THE REBUILDING PROJECT

Do you remember doing connect-the-dot puzzles when you were a kid? Every page looked like a big, random splattering of black dots. But then the fun began. "Oooh! It's a monkey eating a banana! Cool! A giraffe flying a spaceship!" The joy was connecting the dots and watching something take shape right before our eyes.

As we get older, we realize life is basically a big connect-the-dot puzzle. Except it tends to be a lot less exhilarating nowadays than when we were kids. The joy is often replaced by fear, stress and the occasional "what in the world is going on" freak out. That's because as adults it feels as if we're literally *IN* the puzzle. We're on the page surrounded and enveloped by a big black dot. We don't see how things are connected. In fact, we can be so overwhelmed by stress we don't even notice the other dots! We have a "one dot mindset."

The trick is to think outside the dot. We have to remember that there's a whole world of dots on our page. (And on everyone else's page!) We all have huge constellations of dots that Hashem created and wants to help us navigate. By bringing Hashem into the picture, so to speak, it shrinks our ego and widens our perspective. "Ahh, there's life beyond this dot. Things are connected. This isn't the end of the story. There's meaning behind all this. There must be a big picture." And even though we probably won't be able to decipher what that big picture is, simply knowing that it exists is extremely comforting and spiritually invigorating.

If you'd like to learn more about this subject, there's a fabulous book devoted to the topic. It's called...

Megillas Esther. J (And it's quite popular this time of year.) It perfectly demonstrates how the hidden Hand of Hashem can take seemingly unrelated dots and connect them to form a stunning picture.

May we all recognize Hashem's hidden hand more and more in our lives, and soon see that all of our collective dots, no matter how challenging and troubling they may be, are coming together to form a beautiful picture of our Ultimate Redemption.
