

Message From the Rabbi

Jewish history has gone through periods of welcome, when borders are permeable and identities flexible, and periods of exclusion. The Book of Ruth represents a period of welcome.

The story seems an unlikely one for the Bible. Naomi, the mother of two grown sons is widowed. Her sons marry Moabite women, Ruth and Orpah, but in the next verse Naomi's sons die too. And all this is in the first

five verses of the book. With no man to represent and guide them, this family is an anomaly. Orpah makes the conventional choice and returns to her father's house; he will presumably find her another husband.

Ruth, however, chooses to stay with her mother-in-law and to journey with her back to Judah, their ancestral land. Ruth makes a passionate declaration devoting herself

both to Naomi and her God: "Do not urge me to leave you, to turn back and not follow you. For wherever you go, I will go; wherever you lodge, I will lodge; your people shall be my people, and your God my God. Where you die, I will die, and there I will be buried. Thus and more may the LORD do to me if anything but death parts me from you."

By tradition, Ruth is the first convert to Judaism, and these words are considered by many to be the moment Ruth converts. I believe that is mostly true. The Bible does not mention conversion as we consider it today, because one's national identity and religious identity were essentially one and the same. Just as it would be farfetched today to think one could convert to, say, being Irish or Korean, so too would conversion to Judaism have been considered. Rather the Bible strongly implies that a woman takes on her husband's national identity when she marries, and then eventually raises sons with that same identity.

So what happens when a woman who has no children becomes widowed? Ruth is in a legal gray area. In my view she is not so much converting as she is affirming the identity she assumed when her husband was alive. Without a man to make her an Israelite through marriage, she makes herself an Israelite through kindness and devotion.

To the author of the book, Ruth can seem to do no wrong. She is obedient and a hard worker. And she knows how to seduce a man without bringing shame upon either of them. (At least I think that's what she does; the text is vague on the details.) At the end of the

book, it is established that King David will be her descendant. There can be no greater reward.

I mentioned above that this is an unlikely story for the Bible. Most of the Bible tells the story of powerful Israelite men. They establish laws, seal covenants or lead their troops into battle. Most of these same texts portray other nations with suspicion

or worse. The Book of Ruth, by contrast, is about the good that is accomplished when a Moabite woman and an Israelite woman, both essentially powerless, form a bond of friendship and love. The welcome Ruth receives as a Moabite living in Judah is unprecedented and uplifting.

The festival of Shavuot, which falls this year on May 16-17, features the Book of Ruth. There are many reasons for this, including the harvest scenes that would have taken place this time of year. But the key connection of Ruth to Shavuot is the sense of commitment and covenant. Just as the Israelites as a nation commit themselves at Sinai to a covenant with God, so too does Ruth as an individual with Naomi as her witness.

Both the Israelites and Ruth had suffered prior to this moment. Both must have been fearful of what such a commitment truly meant. But in the end, both chose faith and community.

Since that moment, the Jewish people have admired Ruth for her choice. We welcome Jews-by-choice as part of her legacy. And we pay tribute to her on Shavuot, the day that celebrates the union of God, Torah, and Israel.

Greet every person with joy - Avot 3:16

On Shavuot we celebrate a wonderful gift, the Torah. Our tradition teaches us that the Torah was "given"

years ago on Mount Sinai, but it is "received" every day. A rabbinic story explains that at Sinai each of our ancestors heard what was in his or her power to hear. It teaches us that in each generation we have the power to open our ears, eyes, and hearts to the words of the Torah and accept them for ourselves.

The stories, laws, and values in the Tanach Dora Friedman (five books, Prophets, and writings) are the building blocks for Jewish life. Each year as we celebrate Shavuot we re-commit ourselves to the guidance of Torah in our lives. Jewish ethics and values are rooted in the Torah. Examples of ethical teachings in Torah include "Love the stranger as yourself for you were strangers in Egypt" (Leviticus) and "Justice, justice you shall pursue" (Deuteronomy).

Message from President Nickie Falk

Survey Says...What Members Are Thinking

Thanks to all of you who answered our recent survey about reopening our building. We recognize that the responses reflect your feelings about a moment in time and that your viewpoints might be different in a month or two. My own position changes daily, depending on the news reports, and Governor Murphy's and the CDC's daily press briefings.

The survey was meant to give us a snapshot in time as our Ad Hoc Committee on Reopening the Building

develops guidelines to give to our Board as they grapple with what will happen going forward. So, what were Temple Emeth members thinking as of April 16, the cutoff for responding?

Would you feel comfortable coming to Temple if you did not know how many or the percentage of members who have been fully vaccinated against COVID-19?

40.51% responded they would feel comfortable, while 59.49% said they would not.

Are you fully vaccinated against COVID-19? Of the 158 people answering the survey, 154 were vaccinated; 3 were not; and 1 preferred not to answer.

If you are the parent of a Religious School child, is your child/children attending classes?

21.43% of our children are attending classes in their school's building; 35.71% are going to school virtually; and 42.86% are learning through a hybrid situation.

Will you feel comfortable in the Sanctuary if children (those under 16) are present and not yet fully vaccinated against COVID-19?

