It's Not About Me

In the early days of our congregation, there was a man named Ben Toshen who was a baker. His pastries were so good that he couldn't keep them on

the shelves. People would come from far and wide to eat his delicious goodies. If anyone was in the mood for a snack, they would go to Ben's place and get something to nosh on.

Ben had three daughters. They loved his pastries too, and kept begging him to make a special pastry for each of them. He decided instead to make each of his pastries three sided. Ben made cookies and cakes—and everything was three sided. He told his daughters that the three sided pastries were in honor of them. They were delighted!.

Another Jewish family moved to town. The Toshens were so happy that there were other Jews around. It just so happened that the new family, who were called the Homsteins, had three sons just the right ages for Ben's three daughters... but that is a story for another time.

Max Homstein wasn't sure what he was going to do for a living. He talked to Ben about what a Jewish guy could do in Shreveport. Ben described his flourishing business. Max said that he can't make pastries, and didn't want to compete with Ben anyway. However, it seemed to him that he could find a different kind of food to make, and perhaps a restaurant that served meals would be helpful to have around here. Ben agreed, and helped Max rent the store next to his. So now people could have a meal at Homstein's and dessert from Toshen's. Max liked the idea of three cornered to honor his three sons. He started serving triangular sandwiches for lunch.

Eventually they merged their businesses, so that people could get their meals and desserts at the same place. They thought that "Homsteins and Toshen's" was too long a name, so Max shortened his name, and they called their new restaurant, that served triangular foods: Hom & Toshen.

Everything was wonderful. The two men kept coming up with new kinds of triangular food. Ben's new specialty was a donut-like pastry that was covered in fine sugar. Almost every time someone ate one of these powdery treats, they would exclaim, "Ben Yay! I am so glad that you had these available today! They are so yummy!" Eventually that became their name: "Ben Yays."

Max loved the Benyays, but—always thinking about names — he suggested that they spell the name in a fancier way. Ben agreed, and they started to spell these powdery treats: Beignets.

Eventually more Jewish families moved into town. Most of the other families sold clothes and shoes and opened other stores. The downtown was filled with stores with Jewish names, run by Jewish families.

They decided to create a Jewish congregation. When they chose a name for their congregation, they decided to honor the first Jew, since he had made a wonderful name for himself and his family in Shreveport. They called their congregation: Beignet Zion.

And that is the story about the origins of our congregation.

I hope you enjoy your Hom-and-Toshen when you come to Beignet Zion to celebrate together this Purim

A quick glance at the B'nai Zion calendar reveals that Purim is around the corner. The Purim carnival brings back lots of memories of Sunday School activities. It also makes me realize that my kids are now 26 and 24 years old and time has flown by. Carson went through Sunday School with only one other kid (Jessica Maxey) his age. Sarah only had a few more than that her age. We participated in every Sunday School event that was scheduled. We drove kids to work at the soup kitchen, to the cemetery to tidy up around the head stones and to other places that Helaine had set up to teach the values of community service. We organized the Purim carnival, ordered the

inflatables, built games and worked the booths. We scraped and painted the playground equipment and treated the ant mounds. We organized the softball games and encouraged kids to participate. We did it because it was a valuable experience for our kids.

Enrollment in Sunday School is higher than it was when my kids were here. For some kids, just like it was for mine, the time at B'nai Zion is their only time during the week to be around other Jewish kids. These kids are scattered throughout numerous schools in the Shreveport-Bossier area—and beyond—but their circle of friends and teammates generally comes from the schools that they attend. Consequently, they may rarely encounter the other Jewish kids outside of Sunday School. Positive experiences that relate to Sunday School activities are generally going to originate with the parents. It's up to them to suggest ideas for Helaine and Rabbi to explore and ultimately it is up to them to implement those ideas. Anna Myers is the B'nai Zion board member that

chairs the Sunday School committee and I am certain that she would value your input and assistance. There is plenty of congregational support for Sunday School activities but the parents can make things happen.

If you think that the Sunday School can offer additional benefits to your/our children, I encourage you to pursue your ideas. Discuss, organize and make them available for our kids.

