

The "Fragile Dialogue" Among Those Who Love Israel





From the earliest days of the State of Israel, when the Reform Movement sent Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg there as part of a fact-finding delegation, American Jews have been concerned about the nature and direction of Israeli

When "The Fragile Dialogue" was published by the CCAR Press last year, it showed a different set of concerns — primarily the inability of North American Jews to have civil, meaningful conversations about our profound differences regarding the contemporary State of Israel. The book respectfully examines liberal Zionist views that range from a One State Solution to a pro-BDS posture. But what was concerning before is rapidly becoming a crisis today. This lecture, presented by the co-editor of the book, will explore how together we can bridge gaps and heal wounds within our own community.

Message From the Rabbi

Rabbi Steven Sirbu

Can one email change the way the federal government defines what it is to be Jewish? It's possible.

The Office of Civil Rights of the Department of Education is investigating an incident that took place at Rutgers in

2011. Students holding an anti-Israel rally may have discriminated against Jewish students by hastily imposing an admission fee on them when the event was advertised as free of charge. The case had been investigated by the Obama administration which uncovered an email from one organizer to another that said, "We need to start charging because 150 Zionists just showed up!" but that "if someone looks like a supporter, they can get in for free." The case was eventually closed for lack of evidence.

The new Assistant Secretary for Civil Rights, Kenneth Marcus, is reopening the case because he is applying a different definition of Judaism and anti-Semitism. If Judaism is defined as a religion, as it has been for a long time, it is more difficult to read the email as incriminating, since there is no overt reference to the faith of the people being charged. (It is possible that "Zionists" is code for "Jews.") If it is defined as a national origin, which the State Department has done, then the email deserves another look, because discrimination based on someone's appearance fits into the definition of an ethnic group.

This is not the first time that this change has been advocated. The International Holocaust Remembrance Alliance Working Definition of Anti-Semitism, developed 14 years ago, offers a description of anti-Semitism in its

various forms, including hatred and discrimination against Jews, Holocaust denial, and of particular note, anti-Semitism as it can at times relate to Israel.

It can be difficult to draw a line between legitimate criti-

cism of Israeli policy and anti-Semitism.

But it is easy to understand why we need a multi-faceted approach to what anti-Semitism is. We are a religion, but lots of people feel strongly Jewish without believing in God. We are an ethnic group, but unlike being Greek or Irish, you can convert to Judaism. We have a long and unique history, which has at times been distorted by anti-Semites to foment hatred against us. And

most American Jews are Zionists, supporting a Jewish state as the fulfillment of our national aspirations, but that doesn't mean that Jewish students deserve to be harassed on campus because of Israel.

Our varied identities are complex enough that coming up with a definition is difficult, but given this background it is reasonable to call us an ethnic group with a shared national origin.

Anti-Israel activists tend to target universities with large Jewish populations. Since Rutgers has one of the largest, it is important that administrators and civil rights officials have the tools they need to keep Jewish students safe from harassment and discrimination, and to ensure that anti-Semitism is not permitted to masquerade as anti-Zionism. If the Education Department's change is to advance this goal, then I am in favor.







Minutes from the August 2, 2018 Board of Trustees Meeting

Amy Abrams welcomed the new Trustees and ran through the normal order for meetings. Ms. Abrams also noted that Trustees are expected to act as greeter or to sit on the Bimah for services, and to present a D'var Torah and provide snacks at Board meetings. A sign-up sheet for each of these was circulated.

The Board welcomed Lynn Chaiken, Chair of the Social Action Committee. Ms. Chaiken gave a presentation on the history of the Social Action Committee at Temple Emeth and the current projects that the Social Action Committee is doing in the coming year. She noted that the next meeting is scheduled for September 7, 2018, at which the agenda for the coming year will be discussed and stated that all Temple members are welcome to attend. Ms. Abrams noted that the Social Action Committee is authorized to undertake any activity endorsed by URJ and that one doesn't have to be a member of the Committee to participate in its activities.

Marc Chelemer gave a report on the on-going project of updating the Temple's database management software for its membership. The working group reviewed multiple packages and received demos. Ultimately, they selected ShulCloud, at a cost of \$2,400 per year, as the best package for the Temple's needs and the most cost effective. Mr. Chelemer noted that Rochelle Rudnick will spearhead the implementation of the new software.

Administrator's Report. Rochelle Rudnick gave the Administrator's Report. She stated that she is looking forward to the change in software and noted that the ShulCloud product will replace existing software that costs \$600 per year, so that the net increase in cost is only \$1,800 per year, while providing a wider range of services. She is working on the timeline and process for transfer of data.

Ms. Rudnick also reported the following:

Teaneck has reviewed and approved the installation of the new HVAC units.

The existing lease of the postage meter has ended, and a new lease was put in place.

The Temple's copier lease is due to end soon; she is putting a new lease in place and expects that the Temple will save \$300-\$500 per month.

Finally, Ms. Rudnick noted that the Temple is looking for a handyman and asked Trustees to send her any suggestions.

Rabbi's Report. Rabbi Sirbu gave his report. He noted that Cantor Tilem and Dora have been working on a

revised schedule for music instruction, whereby music instruction (including the music to be performed by Etz Chayim) will be taught as part of the regular Religious School curriculum, instead of a separate program Wednesday evening. Students who want to solo will have to sign up for Etz Chayim, but all students who attend the family service will be welcomed to sing with Etz Chayim. There was discussion of the reduced opportunity for Etz Chayim members to socialize.

Rabbi Sirbu reported that the High Holidays Appeal will be dedicated to HIAS, with all donations done on-line.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>. Gary Richards reported on the financial condition of the Temple. He noted that he was working on cleaning up relics of past transactions in the balance sheet.

<u>Financial Secretary's Report</u>. Michael Robinson gave a report on membership. He noted that there are 344 members. Of that number, slightly over 50% have made payment. He noted that pledges have on average increased by 1%. Reminders will be sent out later in August.

<u>President's Report</u>. Amy Abrams gave her report. She noted that the URJ's website <u>www.urj.org</u> is a useful resource, particularly the chatroom "The Tent."

Ms. Abrams reported that that a Marketing Committee is being established with Laaren Brown Hort as Chair and Nickie Falk as Board Liaison, the purpose of which is to coordinate the Temple's various advertising and marketing initiatives.

Ms. Abrams also noted that a recent walk around the Temple's property revealed that a neighbor's backyard was encroaching on the Temple's property. A letter requesting that the neighbor cease the encroachment and remove the encroaching lawn and materials was being prepared and would be sent out.

Ms. Abrams asked for volunteers to chair the Shalach Manot Committee.

Finally, Ms. Abrams reminded the Board of the continuing need to consider leadership development: suggestions of people who might be both able and interested in serving as a committee chair or on the Board in the future.
