

Message From the Rabbi

Rabbi Steven Sirbu

On January 18, the New York Times published an opinion piece by the noted Holocaust scholar Deborah Lipstadt entitled "For Jews, Going to Services Is an Act of Courage." (Copy and paste the first link below). The article was published following a hostage standoff at Congregation Beth Israel in Colleyville, Texas during Shabbat morning services on January 15.

The Jewish community was unified in condemning this act of antisemitism and in hailing their

rabbi, Charlie Cytron-Walker, a hero for keeping his composure and throwing a chair at the terrorist so that the remaining hostages could escape. Prayers ascended from synagogues across the country thanking God that they emerged from the harrowing incident without physical injury.

Dr. Lipstadt's article expressed an idea that is simultaneously self-evident and instinctively wrong. It needn't be said that in 2022, attending a synagogue carries risk; we all know that. And at the same time, we know that it shouldn't be that way. In recent

years, violence and harassment of American Jews has been justified because of our stand on refugees, or the policies of the State of Israel, or because a deranged gunman believes a rabbi can make a call and release a felon from federal prison.

After the hostage incident, many synagogues reviewed their security plans. Temple Emeth takes the same precautions as most other synagogues of our size and setting. We lock our doors. We have security cameras and panic buttons. We maintain a good relationship with local authorities. Sadly, though, we will never know when we will be targeted.

And so when we choose to come to the Temple we come here, not just in an act of faith, and not just in an act of communal solidarity, but also—to quote Dr. Lipstadt—in an act of courage. We know that being Jewish has its risks, and yet we proudly identify with the Jewish people.

I take away a number of lessons from the hostage incident in Texas. Many people will ask if we need better security. Evaluating our security procedures and ensuring that we are following them is always wise. But we must understand that tighter security has a cost—in dollars or in people feeling unwelcome or even in a false sense of security. Creating synagogues that are fortresses cannot be our goal.

Another lesson I take away is that the general American public has yet to grasp the many facets of antisemitism. Of course it is antisemitic if people yell anti-Jewish slurs while they harm us. But it is also antisemitic when they hold us accountable for the policies of Israel, over which we have no control (and sometimes disagree with ourselves). It is antisemitic to believe that Jews control the economy or the media or the government. And it is naïve at best that claiming to be a good Christian means that one is not antisemitic.

The two are not mutually exclusive, and both require study, introspection, and deliberate action.

Related to this is that many Americans do not know how often Jewish institutions are threatened. Many of them attend churches that have no security committee, no security budget, no security procedures other than locking the doors at the end of the day. We, as their neighbors and fellow Americans, must teach them that this is a form of privilege. And, if they seek to ally themselves with the Jewish

community and against antisemitism, they must acknowledge that privilege and leverage it toward a more just society.

Finally, the United States government has created the position of U.S. Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Antisemitism. It is a position in the State Department, meant to monitor what happens in other countries. Nonetheless, the position is vacant because the highly qualified nominee, Dr. Lipstadt, whom I quoted above, has offended some senators with her blunt talk about antisemitism. A strong envoy should be prepared to speak out on this topic no matter whom she may offend. You can urge your senators to vote for her confirmation by copying and pasting the second link below. If our government wants to make a bipartisan statement against antisemitism, this is a clear and easy way.

The United States has always been a safe haven for Jews, though recent events have shown that antisemitism remains a problem even here. The challenge for both Jews and non-Jews is to ensure that this is a country free of bigotry and the violence that often comes with it. When we succeed, attending synagogue will no longer need to be an act of courage, but simply one of love and devotion.

Message from President Michael Robinson


In order to implement the Viewpoints DEI program a pilot program was conducted. This article is a summary of the results of the pilot program.

The Reform Jewish Movement has embraced the concept of Audacious Hospitality. This is an effort to develop a Jewish community that is more inclusive, and reflective of a wide range of identities and the diversity that is the reality of modern Jewish Life. At Temple Emeth, the Viewpoints Committee is leading the effort to incorporate these ideas into our community. We have recently organized two pilot DEI (Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion) groups. We


would like to share this experience with you and hope that you will be interested in joining our efforts. The first part of this report is a description of the DEI process written by two of the facilitators. The second part is the personal reflections of a Viewpoints committee member involved in the organizational work.

As part of Temple Emeth's effort to become more inclusive two pilot DEI working groups were formed. One group was co-facilitated by Susan Schwartz and Howard Lieberman; it included six other congregants. They met via Zoom for six ninety-minute sessions, with the goal of creating a safe and brave space to have frank and forthright discussions about awareness of DEI-related issues in general and specifically at Temple Emeth. Conversations involved the recognition of individual biases, as well as suggestions about what is needed to make congregants feel not only welcomed but also that they truly belong. Meetings included a mixture of discussions, readings, videos, and a review of the Audacious Hospitality Survey provided by URJ to delve into the details. The group also evaluated results of the Harvard Implicit Associations Test which was taken by each participant in order to reveal the existence of unconscious and often unrecognized biases in us all. Topics such as interfaith families, racial and ethnic diversity, LGBTQ+ inclusion, and ableism, as well as accessibility were discussed. The overall goal was to learn from the pilot program and adjust group structures, meeting agendas, and topics for eventual dissemination to the Temple membership at large, as a way to create a more inclusive community.

