Message From the Rabbi

In March, oral arguments were held in New Jersey Superior Court in a case that has broad implications for civil rights in our state. The arguments were made in Latino Action Network et. al. v. State of New Jersey four years after several civil rights groups sued the state arguing that public education statewide is unconstitutionally segregated by race. This has been documented in both demographic studies and by the

state's own statistics. Yet the state constitution, in Article 1, Paragraph 5, prohibits the segregation of any person "in the public schools because of religious principles, race, color, ancestry or national origin."

State law, of course, does not mandate segregated schooling like the old Jim Crow south. In fact, it does the opposite. But we have, nonetheless, one of the worst de facto segregated systems in the country. This is

the result of decades of policies such as redlining and housing segregation; a racial wealth gap affecting Black neighborhoods that impacts the tax base upon which public schools rely; and school district boundaries, which in our state often match municipal boundaries. It is an entrenched and, in many cases, reinforced reality in New Jersey.

Segregation, whether de jure or de facto, does harm to students of all races. It makes race a stigmatizing social status and leaves them unprepared for a diverse world filled with all kinds of people. Desegregated schools and classrooms, in contrast, help students engage across difference, understand different perspectives, and develop empathy.

The judge in the Latino Action Network case must weigh the anti-segregation clause of the constitution against our tradition of "home rule," by which control of things like drawing boundaries rests with local municipalities and maintains that students should be educated near their home. It will likely be several months before a ruling is announced, and we do not know what that ruling will be. What we do know is

that both sides have vowed to appeal, and that it is likely to be elevated to the state supreme court.

We also know that this is an opportunity for us as Reform Jews to express and live out our values. Our movement has long been in favor of civil rights legislation and court decisions. Recently our community has been out in front on issues like voting rights and police accountability.

With this as background, the Religious Action Center of New Jersey (RAC-NJ) is preparing to advocate for equality for education for all New Jersey students. This is in the spirit of the landmark Brown v. Board of Education ruling from 1954 which declared that "separate is inherently unequal." It is also in alignment with Jewish values emphasizing education,

honoring the divine potential in every human being, and loving our neighbor as ourselves.

As you know, my view of Torah and history has made me a passionate advocate for racial equality. And I am not alone. In the 1960's Rabbi Louis J. Sigel advocated for the desegregation of the Teaneck schools, though it wasn't always a popular position.

So when Sarah Blaine, the lead organizer of RAC-NJ asked if I would be part of our movement's response to the upcoming ruling, I said yes. We don't know exactly what this response will be. But we do know that, as with every issue the RAC takes on, it will involve both education and advocacy. It will be rooted in Jewish texts with an eye toward making sure that everyone enjoys the blessings of liberty as we have on these shores.

Stay tuned as I meet the other Reform Jewish leaders—both clergy and lay—who have committed to working on this issue. We believe that Reform Judaism can be a force for positive change, enabling our state to live up to the ideals articulated in our constitution.

The month of April corresponding to the Hebrew months of Adar II and Nisan is a very busy time with lots of important and memorable holidays and events. When you receive this Bulletin, we will be just days away from celebrating our first seder - Friday, April 15th. We need the full seven days of Passover to expe-

rience the seriousness of freedom and the power of song emerging from a united people. Our tradition teaches us that it was only on the *seventh day*, after the Israelites "passed over" the sea, onto the dry land, that they united as one to sing "the Song of the Sea," affirming their faith in God. The Haggadah tells us that in every generation, "B'chol Dor VaDor" we are obligated to see ourselves as leaving Egypt.

Kol Dichfin, the opening line in the Passover Haggadah invites all of us, children and adults alike, to partake of the rich banquet that is the Passover Seder. Our tradition teaches us that the foods, rituals, songs, and stories of the seder feed our bodies as well as our souls.

Our students are analyzing the order of the seder and all special "steps" we take on our journey from "Mitzrayim (Egypt, that is literally "narrow places") to liberation. The seder is the perfect setting to involve your whole family in meaningful memory building and experiences that will last a lifetime. Encourage your family and guests to add their own family history to this glorious holiday.

The pursuit of personal and national liberation takes more than one holiday evening. It is an ongoing quest...

laws, "does God care what we eat," and finally a discussion of Jews in the Civil War and the slave trade. Truly a wonderful and informative weekend for our Temple membership.

Lastly, a note about the war in Ukraine. As of this writing there has been an influx of 3 million refugees into eastern Europe. Almost half of these are children. I'm asking our membership to please donate to assist

Monthly News Update: Uncomfortable Situations By Marion Wolf



ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

When you are young and finding your way in the world, you may face some difficult situations. That is true for the main characters in two new books we've added to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library. Both authors have won prizes for their writing. Both novels are set in the past.

Veera Hiranandani has won a Newbery Honor for


children's literature. Her latest book is <u>How to Find</u> What You're Not Looking For, which focuses on twelve-year-old Ariel Goldman. It is 1967, and Ariel's older sister has just eloped with a young man from India. Ariel's parents disapprove. The U.S. Supreme Court has only



recently decided in Loving v. Virginia that banning interracial marriage is unconstitutional in all 50 states. Not only does Ariel have to deal with her parents' prejudice, she also confronts antisemitism at her Connecticut school (she is the only Jew in her class). Throw in her family's financial problems as well as a newly-diagnosed learning disability, and the girl has her hands full. In an author's note, Hiranandani—the daughter of a Jewish mother and Indian father—explains that she has drawn from her own family's story and has blended fact with fiction. Reviewing this book for the New York Times, Marjorie Ingall says that Hiranandani "handles this dead-serious subject matter lightly, suffusing it with kindness and subtle comedy without being sappy or reductive. It's a pretty astounding achievement."

The Vixen is the work of Francine Prose, who has written 21 novels, garnering all sorts of prizes and critical acclaim. Here she tells the story of Simon Putnam, a recent graduate of Harvard. It is 1953, and Simon has just been hired by a distinguished WASP-y New York publishing firm. Despite his name (which makes Simon sound like a descendant of a Mayflower Puritan), he does not fit into this glittering three-martini lunch milieu. He is Jewish, a native of Coney Island; his family is middle class. The Vixen opens with Simon and his parents watch-

ing TV in horror as they learn of the execution of Julius and Ethel Rosenberg. Simon's mother even knows Ethel personally! Almost the very next day, Simon is given a big assignment at work; he is supposed to edit a trashy novel that will



shore up the firm's failing finances. The book is called <u>The Vixen</u>, the Patriot, and the Fanatic. It has an oversexed heroine called "Esther Rosenstein." It is a terribly written, bizarre smear job of someone no longer alive to defend herself. But what is young Simon supposed to do? How can he balance his ambitions and his conscience? His dilemma grows thornier (and he grows hornier) when he meets Anya Partridge, the seductive author of the book Simon is editing. Nothing is what it seems as Simon navigates some very strange workplace challenges.

Discover how Ariel and Simon cope—come to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library to borrow these and lots of other books.









