Message From the Rabbi

A few months ago, the New York Times made a change to their style guide. It ceased using the term "anti-Semitism," and replaced it with "antisemitism."

The decision was unannounced at the time and went unnoticed by many at first. But the change was reported in December by several Jewish press outlets. The

change had been pushed for some time by advocates such as Deborah Lipstadt, who now serves as the Biden administration's antisemitism envoy. According to the Jerusalem Post, it was also supported by the International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance and the Anti-Defamation League.

The change, though subtle, is significant.

The hyphen and the capital S imply the

existence of something called "Semitism." In reality, such a thing has never existed, at least not with any agreed upon definition. Semitism in its original context was the grouping of all Jews into a single race. But the Jewish people around the globe have varied skin tones and facial features. The original concept of Semitism, then, is flawed. And, to take the argument one step further, there was never a movement called Semitism. The new spelling captures this truism.

The only accepted academic use of Semitic was not in the categorization of people, but in the categorization of language. We understand that Hebrew, Aramaic, and Arabic all have similar alphabets, cognates, and vocabulary. ("Semitic" in this context comes from the biblical character Shem, son of Noah.) That said, it does not mean that peoples who speak these languages should be lumped into a racial or ethnic group. Not only is it inaccurate, but it gives cover when Jewhaters are accused of antisemitism. They deny the

charge based on the claim, often true, that they have no bias against Arabs, who are also Semitic. Such a semantic evasion is both confounding and disingenuous. The new spelling undermines this claim.

The new spelling of antisemitism by the New York Times is a noteworthy, positive development. The

Associated Press and the Jewish Telegraphic Agency both followed suit. And it is reminiscent of the New York Times' decision in 2020, which I favor, to capitalize "Black" to better reflect African Americans as a distinct ethnic, cultural, and social group. But the removal of a hyphen should not be considered more than it is. The real work of combating anti-

semitism is not in how it is spelled but how it is repelled.

The ADL has done wonderful work in calling out antisemitism. Their Center on Extremism works to expose criminal plots and harassment campaigns. They have also taken on Facebook and other social media platforms which permit Holocaust denial and other forms of antisemitic speech. This is part of an overall mission to combat discrimination in all its forms. Our Jewish Federation monitors antisemitism in our region and alerts local authorities when appropriate.

Words matter, but actions matter more. If a new spelling of antisemitism can help people better understand what it is (and isn't), then I am in favor. In an era of increasing nationalism, each of us has a role to play to ensure that antisemitism is not tolerated, so that hate does not flourish and so that our community can be secure.



One Book, One Synagogue Shabbaton Saturday, January 8, 2022

Temple Emeth invites you to our One Book, One Synagogue Shabbaton on Saturday, January 8 to explore the themes of *And After the Fire*, a work of historical fiction set in both late eighteenth and early nineteenth Century Berlin and modern-day New York. While we hope you read this excellent book, it is not necessary in order to enjoy the Shabbaton.

- At 9:00 a.m. on Zoom, Rabbi Sirbu will lead a text study on the writings of Moses Mendelssohn, the foremost thinker of the Haskalah (Jewish Enlightenment) and grandfather of Felix. Moses Mendelssohn's work shaped the society in which his grandson composed, and continues to impact our view of Judaism in the modern world. To join on Zoom, click here.
- At 10:30 a.m., our Shabbat Morning Service will include excerpts from *And After the Fire*, reflecting how the themes of the book are interspersed throughout the Siddur. Cantor Tilem will sing selected liturgical music from 19th Century Germany. You must show proof of vaccination to attend the service, which will also be shown on livestream.
- At noon, we will enjoy a Kiddush lunch, which will be served in accordance with the Temple's policy for Covid-safe meals, incorporating individual packaging and/or designated food servers. Lunch is free, but you must RSVP to Adult Education Chair <u>Linda Poskanzer</u> at <u>lindaposkanzer@msn.com</u> by Monday, January 3. Proof of vaccination is required to attend the lunch.

And After the Fire draws us into the salon of Sarah Itzig Levy (1761-1854) in Berlin. Central to her gatherings was music, like that composed and performed by Johann Sebastian Bach and Felix Mendelssohn Bartholdy. Both were controversial figures in the Berlin Jewish community—Bach for his antisemitism and Mendelssohn Bartholdy because he converted from Judaism to Christianity.

• At 1:00 p.m., Temple accompanist Thomas Mustachio will perform a concert of music by Bach and Mendelssohn Bartholdy to help us appreciate the importance of Sarah Levy's salon. He will be joined by virtuoso violinist <u>Bela Horvath</u> https://www.msmnyc.edu/faculty/bela-horvath/. Proof of vaccination is required to attend this concert, which will also be shown on livestream.

