News From B'nai Zion Congregation in Shreveport, LA

I read an article recently that explained that just before February began, the northernmost town in the United States finally had a sunrise and sunset for the first time in over two months. The sunrise came after 1 PM and the sunset came shortly after 2 PM. I learned about places like that -that have darkness for months (and then in the summer they have light for months). I still wonder what it is like to pass the days, when it doesn't feel like days are passing, since there is no sunrise or sunset each day. The article went on to explain that almost no one in town would even be able to see the sun, since it is so close to the horizon, and the town and the trees block the sun from view of most people there.

I can conceptualize life like that - but I have a hard time really imagining living under those conditions. I imagine that it is very disorienting. Of course for Jews, one of the hardest parts to figure out is: when is Shabbat there. Not surprisingly, the Rabbis have been trying to work that out for centuries. Some say that it depends on where you come from - if you are from Shreveport, and you wind up visiting or living in a place like that, figure out when Shabbat is in Shreveport and keep Shabbat then. Say the morning and evening prayers when it is morning and evening in Shreveport.

Actually, the Rabbis mostly tell us not to go to a place that makes it difficult to tell day from night. They were even more adamant about not visiting outer space. Depending on the orbit of the spaceship, seeing a sunrise and a sunset could happen many times during what would be a "Shreveport day." Now that even Jews have been to space, modern Rabbis have more positive answers.

All of this makes me think about how time plays a role in our lives. I often debate about whether humans invented time and use it to help us, or is it part of creation and we learn to live within it. (I am not convinced that the two ideas are mutually exclusive, but my debaters seem to think that time is either one or the other.)

It feels like we never have enough time. At the end of the day the to-do list is not finished (it is often even longer than when the day started, despite finishing some things). The older I get, the more I realize that I really won't be able to finish all of the things I want to accomplish. I am glad for the day-to-day tasks, because at least I do feel some satisfaction. I am glad when I get to do things on my wish list.

I am also glad when I get extra time. I am not sure that I would sleep more if I lived in a place without sunlight. I can say that I rest more on Shabbat - even when daytime is not dark. I realize that not everyone takes a day of rest each week, but I still wish you would.

I have to tell you that I am also thrilled that this year on the Jewish calendar we get an extra month. Your day-to-day life may not even realize it, but perhaps this will remind you to stop and notice that Purim and Passover are a month later than they usually are. Usually the February bulletin is filled with preparation information about Purim, but because there is a leap year on the Jewish calendar - which means we add a whole month! - Purim won't be here until the middle of March. Sometimes March is when Passover is celebrated, but this year, we won't be celebrating Passover until April.

I hope you realize that we have the extra time this year. I hope we find a way to make that time useful. It could be a great opportunity to do some more things on our to-do lists or better yet - on our wish lists.




People of the Book Club
