Freedom/Independence The American calendar in July begins with a celebration of our Independence. Since the battles to achieve independence happened almost 250 years ago, it is sometimes difficult to remember the struggles. It is great that we remember to be thankful for our freedoms.

Jewish history of gaining independence is significantly longer. Some scholars teach that Adam and Eve gained independence when they left *Gan Eden* (the Garden of Eden). We still think that part of Independence is having to make it on our own. In the Creation story the next phase of independence is when it says that we leave our parents and cling to our "*Ezer K'negdo*" (partner). In these stories we humans are independent - need to take care of ourselves - but we get to do it with someone else.

There are many other examples, but arguably the most significant example of gaining our freedom and independence is when we were freed from slavery, and stood together in the wilderness and at Mount Sinai.

I love that Jewish tradition- from the very beginning of existence - values independence as including an element of dependence. Throughout Jewish tradition we are taught that we need to take care of each other.

The fact that we recognize that we need each other - even when we are independent - is especially complicated now that we are taking care of each other and ourselves by staying away from each other.

We are blessed to live in a time when even if we are alone, we can call or zoom each other. We are not disconnected from each other or from the world just because we need to be physically separated from each other.

Unfortunately many people are gaining a horrible freedom: because they are losing jobs as a consequence of this pandemic.

Kol Yisrael Arevim zeh b'zeh: כל ישראל ערבים זה בזה All Israel is responsible for one another. Please let us know what your status is.

For everyone: Do you need anything? Can you help others? Are you checking in on at least one other person?

As you know, one small way that I am trying to bring comfort is by having our "Stay at Home" Shabbat services. When we include "surprise" readers, if feels like people are checking in on us, and we get to check in on them. We are having Zoom Oneg Shabbat times when we have been getting to meet new people and see some people who we haven't seen for a while - sometimes because they moved away, but can easily join us in this format.

If you do not have access to internet, and want to appreciate these services, contact me about other ways for you to watch - can you play a DVD, for example? I can send you a DVD with services. Can you make a phone call? You can join the Zoom gatherings.

Our congregation has mostly people in the high risk categories. As much as we love to get together - and you know that I am a people-person - it is still safest if we are not gathering. The Board and I are monitoring the situation all the time. For this month we still are not meeting in person for services. You are welcome to contact

me or our president, Kathy to let us know how you feel about what we are doing to try to meet the needs of the congregation. Of course, we are especially keeping an eye on what we should do for High Holy Days. We will keep you informed. We are in this together - even if we are staying apart.

I am amazed at the number of people who view our Stay at Home YouTube services. Equally amazing is the wonderful job our rabbi has done with our weekly services. I know no more than you do who might be participating in the service until I tune in. It's a real treat to see family participants some of whom no longer reside here lighting candles, saying prayers or doing a reading. It's a tremendous amount of work pulling this together and the creativity of finding appropriate themes and speakers.

From our Education Director, Barbara Joseph

On August 18, 2019, thirty-eight students, all with at least one parent, along with about 15 Teachers, *Madrichim* and Rabbis, filed into the Youth Group room at B'nai Zion for the opening *Kehillah* (community) meeting. We sang prayers and songs, as well as Happy Birthday to the summer birthdays, and used playdough to create an image to represent all the new learning and experiences that would happen in the coming year. Social distancing was not being practiced, and the term was not yet familiar to any of us.

As the year progressed, the once-a-month *kehillah* meetings settled into a familiar rhythm in the sanctuary, with Rabbi Jana and Rabbi Sydni alternating the *t'fillah*/prayer component. Older students read to younger students, *tzedakah* projects and holidays were discussed. We asked "*Ben Kama Atah*?" or "*Bat Kama At*?" to those celebrating birthdays.



Our last whole school *Kehillah* meeting of the year, unbeknownst to us at the time of course, was at the beginning of March. When Religious School started meeting over Zoom, it was by class. While I can find a few silver linings among all the changes of the last four months, I am sad we did not have the opportunity for our last two scheduled whole-school *Kehillah* meetings.

I read an article* recently that expressed the view that Jewish education has always, and now more than ever, had the dual purpose of dealing with urgent needs *and* planning for the future.

"As a society, the pandemic has led us to pare down our understanding of what is essential; not bars, but supermarkets; not barbershops but hospitals; *not classrooms, but education*. In our Jewish sphere, fighting hatred is essential, but it is not enough; we also need engagement and education. If we are to build a robust, healthy, and innovative Jewish community, we must continue to invest in education; we must know our Jewish selves."

As we look ahead to the fall and what that might look like, many of us miss the sense of in-person community, *kehillah*, that the Religious School as well as our Jewish Federation, Agudath Achim, and B'nai Zion provide. Historically, by caring for the intellectual, spiritual and emotional needs of the people in our community, we have moved through challenges. And now, through the uncertainty of this summer and the coming months, it will help us hone creativity, innovation, resilience, and joy.

I encourage Religious School families to take advantage of Camp Shalom, Camp Chai, and/or one of many other opportunities to gather virtually this summer. Please let me know how I can help connect your child to an appropriate experience.


