Message From the Rabbi

Following Israel's recent elections, Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu was invited by President Reuven Rivlin to form the country's next government. A majority of Israeli's voted for right-leaning parties, and they claimed 65 of 120 seats in the Knesset, including 35 for the Likud party and 30 for other conservative parties.

Netanyahu's view of a possible two-state solution with the Palestinians has gone from skeptical to hostile. In a move that was intended to rally the support of settlers, the Prime Minister said during the campaign that he would unilaterally annex parts of the West Bank. This promise, if fulfilled, would erode what little foundation is left for a two-state solution that would ensure Israel's future as a Jewish democracy. It would likely lead to a new round of international condemnation and strengthen the Boycott,

Divestment, and Sanctions (BDS) movement that seeks to undermine Israel's legitimacy.

At least 16 seats within the 65-seat coalition are going to be held by Orthodox parties. Though in 2016, the Prime Minister made a ground-breaking agreement with non-Orthodox Jews for access to the Western Wall, he froze the agreement the next year under pressure from these same parties. The compo-

sition of the coalition, in which any religious party can bring down the government, indicates that he will have no incentive to unfreeze the agreement unless compelled to do so by a court.

In short, this was a very disappointing election for

me and, I suspect, for many members of the congregation. But I think it is important to remember that our relationship to Israel is deeper than politics.

We connect to Israel because it is the place where Jewish culture and the Hebrew language thrive. We support Israel because Israelis are our family—either literally or figuratively—and we understand that family must depend on one another. We love Israel because it is the land of our ancestors and the fulfillment of the dream that Jews should have an independent state where we can determine our own destiny.

As we prepare this month to celebrate Israel's 71st birthday, we can and should continue to advocate for our values—democracy, tolerance, and pluralism—even when an election disappoints us. For as it says in Israel's anthem: "Our hope is not lost, the hope of two millennia, to be a free people in our own land, the land of Zion and Jerusalem."

Message from President Amy Abrams

It's the time of year when the weather turns nicer, we can enjoy being outside again, and our spirits improve with the sun. It's also the time when we begin to expect our new pledge forms from Temple Emeth. So it's time to talk about money again.

I'm certain you all remember the theory behind our voluntary commitment program. We wanted to break down any financial barriers that might have been stopping anyone from joining (or remaining in) our family. We wanted people to focus on what they love about Temple Emeth, not just on how much it cost them. We wanted to avoid the unpleasantness of congregants

having to ask for a dues reduction. And we wanted to create transparency that would help our members understand what it costs us to offer the programs we do, so that each of you knows where your money is going.

With the enthusiastic approval of the congregation, therefore, we instituted a double switch. We not only changed the dues structure, but we also committed to an essential restructuring of the culture of Temple Emeth. No matter how much you pay, we are thrilled to have you in this community, no questions asked. It was our belief that choosing your

own pledge level would help foster the joy of belonging, rather than the annoyance of being billed for a fixed amount. We hoped that the corollary of being more comfortable about the financial side of things would inspire more people to become engaged and involved in the many activities Temple Emeth has to offer.

Has the program worked? I would say most definitely that it has. Our income from member pledges has tracked our previous income from dues pretty closely. Significantly, many more payments have been made on time, which suggests that our members are both more able and more willing to meet their pledges than had been the case previously. And maybe I'm in a bubble, but it seems to me that the spirit and energy at Temple Emeth has been rising in the last two years.

It is crucial to keep up our momentum going into our third year. Based on the experiences of some other synagogues, there is a risk that members will begin to take the whole approach for granted, feeling that it's ok to relax and cut back on your own pledge because things have been going so well. In fact, on the contrary, the way the model of voluntary pledges should work requires our members — you — to continuously review Temple programs and expenses and recommit to support Temple Emeth each year.

T'rumot Halev asks you to give to the Temple from your heart. Keeping in mind that Temple Emeth is your spiritual home, we hope that when you get your pledge form, you will invest generously in a place where the return to you is immeasurable.

