## From Rabbi Jana

Change My Mind

Have you made mistakes? Have others done things that upset you? These are not things that we like to think about. However, sometimes these are things that we

cannot stop thinking about.

Two years ago someone I care about – a lot – promised to do something for me. It was something important to me. I was glad to help them out and they were supposed to help me in return. I am still waiting. Every day I wake up and wonder if it has been done (it hasn't), or if it will be done. I don't like to "nudge," but occasionally I remind them. It had gotten to the point where I was angry about it, then hurt about it, then angry about it. Every day I thought about it. I didn't even want to talk to them, because I didn't want to be angry, and I didn't want to get angry at them. When I did talk to them about it they would explain all the ways that they wished that they could, but they were too busy with other important things that came up in their lives. I was always amazed at how much they were going through, and understood why those things took priority. However, it still seemed like every day I would wonder if this would be the day when I would get a call that they were going to take care of my things.

Something happened to me recently where everything changed. It was something I read in a Torah commentary while preparing for Torah Study. The Torah teaches us – commands us actually – that periodically we need to release people from debts. Sometimes it has to do with slaves, and sometimes it has to do with financial things. Often we read that part and laugh – we crack jokes about "I wish." I wish that I didn't owe anything on my mortgage, or car, or student loans. That isn't what happens in real life. We struggle to understand if this could even happen in a modern world – and usually we wonder how they deal with this in Israel. To be honest, it didn't feel like anything that really had to do with us in the modern world.

The section I read recently was not the one about forgiving debts. It was about giving Tzedakah. Torah commands us to give Tzedakah. We know that. We do that. We give often – time, things, money. The commentary that I read reminded me that when we give for Tzedakah, it isn't our money, time, stuff. G-d gave us those things, and we are supposed to use them the way G-d wants. Sometimes that means for ourselves – but a portion of it has to be used for helping others. I realized that in this case, the right way for me to think about it is to realize that this person has really intended to fulfill their commitment to me, but really did have many other obligations that kept getting in the way. If I change the way I thought about the situation, they could feel better about themselves by no longer feeling the weight of their additional obligation to me, and I would stop feeling angry and hurt every day.

It works. Everything feels better. Every day has more joy in it now that the frustration and anger are gone.


Perhaps this is a lesson in forgiveness. If we try and keep coming up short, sometimes we have to let it go (that goes for my viewpoint and acknowledging their viewpoint). I changed my mind and it was as if the whole situation changed – even though it essentially did not change.

Perhaps this is a lesson in finding insights to change your mind. Not just rabbis can get insights from Torah – this New Year is a great time to recommit to looking for answers and inspiration in Torah and Jewish tradition. I hope I can change your mind about that.

# From our Education Director, Barbara Joseph

On September 15, students in grades 4 through 7 will be continuing the tradition of tending to a cemetery before Rosh HaShanah with a visit this year to the Agudath Achim cemetery at the corner of Yale and Walnut. Two years ago we went to the B'nai Zion section of Greenwood cemetery, and as the calendar and weather allow, each year we will rotate through all four Jewish cemeteries in our area.

For some students, this will be their first visit to a cemetery, so it is a unique opportunity to learn. Here are some of the benefits of this experience:

- Connecting the Generations. For many families, especially in the South, ancestors have been buried at the same cemetery for many generations. Allowing children to see all those that have come before them will give them an appreciation for where they fall in their family's story. This can lead to meaningful conversations about ancestors' lives. If there is not a large history of family members being buried at the same cemetery that can also lead to conversations about where their family's roots are, why they are not together, and might lead to a vacation.
- ❖ Students with family members buried at the Agudath Achim cemetery are invited to learn stories about their ancestors from family members in order to share the stories with the other students.
- ☼ Creating Community. These facilities do not maintain themselves and provide unique challenges in keeping them safe and beautiful. By letting the children participate in beautification days, they will appreciate the work it takes, and teach them early on that even after death we should care for the deceased both in memory and in more tangible, physical ways.
- Earning About the Life Cycle. At the transition from early childhood to adolescence, children begin to conceptualize death. They understand that life can come to an end and they understand the consequences of that shift. This can be a fearful time and they can often overextend their fear to an unhealthy point. By visiting a cemetery, they have the time and space to process those fears, have conversations about life and death, and discuss the lives of those who have passed so they see that we should focus on how they lived not how they died.
- Talking About Traditions. In Judaism there are a lot of traditions around death, caring for the deceased, and honoring both body and soul. We often focus on traditions accompanying holidays when teaching our students, and don't spend as much time on traditions around other parts of our existence. This is particularly sad because the traditions around death and caring for the deceased can be beautiful, carry rich meaning, and teach many lessons. It is worthwhile to share these before they are learned through necessity.
- Appreciating Beauty. Cemeteries can be some of the most beautiful parts of our cities, but often go unnoticed or underappreciated. This is a great time to show kids a part of their city they may not be aware of or have misconceptions about. We can help them see the beauty in a cultivated, honored place for our lost loved ones to rest and be remembered, right in the heart of our communities.


