are some recommendations for the big picture about the major ideas of Judaism, and about Israel.

Most of us get engaged, occasionally or frequently, in discussions or arguments about Judaism or Israel. Sometimes just with ourselves. The best way to make these discussions satisfying -- for you, for the people you might be able to educate, for the people you wish you could persuade -- is to have a working big picture, and details that fill it in. These are a few great books for that purpose:

Rabbi Arthur Green, Judaism's 10 Best Ideas: A Brief Guide for Seekers

Rabbi Green is one of the most important thinkers in modern Judaism, having held major positions at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College and Hebrew College. This is one of his easier books; he has several other worthwhile and more dense works on Jewish theology.

Art writes briefly about each of ten different core Jewish concepts. Chances are, you hadn't thought about one or more of these concepts as being on Judaism's top ten, or you may simply be surprised by the order he has chosen. That's the main reason to read this – to think with Art and with yourself about

the most important ways Judaism speaks to today's world and today's human being.

Rabbi Joseph Telushkin, *The Book of Jewish Values*

Rabbi Telushkin is our age's Jewish encyclopedia writer, and his books are chock-full. This is the one we give our B'nai and B'not Mitzvah at Beth Abraham. It consists of 365 entries, each one tackling an idea or a practical guideline in Jewish ethics. You can read it in order, or you can look for any issue of how to act right. You'll be amazed at the texture of what Judaism has had to say about every kind of relationship, and how Judaism has a suggestion to address every kind of human flaw.

From the Incoming President

First, allow me to David Sacks express my deep thanks and gratitude to Michael Harris for ably serving as the prior President of our congregation for the past 3 years. He leaves very large shoes to fill in, especially when it comes to his thoughtful, inspiring and articulate letters and speeches, and his strong leadership to guide the board and keep it focused on the matters at hand. I want to extend my gratitude also to long-serving board members whose terms have recently expired, namely past president, Lisa Bonneau, past secretary Alan Green and Wendy

Kolopsky. Hopefully your retirements from the board will be brief.

The coming years appear daunting and challenging for shuls and other formal religious institutions. Membership levels have been decreasing nationwide as shuls try to find ways to continue to engage area Jews in a time when long-standing norms are being questioned with alternate business offerings. In virtually every industry the idea of just paying for what you use is becoming an expectation, especially among our millennials. Is the idea of a "zip-shul" that far off the horizon? But when these Jews look for a place to go when they need it, will it still be there? What financial model can sustain this changing mindset? How do we encourage them to continue to want to look for and join the "local shul"?

The key to our congregation's growth is to continue to build and maintain warm relationships with people walking through our doors to attend services, school, programs and events. People should feel a sense of home to want to join us and return again and again. I invite everyone to reach out to new people attending offerings in our building and welcome them. Let's understand what they are looking for. How can we help them become more engaged and feel the hemischkeit (down-to-earth feeling) of Beth Abraham?

Rabbi Abraham Joshua Heschel, Moral Audacity and Spiritual Grandeur

Heschel was a unique figure, steeped in Chasidic tradition and German academia and the activism of the 1960s. You couldn't go wrong with any of his books. They are poetry and prophecy and ideas. I suggest this collection, put together by his daughter, Professor Susannah Heschel of Dartmouth. These essays and speeches give you a sense of Heschel's agenda to get Jews to talk about spirituality, to develop and use a God language to demand more from prayer services and rabbis, to see modern issues of war and poverty through the lens of the prophets.

Ari Shavit, My Promised Land

This is a challenging book about the history of Zionism and Israel, written by a loyal critic. Shavit narrates a series of challenges, about one per decade, that first Zionism and then Israel have had to face. Each one came with moral dilemmas and very little time to consider decisions. Shavit refuses the easy judgments of hindsight as well as the idea that Israel can do no wrong. This is a very helpful book for learning how to think about the issues that Israel's harshest critics use to question the legitimacy of Israel.