This past month we had a great turnout for the Louis J. Sigel Scholar-in-Residence program the weekend of April 12-14. Rabbi Saperstein's lectures were scholarly, engaging, inspirational, and humorous. We have a lot of thinking to do about how to approach the issues he raised for us, both as a congregation and as individuals. Many thanks again to David Fox and Rob Staffin and their amazing committee.

We also enjoyed a fabulous Annual Congregational Seder, as always ably coordinated by Rachel and Mike

Eastman and led by Rabbi Sirbu with help from Richard Buchbinder and Marc Klausner.

On May 1, our own Cantor Tilem is receiving an honorary doctoral degree from Hebrew Union College acknowledging her 25 years of cantorial service. A sizable contingent will attend from Temple Emeth to cheer her on, despite having to sit through a full graduation service to be there for her part. We think it's worth it.

Three brothers, Tuvia (Daniel Craig), Zus (Liev Schreiber) and Asael (Jamie Bell), manage to escape and take refuge in the forest where they played in childhood. Seeking a way to avenge the deaths of their loved ones, the brothers turn their daily struggle for survival into a battle against the Nazis. As news of their exploits spreads, others join the fray, willing to risk their lives for even brief freedom.


Monthly News Update: The Stories We Tell By Marion Wolf ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION



The stories we tell as individuals help us make sense of our lives and understand who we are. Likewise, the stories we tell about the Jewish people can help shape our shared identity. The Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library has recently acquired four books filled with fascinating Jewish stories.

The first, In the Land of the Armadillos, is the debut

story collection of Helen Maryles Shankman, who has been nominated for two Pushcart Prizes and has also written a critically acclaimed novel. The eight interconnected tales in this book are all set in a German-occupied town in Poland in 1942. Myth and



folklore mix with horrible realities of the time in "a testament to the persistence of humanity in the most inhuman conditions." In a glowing review for the Jewish Book Council, Ranen Omer-Sherman says that this "stands out as one of the most original and consistently captivating short story collections to have appeared in recent years."

A second book set in the same time period is also about people prevailing in the worst possible circum-

stances. The Tattooist of Auschwitz is the first novel written by Heather Morris, a New Zealander living in Australia. This international best-seller is based on a true story. Working in an old age home in Melbourne, Morris met a Slovakian Jew named Lale Sokolov, who shared his live




story with her. He spent two and a half years in Auschwitz-Birkenau, where he was forced to tattoo his fellow prisoners. In July of 1942, when Lale tattooed a number on the arm of Gita Furman, he vowed that he would survive and marry her. Jenna Blum calls this "an extraordinary story of love so fierce it

sustained people enduring the unimaginable."


Another best-seller added to our shelves is The Other

Woman by Daniel Silva. This is "a masterpiece of espionage, love, and betrayal" by Silva, who "is best known for his long-running thriller series starring spy and art restorer Gabriel Allon." Allon is chief of Israel's secret intelligence service. In this installment, he is lured into the hunt for a traitor after his most



important asset inside Russian intelligence is murdered while trying to defect to the West. "Fast as a bullet, hauntingly beautiful, and filled with stunning double crosses and twists of plot, <u>The Other Woman</u> is a tour de force."

The last of our new books is America's Jews & America's Game: Voices of a Growing Legacy by Larry Ruttman. Ruttman is a practicing lawyer in Boston, who produces and hosts a TV interview show. His book is a work of oral and cultural history based on inter-



views with players, owners, officials, sportswriters and others involved in America's favorite pastime. According to Jonathan D. Sarna, chief historian of the National Museum of American Jewish History, "There may well be more books about Jews and baseball than there are Jews who played professional baseball. But this one is different. Here baseball's most interesting Jews speak in their own words about their lives, their love of the game, and above all about their Judaism. Informative, inspiring, historically significant, and a pleasure to read, this is a book that anybody who cares about America's game or America's Jews will cherish."