### Ethical Dilemmas from a Jewish Perspective with Rabbi Jana

The "People of the Book" book club has chosen to read *The Three Escapes of Hannah Arendt: A Tyranny of Truth* by Ken Krimstein for its summer book. The discussion of the book will be 7 PM Tuesday, September 10. The book is a graphic biography designed and written by Krimstein, a cartoonist for The New Yorker.

Hannah Arendt was a 20th century philosopher who endured Nazi persecution and then "escaped" from country to country. The book will help us to understand her important writings as well as her life. Many of the book club members remember reading lots of "comic books" as kids, but haven't read in graphic format since the Holocaust book *Maus* made its debut on the literary scene. Now we have another chance to read the way many of our grandchildren read every day!

#### **Sisterhood News**

How interesting that the month of Elul and the month of September start on the same day this year, and that day is coming soon! September brings the beginning of fall and longed for cooler temperatures, and Elul is the month of getting ready for the High Holy Days. B'nai Zion Sisterhood is getting ready to be very busy. There are so many things that Sisterhood does at this time of year, and I look forward to all of the opportunities we will have to be together.

We will be doing quite a bit of **baking** during the month:

- ★ I will be baking sweets beginning at 10:30 am Wednesday, Setptemner 18 for our observance of Selichot. If you can't be with us at that time, but would like to make something yourself you certainly may just bring it to B'nai Zion or you may make a donation to Sisterhood to provide for this mitzvah.
- A few days later 2 pm Sunday the 22nd we will bake round challot for the new year. You can come and make your own challah and customize it by making it pareve or dairy, and adding raisins, poppy seeds, and sesame, or you can order a round challah by calling me or the office. The price will be \$10 for a 300 g loaf, or \$18 for a 600 g loaf.



- Finally, we will bake apple cake for Erev Rosh Hashanah and noodle kugel for Break Fast after Yom Kippur. I will plan for 10:30 am Monday the 23rd, but am glad to reschedule if there is a time that's better for YOU.
- ❖ Other preparations for the Break Fast and for the Sukkot Harvest Dinner soon after will be happening early in October, on the 6th, 7th, and 8th. Please come help if you can.

# We Would Be Honored to Honor You

An honor in Jewish tradition is called an "Aliyah," because the word means "going up" and it is an opportunity to be "called up" to the Torah, to the Ark, or any other type of participation.

Rabbi Jana and the B'nai Zion Ritual Committee would love to honor you with an Aliyah for the High Holy Days. Some people have always had the same Aliyah, some people sometimes have an Aliyah, and some people have never had one. Most of the honors do not involve reading. These include: opening/closing the Ark; undressing or dressing the Torah; lifting the Torah. Some honors do involve reading, for example: blessing the Torah; blessing the Haftarah; reading the translation of the Torah or Haftarah.

There used to be traditions that in order to receive a High Holy Day honor – which most congregations believe are the highest honors of the year – the person receiving the honor needed to make a donation specifically for that honor. B'nai Zion does not require donations to receive honors (although it is always a mitzvah to make donations).



Rabbi Jana is happy to help you feel comfortable with whatever honor you receive – even if you have never done it before.



Honors will be given in order of request. If there is a specific honor you would like, please let Rabbi Jana know as soon as possible.

Every service also needs ushers.

Remember that Rosh HaShanah evening service will be 7:30pm Sunday, September 29 and Rosh HaShanah morning service will be 10am Monday, September 30. Yom Kippur Evening Service (also called "Kol Nidre") will be 7:30 PM Tuesday, October 8. Yom Kippur Morning Service: 10:00 AM Wednesday, October 9, and the Yom Kippur Afternoon Service will be 2:30pm Wednesday, October 9.

On the afternoon of Rosh Hashanah, the ceremony called Tashlich is traditionally observed. Jews go to the ocean or a stream or river to pray and throw bread crumbs into the water as symbols of casting away our sins. We will once again go to the pond at The Glen for our Tashlich ceremony. which has a covered area where we can stand or sit, protected from too much sun, or even rain.





B'nai Zion would like to be sure that everyone who wants to are able to attend events or worship services. Sometimes all that is preventing someone from attending is a ride.
