# Message From the Rabbi

This spring will mark the fiftieth anniversary of the Six Day War, which changed the nature of the State of Israel and the Jewish people. The anniversary of the victory is called Yom Yerushalayim, the day of the reunification of Jerusalem, and will be observed this year on May 24.

In June of 1967, Israel fended off an attack by its Arab neighbors and in doing so conquered the Golan Heights

from Syria; the West Bank and East Jerusalem (including the Old City) from Jordan; and the Gaza Strip and the Sinai Peninsula from Egypt. In all, Israel tripled its land area, giving it more defensible borders. At the same time, it became responsible for the residents of these areas. Israel's image around the world changed in two significant ways. Israel's military victory now ranked her as a regional superpower. And Israel was now an occupying force, subject to the same criticisms (both fair and unfair) as other occupiers around the world.

Many Jews at the time saw the Six Day War as a messianic moment, a sign that—after the Holocaust and after Israel's scrappy victory for independence in 1948—God was on the side of the Jewish people and the ultimate redemption was close at hand. The sound of

the shofar at the Western Wall after decades of exile was the beginning of the settler movement, which in the 50 years since has placed an indelible footprint in the West Bank and become the driving force in the right-wing of Israel's politics.

The Six Day War also changed the self-image of Diaspora Jews. In the years following the war, there was an increased level of aliyah (Jewish immigration to Israel) and tourism. And here in America, Jews (especially our youth) took an increased pride in their Jewish identity and in their connec-

tion to Israel. The Jewish people were no longer to be seen as victims, but as a people who controlled their own destiny.

For all these reasons, the Six Day War has a complicated legacy. Each new settlement in the West Bank is, in essence, an extension of the victory of the Six Day War. Each critique of Israeli policy toward the Palestinians is framed as a griev-

ance in wake of the loss. Each peace negotiation is an attempt to resolve the Six Day War

Can we expect to retain all of the positive aspects of this victory while shedding the negative ones? It is a complicated question that depends on your priorities, your values and your fears.

For us American Jews, who are committed to Israel's safety and security, who pray that Israel one day soon will be able to live in peace with her neighbors, understanding the Six Day War is essential to understanding Israel today.

Our Temple trip to Israel this summer will inevitably explore these issues. And this fall, I will offer an adult education course on

Tuesday evenings on the Six Day War. Using a curriculum created by the Association of Reform Zionists of America and the Center for Israel Education at Emory University, we will examine both the history and the modern reality of the Six Day War.

In this season of Israel's independence and the fiftieth anniversary Six Day War, let us resolve to better understand the legacy of victory and to celebrating Israel's many accomplishments over the last 69 years.


#### From the Religious School

## **Message from President Marc Chelemer**

"I love it when a plan comes together." George Peppard uttered those words with some frequency on the television show "The A-Team," and Liam Neeson parroted them in the film by the same name. I think I can say the same thing this month, as the Dissemination Task Force completed its work at reaching out to every household during the late winter and early spring, while Nuts and Bolts and the Board of Trustees wrestled with and came to rest on unresolved issues and questions surrounding how T'rumat Halev – Gifts of the Heart will be instituted and brought to you. Later this month, each household will receive an intro-

ductory letter and a Pledge Form, which will formally kick off Temple Emeth's revamping of how it finances itself.

When that form arrives, please consider its content and the importance of what your household decides to write down as a pledge. The clergy, the staff, your lay leadership, and indeed all of your fellow congregants are counting on you—we are truly counting on each other—to commit yourself financially to the well-being of Temple Emeth. The budget is about \$950,000 (at this writing, Finance

Committee hasn't finalized it yet, but that's close). Our membership is holding at around 305 households. Your pledge of financial support, along with those of the other households which make up this community, will be the test whether my belief, and that of the clergy and the volunteers who have been working so hard for so long to bring this about, will be realized: that given no formal "invoice" for membership, thoughtful, caring, and dedicated adults will offer equal to or more than they were told they had to pay last year.

That is all I am going to say specifically about T'rumat Halev this month. I'd like to use the rest of my article to talk about community. At the three paneem el paneem meetings at which I was the presenter, the unifying element among almost all the remarks I heard from congregants, ex-congregants, or prospective congregants, was that what people valued most about Temple Emeth was the sense of community. Sometimes, that community was most keenly felt at a time of sorrow...when there'd been a death in the family and Temple Emeth rallied around someone to offer support and comfort, sometimes from seemingly total strangers. At other times, it was just a sense of belonging, that when people walk into the building, they said that they were comfortable, that it felt familiar and warm, that it felt like they belonged here. For those readers who are "Star Trek" fans (as always, parallels to Star Trek and Judaism continue to be revealed), one of the most touching scenes in the entire series featured the emotionless android. Lt. Commander Data, returning from a unique experience: watching two emotionally damaged creatures from different species having essentially joined together, and through that unification becoming healed. He says, when asked by the empathic ship's counselor Troi, why he came back to be among the crew of the Enterprise: "Because, Deanna, this is where I belong." The counselor, in a spontaneous moment of affection, puts her arms gently around him and lays her head on the back of his shoulder.


