Message From the Rabbi

In November, the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-JIR) campus in Jerusalem ordained its 100th rabbi from its Israel Rabbinical Program since the program's inception in 1975. All of the ordainees are Israeli citizens, and most are sabras (native-born Israelis). The vast majority have staved in Israel in order to bring dynamic leadership to our

movement's synagogues and educational institutions there.

At Temple Emeth, we have benefited from the talent of these rabbis. In 2015, Rabbi Uri Regev was our Trachtenberg Lecturer, speaking about religious freedom in Israel. In 2017, Rabbi Golan Ben-Chorin led services with Cantor Tilem while I was leading the Temple's trip to Prague and Israel. At about the same



time, participants in our Israel trip attended a service led by (and were later greeted by) Rabbi Naama

Kelman, the dean of the HUC-JIR Jerusalem campus.

We also got to see the beautiful campus on King David Street where these rabbis are educated.

The milestone of 100 Israeli-ordained Reform rabbis is the perfect opportunity to celebrate the gains made by the leaders of our movement. As mentioned at the High Holy Days, the Reform movement, represented by the Israel Movement for Reform and Progressive Judaism (IMPJ), has made great strides to promote religious pluralism generally and Reform Judaism specifically. There are now 50 Reform congregations nationwide, including big ones in Tel Aviv and Jerusalem and small ones in towns like Gadera, which I visited in 2016 for a beautiful and inspiring Shabbat.

The movement has filed several court cases to ensure that forces in the Israeli Rabbinate and the government do not use their power to enforce coercive religious policies. One such case regards the egalitarian section

> of the Western Wall, and another regards a Knesset proposal to limit the number of rabbis whose conversions will be recognized by the state. The work of the IMPJ is highlighted on their website. www.reform.org.il/Eng/.

Leading all of these efforts is the dynamic and exceptional president of the IMPJ, Rabbi Gilad Kariv, another ordainee of the Israel Rabbinical Program. Rabbi Kariv will be making an appearance in Bergen County on Sunday, December 3 at 7:00 p.m. at Temple Avodat Shalom in River Edge. His topic, "Israel at 70— Ensuring a Jewish and Democratic State: The Role of Israel's Reform

Movement," is one that is especially compelling as Israeli society struggles with issues of religion and state. Temple Emeth is a co-sponsor of the event, because I know that the issues of democracy and freedom of religion in Israel are important to us. If you would like to contribute toward Temple Emeth's cosponsorship of this program, please email me at ssirbu@emeth.org, and I will provide details.

As we approach Chanukah, the Festival of Lights, and retell the story of the Maccabees' struggle for freedom in the Holy Land, let us support our vision of freedom wherever we can in every country, especially our Jewish homeland.



called in Hebrew a *Chanukia*? The *Menorah* has seven candles and was lit during the day. The *Chanukia* has eight candles and is lit after dark. The *Menorah* was lit inside the Temple to shed light inside and was lit all at once. The *Chanukia* was lit outside one's door or on a window ledge. Its light is directed outside. It is lit one day at a time with an additional candle for each day.



The teachers and students in our Religious School activate this "light" as a source of Jewish learning, living, and doing *mitzvot*. In a typical day in our school our students learn a new prayer; they study Torah and Jewish history. They are introduced to symbols, rituals, and ethical teachings that help them discover how our community brings us together and connects us with our Jewish identity. In addition, our Family Education programs, student-led services, Kehilla partnership, and Mishpacha Matters (family matters) are a rich source

Message from President Amy Abrams

Wow, this year is really flying by. It's December already. We are lucky enough to go to my sister's every year for Thanksgiving. Her husband is one of seven kids, and while several families couldn't make it this year we still had around 27. Always lots of fun and a little crazy. It's also my husband Arnie's birthday weekend, so it's always busy! I hope you all had satisfyingly filling dinners, good company, and challenging conversations to help you give thanks.

Our voluntary commitment program has been outstandingly successful so far! We are expecting a total of approximately \$470,000 in member pledge income. That is a fantastic number, and you should all pat yourselves on the back a few times! This amount covers all of our budgeted operating

expenses for this year, so we are in good shape for continuing with all of our existing programming. Two-thirds of our pledges are for the same or more than previous years. Plus we have 39 new members!

The only budgeted item that is not included is the capital reserve we added to the budget this year for the first time to anticipate some of the expenses that are likely to arise from our building, such as replacing HVAC units and eventually putting on a new roof. Energy-saving capital expenses can also be paid from the Kahn Grant, so for this year, we are still good to go. However, we do have to be

aware that our building is older and will require ongoing maintenance and repair, which we need to plan for in a prudent manner.

In the interest of transparency and engagement, the key discussion point for our Town Hall Meeting on November 19 was how to build up additional income within the context of the voluntary commitment structure. Over 50 members attended, with good questions prepared. They heard a financial summary from Jim Sandler, then broke out into small discussion groups to brainstorm new ways to find additional funding. They came up with some exciting ideas, which I will summarize for you in the coming month.

You may recall that the Kahn Grant was introduced to us last year by Cynthia Massarsky, who knew a foundation that was looking for recipients. The grant was awarded primarily for increased educational and community involvement, along with a portion for capital improvements to reduce utility costs. Thus far we have used grant money to fund two collaborative festival services with Kiddush lunches, co-sponsored the Beth Sholom Scholar-in-Residence program, and contributed a deposit towards the programming for the One Book One Community events. We have several additional events coming up in the winter and spring that will be using grant money to round out their programming as well, including an intriguing Artist-in-Residence weekend in March sponsored by Viewpoints.

