Oriental Jewish communities, poor children would go door-to-door during the holiday offering to protect Jewish homes from the Evil Eye by burning special grasses in exchange for money or gifts. In Yemen, children would receive a daily coin from their parents to purchase the sugar and red food dye needed to make the "Hanukkah wine" consumed at nightly gatherings during the holiday.

In the 20th century, as political Zionism gained a strong following, the recounting of the Maccabees' efforts to reclaim the Temple became symbolic of the passionate desire for an independent Jewish state. Adults retold the Hanukkah story and gave children coins as they taught them about their heritage.

Perhaps the most familiar form of Hanukkah *gelt* today is a chocolate coin covered in gold foil. This tradition is decidedly European in origin, probably dating from the late 18th and early 19th century, when Jews figured prominently in chocolate manufacturing. Fashioning coins out of chocolate would have allowed poor children to take pleasure in the growing Jewish tradition of receiving *gelt* at Hanukkah time.

This year, may we all remember the values of Hanukkah: Jewish pride, religious freedom, and, as exemplified by *gelt* - the gift of learning.

# Hanukkah Blessings

### HANUKKAH SERVICE FOR THE HOME

A *Hanukkiyah* (Hanukkah Menorah) has space for nine candles. The one that is higher than the others is for the *Shamash* ("helper" or "server"), which is used to light the other candles. Candles are put in the Menorah from right to left (the ones representing the oldest days first). The candles are lit from left to right (the ones representing the newest days first). On the first night of Chanukah, one candle is put in the *Hanukkiyah* and lit using the *Shamash*. On the second night, two candles are put in, and one more candle is added every night until eight are in the *Hanukkiyah* and lit on the eighth night. Light the *Shamash*, then say the blessings below before lighting the rest of the candles for each night. On the first night, say all three blessings below. On the rest of the nights, say only the first two blessings. After the candles are lit, you may continue with readings and songs.
