

Message From the Rabbi

This month our Religious School year will end, and with it an era at Temple Emeth.

For decades—probably since the very beginning we have taken pride in educating the congregation's children in our own educational program. In doing so, our students learned Torah, Hebrew, and Jewish history. They made Jewish friends. And they came to appreciate the Temple building as their spiritual home. Following their final year of Religious School, they often went on to youth group, Confirmation, or serving as madrichim.

At the same time, the adults of the congregation, no matter what their age, understood that educating our

children meant doing our part to build a strong future for our congregation and for the Jewish people generally. No one would give that up without great consideration.

Unfortunately, changing demographics and the decrease in school enrollment compelled the Temple's leadership to consider a change to our educational format. As you probably know, we are pursuing an educational collaboration with Temple Sinai, though as of this writing, a final agreement has not yet been reached.

This, like many transitions, is bittersweet. We can celebrate all that we accomplished in our Religious School, even if we are sad or disappointed that it is ending. We hope to do this in two ways in the month of May.

On Friday, May 12 at 8:00 pm, we will have our annual Milestone Membership Shabbat. Every year it is a reflection on how the Temple positively impacts our members. This year, fittingly, the focus will be on education. Temple member Jill Kravitz, who participated in our Religious School as a student, parent, and teacher, will reflect on what the school has meant to her.

On Sunday morning, May 21 at 9:15 am, we will conclude our year as usual with a Moving-Up Ceremony. We will show our appreciation to our current teachers for a wonderful and inspiring year, and we will also honor Dora Geld Friedman and Barbara Shater for the countless hours they have spent creating a nurturing

> educational environment for our students. Following the Moving-Up, at 11:00 a.m., we will have a celebratory brunch, including music, dancing, and tribute videos. It will be a memorable and festive day! (And though it is a separate event, I hope everyone will stay after the brunch for a program on Jews and chocolate, led by Rabbi

Deborah Prinz.)

Modifying our Religious School program to reflect the changing needs of the congre-

gation is both necessary and difficult. The transition can be easier when we bring our current format to a fitting close, and we appreciate that the core values of our school can continue to guide us as together we create something new.

Congratulations Rabbi Sirbu

Rabbi Steven Sirbu will be marking the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination next month. He has spent 20 of those 25 years at Temple Emeth, so indeed this is a milestone for our whole congregation. In honor of this anniversary, Rabbi Sirbu will receive an honorary doctorate, formally known as Doctor of Divinity (Honoris Causa), from the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion at their annual graduation ceremony. The ceremony will take place on **Thursday, May 4 at 4:00 pm** in the Lowenstein Sanctuary at Temple Emanu-El, 1 East 65th Street in New York City. The keynote speaker that afternoon will be Rabba Sara Hurwitz; she is known as the first female Orthodox rabbi. 

Justice Brandeis and His Legacy Tuesdays May 9, 16, 23 and 30 - 8:00 to 9:00 p.m.



Louis D. Brandeis, the first Jewish justice of the Supreme Court, is perhaps the most famous Jew to come from Louisville, Kentucky. Before joining the Court, Brandeis gained renown as "The People's Lawyer" and an advocate based in Boston. Only later in life did he embark on his most significant contribution to Jewish life: redefining American Zionism. This class will examine Brandeis's legacy as a lawyer, judge and Zionist and attempt to apply some of his lessons to our political and legal landscape. Our primary textbook for this class will be "Louis D. Brandeis: American Prophet," by Jeffrey Rosen. Temple Emeth, as a member of the Religious Action Center of Reform Judaism (RAC), is participating in RAC's Power for Purpose national campaign advocating for policies that will deliver a clean, healthy, livable future for all communities, particularly those most impacted by climate pollution.

Small Changes Can Have an Impact Social Action Committee Environmental Call for Action! How to Conserve Water and Use Alternatives to Plastic:

Turn off the water while brushing your teeth.

Try and limit how often you flush the toilet.

Take guick showers and save 1000 gallons a month.

Take showers instead of baths.

Look for and fix leaks.

