

Message From the Rabbi

Jerusalem is the capital of the Jewish people. It is where King David brought the Holy Ark when he moved his seat of power from Hebron. It is where the First and Second Temples stood, and where the remnant of their retaining wall, the Western wall, still stands. It is where the Knesset, the President's official


residence, the Prime Minister's official residence, and the Supreme Court are all located. Within the hearts and minds of Jews in Israel and beyond, Jerusalem is our capital and can be objectively demonstrated as such.

Why then was there so much outcry when the Trump administration announced that it would recognize Jerusalem as the capital of Israel? After all, on one level, the President was simply acknowledging reality. Everything in the Middle East, however, is multifaceted, with different interpretations of history, of symbolism, and even reality.

These nuances raise a number of questions regarding the status of Jerusalem.

When in 1947 the United Nations divided Palestine into two future states, one for Jews and the other for Arabs, Jerusalem was designated as an international city. There were no existing international cities at the time, and no one really knew what it meant. But the designation made it possible for controversy to be side-stepped and the plan to get passed. All of the Arab countries at the time rejected the partition plan and waged war to try to prevent its implementation. Did that mean that Jerusalem's status as an international city was null and void?

At the end of Israel's war of independence in 1949, Jerusalem was divided between Israel on the west and Jordan on the east. The Green Line, as it came to be called, was a cease-fire line and not a recognized border. Nonetheless, there was little if any protest in the international community when Jewish families moved to West Jerusalem. It quickly became an important part of Israel culturally and geographically. But to many, the status of Jerusalem can be resolved only by negotiation. If West Jerusalem is an accepted part of Israel, why can't it be the capital of Israel?



An important part of Zionist philosophy is that the

Jewish nation should have a sovereign state that is not

each of these questions depending on your perspective. To me the most important question is, "Why did the Administration make this move now?" Making this change undermines America's role as an impartial mediator in the Israeli-Palestinian peace process. True, the process has been stalled for years, but I would think that the US would want to continue to play this role.

Making this change is also a way to give something to the President's base, which includes large numbers of Evangelical Christians and right-leaning Jews. The declaration could have been more balanced to reflect the aspirations of both Israelis and Palestinians, but it wasn't.

Personally, I have mixed feelings about this decision. As someone who believes in policy matching reality, I must admit that stating the obvious should never create controversy. As someone who believes in Jerusalem as our capital, the focus of our prayers and the center of our spiritual life, I am glad to have company in this view.

But as someone who believes in a two-state solution—as distant as it may currently seem—I don't support a change that further erodes trust among parties who should be building trust. I don't think the timing is right for America to jeopardize its credibility in the region over a declaration that changes nothing on the ground.

The Psalmist wrote, "If I forget thee, O Jerusalem..." The Jewish people will always have Jerusalem in our hearts, and I pray for the time when love of Jerusalem can convince all involved to work for the peace of Jerusalem.

Message from President Amy Abrams

I hope you are all recovering well from the last round of holidays! Does your house still smell like latkes?

Reporting back as far as last November, I am pleased to tell you that the Town Hall was a very successful meeting. We had upwards of 70 congregants present for a comprehensive update on finances by our Treasurer, Jim Sandler, and an excellent breakout session to consider alternative approaches to raising additional funds. We got lots of great suggestions for additional fundraisers, most of which also sound like a lot of fun, and other suggestions for new sources of income. Lots to think about there.

For the moment, however, we are financially exactly where we want to be. Since the Town Hall meeting, we have received some additional pledges and some very generous gifts, and we are right on point for our budget. Pretty fantastic work for our first year of Terumat Halev! I am so proud of our congregation as a role model for this new approach to shifting the conversation away from money and towards what the Temple means to you.

Moving on to December, the Bazaar was also wildly successful again this year, pulling in a gross of about \$15,000, including \$1400 from the summer sale. Our gratitude and thanks go to all who helped out, especially Laaren Hort, Ellen Monane, David Wolinsky, Marc Chelemer, Carla Silver, and Marion

Wolinsky, Marc Chelemer, Carla Silver, and Marion Wolf. I'm sure I'm forgetting a lot of people I should be naming here. Everyone who sorted, set up, chaired a booth, sold, and cleaned up was vital to this success! From the sound of it, everyone had a good time, too.

I missed the Bazaar this year because I went to the URJ Biennial in early December for the first time. Idajean Fisher, Wendy Kosakoff, Paul Kaufman, and David Kohane also went from Temple Emeth. It was pretty amazing. Try to picture 5500 Jews praying together with a video screen and fabulous music, including a rock band, new liturgical songs, a gigantic choir (which included Idajean!), and an entire auditorium filled with Jewish spirit and energy. All that plus the workshops had some good concepts too, which I hope you'll be hearing about in the days to come.

One of the takeaways that was mentioned at a wrap-up session struck a particular chord for me. From the Audacious Hospitality sessions, one person mentioned that diversity and inclusion means welcoming everyone however they choose to practice their Jewish faith. They may keep kosher, or they may not be very observant. They may be intimately familiar with the Hebrew prayers or not be able to read Hebrew at all. They may be comfortable wearing jeans to services, or they may prefer to put on a dress. They may be of another faith but working to raise their children Jewish, or supporting their Jewish spouse who still wishes to observe his/her tradition. Audacious Hospitality means that we

welcome all these varieties and more. I think Temple Emeth does a great job of this. I hope that everyone in our congregation feels that whatever their personal practices, they are welcome at Temple Emeth.