Yossi Klein Halevi, *Letters to My Palestinian Neighbor*

The author is an Israeli journalist and Orthodox Jew, who believes essentially that the Jews have a moral claim to the entire Land of Israel, and that the Palestinians have a moral claim to the entire land of Palestine. In the long term—though not yet—Halevi believes in dividing the land as a historical injustice in the service of justice to living people. He has spoken at times of the typical Israel being divided internally, having "right-wing days" and "left-

wing days."

So he sets out in this work to explain the essential components of the Jewish claim to our land, to a hypothetical Palestinian neighbor just across the wall that guards his own home at the edge of Jerusalem from potential terrorists. He addresses head-on each of the claims made by Palestinian movements that deny a historic Jewish connection or claim to the land. This is a close cousin to Shavit's book, written from the perspective of the Orthodox Zionist peace camp.

to make sure that these are inspiring people to attend and return. We may need to adjust here and there to the changing times and needs. It is important to maintain a strong connection to our traditions but at the same time, we will need to innovate to attract new and existing members to continue to join us for our offerings and support our long standing community ideals.

An example of this type of innovation, are the new alternative services for the High Holy Days 2018. These will provide different options for members and guests who are looking for something beyond our traditional services. While I feel very at home in our traditional service, I realize that there are many attendees who don't.

They have different backgrounds, perhaps interfaith, and would like to experience the High Holy Days in a way that can provide more meaning to them. In 2018, we will provide a multigenerational family learning service led by Eliana Light that will incorporate learning, prayers, and music to help serve members and guests with their family members young and old.

We have to look at financial models and dues structures so that we can meet the needs of all our congregants. Of course we would love for these to be as low as possible but at the same there are minimum costs to run a shul that can provide the experience and offerings that many of us have come

to expect. We will challenge ourselves to find the right balance while still continuing to invest in the critical offerings for a viable congregation.

I look forward to working with the Rabbi, Education Director and a diverse and energetic board that aims only to serve the Temple to be its best. While we already have a good group of insightful members, there remain a couple of open seats, especially on our executive board. What's In a Name?

I wonder how many of you know the name of our religious school. Probably most people would say it is Temple Beth Abraham Religious School. Well, you

wouldn't be wrong to think that, as that is how we refer to ourself. But the truth is we have a special name that was bestowed upon us in 1986, the date when the school as you know it was dedicated. The name of our school is Philip Porter Religious School housed in the Alice and Julius Miller building. I wonder if this name fell from use because it was a mouthful.

Hattie and Philip Porter and Alice and Julius Miller were close friends and generous and active members in Temple Beth Abraham. The Porters donated the land upon which the school sits, and the Millers gave a substantial sum of money to build the school. Of course many families made donations to fund the building of our beautiful school.

As of today, we will return to using our *Shem Tov*, "good name". It is a name that honors two families that are now in our past but whose names shall forever endure. In the fall, we will plan an opportunity for our students to learn about those who walked before them. We will learn about the Porters and the Millers and think about what it means to have a Good Name. It will take a bit of practice but from the standpoint of doing what is just and right, we will refer to our school as Philip Porter Religious School.

In August, the school calendar will be available on the synagogue website. Families that enroll their children will receive a copy of the calendar through email. The faculty and staff have been, and will continue, working on finessing the school curriculum. We are taking a deep look into our Hebrew teaching sequence, assessing the past and working for the future. I am pleased to share that Rina Scharf will be working with the Dalet, Hai and Vav students as the lead Hebrew resource teacher one day each week. She will also continue as the Gimel teacher as well. Speaking of the Gimel class, we are trying something new for our Gimel students. They will attend on Sundays and Tuesdays. This is a pilot schedule that we hope will support the needs of some of our families. If this schedule works for these families, we will look at moving in that direction.

There are many exciting plans waiting to bud next year. We will welcome Eliana Light, a teacher and troubadour of Jewish music and prayer who arouses and stirs the soul. She will be with us on October 12 – 14. Eliana's creative programming and her service leadership skills are remarkable and as such will bring something to every age. She rocks with the littlest ones and elevates the spirit of the older ones. In fact, before she comes for the fall Shabbaton, everyone will have a chance to worship with her during the High Holy Days. How so, you may wonder. Well, Eliana will be leading our alternative High Holy Day services. Keep your eyes and ears open to learn more.

