We Need Feeders and Greeters

My midsummer bulletin column is going to be very simple. There are two things Beth Abraham needs a lot of help with, in

order to be much more successful in the coming year at everything we do. We need help with **feeding** and greeting.

A very short Torah background: Beth Abraham means "the house of Avraham and Sarah." In the Torah, their home was a place of extreme, radical welcome to anyone. Greet and feed first, ask questions later!

We want to make sure that 100% of the people who encounter our community feel like they can belong if they choose to. We want to make sure that no one feels like they don't belong if they don't already know where the Sanctuary or the

bathroom is, or where to go if they arrive after something is started.

So we need greeters for everything. We need greeters every Friday night and Saturday morning for services. We need greeters when we have holy day celebrations and guest speakers. We need greeters when we are standing around or sitting down eating.

It's a matter of walking the walk, actually being curious and interested in each other — and not taxing the small number of people who already greet.

Now I know that greeting is not a role that works for everyone. We're not all wired to be gregarious on cue. But a lot of you can do this.

You don't need to feel like you're an "insider" who knows everybody and everything going on. In the home of Sarah and Avraham, everyone was an insider the moment they walked in, and everyone felt like a

bit of an outsider, even the two of them. We'll give you everything you need to know if you volunteer once or a bunch.

Feeding – we have noticed, and it's no surprise, that the environment is warmer whenever there is food and something to drink. We've had a couple of Shabbat and holy day mornings with breakfast, and it transforms the synagogue!

So we need shoppers, choppers, platers, and picker-up-ers. (Also sponsors!) Some of this work is in the background, and some is in moment. If you can add our shopping list to yours sometime, or shop special for us once in a while, or if you can drop by on a particular day and do one task on a list in the office or the kitchen, that would be a huge help.

I can tell you that committee chairs,

We are grateful for a long time member who has stepped forward to sponsor Eliana's return. I also want to mention the gener-

ous donation of the herb garden and establishment of a Temple Garden Fund (under management of the board) from the Green family to provide for "farm to table" ingredients for our Temple kitchen.



New Year, "New "School!

Even though we are in the middle of summer, my thoughts are on September. I am working with Rabbi Jon, Jessie Mocle and our faculty to plan, create

and build a new school structure for our students and families. Join me to take a glimpse into the future.

As many of you know, our school walls were built to move around to make alternative spaces. This summer Richard Bryant has begun taking down the walls to ready the space for the reNew YEAR services led by virtuoso Eliana Light. Based on the very positive feedback we received from her High Holy Day leadership last year, we asked her to return to us this coming year. She was very excited to come back to celebrate and worship with us. At this time we have already begun working with her to plan for the content of the High Holy Day services. She has so much to offer us. We hope all of our families and other congregants will join us for all or some of the holidays.

You may not think this, but bringing down the walls in the school will serve us well. Both our Sunday school and weekday school will gather in an open, multi-age classroom where teachers will co-teach and collaborate. Your children will learn along with children both younger and older than them. There will be times when same grade students will move to a corner or small room to take part in active learning with one of the teachers. Other times students

will be grouped according to their skills such as Hebrew reading. Then there will be times when everyone gathers for a full school service, activity or program.

In addition to the space changing, we are also changing some of the content and the direction we will go with our students. Jewish values will be the solid foundation that both supports and weaves through the entire curriculum. We will seek to bring out the "mensch" in each student. We will talk about what it means to be a mensch and how that connects to *mitzvot* (responsibilities).

It's important to us to build and strengthen connections between our students. We want each child when they enter the building to feel like he or she is in a safe and amazing place. We will do that as their teachers and through the way we engage them in learning and socializing. Offering an environment where our students can make friends and have fun learning is a key goal.

And of our course, don't forget the spirit behind all we do. We want to support our students as they learn and practice gratitude, mindfulness and forgiveness. Together we all will work to create a sacred space, *makom kadosh*, where every person is respected, where every person is accepted, a place where each can explore their own Jewish connection and identity.

Finally, I am looking forward to being a weekday teacher. My love for teaching comes from my soul, and I am so grateful to have the opportunity to work with Morah Rina and Morah Darlene and the most amazing students in our school.

There is so much wisdom in each of them. I can see it in their eyes and the way they tune into the word. Their wisdom bubbles up from the questions they ask and the ideas they articulate.

Look for more specific information including start dates and programs in this bulletin and in late August. As soon as your send in registration along with the fee, you will receive the school calendar. If you have any questions or thoughts, please be in touch. We need you, our parents, to join us in the many wonderful events that are coming up. We need you to volunteer to help with small but important things like shopping for food and prepping in the synagogue kitchen. We also invite you to bring your skills to our students. Do you love to bake or cook? How about art projects or singing? Become a member of the team. Together we can make this the best school year ever!

