

THE REBUILDING PROJECT

Last week, my son and I were driving back to Dallas after visiting my parents in San Antonio. My son was behind the wheel, and it happened to be a very windy day. At one point he pipes up and says: "I'm getting really frustrated with the wind." I was pretty sure I knew what he was talking about—the wind was blowing so strong it was actually jostling the car around. But I asked him to clarify what he meant anyway, so I asked, "Your frustrated with the wind?" And he responded, "Yeah, I keep having to course correct."

And it was like a little Rebuilder siren went off in my head. (Did you hear it?)
Without trying, my son basically summed up life in six words: "We keep having to course correct."

Man, ain't that the truth? Never a dull moment. Flights get delayed, refrigerators stop working, people are brash, children tantrum, bosses tantrum, husbands absentmindedly lock their wives out of the house. (I only did it twice.)

When the wind jostles us off course, it's quite natural to feel frustrated or resentful. The question really becomes: how long do we stay off course? Instead of being solution oriented, we're often problem oriented.

We dwell on whatever threw us off course and kind of just spin out.

As I was contemplating my son's comment about the wind and course correcting, something dawned on me. During our daily davening this time of year, we say the words, "masheeve haruach"—He (Hashem) makes the wind blow." In other words, each and every one of the inconveniences we experience, all those things that figuratively blow us off course, are not "just happening." "Masheeve haruach"—Hashem *mak*es the wind blow—Hashem is lovingly nudging us off course to give us another opportunity to refine our character traits and see Him actively involved in our lives. Just like Hashem used the wind to blow the plague of locusts *into* and *out* of Egypt in this week's Torah portion, and used the wind to split the Sea of Reeds in next week's portion, the wind serves a meaningful purpose. Those daily obstacles and inconveniences are there for us to GROW.

So the next time we get a little knocked off course, let's remember Hashem is behind the scenes. There's meaning and a purpose to what's going on. It's not random. Hashem is guiding us. And He's also there to help us navigate back on course.
