#### Love Your Neighbor, in Study and Action

Well it wasn't my goal of 75, but during Elul I did study the Torah's commandment of "love your neighbor as yourself" with 30

different people. Some came more than once! It was energizing for me to meet people and delve into Torah and commentaries at four coffee places, one home, two different times at the synagogue, and two web conferences.

Each discussion was different. Some were more about close-up relationships, and some were about wider circles of responsibility. We discussed whether love is about attitudes, emotions, or actions—or some combination. I got to deliberate with Democratic activists and committed

libertarians – sometimes in the same circle! We even roped in a Christian professional Bible scholar one time, who happened to be having coffee at the same time as we were.

By the end of the month I was even more convinced that this kind of Torah study around ethics has something unique to offer us and the world we are part of. It is a meeting place, where we talk out our own reflections, join centuries-old debates, and summon contemporary thinkers from in and out of the Jewish world. It's a goal of mine to continue this kind of study in different formats and places throughout the year.

One important strand of interpretation around "love your neighbor" is political – our responsibilities in the community, to care for people and

make sure justice is established and done. October is a big month for that in our local Jewish community. We have two Beth Abraham traditions, and one new opportunity that I hope will become a tradition.

Every election cycle, the Southern New Hampshire Jewish Men's Club hosts a political forum where candidates for federal and state office have a chance to speak and answer questions submitted by the community. This year the event will be on Sunday, Oct. 21.

We expect to have candidates for Congress and Governor, and hopefully for the State Senate as well. I am honored to be moderating the forum once again. We always draw citizens from beyond the Jewish community,

alone. I am from the camp that needs to be irritated by a situation before I step up and take action and get involved.

This was the case when I was living in Bedford and watched one attempt after another fail in bringing a public high school to Bedford. Finally, I joined the campaign and got elected. From my position on the school board, I was able to shape the message and tweak the campaign. A year later in 2005, the vote passed

the necessary 60% threshold and Bedford had its high school. The school opened in 2007 and is one of the top schools in the area.

So what does this have to do with Temple Beth Abraham? After watching the numbers in our shul and Religious School decline over the recent years, I stepped up and joined the board. After a few years on the board, I volunteered to go one step further and assume the presidency. For me, it was all about trying to take proactive steps to see if we can turn the corner and grow the congregation and school.

I have oftentimes found myself talking to members who seem to be frustrated with one thing or another. My ask of you? Come forward, share the idea. Who knows? You might get to participate in a ground-breaking change in our shul and who knows where this will lead.

One such example, was the idea to propose a name change from Temple Beth Abraham to Beth Abraham Synagogue and Jewish Center, during the prior year, that was sponsored by my fellow board member, Jeff Weiss. Jeff felt that we could get more attention with a name change, attract new members and the proposed name would better capture the culture and the many things that we do at Beth Abraham.

During the process, we held several forums and ultimately a vote. While the vote failed, we learned a (Continued on the following page ...)

as our forum has a reputation for serious and informed questions. It's not a debate format; each candidate meets with us separately.

Every single year, Beth Abraham has the honor of hosting the CROP Hunger Walk for the Nashua Area Interfaith Council. More than 400 people from more than 20 faith congregations and groups raise more than \$40,000, to support local and international anti-hunger organizations.

It is amazing to have our building as full as on the High Holy Days, to share the bimah with other faith leaders and the mayor of Nashua, to meet people from other congregations and then to enjoy a meal and the amazing music of our Raymond Street Klezmer Band and the New Fellowship Gospel Choir.

The CROP Walk is on Sunday, Oct. 28 and more information about how to participate in the preparation or in the walk is in the bulletin.

Our *Tzedek* (Justice) Committee is working this fall with the Unitarian Universalist Church to engage with the neighborhood between our two congregations. In partnership with the Granite State Organizing Project, we will be going door to door to encourage people to vote and to find out what the key concerns and issues are for people in the neighborhood.

This is an area that historically was once the center of the Jewish community in Nashua. Our previous Beth Abraham building was a number of blocks south and east of where we are now. We hope to reestablish our roots in this part of town, and see how we can be partners and allies for the people who live there. We plan to be out on two Sunday afternoons, October 21 and November 4.

Research has found that when you ask someone if you can mail them a reminder about voting and they agree, participation increases substantially. That is part of the canvassing work. We are not campaigning for any party

or candidate, but encouraging the vote and researching the needs of our closest geographic neighbors in town.

And of course, everyone who is eligible should vote. Inform yourself about the candidates and issues. If you have kids, make sure to bring them with you to the polls, to experience the thrill of freedom and democracy! As I never tire of telling you, a voice in selecting our leaders is something that few people, and few Jews, have ever had in all of human history.

Michael Walzer, the Jewish activist and political philosopher, writes: "...think of the welfare of the most vulnerable people in the country. And then vote, gladly, for the candidate who minimizes their vulnerability." I can think of no better Jewish maxim for the upcoming election.

Engage and Make a Difference continued ... lot from our members. We heard good reasons for changing and for staying the same. But one thing was a point of universal consensus. If we are really saying that we are a *Jewish Center* then we need to deliver on that promise.

While there are many great things happening, I want to draw your attention to two of the biggest ideas that will be ground breaking in achieving our vision of growth and being a *Jewish Center*. They are the relaunched Yedidim program and the ReNewYEAR High Holiday services.

Yedidim is designed for families with children 0-8. There are many

fun and engaging activities such as Shabbat in a box program, Mom's Night Out, Dad's Night Out, Family Havdalah services once a month and so on. Jessie Mocle is energized to reshape the look and feel of our membership with kids 0-8. There is so much more to talk about here. If you know of families with young children, please direct them to Jessie to learn more about Yedidim.