Along with the Kahn Grant, we have qualified for an NJ Direct energy savings improvement grant. This grant will allow a state approved contractor, Lime Energy, to replace most of our HVAC units and convert all remaining lighting to LED bulbs. We do have to pay a portion of the costs,


which is calculated to come out of our energy savings, but which can also be paid from the Kahn money. That will save us energy, save us money, and do good things for the planet. Definitely a win-win!

While we are focused on lighting, here's something else exciting to look forward to: I am delighted to report that due to an extremely generous gift from Idajean Fisher, after excellent research work by Idajean and Barbara Balkin, we are installing new lighting in the Museum to finally make the room appropriate for our Shabbat morning services as well as our museum. New high hats will be added in the center of the room to provide additional lighting for reading siddurim. The existing track lighting will be modified with

replacement fixtures and LED lights suitable for lighting the museum exhibits along the walls of the room. Thank you so much, Idajean!

We are also beginning the next round of strategic planning with a survey designed to compare where we are now to where we were in 2014, when we last did this survey. Those answers will help us evaluate which issues look like they need attention. The Jewish Federation of Northern New Jersey will help compile the results so that we can see what we have, and then we can consider how best to approach them. Watch your email, if you haven't seen it already, for directions on

how to complete the survey online. The more people participate, the better our results will be. Expect to be reminded until you've filled one out!



Next up is our Bazaar on December 10, 9:30-3:30. Bazaar is always a treat, whether you're working or shopping. It's a high-energy, fast-talking sort of operation. It's always big fun, as well as a big fundraiser. Sadly, I'll miss Bazaar this year, as I'll be attending URJ Biennial Convention in Boston. I have never been to Biennial before, and I hear it is amazing, so I look forward to learning all sorts of new and interesting things that I can bring back to Temple Emeth.

Then you'll want to be sure to join in greeting all our new Temple members this year at our annual Chanukah dinner on December 15. Remember to bring your menorah and candles and we'll all light our chanukiot together. It makes a beautiful, bright, shining sight! We have a lot of new members this year, so please come prepared to schmooze with a lot of new people. If you are new, you will be our guests (i.e., free of charge!) as we welcome you into our congregation.

I hope to see you all at this feast of events!



ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

Are you looking for a memoir to inspire? Or perhaps a new cookbook to add some spice to your meals? Maybe you'd like something different to discuss with your book group? With our latest acquisition, the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library can meet all your needs.

Zahav: A World of Israeli Cooking is the work of Michael Solomonov and Steven Cook. They are the co-owners of Zahav, a highly-regarded, modern Israeli restaurant in Philadelphia. Started in 2008, Zahav (the name means "gold") brings an authentic taste of Israeli culture to the States. Executive chef Solomonov is famed for transforming simple foods into culinary masterpieces. He has been recognized by the James Beard Foundation with its 2011 Outstanding Chef award.

In this book Solomonov shares his recipes. Melissa Clark in The NY Times Book Review says that <u>Zahav</u> captures his "cooking that bursts with freshly ground spices and complex flavors." The book is full of stunning photographs of Solomonov's creations.

Zahav goes beyond the scope of an ordinary cookbook; it also tells Solomonov's life story. Born in Israel, he grew up in Pittsburgh. His younger brother was a soldier in the Israeli army and was killed by sniper fire in 2003. Solomonov overcame drug and alcohol problems before finding success with his restaurant. All this autobiographical information is mixed (and stirred?) into the book. Whether he is explaining how to make hummus or relating his per-

sonal struggles, Solomonov writes in a conversational style that is direct and engaging.


This unusual book has another distinction: Zahav is this year's One Book, One Community selection. Each year since 2012 the Jewish Federation of Northern New Jersey has picked a book to be the focus of shared conversations



in synagogues and other Jewish organizations throughout the area. All these institutions offer programs exploring the book's themes. In the spring there is a culminating event, when all are invited to hear the author speak and enjoy dessert. (Date and

place yet to be announced)

Temple Emeth has been involved in One Book, One Community since its inception. This year we will have a Shabbaton on Saturday January 6, 2018. The Torah Study class will examine Torah and Talmud texts about dining. During services Rabbi Sirbu will highlight the theme of the land of Israel and its bounty. A catered festive Kiddush lunch will be enhanced with salads prepared by Emeth members according to recipes from the book (contact Linda Poskanzer if you'd like to do this). At 1:00 p.m. we will screen the film "In Search of Israeli Cuisine," starring Michael Solomonov. This wonderful day is sponsored by the Adult Education Committee and is free of charge to participants (although your RSVP for lunch is needed). <u>Finance – Jim Sandler/Michael Robinson</u> – 1st Quarter wrap – cash flow good. High Holy Days tickets purchased - \$10K, budgeted for \$15K (some may have joined instead); Bergenfield Board of Education and other rentals on target. Voluntary Commitment – 22 pledges outstanding and are being billed same as last year.

<u>Chanukah Gift Program</u> – discussion regarding Voluntary Commitment with free Religious School vs. free Religious School with no membership.

Chanukah Gift Program Motion -MOVED, that we offer free enrollment for all new students in grades K-3 from Chanukah through the end of the school year. Membership is not required. Participation in this partial year will not count as the one year free enrollment in grades K-2 offered under the voluntary commitment program. Vote on motion – approved.