At this point, the 2018-19 registration has been sent to families in the system as well as prospective attendees. The Teen Beth Abraham Philanthropists, known as BAP, is accepting registration as well. If you do not receive a form by email, please go to the synagogue website to find the link to register. In addition, you may call Jessica or me. I am very excited to welcome everyone in the late days of summer. We invite all of our students and their families as well as people who are thinking about our program to a Welcome Back Ice Cream Social on Saturday, September 8th in the afternoon. More information will be available in the next bulletin. I hope you will keep this date open. We have a great building, a super rabbi, a fabulous faculty and lots of good things happening here. The only missing piece is YOU!

Chevra Kadisha—"Help Wanted"

You may or may not know that the greater Nashua area has a *Chevra Kadisha*, a "sacred society" that prepares the deceased of our community for burial. The ritual preparation of the body of the deceased is called "tohora", purification, and is both a spiritual and physical purification.

The *mitzvah* of taking care of the dead is the final *mitzvah* that can be performed for a person. Since the deceased is unable to reciprocate, the mitzvah of *tohora* is considered a true act of lovingkindness. It is a great honor to be a member of the *Chevra Kadisha* and carry out this *mitzvah*.

We have a Women's *Chevra Kadisha* and a Men's *Chevra Kadisha*, both made up entirely of volunteers. Currently, we are in need of a few more women for our Women's *Chevra* and a few more men for our Men's *Chevra*. To be a member of either *Chevra Kadi*-

sha group, a person must be a Jewish adult. No other prior knowledge or experience is needed. Our members observe at first, then participate more when they feel comfortable doing so. It is not required that all of our members are available to participate in every tohora; usually, four to six of us are needed each time. The frequency with which we are called upon is variable. In recent years, the time commitment has been a couple of hours, often in the early evening, a handful

of times a year. This time commitment may increase as our community ages. If this *mitzvah* is something that interests you, please contact Rabbi Jon. He will refer you to a member of the *Chevra*.

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Meet Alexandra Silber, Broadway Actor and Author Sunday, August 12 at 10:30 a.m.





Welcome, Eliana Light for High Holy Days and October Shabbaton

Eliana Light is an award winning songwriter and educator who empowers people to make Judaism their own through song, experiential education, and prayer. She has put out two albums of original Jewish music, A New Light and Eliana Sings (About Jewish Things!), and travels the country providing artistin-residence weekends, teaching at conferences, and consulting with synagogues to create intentional, meaningful prayer experiences for adults and children alike. Her songs have been featured on PJ Library compilations and are used by educa-

tors, song-leaders, and clergy all over the country. Eliana has performed and taught at the Union for Reform Judaism Biennial, the NewCAJE Jewish Education Conference, Limmud New York, Songleader Boot Camp, Hava Nashira, and the DeLeT Masters Program. She is the author of Hebrew in Harmony, a curriculum published by Behrman House that teaches prayer and Hebrew through music. She is also the founder of the G!D Project, an educational initiative focused on accessible, meaningful conversations about G!D and spirituality through

ritual, text, and creativity. Eliana received her Masters in Jewish Experiential Education from the Jewish Theological Seminary in 2016,

Beth Abraham Committees and Organizations

Judy, Noreen, and Rabbi Jon can put you in touch with the head of any group if you have something to discuss, are interested in joining a committee or would like to work on a project!

Board of Directors – President: David Sacks

Sets overall policies and goals, monitors finances and overall wellbeing of Beth Abraham and our Jewish community. Specific responsibility for financial and facility decisions as they come up, and developing leadership and membership in all our committees.

Education and Family Engagement Committee – Chair: Sarit Itenberg

Works with the Director of Education and Family Engagement to develop curriculum and programs to engage children ages 0-18 and their families, through Yedidim (for families of younger than school age), Religious School, other family and parent programs, USY teen youth group and other teen programs. Runs the annual Purim basket fundraiser.

