Message From the Rabbi

Rabbi Steven Sirbu

The holiday season was extraordinary in so many ways. The feedback to our livestream services has been overwhelmingly positive, and that is due in large part to the tremendous support we received from Temple volunteers. Normally, we express our gratitude from the bimah on Yom Kippur morning, but this year I am using my Bulletin column to offer heartfelt thanks to those who gave of their time and talent this season.

Technology was foremost on our minds as we prepared for a holiday season when our Sanctuary would be closed to the congregation. Our Technology Task Force met weekly over the summer to ensure that we would have the capability to

livestream our services and have outdoor sound when necessary.

First and foremost, I would like to thank **Ed Pierce**, who drew on his expertise as a Broadway designer and coordinated the installation of the livestream equipment and ran the control booth for every service. I am so grateful for the insight and dedication he brought to this project. Part of the project was to take the former gift shop and transform it into our livestream control room. Assisting Ed at every service was his son, **Isaac Pierce**, who also served as an assistant cameraman at our August recording sessions. **Vic Anesini** researched

which outdoor sound system we should purchase and then monitored it during our outdoor services.

Four of our services featured pre-recorded Torah services. Thank you to **Ace Zaken**, who was our lead cameraman at the August recording sessions. He also came back later to shoot the artwork, plaques, and other artifacts in our Temple building. I also appreciate the work of **Damary Vargas Zaken**, our film editor for the four Torah service videos and other shorter videos on the High Holy Days. Thank you also to our honorees who took time out of a summer Sunday to dress up for the holidays and record their honor. **Barbara Balkin**, our Temple photographer, supplemented the visual element of our services by compiling photo montages at Simchat Torah. **Nickie Falk** created the montage of the past presidents for Kol Nidrei.

The heart of our textual experience during services is the reading of the Torah. Our Torah readers had less time than usual to prepare, but nonetheless they sounded great. Yasher Koach to (in alphabetical order) Marc Chelemer, Rachel Eastman, Emma Eig, Idajean Fisher, Judy Fox, Stephen Friedman, Jacob Newman, Emre Ozmemili, Evelyn Pierce, Iris Pierce, and Marion Wolf.

As we do every year, we relied on the talent of our young people to give our services and programming vibrance. Amanda Eastman, whose beautiful voice on the bimah enabled Cantor Tilem to sing harmonies at several high points of the service, was outstanding. Adam Kohane played guitar and blew shofar, with an amazing t'kiah g'dolah. And Caroline Wolinsky led a timely activity for our teens on Zoom. That program immediately followed the children's programming for our K-7th graders, coordinated by Amanda Eastman and Stacey Butler, and featuring the "Jewpardy"-hosting talents of Marla Levine. Our young people tasted the sweetness of the new year with goodie bags prepared by Kendall Seidenari.

We had several new musical elements that came through beautifully on the livestream format. **David Kohane** and **Wendy Kosakoff** called in remotely to lead one of the songs at our Healing Service. **Bryan Wilson** played his cello beautifully as part of Kol Nidrei. Our junior and teen choir singers contributed to the virtual choir video that was played at the end of Yom Kippur morning. And of course, we owe a debt of gratitude to accompanist **Eric Clark** whose immense talent was evident at every service.

Our Security Committee, chaired by **Steve Chaiken** and our Ushering Committee, chaired by **David Wolinsky**, worked together to keep us safe, especially when we gathered in per-

son during the Shofar service.

Thank you to all who participated in the alternate High Holy Day Food Drive to benefit the Center for Food Action, chaired by **Karyle Goldstein** with the support of the Social Action Committee, chaired by **Lynn Chaiken**. Together we contributed at least \$2,327 to feed our hungry neighbors. **Paul Kaufman** called us to action in a different way by speaking about the Religious Action Center's Civic Engagement Campaign.

Thank you to Lynne Graizel and her committee—Judy and David Fox and Jacqueline

Guttman—for coordinating the Book of Remembrance, and to **Micaela Brody** for her design expertise. It helped bring meaning to our Yizkor service.

I wish to thank **Stephen Friedman**, the chair of the Ritual Committee, for his hard work distributing honors to members of the congregation. His work was accelerated to make sure that honorees had enough notice to attend our August recording sessions.

Thank you so much to Temple President Nickie Falk, our Officers, and the Board of Trustees for their endless dedication to the Temple. Doug Falk, Nickie Falk, Marla Levine, Michael Robinson, and Nancy Scher helped distribute prayer books in the parking lot. Judy Fox and Mimi Sigel wrapped 400 honey sticks that were distributed with the books, ensuring that even though we were apart, we were off to a sweet year.

Thanks to **Suzannah Mercado**, our Temple Administrator, and the front office staff for working tirelessly over the last month to make sure that every administrative detail was taken care of, and there were many more of them because of all of the changes. Suzannah also worked closely with our terrific custodial staff, especially **Marisol Plaza** and **Amanda Berrero**, for ensuring that our building was ready for this important season.

And finally, I wish to thank my clergy partner and friend, **Cantor Ellen Tilem**. This year presented countless challenges, but they just accentuated her ability to elevate us with her beautiful voice and her personal warmth.

In the traditional prayer book we read, "Ashreinu—We are fortunate, how good is our portion, how pleasant our lot, and how beautiful our heritage." The way so many people lent a hand during the holidays make these words ring true. May this be a year of health and happiness for us all!

Message from President Nickie Falk

Temple Emeth Teens Walk Against Hate

On Sunday, October 18, I was privileged to join our Emeth Teen Community (ETC) in a Walk Against Hate, sponsored by the ADL. The ADL was founded in 1913 by Sigmund Livingston, a Chicago attorney who envisioned an America where those who were different were not targets of discrimination and threats. While originally aimed to stop defamation of the Jewish people, ADL's mission has grown to confront discrimination and secure justice for all, irrespective of religion, color, national origin, ethnicity, gender, or

sexual orientation.