Plant hardy plants outside and limit lawn watering.

Use a dishwasher instead of hand-washing dishes.

Do everything you can to eliminate the use of plastics!

Install water filtration systems and use tap water.

Drink out of non-plastic glasses and cups, or reusable water bottles made of glass or metal.

Use products that come in biodegradable or compostable containers.

Buy larger containers of liquids to refill smaller containers, in place of buying multiple small containers.

Refill your cleaning supply bottles with cleaning tablets and water.

Use plastic alternatives, such as paper, glass, or metal containers.

There are many new products made of mushrooms, seaweed, and other compounds that are biodegradable and can be used as non-plastic "plastic," for utensils, food wrap, containers and more.

Compostable non-plastic "plastic" bags can be bought online at large retailers.

Support the non-plastic movement with your intentions and habits!



Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Monthly News Update: Glimpses Into Others' Lives by Marion Wolf ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION



Sometimes when you read a novel, you wonder what it must feel like to face the difficult circumstances the characters face and how you might deal with their problems if you were in their shoes. A sensitive, well-written book opens your eyes to other perspectives. We have added two such works of fiction to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library. These books both draw on the authors' own lives, and both have poetry sprinkled throughout them.

In fact, the very title of one of them—Moriel Rothman-Zecher's Sadness Is a White Bird—is taken from a poem (that poem is Palestinian poet Mahmoud Darwish's "A Soldier Dreams of White Lilies."). Sadness Is a White Bird is a coming-of-age story, the debut novel of




Rothman-Zecher, who is known for his journalism and his own poetry. Like his main character Jonathan, Rothman-Zecher is an Israeli citizen who spent some of his early years in the United States. We meet Jonathan, when he is 19 years old. He is in an Israeli prison writing letters to his close friend Laith. We do not know what crime has landed Jonathan in that prison, but we gradually learn about his life from those letters. We hear the story of his grandfather, a Salonican Jew whose community was destroyed by Nazis. Jonathan's grandfather managed to escape and fought as a young man to establish the State of Israel. Jonathan has always taken pride in his heritage and looked forward to serving in Israel's army as a paratrooper. But his situation

becomes complicated when he forms a deep friend-ship with Laith and Laith's twin sister Nimreen. Those siblings are Palestinians, and their family history is tragic, too—only they have suffered at the hands of the very Israeli army Jonathan seeks to join. Nevertheless, Jonathan goes ahead with his service in the IDF. Then he finds himself policing a Palestinian demonstration. This book is beautifully written, powerful, and disturbing.

Laura Zigman is the author of several novels. <u>Small World</u> is her latest. Like her main character, Joyce Mellishman, Zigman grew up with two sisters, one of whom was disabled. In real life and in the book, that sister lived some of her life in an institution and died young. What impact does that have on those who survive? In <u>Small World</u> Joyce's older sister Lydia moves back east after almost 30 years in Los Angeles. The sisters, both divorced, decide to live together until Lydia can find her own place. They

seldom discuss the loss of their sister Eleanor, and instead of forming a close bond as adults, their relationship is fraught. Though this book deals with a serious subject, the author has a light touch and injects humor with charming "found poetry" from Joyce's neighborhood social networking



site. This novel of sisterhood and hope reminds us that sometimes you have to look back to move ahead.



WHAT IS TEMPLE EMETH'S TEEF?

We are in the midst of celebrating Temple Emeth's 75th Anniversary! How proud we are of Emeth's history and its many contributions to the local and larger community. We can thank our clergy, lay leadership, and the support and generosity of our members for our continued vitality and financial viability.

One important aspect of Temple Emeth's financial picture is the existence of the Temple Emeth Endowment Foundation (TEEF). A campaign in 1983, for Temple's 36th Anniversary, raised monies for our first endowment fund.