Audacious Hospitality is just one way we are building community this year. Don't forget about our Meet and Match program! So far we have people interested in hiking and in knitting. I know there are people hiding out there who want to play Mah Jongg, both beginner and advanced. Whatever your interest, speak up! get your ideas in! This is still a pilot program, so you're not committed to a six-year obligation unless you decide you like it. Give it a try. You might like it!

Within our focus on creating community this year, we all realize that "community" means supporting our neighbors in good times and in bad. Unfortunately, I have recently had to make a lot of shiva visits. The more I go to, the more I realize what a comfort it is to a bereaved family to have people from their community present, even if it's not a close friend. As a means of building a stronger com-

munity, I encourage each of you to attend shiva this year for one person who is not a close personal friend. I think you'll be surprised at not only their reaction, but your own. It truly makes you realize what a mitzvah it is to be present for a neighbor in a time of need

With the diversity we have in our congregational community, we don't always know how to respond when a non-Jewish partner or spouse suffers a loss, as we don't always know what procedure the family wishes to observe. I think that we just need to reach out. If there is a wake or other observance, it is appropriate to attend. If the Temple doesn't tell us how the family is mourning, make a phone call, send a card, or express your sympathy in another way that is comfortable for you. It's all about just being there.

Looking ahead, January has some great events coming up. I am personally excited about the One Book, One Community Shabbaton on January 6. Not only is it a fun community event, but this year it's focused on FOOD! The book is a cookbook, we're going to try some of the recipes, and the film is about the Israeli cuisine showcased in the book. What could possibly be bad?

The rest of the month has so many things going on I'm not even going to try to summarize them. I refer you instead to the calendar on the Temple web page, which I find very helpful in keeping everything in mind. 
Temple Emeth Bazaar 2017

Social Action in Action

Temple Emeth once again hosted a homeless family through the Family Promise program...first in St. Anastasia's Church and more recently at Temple Emeth. This will be almost 20 years that we have been sheltering homeless families and, unfortunately, the need continues.

We continue to concern ourselves with a number of urgent issues that affect all of us:

Ban Unsafe Oil Trains - the Committee to Ban Unsafe Oil Trains (of which the Social Action Committee is a member) sent a request to members of the Teaneck Town Council to sign a pledge that they would work towards a future goal of 100% clean energy.

Gun Control – we support legislation that has been introduced in the State legislature that would ban the sale, possession, and use of "bumper stocks" in New Jersey. There is also a federal report that the U.S. House of Representatives has passed legislation that would allow "concealed carry" of weapons, even in states which ban carrying concealed weapons. It is unclear whether the Senate has considered similar legislation.

HIAS Welcome Campaign – A "postcard party" was held at Temple Emeth on December 13th. Participants were invited to sign postcards to appropriate government officials urging them to support the rights of immigrants and to retain the DREAM act, allowing immigrants who were transported here as children to remain in this country.

The North Jersey Sanctuary Committee - We continue to be a member of this coalition which services people who have fled their country of origin because of the horrific experiences they have endured. The Committee is currently helping four people.

This month all food and other donations will go to Buddies of New Jersey. Buddies, located in Hackensack, serves people living with and affected by HIV/AIDS.




In trying times how do we cope? Some turn to humor; some seek escape. Not that long ago we could find both humor and escape in the Catskills. Two new



books in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library deal with these subjects, giving us insights into Jewish humor and the history of the Catskills.

Let There Be Laughter: A Treasury of Great Jewish Humor and What It All Means is the work of Michael Krasny. The author is a professor of

literature at San Francisco State, a well-known public radio host, and the nephew of Temple Emeth member Joy Herman. For many years Krasny has collected Jewish jokes and wondered, "What do these jokes mean? And where do they come from? And what do they tell us?" In <u>Let There Be Laughter</u> he offers a wide-ranging sample of his collection, organized thematically, with gags about Jewish mothers; sex and marriage; schlemiels and schmucks; and assimilation, among other topics. Some of the stories Krasny tells are familiar, and some are new. All are funny. You can come for the comedy and enjoy the commentary as a bonus. In her review in The Times of Israel, Renee Ghert-Zand points out that this book's publication was not planned "to coincide with Trump's election. But its comedic timing was impeccable, with the release set to make us laugh to keep from crying." A good laugh once could be had in the Borscht Belt. Many Jewish comedians got their start there, telling the very jokes catalogued by Michael Krasny. Stephen M. Silverman and Raphael D. Silver share fascinating details about the area in The Catskills: Its History and How It Changed America. This book with its beautiful photographs is "an effort to capture a sense of the color, charm, and even lunacy, that for the past four hundred years have characterized the Catskill Mountains and the people attracted to them. Those people include Henry Hudson, who first spotted the Hudson River in 1609. The earliest American folk heroes—Rip Van Winkle and Natty Bumppo—made their home in the Catskills. Later the Hudson River School painters showed the beauty of the mountains in their landscapes. The Catskills were already a popular WASP attraction in the 1800s,



when Jews were excluded from the resorts there. At a Catskills writers' residence, Mark Twain spent the summer of 1890. He "complained that the walls of his cottage were so thin that one could hear a woman changing her mind in the next room." We've all stayed at places like that!

Who knew that the first Christmas tree sold in America came from this region or that Prohibitionera mob figures sought refuge there? Eventually came Grossinger's, the Concord, and Kutshers, where one could go to see stars like Phil Silvers and Milton Berle or newcomers like Sid Caesar, Lenny Bruce, and Mel Brooks.

Thumbing through the pages of these two books one comes across many delightful tidbits that distract and amuse. See for yourself at the Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library.