I feel confident in claiming that the ReNewYEAR experiment has been a resounding success. The alternative high holy day service was just a twinkling of an idea that was in the minds of Esther Kosofsky and myself a year ago. Fast forward a year. The great space in the Religious School was packed to capacity on both days of Rosh Hashanah (weekdays, mind you), delivering an engaging learning and family experience. The gallery in the main building was empty but for the two board members greeting members and guests between 10 and 11:30, while both services were in full swing. The reports from attendees of how they enjoyed the alternative service and tunes were overwhelmingly favorable. So much so, that I have already asked Eliana Light, the leader of our alternative service if she is able to commit to TBA for next year. I am happy to say that she is. ReNewYEAR is here to stay!

Preparing for the New Year and preparing for the new school year share a number of similar action steps. First, there are many plans that have to be finalized.

Then we need to collaborate with the teachers and leaders to make the beginning of the year monumental, something that will inspire, lift up and engage our community into a sense of sacred space, sacred work. A sacred space is a place where you feel safe and are able to breath deeply and open up to new ideas and feelings.

As I write this, Rosh Hashanah has passed and Yom Kippur looms ahead. Much of my time has included collaborating with our guest spiritual leader, Eliana Light. Working with Eliana has brought me a powerful sense of pure spirituality. Being present in the sanctuary where she led us in prayer through song and story, a new lens to take in the work of the holiday filled me with joy and awe. I hope each of you had an opportunity to be a part of the High Holy Day work, avodah, in some way. Perhaps you davened with Eliana or maybe you davened at the main sanctuary. Others of you may have been out of town with family or perhaps you were at your

favorite place, which to you is also a sacred place.

The doors to the school opened before Rosh Hashanah. Given that the school was set for the holy days, we had to share the space and find ways to learn both together and as individual classes. After a countdown, they all threw their balloons onto the sidewalk in the back of the school right at the spot where they wrote their misdeeds. It was a remarkable moment to watch our misdeeds just wash away.

As I look ahead to the next month, there is a great deal on the calendar. I suggest that everyone take a look at the events and dates for the next few weeks. Also, please take a look at the Yedidim page for programs and activities for our families with young children. We are excited to offer a monthly Sunday school program for families with children ages 2 - 3 years old. Jessie Mocle, our Yedidim Director, is heading this program. The BAP team is taking off on Sunday, September 16. We have 10 teens that will work together along with teen leader, Dan Kassner. #### **Interfaith Burials in Our Cemetery?**

In keeping with Beth Abraham's philosophy of increasing inclusiveness, the Ritual and Cemetery Committees have initiated discussion about interfaith burials in the Beth Abraham Cemetery. Currently, only people who are halachically Jewish, by birth or conversion, may be interred. Both committees did detailed study, with Rabbi Jon, of pertinent texts and a recent opinion

papers from the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Rabbinical Assembly. It was felt that it is reasonable to pursue study of this issue, and a small working group made up of members of both committees will be meeting to address potential challenges. If a decision is made to consider implementation of interfaith burials, open congrega-

tional forums will be scheduled so that all of our members will be able to participate in discussion of this initiative. Ultimately, such a policy would require approval of our Board of Directors.



Many years ago I wrote a column that some people found offensive. I was very involved with Women's American ORT at that time, and

ORT had a fundraising program called "Mother to Another". For a donation of \$25, ORT would provide their students with a kit of toiletries and other small necessities. In my column, I suggested that families could forgo a meal or two at their favorite fast food place and earmark the funds they saved for this project. (You can tell it was a long time ago because you could get a meal for a few people at a fast food place for less than \$25!) I thought it would be an easy way to do a good deed, and, possibly, teach our children a life lesson. Imagine my surprise when several people approached me to say I had no right to tell them how to feed their families or how to spend their money.

Donate the card to the Nashua Soup Kitchen and Shelter Birthday Room.

#### How's Your Child's Mental Health?

This column is a bit different from most of my columns, and has no Jewish focus. However, it does focus on the mental health issues facing late adolescents (15-18 year olds) and young adults (ages 18-24). These groups have high levels of stress not seen previously in these age groups (see Psychology Today). Research shows that anxiety or depression affects nearly 1 in 5 students. But why are these disorders so prevalent? Social media and technology are factors, as well as mobile phone addiction (yes, this is real). In addition, there is a certain competition between real life and virtual life, thanks mostly to social media (see The Conversation).

As a parent, you are familiar with the emotional ups and downs many young adults experience in college and high school. Colleges are overwhelmed by the numbers of students seeking mental health services. The Washington Post reported "...students have been taking action themselves through peer-run mental-health clubs and organizations." This step appears to be working for students. If your child has an ongoing mental health condition, the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) offers tips on managing the condition in college, with ideas on what to do to prepare for college and after arrival.

What can parents do? First, <u>Parent</u> Wellness <u>Promotes College Student</u> Wellness. It may surprise you to know that college students think about their parents often and are

impacted by their wellness. Students feel stressed out when their parents experience problems. So get on board and check out four areas where you can take action.

Second, How Parents Can Help When Anxiety Hurts Academic Performance at College. This article provides questions to ask your child about anxiety and steps you can take to help them control or overcome it.

Third, One Small Change in your life can actually make all the difference in the world. Suggestions in this article are learning to say "No", showing more kindness, ditching tobacco, eating fruits and veggies, reading more, eating healthy, drinking more water, moving more and sitting less, and expressing gratitude. These are great ideas for everyone, not just students.

There are resources available to you, as parents, and to your child.

College Wellness is a resource page

for promoting happiness and health in the college years.

Grown & Flown, Parenting Never Ends is a web site covering a range of issues relating to raising children ages 15-25.

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