TEEF was established as a formal foundation in 1991 by the Temple's Board of Trustees under Temple co-presidents, Micki Grunstein and Diane Winer, as a charitable, non-profit corporation to safeguard these endowment funds and invest them for Temple's sole benefit. Sue Keusch was the president from the inception until about 10 years ago and remained a board member only until recently. Sue's contributions and dedication have been immense. David Fox took over as president after Sue and continues in that role to this day. TEEF's current board members include Sue Breznick, Steve Chaiken, Wendy Wineburgh Dessanti, Idajean Fisher and Laura Kirsch, who has served as TEEF's legal counsel all these years.

TEEF's current assets are \$430,000. It has provided a safety net and necessary loans to the Temple throughout its history at low interest rates. Some examples include a 30-year long term loan with a \$95,000 balance remaining from the late 90's building addition and a short-term, one year borrowing agreement which was recently implemented for a \$98K loan for overdue kitchen renovations, that we are pleased to say, has recently been repaid.

Donors through the years contribute to a large variety of restricted funds (specifically how income and earnings are used) which support music, the arts, education, youth, caring community and unrestricted funds which support Temple's operating expenses and more. This certainly enriches our programming and events. Temple members can contribute as little as \$10 at any time to an existing fund, and with a substantial donation of \$5,000 or more, may actually create a new fund in honor or memory of someone and be recognized, if so desired. This beautifully embraces the concept of posterity.

Summary of Minutes of the March 9, 2023 Board of Trustees Meeting

Rabbi Sirbu reported that the RAC trip to Washington, D.C. was a success; seven teens participated; the Temple will be participating in a gathering at Votee Park on April 25 to celebrate Israel's 75th anniversary. At the end of the Religious School year the current positions of Director and School Administrator will be discontinued. There is a luncheon being planned for May 21 to honor Dora's many years of service, and we will conduct a Tribute to our Religious School in conjunction with our Milestone Membership Appreciation service on May 12.

Suzannah Mercado and Sue Keusch assessed the building. Bids for partial and full replacement of the roof have been requested; the parking lot and rear driveway need to be repaved; the lighting bar on the stage needs to be repaired; carpet in the Youth Lounge needs to be replaced. One-day rentals are picking up. There has been \$29,000 in rentals since July 2022, but no activity on long-term rentals.

Gary Richards reported that the Temple will repay TEEF the \$98,000 borrowed for refurbishing the kitchen. The Temple has gone from a ~\$53,000 deficit to a ~\$17,000 surplus because revenue is projected to go up from ~\$839,000 to ~\$952,000.00. The Board thanks the anonymous donor who made a contribution that allowed us to conduct the strategic plan.

Alan Winters reported that households have committed ~ \$460,000, of which \$409,209 (89%) has been collected. Increased contributions by 114 households added \$40,600. Decreased contributions by 4 lowered \$19,877. Since July, 2022 there are 15 new memberships which added \$9,126, and 17 resignations resulting in a loss of \$3,950. The need to bolster the number of people on the Membership Committee and for them to conduct "exit" interviews was discussed; as was reviving a planned giving campaign.

Flip Bernard reported that the issue of whether there is sufficient communication between the Board and the membership has been raised. Also there is a need to have more respectful conduct at board meetings. A motion was passed as follows: "Move that the agenda for Board meetings be posted in This Week At Temple Emeth the week before a board meeting. That a summary of the Minutes be posted in the monthly Bulletin. That the Temple distribute our Safe Environment policy once a year to the membership." Board meetings are open to the membership except during executive session.

Karen Rappaport presented a proposal that detailed the creation of a Lifelong Learning Institute to coordinate all Temple learning opportunities, which would be marketed to outsiders and promoted and publicized better. A vote on the proposal was tabled. Instead a motion was passed as follows: "We are in favor of moving to a consolidated approach to life-long learning that can be marketed and branded both internally and externally." A second motion also passed as follows: "The Adult Ed Subcommittee will report back at the May Board meeting with a proposal, based on research of other successful models, for life-long learning."

Rabbi Sirbu and Stacey Butler held their first meeting with Temple Sinai about the collaboration of the religious schools went well. Temple Sinai's Director of Education, Guy Ratki, made a presentation of their religious school program. The negotiating teams discussed concerns raised by each congregation.