49.37% of our members would attend services in our Sanctuary with unvaccinated children present; 37.34% would not; and 13.29% preferred not to answer the question.

What services/activities would you feel comfortable coming to the Temple to attend?

The response to this question was mixed, with people feeling most comfortable attending Shabbat and High Holidays services.

If the Temple has limited seating for services or other activities available on a first-come, first-served basis, would you want to reserve a spot?

Email was the reservation basis of choice, with 62.66% saying they would reserve a spot by email; 24.68% through ShulCloud (our online database system that all members have access to); 9.49% would rather call the office; and 3.16% gave a mixed bag of other means of responding.

It is likely that the Temple will reopen to limited attendance before we resume serving food and drink. If services, Torah study, or other activities resumed in person, but without the Oneg or bagels, would you be more likely to attend, just as likely to attend, or less likely to attend?

Only 3.16% of those responding said they'd be less likely to attend if no food were served; 31.92% said they'd be more likely to attend; and 82.91% said they'd be just as likely to attend.

es that are also livestreamed would you be more likely to attend outdoors, equally likely to attend, or more likely to watch on livestream? 31.01% would be more likely to attend outdoors; nearly half, 46.20%, would be equally likely to attend outdoors or watch on livestream; and 22.78% would be more likely to watch on livestream.

If the Temple offered in-person, outdoor servic-

If an outdoor service needed to be cancelled and moved to livestream because of inclement

weather, how far in advance would you need to know to adjust your plans?

Most people, 81.01% would only need two hours to adjust their plans, while 14.56% needed at least 8 hours; and 4.43% would prefer at least 24 hours' notice.

What's next?

The Officers have already established clear protocols for those special lifecycle events that the Board has authorized people can enter our building—Bar/Bat Mitzvah, funerals, weddings, Auf Rufs, and Confirmation. These include limited attendance, distanced seating, masks, temperature taking, and information collected for contact tracking. We are now investigating what possible changes to our physical structure would we need to consider before letting people back in greater numbers. The Board and Ad Hoc Committee on Reopening the Building welcome your feedback. Please continued (president@emeth.org) with your comments so that I can pass them along.



PRICE FOR CEMETERY PLOTS INCREASES JULY 1

The Bergen County Reform Temple Memorial Association is a cemetery association founded in 1954 to serve Temple Emeth. Prices for graves will increase from \$900 to \$1200 per grave effective July 1, 2021. This is the first price increase in seven years. While the \$1200 price is still well below market value, we encourage you to consider making a purchase while the \$900 price is still in effect.

Family plots of four graves or larger are available in our sections in Cedar Park and Beth El Cemeteries on Forest Avenue in Washington Township. Single graves and multiples thereof are available in our section in Riverside Cemetery located on Market Street in Saddle Brook. In accordance with the cemeteries rules, we may sell graves only to Temple members for use by those who at the time of their death are of the Jewish faith.



Monthly News Update: How to Travel During a Pandemic By Marion Wolf




ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

While we have been in lockdown for over a year, the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library has been steadily acquiring new books. Several of these volumes tell stories set in places far from Teaneck, New Jersey. You may be stuck at home, but let your imagination roam!


According to the *Jewish Review of Books*, A. B. Yehoshua is "the greatest Hebrew novelist." His latest novel, skillfully translated by Stuart Schoffman, is <u>The Tunnel</u>. It tells the story of Zvi Luria, a 72-year-old retired engineer living in Tel Aviv. His wife

is a respected pediatrician, and their long, loving relationship is at the heart of this book. Together they are facing a big challenge: Luria has the beginnings of dementia. To stave off his decline and stay engaged with the world, he takes an unpaid position



assisting a young engineer building a road in the northern Negev. On the route there is a Palestinian family living without proper permits among ancient ruins. A tunnel would allow them to stay there. Robert Alter writes in his review, "A story centered on cognitive decay and involving an encounter with Palestinians that has fraught political implications may sound a little grim, but it is characteristic of Yehoshua's fiction that most of this is rendered as wry comedy—a strange sort of comedy that repeatedly highlights bizarre incongruities." The Tunnel is both witty and suspenseful; it's no wonder that it is a finalist for the National Jewish Book Award.


To Be a Man is a collection of short stories by Nicole Krauss. *The New York Times* calls her "one of America's most important novelists and an international literary sensation," whose stories "cross boundaries of geography and convention." *Esquire* says this book is "masterfully crafted



and deeply contemplative...an astounding collection of ten globetrotting stories, each one a powerful dissection of the thorny connections between men and women." Krauss's male characters are fathers, friends, seducers, and even a lost husband who may never have been a husband at all.

Haim Watzman is an American-born, Jerusalem-based writer, journalist, and translator. Since 2008 he has written a column called "Necessary Stories" for *The Jerusalem Report*. From that column Watzman has chosen 24 stories of Israeli and Jewish life and compiled a collection also called <u>Necessary</u>

Stories. Sometimes Watzman reimagines historical encounters; at other times he shares personal anecdotes. Joseph Skibell says, "Necessary Stories is a quietly beautiful work, haunting in places, gently funny in others, written by a graceful, thoughtful, eloquent man."
