## FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



This past Sunday I went to the wedding of my friend's son, David, to Jourdan. It was held in Somerset at a catering hall I had never been to before. It was really quite lovely and very large.

About 200 people were in attendance and, a huge thank you to my friend, because she put us at a table that was a bit further away from the DJ's speakers. Not that I think it mattered because, quite honestly, the music was so loud and the base was so strong, we had to scream just so that the person next to us could hear what we were saying. A few months ago, I went to an audiologist to get a baseline hearing test. I didn't think I had hearing loss, but Rob was going so I went with him. He had moderate hearing loss, and I had no hearing loss and was told to return in three years. I'll put it on my calendar. However, this wedding may have sped up my hearing loss and absolutely gave me laryngitis (much to Rob's delight)!

But I digress because that's not the real reason I am writing this. This was a wedding between David, who is Jewish, and Jourdan, who is Filipino and Christian. The people in the wedding party and the people in attendance could have very well been a part of the U.N. delegation. There were Jewish people, African American people, Filipino people, Hispanic people and it was a wonderful thing to see. My message is not to discuss intermarriage, rather about a gathering of cultures and religions that was refreshing given the issues we have been surrounded by recently. This

These past few weeks have been very difficult. Israel is forced to defend herself over and over. Where other countries are not asked to justify retaliation when aggressively attacked, Israel always is. I don't understand broad hatred of an entire group of people. I have certainly disliked a person. I may have even disliked a couple of people. I don't like using the word hate ... so I'll say strongly disliked. I just don't understand hating a people as a whole. I don't understand the mindset of hating someone you've never met. I mean, truly, you can't like everyone, but the level of hate that Jews experience is beyond

There is a song from the Broadway show South Pacific, written by Rogers and Hammerstein. Jewish men whose words, written almost 75 years ago, still ring true:

### You've Got to Be Carefully Taught

You've got to be taught to hate and fear, you've got to be taught from year to year

It's got to be drummed in your dear little ear, you've got to be carefully taught.

You've got to be taught to be afraid, of it takes is that first step. people whose eyes are oddly made

And people whose skin is a different shade, you've got to be carefully taught.

You've got to be taught before it's too late, before you are six, or seven or eight

To hate all the people your relatives hate, you've got to be carefully taught!

Was there always harmony? Maybe not, but for the most part everyone got along. We were all poor together. The only discrimination I experienced as a kid was being told that I killed Jesus. I had to ask my mother about that. I didn't know who Jesus was and I certainly didn't remember killing him! Maybe because I looked Hispanic, since I had dark hair, darker skin (my mother was Yemenite), it was assumed I was Spanish. In East New York, in my teens and early twenties, they were more the majority, so I guess I fit in. As an adult, working in Princeton at a personality testing firm, I was asked by a female client if I missed having Christmas because I was Jewish. I thought that to be an odd question. How do you miss something you never had? So, I asked her, if she missed not having Chanukah and eight days of celebration.

EBJC is a safe haven. Safe from hatred, safe from judgment, safe from intimidation. Certainly, the leadership, staff and clergy feel this way. We have signs outside of our entrance welcoming everyone! As it should be. A shul should be a place of comfort where one never feels intimidated or on the "outside". EBJC is a safe place for all that walk through our doors. All it takes is that first step.

## FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



Like many of you, I have been glued to the television and computer for the past several weeks as events have been unfolding in Israel. So many of us have family and friends there. Someone sent me a meme about Israel that said "When somebody asks if I have any family in Israel, I reply...Yes I have several million" We all have family in Israel. As the Rabbis taught us, "All of Israel is responsible for one another"

But how do we live that ideal? We are fortunate that we live in the United States where we have freedom and a voice to speak out. And speak we must. We must continue to let our voices be heard by communicating with local and state officials, to speaking out and pressuring our alma maters, where many of our own Jewish students no longer feel safe on campus.

In our own community, we are doing Last, there is an old saying that everything possible to "harden" our building and make it safer for everyone, from our pre-school students to our seniors. New procedures are going in place, more guards are being assigned, and we now have volunteers who are watching the network of cameras that we have set up inside and outside the building. Thank you to the many families of Kesher, who have stepped up to be another pair of eyes when Kesher is in session. We are also continuing to look for volunteers to watch the cameras on Saturday morning. If you have 90 minutes, please contact us.

How else can you help? Israel needs supplies. Israel will need to rebuild and fortify. There are so many organizations that are pitching in to help in every way possible. The Jewish Federation has an Israel Fund. Israel Bonds is a way to Invest in Israel's future. There are also many other groups that need your help. Yasher L'Chayal, and the Friends of the IDF support our soldiers. The Magen David Adom, (Israel's affiliate of the International Red Cross) supplies ambulances and medical supplies Israel. Please contact any of these groups to help.