Certainly, I've felt like "this is where I belong" for so many years, I cannot remember a time when

Temple Emeth didn't feel like home. Indeed. as my family sometimes wryly commented, there were times when I spent more time at Temple than I did in my own abode. There are moments...when I am reading the Bimah announcements and look out at the faces of worshippers and I recognize nearly everyone, when I am standing at the top of the stage stairs during Bazaar and looking out at the myriad volunteers amidst thronging customers, when I'm amidst the hubbub of picking up all the bags and baskets of my Shalach

Manot delivery route on that annual Sunday morning event, when I'm pressed up against a happy throng of revelers at a Spring Gala...that my heart, like Deanna Troi's, is flooded with a sense of affection, happiness, iov even.

I have a sense that many others feel the same way. You may have noticed that I haven't "given away" my parking space for many months. It's not for lack of trying. But many of the people I've offered it to as a token of my thanks for their exceptional volunteer work have turned it down, not wishing to call attention to themselves. I think that is a reflection of how many, perhaps most, of the members of the community view themselves as part of that larger group and eschew a lot of individual attention for their participation in it.

My hope for each and every congregant at Temple Emeth is that you are able to find that same sense of belonging and community for yourself. The congregation offers so many avenues and mechanisms to become a part of it, and it's not only via shared worship experiences, although Friday nights and Saturday mornings are wonderful. No, it's through singing, cooking, planting, arranging, teaching, learning, crying, merry-making, laughing together that you become part of the community. As this fiscal year begins to wind down but the warm spring and summer beckon, I hope you'll make yourself a greater part of Temple Emeth and be enriched and embraced by it.

Monthly News Update: Love It or Leave It

#### ASSOCIATION OF JEWISH LIBRARIES ACCREDITATION

What does it mean to be a Jew? What is it about Judaism that makes it worth our while...or not? If you surveyed ten Jews, you'd get at least ten different answers to these questions. You could also consult two new books in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library. In these books you can find very different but equally fascinating responses to these questions.

Judaism's 10 Best Ideas: A Brief Guide for Seekers by Rabbi Arthur Green is a short course in Jewish wisdom, the fifth book written by this leading spiritu-Ordained by the Jewish Theological al teacher. Seminary, Rabbi Green is a professor at the nondenominational Rabbinical School of Hebrew College in Boston. In his book's introduction, Rabbi Green promises to share "the core of Jewish teaching, the ideas that represent the Jewish people's greatest ongoing contribution to human civilization." And this he delivers succinctly with down-to-earth explanations, humor, and lots of illustrative stories. According to Rabbi Rachel Cowan the book is "as valuable for one beginning to explore Judaism as for one who needs renewal of soul and purpose." Each chapter is devoted to one central tenet of Judaism, such as Shabbat, Torah, or Tikkun Olam. Judaism's 10 Best Ideas is the text we are using in Lunch and Learn. It is a tiny handbook, stimulating and informative.

Rabbi Arthur Green finds much of his inspiration in

Hasidic teachings. Shulem Deen, on the other hand, was raised a Hasid, lost his faith, and left his community.

Deen tells his story in All Who Go Do Not Return, a 2015 National Jewish Book Award Winner. Deen's earliest years were spent in Borough Park, where he attended a cheder that was open to Hasidim of all different sorts. There he had a couple of years of English and math. But then his family moved to New Square and joined the Skverer sect, which is considered fanatical even by the Satmars (themselves extremists). His education focused exclusively on ancient Jewish texts. Deen spoke only Yiddish. He married at 18; it was an arranged marriage and just about his first contact with a girl his age. Soon he was the father of five children, and he had no skills whatsoever to support his family. What Deen did have was an intellectual curiosity about the outside world. This led him to sample forbidden pleasures. Listening to the radio was just the start. Soon he was reading the encyclopedia in the children's section of the public library, watching movies, and questioning his life with the Skverers. Labeled a heretic and ousted from New Square, Deen paid a heavy price: he ultimately lost all contact with the children he loved. His memoir is beautifully written and poignant.

These two books are available in the Rabbi Joshua Trachtenberg Memorial Library.

Approximate cost for above work (awaiting official proposal from PSEG): Total cost - \$239,000. Cost to Temple Emeth - \$71,700 (30% of total cost) 36 Monthly No-Interest Payments at \$1,992 per month. MOTION – Option to use the \$65,000, previously approved by the Board for the Lime Energy proposal, for the PSEG alternate - PASSED.

7.