Help Save Lives At Our Community Blood Drive

Every two seconds, someone in the U.S. needs blood. To help save lives, Temple Beth Abraham is hosting a blood drive on Tuesday, September 3 from 2:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. at the synagogue in the Social Hall.

The community is invited to take part in this special event and donate blood for hospital patients in our neighborhoods and across the nation. The need for blood is constant, but only 3 percent of the U.S. population donates. By rolling up a sleeve, donors can play a critical role in the treatment of accident and burn victims, heart surgery and organ transplant patients, and those-receiving treatment for leukemia, cancer or sickle cell disease.

To make an appointment or to learn more, download the <u>American</u> Red Cross Blood Donor App, visit RedCrossBlood.org or call 1-800-RED CROSS (1-800-733-2767).

Completion of a RapidPass® online health history questionnaire is encouraged to help speed up the donation process. A blood donor card or driver's license or two other forms of identification are required at check-in. Individuals who are 17 years of age (16 with parental consent), weigh at least 110 pounds and are in generally good health may be eligible to donate blood. High school students and other donors 18 years of age and younger also have to meet certain height and weight requirements.



Some of the activities have included digging for artifacts, visiting the Kotel to send your prayers (all prayers are taken to Jerusalem), making Israeli crafts at the Israel Museum, strolling Ben Yehuda Midrehov (pedestrian mall), eating at Café Tel Aviv, hanging out at the Kikar Zion open mic coffee house, enjoying falafel at Sarah & Sam's King David Café, Israeli dancing in the Sultan Pool, listening to Kol Yerushalaim Radio, sing-a-longs of Israeli songs, performances by the TBA Zimria and The Raymond Street Klezmer Band, tours of different areas of Israel, and more. In the recent past, there was a Lego build of a 20 x 20foot model of Jerusalem.

The Israel Street Festival is a wonderful event that sustains the TBA community's link with Israel. It is a perfect family event and the walkathon is a great way to get exercise and provide *tzedekah*. Everyone should come to the Israel Street Festival next year. to get them all in the same place at the same time. By the time you read this, they will be here visiting, but we wanted to spend time with them in their own environment. We had a great time with them environment also saw other family and friends.

Summer seems to be the time for family reunions. We had the amazing opportunity, while in Israel, to meet cousins from Russia who immigrated to Israel about ten years ago. The easiest way to explain our relationship is that Galina's maternal grandfather and my maternal grandfather were brothers. My grandfather came to the United States with two of his older sisters when the

three were teenagers. His parents, two older sisters, and two younger brothers stayed behind in Russia. The short story is that through some genealogical sleuthing, my cousin Noa, who lives in Efrat, recently wrote to the relatives still in Rostov, Russia. They responded and told of Galina and her family living in Ashkelon. We had a wonderful gathering for a barbecue in the Jerusalem Forest Park.

How did they decide to make aliyah? Galina's daughter, Julia, went to Israel on a Taglit-Birthright trip. She met Vitaly, a Russian *oleh* (immigrant to Israel), recently discharged from the IDF and working as a guard on the tour bus. They fell in love, she made aliyah, they got married, and soon her parents and brother followed.

So there we were with telling our family stories to one another in Russian and Hebrew and English.

Vitaly is the only English speaker in the Russian family. The young people speak Russian and Hebrew, Galina and her husband Aleksander speak only Russian. Buzz and I have only English, and Kate speaks English and Hebrew. Somehow, language was not a barrier. We looked at old family photos and remarked on how many similarities we found. Galina's mother was named Paulina. My mother's given middle name was Pauline. Neither of us, nor Noa the sleuth, knows of a Paulina in our family tree. After a delightful afternoon, it was an emotional parting. We look forward to seeing them again on our next trip.

The rest of the summer stretches before us. Reach out to your family...near or far. Connect or reconnect. You know, it's something to think about.

"Rivaling the greatest wooden architecture in history, the synagogues of 18th-century Poland inspired artists Rick and Laura Brown of Handshouse Studio to embark on a 10-year pursuit—to reconstruct the elaborate roof and painted ceiling of the Gwoździec synagogue. Leading over 300 students and professionals from 16 countries, the Browns grapple not just with the echoes of World War II when these buildings were destroyed by the Nazis, but also with warped timbers, tricky paints, and period hand tools. By the end of the project, they have done more

than reconstruct a lost synagogue: they have recovered a lost world. The Gwoździec roof was unveiled in 2014 as the centerpiece of the POLIN Museum of the History of Polish Jews in Warsaw."

How To Be President Forums Kick Off Successfully!

