Make Like a Tree

I forget or don't realize, how much time I spend thinking about trees. I love to watch them change color. I wait patiently starting before the High Holy

Days for the leaves to go from what seems like a uniform blanket of green to the royal colors of the autumn. I do notice trees wherever I go, but I love to look at the Japanese Magnolia that I see every day outside my office in the Schuster Garden at B'nai Zion.

This year it felt like fall lasted less than a week. And it came closer to Hanukkah than Sukkot. And then, since it immediately got warm after that cold snap we had, the tree in our garden started to make buds. By the time of Sophie's Bat Mitzvah – the morning of her Bat Mitzvah actually – the blossoms began to turn the tree from brown with grey fuzzy buds, to blazing pink. By the time of Maddy's Bat Mitzvah, the pink may not even be there anymore. If you looked at the pictures on my phone, you would see more pictures of that tree than anything else.

Time seems to go by so quickly when I watch this tree. It feels like weeks – not months – between fall, winter, and spring. Enjoying the colorful display makes the passage of time more poignant, and less stressful.

We can learn a lot from trees.

I remember in college studying Martin Buber's *I and Thou*. Buber used the way we interact with a tree to explain the kinds of relationships we have with things. Sometimes a tree is just an "it." Sometimes a tree, if you spend time thinking about it, becomes more like a "you." Buber goes on to describe the depths of interacting with people, and then with God. I think that in some ways, the fact that I thought about understanding a tree as something more than an "it" was the conscious beginning of what might be called "mindfulness" today. I do try to find some time each day to look at something in a "mindful" way. Lately the trees have been winning for my attention.

I like to think of those moments as "awesome" – filled with awe (which could be called "awful" but obviously would ruin what I really mean). I also think of those moments as "holy."

If the changing colors of a tree leaves me breathless, then perhaps I can learn from the tree: To stop and appreciate the awesome moments.

Try it... try to let a tree leave you breathless. It could be the colors, or the magnificence of the unique shape it has become, or it's refreshing aroma, or perhaps the food it provides... I'm sure you can think of other things to add to the list, especially if you really do take time to get to know the tree.

And make like a tree and let people leave you breathless too.

And realize that if trees can bring you awesome moments, and people can leave you breathless, then realize that God is there, and you are at the I and Thou moment, if you let yourself be. Live in the world. Let it leave you breathless.

Or if it the thing you are looking at is a tree, maybe it is not an "I and Thou" moment, it is an "I and bough" moment. I couldn't resist. I guess you saw all the "leaves" in this tree lesson too. I want to be serious, but the colors cheer me up, and Purim is weeks away.

Before Purim there are many things I would like to do with you. Look in the bulletin, and you will know how to find me.

So how do we assist — or replace — those folks who give so much time to BZ? I hope you will tell me or Rabbi Jana, because I don't know the answer.

I do know that as President, I have gained a new appreciation for all of the efforts it takes to keep things at B'nai Zion running smoothly—from the professional staff, to the Board members, Religious School teachers, and so many volunteers. Please help me thank them when you see their good efforts—and I will add my thank you to everyone who is contributing to B'nai Zion in whatever way you can.

Please keep up with the BZ calendar because, as usual, this month is filled with many things to do at B'nai Zion.

From our Educator, Helaine Braunig

Writing a bulletin article from San Francisco while awaiting Bill's surgery, I'm uplifted by the way you have rallied around us. Your many texts, emails, Facebook messages, and phone calls have reminded us how much we value the gift of community. Often on Sunday mornings at Religious School, at mitzvah projects like the recent packing of boxes at the Food Bank, and at book club meetings, I think how fortunate we are that members of B'nai Zion and Agudath Achim come together to support each other. Bill and I thank you for helping to make our time away from Shreveport easier for us.



The winter months always focus my attention on our Jewish community's place in the larger community as we set the wheels in motion for our annual Blood Drive and Mitzvah Day. If you know of volunteer opportunities that we might be able to join, or if you have special agencies whose work you support, please get in touch with me so that we might try to incorporate new activities into our program and find new beneficiaries for our efforts. In addition to being physically active on behalf of others, we want to channel our tzedakah fund dollars to worthy efforts here at home and around the United States and the world. With that in mind, I hope that you will help me in raising the bar for *regular* Religious School tzedakah contributions. The habit of giving tzedakah is not just a "good deed" – our tradition "commands" that we give. I learned as a child from my parents and grandparents that giving is indeed a *habit* as well as a responsibility, and I want the children in our school to learn the same.

Perhaps I just become more reflective in the winter, but I also focus on the internal Jewish community. I think about the fact that we have new young families who need the support of older people because their own families live far away. I think about the fact that we have older people who have many life experiences to share with those who are younger. I hope that we can make specific plans— across the generations—to work together, learn together, and have fun together.

