# Message From the Rabbi

As I write this my heart is heavy because of the recent proliferation of gun violence in the headlines. The mass shootings at a grocery store in Buffalo and an elementary school in Uvalde, Texas, have shocked us with both their inhumanity and the ways that high-powered firearms can cause so much devastation in so little time. But beyond these grotesque crimes have been two attacks on the New York City subway system in recent

weeks, and countless others that do not make the headlines because they are no longer "extraordinary," that is to say, sadly, that they no longer surprise us.

These incidents followed the hostage situation in January in Colleyville, Texas. In that incident, the hostages escaped unharmed, but again it was a gun that brought terror to that congregation. The

rabbi and three congregants acted decisively in order to thwart the terrorist and get away.

With this in mind, I closely followed the church shooting in Laguna Woods, California, on May 15. This attack on a house of worship hit home for me. The attacker was greeted by a receptionist (what we would call a "greeter") but refused to fill out an intake form with his name and contact information. He had no previous ties to the church, where members worship in Taiwanese, but chose that location to harm strangers because of his grievance with Taiwanese people. He had clearly planned the attack, sealing off the exits his victims would try to use when they fled. Like in Colleyville, the split-second actions of the parishioners subdued the gunman and saved many lives.

America, with a deep-rooted gun culture, can be a violent place. This violence goes back to our founding. Not only was independence from Britain achieved through warfare, but violence was regularly used against Native Americans and Black slaves. (My current interest, as you may know, is the violent period of

racial terror lynching from 1877-1950 and the lessons we can learn from it.) We cannot build a society that shuns violence until we acknowledge this history, because building a peaceful society means not merely passing laws or reforming institutions, but changing our culture.

Changing culture is by definition a slow process. It

involves an evolution of shared language and societal norms. It also requires a commitment to a common future that is brighter than the past. Changing culture is difficult, which is why it is rare. And there are inevitably setbacks.

But it is not impossible.

In the Torah, the Israelites changed their culture several times. The first was as a

group of former slaves to a nation that cared for one another within the context of the covenant. The second was when this commitment and this covenant would need to apply not just to living in tents, but to settling the land of Israel. It changed again when the Jews were expelled from Israel and forced to live as a minority in far-off lands. Each change enabled us to adapt to new circumstances, and each was built upon core values and past successes.

In this country, it can be argued that our culture has changed around smoking, seat belts, and drunk driving. Each of these changes was the result of a sustained campaign that convinced a majority of Americans that change would benefit everyone. It wasn't perfect, but it can model the culture change that we seek with regard to gun violence.

After these senseless killings, fueled by hatred and other forces I still don't understand, we can mourn and be angry today, but real change will require patience, diligence, and vision. It has been done before, and it can be done again.



#### **Social Action in Action**

Did you take action with Social Action this year? We thank you if you did. We thank you for your donations to the Janice Preschel Social Action Fund, and we hope that you will join us as we help us to support a neighbor, a cause, even our democracy.

Here are some of the worthwhile causes we supported this past year:

#### Food security

We held a High Holiday Food Drive in September, and, together with the Federation, a Mega Food Drive in March. In November and June we served Family Promise Walk-in dinners for 150 homeless people each time.

#### **Dedicated Shabbatot**

We had Repro Shabbat, Refugee Shabbat, and Earth Day Shabbat.

#### **Environmental Action Day**

There was a Clean up the Park event in October.

#### NJ Social Justice Remembrance Coalition

Our October event was in Eatontown NJ, where we heard a Mingo Jack Presentation.

In April we cosponsored a breakfast with B'yachad on "The Sacrifice Zone."

#### Advocacy, in collaboration with RAC and RAC-NJ

We made individual lobby visits last summer with Senators Bob Menendez and Cory Booker regarding the Freedom to Vote national voting rights bills. We drew over 500 people total to hear our Senators.

This month we attended Every Voice, Every Vote 2022 National RAC Campaign to get out the vote.

#### Civic Engagement

Around the time of the NJ November election, we provided information about new voting procedures such as early voting, and we urged people to get out the vote. We anticipate doing more GOTV (Get Out the Vote!) work around the interim elections this fall.

We took on the Fair Chance in Housing "Ban the Box" bills. We participated in dial-in days to our legislators. We made lobby visits with Senator Loretta Weinberg and Assemblyman (at the time) Gordon Johnson. We wrote letters and Op-Eds. Our presence in this campaign, with Fair Share Housing, made a big difference. The bill passed—the first in the country!