Social Action in Action

Update from Sarah Blaine, Lead Organizer, RAC-NJ about progress in advocating for **Democracy in a Day/Same Day Voter Registration.**

We are making an impact.

Over the past week, our congregations have organized virtual lobby visits with quite a few key legislators and/or key members of their staff (Sen. Weinberg, Assemb. Johnson, Sen. O'Scanlon, Assemb. Stanfield, etc.) and more are in the works. Recently, our RAC-NJ campaign strategy team (and coalition partners) met with the bill's primary assembly sponsor, Assemb. Raj Muhkerji, to discuss a strategy to get this bill done ASAP, either before the end of this legislative session or at the very beginning of the next session. We have been having important and impactful conversations with key county election officials, and we have heard agreement on both sides of the aisle (as well as from our coalition partners - League of Women Voters of NJ and New Jersey Institute for Social Justice) about needed changes to the bill as written.

We are making our voices heard.

The Star Ledger recently ran our Op Ed in support of same-day voter registration, available at https://www.nj.com/opinion/2021/12/want-more-people-to-vote-then-new-jersey-needs-same-day-voter-registration-opinion.html Please amplify and share widely. More Op Eds and letters to the editor are in the works. Keep them coming! All of us working in relationship together create new opportunities and stronger work. Our committee chair call-in day really made an impact! We ensured that the relevant committee chairs know our bills need to see the light of day. Our efforts were also a model of accountability

to one another, as 42 RAC-NJ leaders from across the state committed themselves to the project, made the phone calls, and shared the feedback they heard. Well done!

Last but not least, there is an opportunity to deepen our thinking about the ways in which we need to work together to combat antisemitism and racism. Between in-person and virtual attendance, over 500 people participated in real time in the Gertrude & Milton Kleinman Consultation on Conscience: Antisemitism and Xenophobia in American Society on December 5. If you missed it, it's not too late to hear from Eric Ward, Director of the Ford Foundation; Rabbi Jonah Pesner, Director of the RAC; Dr. Karen Gaffney, author of Dismantling the Racism Machine; and Rev. Dr. Charles Boyer, founder of Salvation & Social Justice. Status of the Reproductive Freedom Act.

The Temple Emeth Social Action Committee has been working with NCJW- Bergen and with Thrive (an advocacy group that has also been in coalition with Planned Parenthood and numerous others). The RFA has not been posted for a vote. In an article Senator Sweeney indicated that the full RFA would not be posted for a vote as there were concerns and that there were not 21 yes votes in the Senate. The Legislature is on break until Jan. 3. Lame duck ends on Jan. 12 or 13. Thrive hasn't given up. We'll keep you informed if action is requested.



Monthly News Update: Short Stories for the Whole Family By Marion Wolf ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION



Among the treasures in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library are collections of Jewish short stories (when you feel like a nosh instead of a full meal!). Some of these stories are intended for adults, while others are meant for youngsters.

The Oxford Book of Jewish
Stories, edited by Ilan
Stavans, contains 52 stories
from all over the world
(tales originally written in
about a dozen different lan-




guages). Among the authors represented are Sholem Aleichem, Franz Kafka, Isaac Bashevis Singer, and Primo Levi. There are lots of Americans here, too—Saul Bellow, Bernard Malamud, Francine Prose, Allegra Goodman, and Philip Roth, to name a few. Stavans explains in his preface that he has included "writers engaged in deciphering their Jewish identity, responsible for stories of high artistic value that serve as mirrors to major transhistorical themes like antisemitism, assimilation, interreligious relations, mysticism, and the tension between politics and faith."

A brand-new book in our library is <u>An Angel Called</u> <u>Truth & Other Tales from the Torah</u>. The authors are

Rabbi Jeremy Gordon and Emma Parlons. Rabbi Gordon is a Conservative rabbi in London (where the Conservative movement is called Masorti), and

Ms Parlons is one of his congregants. Both of them had searched unsuccessfully for short Jewish stories that would engage 10–13-year-olds. They decided to write the stories themselves! They brought onboard to their project Pete



Williamson, a gifted illustrator. Rabbi Gordon and Ms Parlons have created one "micro-tale" for each weekly portion and one for each festival. The stories are each told from the point of view of a young person, often a girl. These tales are told with humor, and the discussion questions that follow each story raise interesting spiritual and philosophical issues. Say the authors, "We've never seen anything like it, we wanted our own kids to read it and so…we wrote it! We hope you love it." For more information about this book, take a look at