As we move forward with the second semester of our year, Rabbi Jana, Cantor Neil, and I, along with our teachers, would like to join you in brainstorming ways to enhance what we do in the classroom with home activities. Perhaps you'd like to host a Shabbat dinner for your child's class. Or, how about a Shabbat pajama party for our toddlers and young students with cookie baking and havdalah? Perhaps you'd like to undertake new practices to protect our planet's resources – a great way to celebrate Tu B'Shevat. We celebrate Purim with a big carnival each year, but families can also celebrate at home by making baskets of goodies to share with family and friends, or by watching movies about people real or fictional who have behaved heroically to ensure freedom for others. (Have you watched *To Kill a Mockingbird* with your older children? What about *The Diary of Anne Frank* - to prepare for a discussion of "the Righteous Gentiles" during the Holocaust?) I'm not suggesting that you and your family need to do all of this – just something new for the new semester.

Bill and I look forward to seeing you by the end of the month. In the meantime, we love your text messages and email, and we both appreciate your willingness to help get things done in our absence.


Jewish Book Club

Shabbat Shira—a Shabbat of Music... and Trees



Tu BiSh'vat



Tu BiSh'vat, like Hanukkah, is a post-biblical festival, instituted by the Rabbis. However, the holiday has biblical roots. The tithing system upon which it is based dates back to the Torah and its deep concern with trees, harvests, and the natural world, all of which are at the heart of Tu BiSh'vat. Beginning with the Tree of Knowledge of Good and Evil in the Garden of Eden all the way through to Deuteronomy's injunction against destroying fruit trees in times of war, our biblical text is replete with trees, both literal and metaphorical. Indeed, the Torah itself often is referred to as an *eitz chayim* (tree of life), based on a passage in the Book of Proverbs.

Although the celebration of Tu BiSh'vat has a long and varied history, the theme most commonly ascribed to the holiday is the environment. It is considered a festival of nature, full of wonder, joy, and thankfulness for God's creation in

anticipation of the renewal of the natural world. During this festival, Jews recall the sacred obligation to care for God's world, and the responsibility to share the fruits of God's earth with all.

Tu BiSh'vat falls at the beginning of spring in Israel, when the winter rains subside and the pink and white blossoms of the almond trees begin to bud. It is for this reason that almonds and other fruits and nuts native to the Land of Israel - barley, dates, figs, grapes, pomegranates, olives, and wheat - are commonly eaten during the Tu BiSh'vat seder.

In modern times, Tu BiSh'vat was nourished by the rise of the Zionist movement in the late 19th and early 20th centuries, which re-emphasized the Jewish people's connections to the land and the natural world. It was the Zionist pioneers who - with strong financial support from Jews throughout the world who donated trees to mark *smichot* (special occasions) - re-forested the land of Israel, largely under the auspices of the Jewish National Fund (*Keren Kayemet l'Yisrael*). As a result of this emphasis on tree planting - on Tu BiSh'vat and all year long - Israel stands as the only country in the world with an almost constant net *growth* of trees.







Recently, I attended the Jewish Federations of North America General Assembly, called the 'GA.' If that doesn't mean much to you, don't feel as if you are alone. I felt the same way until 15 minutes after our first meeting started.

Two or three thousand attendees gathered in one room. A voice came over the public address system. It was a young girl, maybe in her teens, telling about her experience in a Federation program. She alternated with three other young people telling their stories. One was from Canada. It was spell-binding to listen to the impact our Federation had had on these young Jewish lives and how awakened they

were to the wonderful things our tradition offers. Other stories would follow: a young girl who qualified for Birthright Israel because she had a Jewish grandparent. A young Muslim girl and her young Jewish friend who attended the same Federation-sponsored school in North Africa.

Reading the schedule of events and deciding which I should attend... they went from 7 a.m. until bedtime... I arrived at the last page and saw something that made me realize I could say that 'our' Federation helped make this possible. There were eight Federations recognized for being in existence for 75 years. We were one of them! The next morning (7a.m.!) at the business meeting, I was asked to stand with the other 75-year-old Federations and be recognized by the assembled leaders.

I met someone from another Federation. "Have you heard of the Greenspoon Foundation?" they asked. "No," I said. "It's an unbelievably easy way to raise money for your local Federation." I met another person from a different Federation. "Have you heard of the Greenspoon Foundation?" she asked. "I just did," I said. 
The February event will be February 22 from 2-3 p.m. in the Tower Ballroom at the Oaks of Louisiana.

A group of Hebrew students were looking at the Torah scrolls in the Ark at B'nai Zion. One student noticed that one of the breastplates had two February dates inscribed on it. Upon closer examination, we saw that it reads:

Marcy Levy Hartman, Lt. J.C-USNR-S.C. Feb. 2, 1918-Feb. 7, 1943: North Atlantic

Does anyone have information that they could share about the significance of the inscription?

Rabbi Jana showed them that the little Ark on the breastplate opens to reveal a tiny Torah scroll. We noticed the lions, and the crowns, and the bells, and the little plaques with holiday names.

When was the last time you got "up close and personal" with a Torah scroll?