DEI – Those were just three letters to me until I became involved with the Viewpoints Committee and discussions about Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion. I



I had years of sensitivity training when I worked for the Teaneck Public Schools (ahead of the time I think – since I have been retired since 1999) and felt that I was pretty aware and sensitive to the feelings of others. Then came the Temple trip to



How about all the members of the Temple family? A single parent who is balancing work and child rearing: someone handicapped whose obstacles include walking down Emeth's long hall or struggling to hear a streamed service; a gay couple; a person of a different background, ethnicity, or color; someone who is struggling financially; one who is recently divorced. How much do we know – how much do we care – how can we become more concerned, caring, respectful, inclusive? These are the questions that DEI is asking. Two groups met, talked, questioned, and gained a new selfawareness. It is time to take it further - to involve more people in the process, and to work hard to make our Temple a truly caring community, one in which every person is understood, respected, and valued. Thanks to the efforts of Karen, Phylis, and the Viewpoints Committee, and to the leaders and participants in the first two groups, we have begun. Let us all pledge to continue.

little known story of the survival of the Bulgarian Jews during WWII. In March 1943 the Bulgarian pro-Nazi government cancelled the deportation

of the entire Bulgarian Jewish community of 48,000 people. This movie tells their story through the eyes of three of those survivors. The film was directed and produced by Elka Nikolova, who will join us for a discussion of the film.

Bio of the filmmaker:


Elka Nikolova was born in Bulgaria and studied psychology at the University of Sofia before she moved to the United States in 1994. In 2000 she received her MA in Media Studies, with a focus on film production at the New School in New York. She has worked in film and television in New York since 2003. Her documentary film, "Binka: To Tell a Story About Silence," completed in 2007, premiered at MOMA in

New York. She co-produced and edited the documentary film "Angel Wagenstein: Art is a Weapon" directed by Andrea Simon and completed in 2017. At the end of 2020 she completed her second documentary film "A Question of Survival" about the legacy of the Holocaust in the Balkans, as seen through the eyes of three Bulgarian Jewish survivors from New York. The film premiered on April 5, 2021 at the South East European Film Festival in Los Angeles. She is currently working on her third documentary "The Dressmaker," which continues the exploration of the Holocaust in the Balkans.

The only exception is once each fall during Sukkot, when they offer produce and herbs from the garden to our congregants in exchange for whatever donation they offerwhich literally is seed money for the next spring's seeds and plantings.

A Message from Julie Weisman, Temple Emeth gardener

Brrr!...We don't think it could get much colder than some recent days have been...which makes it the perfect time to be planning next year's Temple Emeth Garden.

Emeth gardeners have been dreamily poring over seed catalogues and by the time you read this Bulletin, will have ordered seeds for the crisp cucumbers, juicy tomatoes, and sweet snow and snap peas that we have learned do well in our soil. This year we plan to start many of our vegetables indoors ourselves, rather than buying them as seedlings from a nursery. This means planting them in little peat pots on our windowsills in late February so that by the Sunday after Mother's Day, which is our usual "planting day" for summer crops, our seedlings will be hale and hardy and ready to go into the ground.

Of course, some of our favorites, snow peas, sugar snap peas, and spinach are frost-tolerant, and we will be planting those directly in the garden at the end of March. Stay tuned for the actual planting dates, which we will include in the next edition of the Bulletin.


Monthly News Update: Historical Fiction, Modern-Day Reflection By Marion Wolf



ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

What is your preference? Do you like to read historical fiction with vivid details that transport you to the past? Or would you rather read thought-provoking essays about the present? Either way, we have you covered with two new additions to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library.

Rebel Daughter is a young adult novel by Lori Banov Kaufman. That name may sound familiar, because the author spoke to us at a B'Yachad Breakfast in November. She came to us over Zoom from her home in Israel. When she heard about a fascinating archaeological discovery, Kaufman




was inspired to write this tale of the 1st century. Near Naples a 2,000-year-old gravestone of a slave—a Jewish captive brought to Rome—was found, and the Latin words on the stone suggested some sort of romance between master and slave. Kaufman embarked on ten years of meticulous research about life in ancient Jerusalem so she could tell a story about that time through the eyes of the young girl who grew up to be that slave. Esther is the daughter of a Temple priest. She is a witness to the Jewish war against Roman occupation, which ends with the destruction of the Second Temple. Hers is a tale of survival under extraordinary circumstances. Real historical figures like Josephus are featured in the narrative, and the book brings that turbulent era to life. Rebel Daughter is Lori Banov Kaufman's first work of fiction.

Dara Horn, who is famed as a prize-winning novel-

ist, has come out with a collection of essays called <u>People Love Dead Jews</u>. Its title surely draws one's attention to what Kirkus Reviews calls "this bril-

liantly readable yet purposefully disturbing book." It seems that whenever there is a deadly antisemitic attack, Horn is called upon to react on the Op-Ed page. This troubles her, because she is always asked to write about dead Jews, not living ones. It is this realization of hers that has led to this book. Horn's first chapter is about "Everyone's



(Second) Favorite Dead Jew," whom she identifies as Anne Frank (perhaps coming in after Jesus?). The diarist is remembered for her statement: "I still believe, in spite of everything, that people are truly good at heart." But this was written, Horn notes, about a month before Anne Frank met people who must've convinced her otherwise. Horn contends that the deaths of Anne Frank and other Jews have been turned into vehicles for ethical lessons that have little to do with the Jews themselves. The author shares her thoughts and feelings about a wide range of topics: Shylock, Ellis Island mythology, Holocaust museums, and a Jewish Heritage Site in Harbin, China. A Goodreads reviewer says, "Throughout, she challenges us to confront the reasons why there might be so much fascination with Jewish deaths, and so little respect for Jewish lives unfolding in the present."

Come to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library, where you'll find great books about Jewish life both past and present.