The ETC offers Temple Emeth 8th to 12th graders the chance to explore their Jewish identities and give back to the community with two tracks—ETC On the Road and ETC Mitzvah. The program is run by Rabbi Sirbu, with assistance from Pixie Pierce, who is the chair of our ETC Committee, and Amanda Eastman. Many thanks to Rachel Eastman, who followed in the "chase" car during our

walk, and to Barbara Balkin, who took pictures along the way.

The walk began in our parking lot with an address by former Teaneck Mayor Mohammed Hameeduddin (2016-2020), who was the first Muslim Mayor in Bergen County. "Democracy," he said, "is very fragile. It always needs to be watered and nourished or it can be quickly taken away from us." Mayor Hameeduddin noted that it took only ten years for Germany to transform into a facist country. "With studies showing that white supremacy is on the rise, what does that mean for the society in which we live today?" he asked.

"Kids have the burden of working with people who don't act and look like you....We have to come together in a positive way so that we don't turn into the people we are protesting. However, working together, there is nothing we can't accomplish."

During our approximately 2½ mile walk, we made stops to learn about hate in our own community. At Benjamin Franklin Middle School, we talked about bullying, harassment, and intimidation. At Teaneck High School, Rabbi Sirbu spoke about the horrific acts in Charlottesville, Virginia, when hundreds of far-right extremists gathered in August 2017 to protest the removal of a Confederate statue and a counter-protester was killed.

Our final stop took us to Theodora Smiley Lacey School, where we had the honor of hearing from Theodora Smiley Lacey, described by Rabbi Sirbu as "living history." Lacey grew up in Montgomery, Alabama, where her father served as the president of the Dexter Avenue Baptist Church; Martin Luther King, Jr. was the pastor. "I was 13 before I could go to the zoo," said Lacey. "Everything was separate."

She vividly recalled the Montgomery Bus Boycott. "Riding a bus was very significant," she said. "We depended on buses to take us to our jobs. Very few of us had cars." The buses remained empty for over a year until the Supreme Court ruling.

Though her family moved to Teaneck in 1961 to escape the discriminatory practices of the South, she found racism here as well. "There were no signs for colored restrooms, but we realized we were not welcome here either,"

she said. Neighbors would cross the street, so they didn't have to walk in front of her house. One neighbor sat in his driveway with a shotgun across his lap. Black families were routinely sold houses in only the northeast part of town, thereby segregating the schools. She and her husband worked to integrate the town and the schools.

"I also found there were so many people of good will, who were willing to stand up for the rights of others. They did not perpetuate evil."

She concluded by urging the students to "use your voice to make a difference." Certainly, a great lesson for us all.



TIFF at 15 - All Virtual

Now in its 15th year, the Teaneck International Film Festival, a project of the Puffin Foundation, is going virtual and, according to Executive Director Jeremy Lentz, the benefits are many: No planes, trains, or



automobiles and yet filmgoers can come from all over the country to watch films from the safety and comfort of their own homes. With features, documentaries, and shorts scheduled one at a time over a two week period – November 12-25 – no one will have to race between theatres and everyone will be guaranteed the best seats in the house. The all-access pass is back, with a price tag of just \$35 for admission to all (14) films and, for those who don't want to commit to a movie every night, ticket prices are just \$5 per film.

The theme Activism: Making Change has earned the TIFF accolades as the "film festival with a social conscience." The 2020 program will include movies and talkbacks about racism, oppression, the environment, the LGBTQ community, women's rights, immigration, and the underserved and forgotten whose stories have not been told. There will, of course, be opportunities for escape and laughter.

Someday this pandemic will end,


And time at the Temple we'll spend.

As we look ahead to a more normal future, we acquire new titles for the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library. These include two debut volumes.




The Worlds We Think We

Know by Dalia Rosenfeld is a collection of short stories. The American-born author is a graduate of the Iowa Writers' Workshop who currently lives in Tel Aviv. Her stories are set in both the U.S. Midwest and in Israel, but wherever her characters are, the suffering of the Holocaust haunts them. Despite the pervasive feelings of sadness, loneliness, and isolation, these stories are leavened with humor. According to a review by Ranen Omer-Sherman, Dalia Rosenfeld takes "special delight in awkward encounters, mismatched pairings, uncertain destinies, and sexy indeterminacies." Molly Antopol calls the characters "deeply human and unforgettable." Gary Shteyngart says Dalia Rosenfeld is "very funny, Jewish, and wise."

Another wise Jewish writer is Dr. Ora Horn Prouser. You may recognize Dr. Prouser's name, as she spoke at Sweet Tastes of Torah this past February. She is the author of <u>Esau's Blessing</u>: <u>How the Bible Embraces Those with Special Needs</u>. Dr. Prouser takes familiar Bible stories, traditionally interpreted

one way by Rabbis, and looks at them with a new perspective taken from the field of special education. For example, Esau is seen by medieval commentators as evil personified. But Prouser wonders if his impulsivity in



selling his birthright and some of his other behaviors would today lead to a diagnosis of attention deficit. Rereading Torah tales from such a different angle can not only lead to fresh insights but can also "help us to imagine our special needs brethren in the embrace of a loving God, and instruct us to respond in a similar compassionate manner." So many people with disabilities are featured prominently in Scripture! Just think of Jacob limping, Moses speaking with difficulty, and Isaac going blind. Prouser reminds us that all deserve to be treated with dignity and respect.

Both of these books you will someday find in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library.


