Exploring the themes of The Book of Lost Names by Kristen Harmel

## <u>9:00 a.m. – Torah Study Session:</u> "The Bible of Lost Names"

Several Biblical characters have multiple names or are ascribed additional names in Rabbinic literature. According to the Midrash, for example, in his infancy, Moses was given ten names, each to reflect an aspect of his significance or his future. At this week's Torah study session, we will study these texts to understand the significance of these multiple names.

This morning's Shabbat service in the Sanctuary will incorporate the themes of our book. Rabbi Sirbu will read from Parashat Va-y'chi, the last portion of Genesis, which refers to the third patriarch alternately as Jacob and Israel. The service will also be shown on livestream.

The Torah teaches us that every human being is created in God's image. We become God's partners when we choose to care about and help others. All of us share the

Tzedakah is a hard word to translate. The Hebrew root indicates that it has something to do with "justice and righteousness." Many people translate tzedakah as "charity," but in the Jewish tradition tzedakah is a mitzvah, a religious obligation. The Talmud teaches us that tzedakah outweighs all other commandments.

After a busy holiday season, (both my grandchildren were born in December) it's time to slog through winter and be thankful we don't live in Buffalo. Anyway, I wanted to give you a short update as to where we are with our strategic plan and reimagining what Temple Emeth is and what it could look like in the future.


As you know, we have divided our concerns into five categories. They are finance, Religious School, Adult Education, physical plant, and staffing. Because we had to start somewhere, we decided to first look at the "low hanging fruit." That is finance, Religious School, and Adult Education. After spending some time looking at data points and getting feedback from the Temple community, it's time to look at the action steps needed to help improve outcomes that the Temple provides its congregants. To do this we have created subcommittees to investigate the various ways we can improve our institution.

I'll start with finance. Finance is the engine that ultimately drives our Temple forward. Without a sound financial plan even if we have the most innovative programs in the world, we have no way to drive the programs forward without funds. Thanks to co-chairs Stuart Breslow and Temple treasurer Gary Richards, as well as a crack financial team, we are looking at ways to put ourselves in a sound position far into the future.

The next area is Adult Education. Even though we have always had a strong Adult Education program at Temple, we can always look for ways to make the programs we have even better and institute new programs to bring added excitement to our existing offerings. Linda Poskanzer and Karen Rappaport are heading this effort on behalf of the

Strategic Plan Steering committee. I hope we can have a report from them at the March board

meeting.

Finally there is our Religious School. Due to our changing demographics and a general decrease in enrollment we need to find innovative ways to educate our young people. The young are important to the future of our institution and their Jewish education is essential to what kind of institution we intend to be in the future. This subcommittee's co-chairs Stacey Butler and Marty Breznick have had the courage to think outside the box (and if necessary, fashion a whole new box) to give our young people the Jewish educa-

tion that they rightly deserve and we are obligated to provide.

All three of these areas are being examined at as we speak. We have not forgotten about the other areas either and will be looking at them in depth in the near future. I encourage you to ask questions as they come to mind.


#### Martin Luther King, Jr. Birthday Events on Friday January 13 at 8:00 p.m. and Monday, January 16 at 6:00 p.m.

## Temple Emeth Viewpoints Committee Programs for February 2023



The mission of the Viewpoints committee is to present programs that highlight all the different types of Jews in the our community. The following are the programs scheduled for February 2023.

#### 1. Friday, February 17 at 8:00 p.m. Disability Shabbat

The speaker is Lisa Shulman, MD, a Neurodevelopmental Pediatrician and a Professor of Pediatrics at Albert Einstein College of Medicine. She specializes in treating children with developmental and learning disabilities. In her work she hears from families who want to feel more included in the community. Her talk, "Shining a Light on Inclusion", will be on ways to make our Temple community more inclusive.

#### 2. Thursday, February 23 at 7:30 p.m. NY Historical Society presentation



## Social Action in Action

Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition Update
The new year seems to be a good time to update you about the work of the Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition, NNJSC, of which we are a founding member. The information below comes directly from their latest newsletter.

NNJSC is currently helping the largest number of individuals ever, as they are receiving more and more requests to help families coming over our southern border.

• New fundraisers include NNJSC as the grateful recipient of a couple of generous grants.

- Two events combined musical entertainment and fundraising. One was made possible by Deb Goodell, a former trustee and secretary on NNJSC's board who established the Brookside Trio. A second was spearheaded by Adán Vásquez, who directs a program which teaches music appreciation, theory, and the playing of musical instruments to disadvantaged children.
- NNJSC ran a combined plant/garage sale, made possible by mountains of help from some board members, friends, and clients.

The coalition keeps us abreast of federal and state laws and other issues related to immigration, by holding half-hour educational sessions before some of their monthly meetings. You are all invited, just express your interest at nnjsanctuary.com. A sampling of the speakers has included:

- Alain Menthe, Welcome Home Jersey City: Program for Resettlement of Afghan Immigrants
- Carlos Rojas Rodriguez, Immigrant Justice Network
- Hilary Li, Detention Watch Network: The New Way Forward Bill. The NNJSC also advocates for those forced to flee their home countries.

Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition has joined with members of Pax Christi, First Friends, and other organizations to form the Interfaith Campaign for Just Closures, which aims to end the I.C.E. detention programs at New Jersey detention centers and focuses on the rightness of "releases, not transfers" of those asylum seekers in centers that are closing.

NNJSC has been working with a Haitian couple with two children, one of whom has cerebral palsy. They moved to Chile and were discriminated against for being Haitian, feared for their lives there, so they tried to enter the U.S. but were turned back at our border during the Trump era. They eventually made it into the U.S. on a second try by crossing the Rio Grande (with the young girl with CP suffering a broken pelvis due to strong currents during the river crossing). They have applied for TPS (temporary protection status) and received some much-needed medical help for the daughter and school entry for their son, but not without extreme difficulties along the way here in the US.

A new arrival in our Cuban community is the daughter of one of our clients, who had to be left behind in Cuba with her mother, when her father came to the US several years ago. She is now 12 years old, and had her first day of school in the U.S. this past September.

Finally, after helping some Afghan émigrés with temporary finances for a few months, the coalition learned a few weeks ago about an 82 year old Ukrainian woman, with a brother and sister-in-law living in NJ, who came here from Kharkiv last spring after her husband died. NNJSC managed, with the help of yet another foundation and a contribution of some of their own funds, to help MZ's family rent an apartment for her in the same complex where they live. She has also applied for TPS, but that could take a year or more for her to receive. Meanwhile, the only government aid for which she qualifies is a home health aide provided through the German government's aid for WWII refugees.