Ritual Committee – Chair: Helen Honorow

Develops religious policies for the synagogue, as well as initiatives to engage the community in Shabbat community, daily and weekly services, and Jewish practice in general. Puts on periodic international-theme Shabbat dinners at the synagogue.

Lifelong Learning Committee – Chair: JeffMasors & Ellie Schwartz

Plans adult education, Jewish cultural, and Israel-related programs,

including speakers, performances, BABKA book club, and classes. Committee members organize logistics and food related to these programs.

Chesed (Caring) Committee – Chair: Marsha Feder

Provides meals after funerals, visits for the elderly, rides members who are unable to drive, and meals for families experiencing illness.

Tzedek (Social Justice) Committee – Chair: Marsha Feder

Focuses on human rights issues and supports those in need, with a local focus. Committee members volunteer each week at the Nashua Soup Kitchen and Shelter, and are involved in immigration issues in various ways. The committee approaches the Board and Rabbi for official statements on behalf of the community regarding issues such as immigration and LGBT rights.

Sisterhood – President: Becky Green

Sisterhood is women coming together to help each other, help the community, and have fun in the process! Sisterhood organizes educational, sends holiday packages to college students, prepares food for a house of mourning after a funeral, arranges for food after Shabbat services, runs two rummage sales that raise money for local organizations, helps maintain the synagogue kitchen, and much more.

Southern New Hampshire Jewish Men's Club – President: David Fox

The SNHJMC caters to the social and educational needs, and bellies, of men in the Southern New Hampshire area by way of our Sun-

day breakfast programs – our own brand of great programming and in collaboration with other Beth Abraham groups. The Bruce Retchen/ Neil Goren Scholarship Fund gives a gift to Bar and Bat Mitzvah and provide stipends to students who are making educational trips to Israel.

Chevra Kadisha (Burial Society)

One group of women and one group of men on call for the traditional preparation of bodies for Jewish burial. Traditionally, the members of the groups remain anonymous to do their work with humility.

Zimria (Choir) – Coordinator: Becky Green

Our growing choir sings at Beth Abraham programs, High Holy Day and periodic Shabbat services, and an annual concert, and participates in the Greater Nashua Interfaith Choir.

Membership Committee – Contact: Wendy Kolopsky

Reaches out to prospective members and welcomes new members personally.

Outreach and Communications Committee – Chair: Daniel Palmer

Develops and executes marketing plan for major community initiatives, recruitment of new members, and the school, working with staff and other committees.

Finance Committee – Chair: Richard Cohen

Oversees the investment of synagogue funds, develops an operating budget to propose to the Board each year, researches and recommends ideas for sustaining the institution financially.

Cemetery Committee – Chair: Alan Green

Oversees the maintenance of the Beth Abraham Cemetery at Exit 5 in Nashua, the selling of plots, and the logistics related to burials. Committee members take turns being on call in the event of a death.

Fundraising Committee – Contact: Gaby Zeira

Organizes an annual fundraising appeal, including communications and events, and strategizes about other initiatives such as planned giving.

Interior Committee – Chair: Elaine Brody

Oversees and approves all major design and decoration projects. Projects have included stained glass windows, Ner Tamid (eternal light), Hallelujah, Menorah, and Parochet (ark curtain) in the sanctuary as well as wall hangings and furnishings throughout the synagogue.

House Committee

Researches options and oversees repairs and renovations for the two buildings, working with our Facilities Manager.

Security Committee – Chair: Harris Greenstone

Recommends security practices and infrastructure for our two buildings.

High Holy Day Committee – Chair: Chris Savage

Organizes honors (coming to open the ark, have an aliya, etc.) during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services, and serve as ushers in Sanctuary during services.

Rabbi Liaison Committee – Chair: Marsha Feder

This committee meets three to four times per year to provide a forum for discussions between the rabbi and a representative group of congregants.

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
