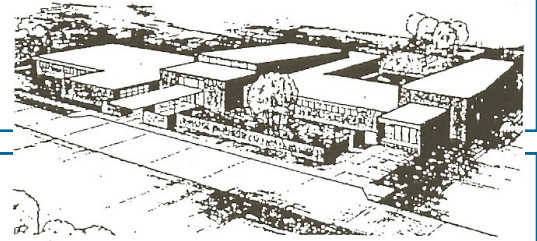

## FROM RABBI JANA...

### WHAT AN HONOR

The saddest day of the Jewish calendar is over. It is time to tell a few jokes...

Have you seen the t-shirt that says, "Let's eat, Grandma" and "Let's eat Grandma" – the first one is obviously inviting Grandma to join them for food, and the other is suggesting that Grandma is what is going to be eaten (yuck – not kosher!) In fact, the t-shirt also says that "commas save lives."

The importance of a comma also applies to the title of this message. I hope people will see: "What an honor!" With the intention that when anyone participates in activities for B'nai Zion, it is an honor. Instead, sometimes it feels like people understand it as: "What? An honor?" Which could either mean that you don't feel like you deserve an honor, or you are not going to do whatever it is that we are asking.

The other joke is a story about a Rabbi and the new President of the synagogue (Please remember that this is not a real situation – just a joke.) The Rabbi says that, as the new President of the congregation, he will be honored with the most important Aliyah of the year – blessing the Torah for a High Holy Day service. The President panics – he pleads with the Rabbi not to make him chant Hebrew in front of the congregation. He is worried that he will mess up. He doesn't think that his Hebrew is good enough. He doesn't want the position of the President to be besmirched due to his "performance." He thinks that the congregation would rather not see him take this honor – and argues that it would be better to give it to someone else. He refuses to do it. The Rabbi explains that, as the new President, the congregation would feel that he is besmirching the position by not having an honor during the High Holy Days. However, seeing how stressed the idea of chanting Hebrew is for the President, he is offered a different honor – one without a speaking part. The Rabbi says that the President could dress the Torah after it is read. The Rabbi explains that all the President needs to do is put the mantle and breastplate on after the Torah has been open for everyone to see. Then the President can return to his seat. The President gratefully accepts this non-speaking honor. The big moment comes – the Torah is read and blessed, then it is lifted. The President takes the mantle and breastplate, puts them on, and returns to his seat. The Rabbi runs after him and calls out – put them on the Torah, not on you! (Not an actual story. I hope you thought it was funny enough to be a joke. In real life, this Rabbi is ready to help you, so you don't embarrass yourself, and it truly is an honor.)

It feels like many people think of honors as stressful and not joyful. The word means "going up." It is a way to help you and the congregation reach a higher spiritual place. It is joyful to participate – even if you feel nervous in front of others. Everyone should be glad to see that you are participating. At B'nai Zion we try to take the stress out of getting an Aliyah. We invite you to help bless the candles or the lead us in the Kiddush. There are many ways to help you with the Hebrew – including opting out of doing the Hebrew at all. During the High Holy Days there are many honors that don't include reading anything at all: opening and closing the Ark, dressing and undressing the Torah, lifting the Torah. We also honor people by having them read translations of the Torah or Haftarah portions – and we need people to chant or recite the blessings for the Torah and Haftarah.

I hope that you always know that it is an honor to be part of B'nai Zion, a Kehillah Kedoshah – "Holy Congregation." Would you also accept an honor to participate in the High Holy Day services? Please contact me to let me know which honor you would like, or please accept the honor if it is offered to you.

I am reminded of a favorite line from the Haggadah:

"We will be held accountable for all the permitted pleasures we failed to enjoy."

## From our Education Director, Barbara Joseph



The month of Elul begins soon, and with it, a time for reflection leading up to the High Holidays. There is a wonderful article at [myjewishlearning.com](http://myjewishlearning.com) that describes some traditional customs and legends connected to the month of Elul, as well as how to engage these rituals as a family. Whether you have children at home or not, the activities are a great way to spend time together with family members or friends, and a great reminder that as Jews, we live our lives in sync with a special calendar.

One of the Elul traditions involves a single blast of the shofar at the end of every weekday prayer service. One way to incorporate this into our homes is to blow a shofar, or even a toy horn, each morning before we head off in different directions (see below, about the start of school). It can be a reminder of the importance of forgiveness this time of year. Share with each other your goals for asking for and receiving forgiveness. And then, when you hear the many blasts of the shofar on Rosh Hashanah, it will be a culmination of your important reflections over the past month.

Whether your child is just starting kindergarten or about to leave for college, this month brings with it the excitement of a new school year. With the new semester comes the possibility of new supplies, different faces in class, and maybe just a bit of nervous energy. I hope this transition is an easy one for all of you, and that you can use the last few weeks of 5778 before Rosh Hashanah to settle into a comfortable routine.

I hope to see many of our younger members and their grownups at the pool party on Sunday, August 5th, and at the Blessing of the Backpacks on Friday evening, August 10. Mark your calendars for September 16, the first day of Religious School!

Donations can be made online, mail or at the B'nai Zion office. The Sisterhood greatly appreciates everyone who helps by contributing to the Flower Fund.

After the flowers are no longer needed at services, sometimes the flowers are brought to someone who is recuperating, or celebrating. You are welcome to request the flowers after the services are over for yourself or someone else who might appreciate them. Contact the office for details.