## KESHER AND YOUTH GROUPS





Hello Kesher and Youth Families.

Wow! October has been flying by!! After some incredible Sukkot experiences, we were excited to transition into our full curriculum. Every day, we open school with some tefillah and discussion of the parashah. We not only learn the order of the service, but we discuss how these prayers and stories relate to our own lives in 21st-century NJ. In classes, teachers are following the prayer curriculum, studying Torah, teaching Hebrew reading skills, and looking into our past via history and Israel to better understand our present.

The Hebrew month Cheshvan, which comes after the first month of Tishrei, often goes by the bitter name "Marcheshvan" ("mar" is the root of "maror") because we are sad that we went from a month filled with holidays and celebration to one without any holidays at all. Fortunately, we may have birth-days and anniversaries in Cheshvan, so our focus as a people can be on making Cheshvan less "mar" through our personal celebrations, even when times are tough. Here in Kesher, we are doing just that by fulfilling learning and mitzvot goals during each class!

While we are keeping our brains and spirits active in school, please remember to keep practicing Hebrew and tefilah at home! On Sundays, our Madrichot and I are going to pull out students for extra Hebrew remediation and enrichment.



# PARTNERS IN JEWISH PROGRAMMING TRAVEL SERIES SIX PARTS 2023-2024

#### Sunday, November 19 @ 1:00 PM - "Jewish Cuba" with Abel Hernandez Eskenazi

This presentation will present a panoramic view of the whole Jewish presence in Cuba since the first group of Jews who arrived to Cuba until today. It will emphasize the different historical periods of the Cuban Jewish Community, the presence of Jews in different cities of the country, the most important Jewish places and the most important Jewish personalities.

#### Sunday, December 17 @ 1:00 PM - "Jewish Greece" with Evan Kapros

Greece is full of history, and this is reflected in the history of Greek Jewry, a unique combination of Sephardic, Ashkenazi, and Romaniote communities with roots in Spain, the Balkans, and going back all the way to the Roman Empire. We will discover this rich history, and will talk about the social perceptions prevalent in contemporary Greek society concerning Jewish identities. Finally, no good discussion about Greek Jewry can be conducted without talking about the language, food, and music of the community!

#### Sunday, January 7 @ 1:00 PM - "Jewish Egypt" with Louise Arwas

Over the course of our virtual tour we will be time travelling: From the time of Moses, through to the Golden Age of Egyptian Jewry, and right up to present day Jewish Egypt. We will visit an Egypt that was tolerant and open, yet indigenous and traditional, where Jews and their Muslim neighbors lived harmoniously, and extended, multigenerational families lived seemingly safe and joyous existences. We will be journeying through world history and Jewish history (and some of my own family history), and long the way we'll stop at some of the most iconic Jewish sites in Egypt. We will remember what was - and maybe what can be again someday.

#### Sunday, January 28 @ 1:00 PM - "Stories from Curacao's Jewish History" with Ron Gomes Casseres

This presentation will include both historical and current stories about the Curação Jewish community and practices. Curação will also be introduced for those who may not be familiar with my home country. There will be several photographs to show aspects of Curação, the synagogue and Jewish heritage sites.

#### Sunday, February 25 @ 1:00 PM - "Jewish Portugal" with Gloria Ribeiro

The Jewish heritage of Lisbon started in Roman times (if not before). This visit will allow you to understand the living Jewish community in Lisbon and learn about their history, their traditions and their everyday life. We will see the Sharee Tikva synagogue and refer to the massacre of Passover of 1506, for which a memorial was built by Jews and Catholics to express the reconciliation between religions. We will also walk virtually through Lisbon's historic downtown, where two of the Jewish quarters used to be located. The Alfama, the oldest neighborhood in Lisbon, still preserves the 8th century layout, and here, Jews, Christians and Muslims used to live and work side by side. For centuries after the expulsion, many "conversos" kept practicing their faith in secrecy, and the most famous example are the Belmonte Jews, who until recently lived as an isolated community. We will also learn about the growing community of Porto, representing about 500 Jews from more than 30 countries.

#### Sunday, March 10 @ 1:00 PM - "Jewish Iran" with Alan Niku

Iran's Jewish community is one of the oldest diaspora communities in the world. But is there more to those 2700 years than Queen Esther and the Islamic Revolution? This talk examines the lesser-known parts of Iran's 'Jewish History, a vast story of prophets, autonomous nations, divergent sects, epic poetry, and political intrigue. Through the music, languages, foods, writings, traditions, and stories of two millennia, along with their ties to neighboring and faraway communities, the Jews of Iran have forged a culture at once Persian and Jewish, with traditions and aesthetics uniquely their own.