We participated in a Same Day Voter Registration campaign called "Democracy in a Day." This was a collaboration with the NJ League of Women Voters, the NJ Institute for Social Justice, and many other organizations. We made lobby visits to Senator Weinberg and Senator Johnson. Just recently we created and participated in a Trenton Lobby Day for Same Day with more than 50 organizations represented to get this bill passed before the November election.

#### Reproductive Freedom Act

We supported and worked on the local bill that codified Roe vs Wade in New Jersey.

We took part in Abortion Rights Rallies and protests with NCJW, Planned Parenthood, and other organizations.

Back in November we attended the NJ Consultation of Conscience.

#### **Charitable donations**

We contributed to the Center for Food Action, Northern New Jersey Sanctuary Coalition, HIAS, Ukraine, TIFF, Israeli Environmental Clean UP Organization, Haiti (our yearly donation), and the Teaneck High School Scholarship Fund.

#### **A Future Project**

We plan to work on a NJ School Desegregation court case.

We are working to make the world a better place (tikkun olam) and to support Jewish values. This is an open invitation: when you see or hear of an event, please join us.


# Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library

Monthly News Update: Lives Interconnected


Three new acquisitions in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library explore interconnections. Two of the books are fiction, and one is nonfiction. All three books show us the links between people's lives and the moment in history where they find themselves. Some of the interconnections are random; others are familial.

City of a Thousand Gates is the debut novel of Rebecca Sacks. It is set in modern-day Israel. Sacks introduces a large cast of characters from disparate backgrounds with differing view of the Israel-Palestine divide. These characters include a college student, a professor, a journalist, and a soldier. Their "stories coincide,



intersect, and intertwine...It is the depiction of their intimate lives—as mothers, daughters, sons, lovers, and husbands—that lets this book reveal complicated, painful truths about life in a conflicted land. With profound empathy, Sacks evokes the universal drives that motivate individuals on both sides—the desire for security, freedom, and dignity that each of us, no matter who or where we are, recognize and share."

David Grossman is the Israeli author of More Than I Love My Life, which has been translated from the Hebrew by Jessica Cohen. Grossman has written numerous works of fiction, nonfiction, and children's literature. His writing has been translated into more than 40 languages, and he has



won all sorts of international prizes. This latest Grossman novel has its origins in a true story, that of a Yugoslavian partisan fighter, Eva Panić Nahir. She was a good friend of David Grossman, and she asked him to tell her family's tale. Her fictional counterpart is Vera, a 90-year-old woman. We learn that back in the 1950s Vera refused to betray her husband's memory and denounce him as an enemy of the people. For this she spent three years imprisoned and tortured on the island of Goli Otok off the coast

of Croatia. Now Vera, her daughter Nina, and filmmaker granddaughter Gili travel back together to that barren island. The hope is that this trip can fill in missing pieces of Vera's story and bring about some sort of healing for these three generations, whose lives have all felt the impact of Vera's awful history.

Real life history is the subject of Jonathan Kaufman's <u>The Last Kings of Shanghai</u>: <u>The Rival Jewish Dynasties that Helped Create Modern China</u>. The author is a Pulitzer Prize-winning journalist, who has reported on China for 30 years. Here he relates the remarkable multigenerational saga



of two clans of displaced Baghdadi Jews, who have flourished in Shanghai and Hong Kong. First to arrive was David Sassoon, who with his eight sons built a business empire across Asia, bankrolled England's future king, and advised prime ministers. Grandson Victor Sassoon built the Cathay Hotel, one of the most glamorous in the world, on Shanghai's waterfront. Elly Kadoorie started out as an employee of the Sassoons but later became in his own right one of the richest and most powerful men in Asia. His two sons carried on his family business. The Sassoons and the Kadoories "stood astride Chinese business and politics for more than 175 years, profiting from the Opium Wars; surviving Japanese occupation; courting Chiang Kai-shek; and nearly losing everything as the Communists swept into power...Kaufman enters the lives and minds of these ambitious men and women to forge a tale of... family rivalry, political intrigue, and survival. He also tells the triumphant story of how they joined to rescue and protect 18,000 Jewish refugees fleeing Nazism." For most of us this is unfamiliar history, and it reads like a thriller.

In these new books both fictional and real families are caught up in significant historical moments. Come to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Library to read about their lives.
