

Message From the Rabbi

Election Day is on November 8.

As I emphasized in two of my High Holy Day sermons, Jews thrive in democracy. On this Election Day, our obligation to democracy is threefold.

Our first obligation is to vote. Participating in our democracy shows our neighbors and our leaders that

we have a rightful place in the process. Our concerns, both domestic and international, should be reflected and represented in our leadership. New Jersey now has early voting, so casting a ballot is easier than it used to be.

Our next obligation is to support voting rights and voter turnout nationwide. The Religious Action Center, our office in

Washington—which also has a state project here called RAC-NJ—has renewed its "Every Voice, Every Vote" campaign to promote voter participation. Our Social Action Committee has already partnered with the RAC to send post cards to potential voters with information they will need to cast a ballot. The RAC's website has opportunities for you to get the word out about the importance of this election, including texting potential voters. Log on to https://rac.org/take-action/every-voice-every-vote for more information.

Finally, our obligation is to use our ballot to strength-

en democratic institutions. This includes freedom of the press and stopping censorship from school libraries and public libraries, which disproportionately seek to remove books about the Holocaust and LGBTQ families. It includes protecting abortion access, as complete abortion bans which are now in effect in some states after the *Dobbs* ruling may pre-

vent Jewish women from obtaining abortions in accordance with Jewish law. And it includes equality in public education as a birthright for all American children.


Temple Emeth, as a non-profit religious organization, cannot endorse a candidate or party. The law is barely enforced, and some politicians want to repeal it. Even if it were legal to endorse candidates, it

would be unwise. Our politics are divisive enough without a house of worship being explicitly associated with a candidate or party. But it is important to advocate participation by all and to understand that Americans of all backgrounds bring their religious values with them into the voting booth. As Jews who thrive here like we have nowhere else, we must be passionate about the laws and policies that protect our community and about the values that we hold dear.

Election Day stands alone as an occasion to do just that.



Pay Attention!

We seem to be in a time of conspiracies, groups that none of us have ever heard of, producing bad information. That means we all have to pay attention to who is telling us what, as we decide who to vote for.

A recent USA Today article highlights the efforts by an outside political group promoting extreme points of view to influence local boards of education around the country. It's part of a disturbing national trend involving different political organizations. It's happening here.

In our own school vards

A group called the NJ Project has endorsed candidates for Bergen County School Boards in Fairlawn, Ft. Lee, Paramus, Rutherford, Wood-Ridge, and Teaneck (5 candidates). Friends in Tenafly are reporting that

"We have a new slate of three candidates... who feel strongly that it's inappropriate to teach anything about LGBTQ issues in elementary school and also have issues with anything anti-racist (in fact, I think anything mentioning race at all).

They are looking to eliminate racism and Marxism from the schools. But except for the one well-known guy, who has ranted at many BOE meetings in the past, they're running on a slate of 'listening to the parents' voices.' Lots of code words. At least one of them really doesn't seem to understand the function of the Board of Education, so it's an important race for Tenafly voters to be aware of and to vote on."

How to decide who to vote for - Do some research online, talk to friends, call your local League of Women Voters (LWV) which generally creates voters' guides and is sworn to be non-partisan.

Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library Monthly News Update: Fall Fiction By Marion Wolf ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION



As the days grow shorter and cooler, it is time to curl up with a good book. You might enjoy some works of fiction we have added to the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library: a short story collection, a sequel to an acclaimed novel, and a brandnew novel.

Johanna Kaplan is a prize-winning author, who arrived on the literary scene in the late 1960s. Some of her best short stories have now been assembled in <u>Loss of</u> Memory Is Only Temporary as



part of a series called "The Art of the Story." Kaplan is renowned for her insight into character and her pitch-perfect command of dialogue. Her stories are specifically set in in post-WWII Jewish New York but nevertheless have a universal significance. Cynthia Ozick says, "Johanna Kaplan brings...a large-minded, capacious intelligence; a vitality; and a brilliant sense of irony...She exhibits an astonishing power of rendering a whole society with virtuosity, energy, and explosive satire." Francine Prose suggests we open the book at random: "Everywhere you'll find passages and plots that amuse and surprise and move you."

You may remember Helene Wecker's debut novel, <u>The Golem and the Jinni</u>. It was the book we read in 2015 for our One Book One Community. A blend of folktale and historical fiction, <u>The Golem</u>

and the Jinni was set in 1899. It told of two supernatural beings who made their way to New York City and tried to blend in with other immigrants. Chava was a golem made of clay, and Ahmad was a jinni, a creature of fire. These characters return now in The Hidden Palace, a sequel that follows their

adventures right up to the beginning of WWI. They are still having a powerful impact on the lives of the humans around them, while trying to sort out what they mean to each other. Helene Wecker has earned accolades from The New York Times for combining "the narrative magic of <u>The Arabian Nights</u> with the kind of emotional depth, philosophical seriousness, and good old-fashioned storytelling found in the stories of Isaac Bashevis Singer.

Still another masterful storyteller who knows her way around a plot twist is Jean Hanff Korelitz, author of <u>The Latecomer</u>. This book begins in 1972 with a tragic accident and continues to the present day. First we meet Salo and Johanna Oppenheimer, the parents, who are



brought together by that accident. Later we meet their triplets—Harrison, Lewyn, and Sally—who are conceived via in vitro fertilization. These siblings despise one another and cannot wait to leave home for college, where they don't even want to acknowledge the others exist! Facing an empty nest, Johanna decides to take a fourth embryo that's been on ice and bring "the latecomer" of the title (Phoebe) into the world! She may be an afterthought, but Phoebe plays an important role in this fractured family. The book "touches on the topics of grief and guilt, generational trauma, privilege and race, traditions and religion, and family dynamics." Allegra Goodman says in her New York Times review that The Latecomer "is both compulsively readable and thought-provoking."