On July 2, former U.S. Representative John Delaney spent an hour at Beth Abraham in Nashua in a different kind of conversation about his candidacy for president.

In front of 75 people, he spoke with me, Rev. Sally Newhall of the Nashua Presbyterian Church, and Michael Reinke of the Nashua Soup Kitchen and Shelter. Together with Rev. Allison Palm of the Unitarian Universalist Church of Nashua, we are the leadership of How To Be President. Our tagline is "Transforming How We Learn About Candidates By Asking Better Questions."

We believe that candidates too often have to present themselves as people of perfect experience and judgment with knowledge of every issue and a plan for everything. We as citizens collude in this illusion. We believe that journalists and citizens don't ask enough of the reflective questions about leadership and about preparing for a job with powers, burdens, and complexities unlike any other. So we are inviting candidates from any party to come and speak with us. We don't ask about specific issues - there are plenty of places you can hear them speak about issues and their resume.

You can see the full hour of our interview with Rep. Delaney on YouTube – go through our website, howtobepresident.org. The whole point of the series is to go into depth, so I hesitate to summarize and defeat our purpose! But here are some things we touched on.

We asked Rep. Delaney about what part of America farthest from his home base or comfort zone he has really gotten to know. He spoke



to us about growing up in urban New Jersey in a union household and meeting his future wife and her family – April grew up on a farm in Idaho. He spoke about the difference between how he himself and voters in his congressional district perceived aspects of his life experience differently.

We asked him about how he is preparing for the responsibility of life and death the world over. Rep. Delaney spoke about the different spiritual, ethical, and analytical approaches he would have to integrate. I found this one of the most original and unexpected parts of our conversation.

We asked Rep. Delaney how as a businessperson who has to negotiate strategically, withholding parts of his true position and goals, he avoids becoming a dishonest person. He had some interesting reflections on the ethics of negotiating, and how one does business with people whose own ethics and behavior make one's blood boil.

One of our goals is to make sure that every candidate has to answer questions like these not just for an hour but as part of campaigning in New Hampshire. So we have published our own list of questions on our website, howtobepresident.org. Ask them, and post your own recordings or reporting about them, tagging them #howtobepresident. Share them with our Facebook page (facebook.com/howtobepresident – like and recommend our page!) or e-mail them to us at info@howtobepresident.org.

Our videos will continue to be uploaded on our YouTube channel, called HowToBePresident. Subscribe to the channel! If you'd like to be notified by e-mail of upcoming forums, e-mail us as well.

We are working on forums with at least one Senator and I got a personal promise from Vice President Biden to do this as well. We are reaching out to candidates in both major parties.

Four years ago, our group in Greater Nashua tried to get candidates to come to our forums and no one accepted. The only fruit was my moment speaking to Secretary of State Clinton at a CNN televised town hall in Derry. It went viral, because it was a unique moment. Let's make it not so unique this time around.

Get Ready for Video!

This month I looked at Jewish online videos. There is quite a lot out there. Jewish videos cover a variety of topics – religious, secular, music, learning, children, adults, nature, women, inspiration, documentaries, food, prayer, and more.

Let's start with Chabad.org's Jewish.

TV. Here you can find many topics or channels along with



courses, *parsha* videos, and a list of speakers. These are all available to you in the menu near the top of the page.

How about kid videos? Chabad.org has a JewishKids.org site with plenty of variety. You can find videos plus games, stories, music, and more. For videos, filter by topic or scroll down the page to find something that catches your eye, or your kid's eye.

Another good site for kids is BimBam. This site has several hun-

dred videos, mostly for kids. The videos use stories to im-



part Torah wisdom. There are also videos for adults. Unfortunately, this organization announced in April 2019 that it will be closing as there is not enough funding to sustain it. Eventually the videos will move to ReformIudaism.org.

<u>Aish.com</u> is another place with videos, and has videos on spirituality, Israel, relationships, and more. Be sure to check out the humor section!

Are you interested in learning Torah through videos? Then you may like <u>Torah Live</u>, a site with a mission to "take the entire Torah and translate it into the language of our generation." Note that this site requires a membership, and a

free membership does have access to all the available videos, as do the paying memberships. Browse the site before you sign up to see if it's what you're looking for.

And then there is <u>Hidabroot</u>, which bills itself as the "world's largest Jewish TV network." Open the Video page and see a list of categories

on the left, or scroll down the page to see what's available.



Many museums and similar organiza-

tions have video libraries, but not all have the videos available online. Similar to videos are podcasts, which can be audio, or video, or some other format.

If you do a search for Jewish online videos (or podcasts), there will be many other choices. So take the plunge and get ready for video!

Our own Rabbi Jon is online already with some podcasts (find them at iTunes) and YouTubes. He tells us many more are coming this summer and fall!