From our Educator, Helaine Braunig

Weeks away from home have taught me a lot about communication. First of all, Bill and I have realized how many people's lives have intersected with our own. Social media makes it so easy to remind people that you are thinking of them, and with every Facebook "like" or comment or message, we get to remember how long we've known people and in what context. Second, we realize that people still embrace earlier forms of communication- we've had lots of calls and cards and that in-between form: the text message. And of course, we haven't just been on the receiving end. I've used all of the aforementioned forms to keep up with our family and friends. However, the communications have made me most aware that long-lasting friendships can



survive without frequent communication. Months and even years seem to dissolve when we hear from someone for the first time in a long time. Additionally, these messages from people "from the past" make us eager to re-connect in a more personal way- by phone and by making plans to meet again when we visit other parts of the country.

The other aspect of communication that I've become more tuned in to is the communication with the people we actually see often because they live in Shreveport. Too often we go through our daily and weekly routines without paying enough attention to the specific joys and challenges in their lives. I have realized that only a few people are really present for other people, and that I often fail to reach out in meaningful ways to the people I count as important to me. My weeks away have made me consider: How can I be a better listener and a better friend? How can I become more than a Facebook friend? I think it will take a variety of means, but I want to start with you, my B'nai Zion and Religious School friends. I hope you will say yes to my invitations to meet for coffee or lunch, take a walk together, or just visit for a few minutes on a Sunday morning. We can talk about JewIsh community life (if you like), but we can also talk about books and movies and parenting and travel, about current events and about making Shreveport and Louisiana and the United States places that we are happy to live in. We can figure out what we can do better and who can help us, whom we can help and how.

Please look elsewhere in the bulletin to see what's happening in March and April, especially with Purim and Spring Break. Yes, we still provide a print newsletter as well as the phone messages, email, and text messages that have become our usual forms of communication. I don't want to downplay the importance of any of our ways of connecting to each other. However, what I most want you to understand is that our time away has reminded us that underlying all of the messages to us has been the value of your friendship. Bill and I can't wait to return to Shreveport and see you in person. We can't wait to say our thank-you's face to face. We can't wait to be present for important occasions. In the meantime we are thrilled that B'nai Zion's streaming technology makes it possible for us to be with you even from San Francisco - to celebrate a Bat Mitzvah or remember a dear member of the congregation who has died. We are thrilled that we can exchange videos with Religious School classes. Best of all, we are thrilled that staying in touch with you has made the weeks before and after Bill's surgery pass more quickly. See you soon.



A Message from Federation President, Ben Sour

"Paradoxical as it may seem, if a nation wishes to survive, it must not make survival itself its supreme objective, but rather aim at the achievement of good. That alone makes national survival important to its individual members."



One of our biggest challenges is deciding where to allocate our charitable gifts. Some people believe money should be reserved for local giving. Others believe that we should donate more to Israel, or to the Jewish Federations of North America.

Would sending more board members to the General Assembly be a worthwhile investment? Before I went to one, I would have said "no". Now, I would say, "definitely yes".

How do we make sure our contributions will be used in a worthwhile manner, some ask? How do we weigh the different causes? Should feeding a poor person take priority over a worthwhile experience or schooling for one of our children? Or a scholar in residence weekend? Is a cur-

rent proposal really justified or should we decline to fund it because there may be a greater need in the future?

Should we participate more in local organizations that have a robust infrastructure for helping the needy, including needy Jews?

The legitimate questions, tensions, conflicts "go on, and on, and on", to quote a famous professor.

What do I believe? It depends. I believe the board should gather as many opinions and facts as possible, pray that we do the right thing, vote, hope for the best, and listen to those who don't agree with the decision.

Being humans there is only so much we can know. We have to have faith that whatever we decide to fund will, in the long run, be worth our investment.

I just finished reading Les Miserables (the 1,300 page version). It demonstrated how that a simple act of generosity could propagate good through many lives. We have to hope that, when we fund something, our generosity will do a small part to make the world a better place.


