


The Center for Early Learning @ EBJC



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RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



Greetings from Rabbi,

Shanah Tovah Tikateivu! May you all be written in the Book of Life for a good year. is the traditional greeting for this time of year, as we approach the Yamim Nora'im/High Holidays. But this year, the image of the Book of Life takes on a more visceral meaning. Having seen so much suffering in the year just ending, issues of life and death are very much on our minds. The u'netaneh tokef prayer. listing possible our misfortunes in the year to come, has never seemed so real.

There will be many firsts on the holidays this year, many adjustments to our current reality. Our psalms teach us: "Shiru l'Adonai. shir chadash," "Sing to the Lord, sing a new song." At EBJC, we are singing "b'ofen chadash," in a new way, through the use of remote learning and davening. During High Holiday services this year we will offer special programming for children and teens remotely, helping them to learn traditional songs and holiday themes in a new way.

Those themes continue to resound, regardless of what happens to be going on in a given year. The behaviors and ethics of self-reflection, of true apology, and of heartfelt forgiveness, are eternal. They are the means by which we acknowledge our responsibilities to family, friends, and community, and by which we repair frayed relationships. They mend the tattered books of our own lives.

FROM CANTOR LARRY



Cantor's Musically Speaking:

In Judaism, there is the concept that the Jewish People are known as the "Chosen People". Whether or not the idea behind the term is that God has chosen the Jewish People or the Jewish People have chosen God, it all has to do with making the right choices and doing the right things.

Jeffrey Cohen in the Prayer and Penitence, book. explain: With helps the words Attah V'hartanu (You Have Chosen Us), we commence the middle blessing of the seven blessings of the Amidah recited on all festivals. This is referred to in the Talmud as K'dushat Ha-Yom ("Sanctification of the day"), as it con-tains references to the special quality of holiness with which the festival days are The form of this invested. blessing as it appears in the Musaf Amida for Yom Kippur is the most expansive because the account of the ancient Temple service (Avoda) and the S'lihot (penitential prayers) were inserted into it.

The actual mention of the holiness of the particular festival only comes in the following paragraph, Va-ti-ten Lanu ("And you gave to us"). The purpose of Attah V'hartanu is to serve as an introduction by establishing from the outset why Israel merited to be the recipients of those precious holy days. It was a loving privilege conferred upon Israel because of her willingness to aspire toward spiritual "exaltedness above all tongues," in order to become a receptacle of holiness through the fulfillment of God's Mitzvot or commandments.

The Attah V'hartanu blessing is couched in the second person. The same blessing, though framed in the third person—Asher Bahar Banu Mikol Am ("who has chosen us")—is employed as the evening Kiddush bless-ing for all festivals. A contracted version of it is also used as the blessing recited before the Reading of the Law (Asher Bahar Banu Mi-kol Ha-amim).

This composition is reproduced almost verbatim in the Attah Yatzarta prayer which is recited on Shabbat Rosh Hodesh in the repetition of the Musaf Amida.

As the New Year is upon us, we look back to the choices we have made, both good and bad. We look ahead to the future as the choices are placed before us. Let us make the right ones. Let us prove our worthiness to God, to our family, and to our friends that we are indeed chosen. Chosen to perform God's laws and the laws of all humanity. Let the prayers

we say reflect the actions that we do.

On behalf of my wife, Laura, my children, Samantha, Avi, Heather, and Jeremy, I wish you and your families a Shana Tova Tikatevu for a happy, healthy and prosperous New Year.

FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



Friends,

The year 2020 has been, to understate the obvious, a challenging year, both for us individually as well as for our EBJC community. We are writing to inform you of this year's plans for our High Holidays. Rosh Ha Shannah will be celebrated on Friday night, September 18th, Saturday September 19th, and Sunday, September 20th. Yom Kippur will occur on the evening of Sunday, September 27th, and throughout the day on Monday, September 28th.

Notwithstanding the information below, all services will continue to be streamed on our website.

We will be holding in-person services throughout the High Holidays. Indoor services, by executive order of Governor Phil Murphy, will be limited to a maximum of 100 people. All those attending in-person services will be socially distanced throughout the sanctuary and the Kroll Ballroom, and masks will, of course, be required to be worn. Additionally, those attending will have their temperatures taken prior to entering the building. Anyone with a temperature above 100.4 degrees will not be allowed to enter. These services will be led by men, but we are planning to have both egalitarian and traditional Torah services each day.

A second lay led outdoor service limited to 25 people will also be held on the two days of Rosh Ha Shannah as well as on Kol Nidre night and Yom Kippur. The same safety guidelines as previously mentioned will apply to this service as well. This service will be a completely traditional service and will not be streamed.

In the interest of safety, no ark openings or English readings will be assigned to congregants this year. Torah honors (aliyot and Haftara readings) will be assigned from among those who choose to attend in person. Those receiving an aliyah will recite the blessings from their individual seats.

The Talmud teaches us that an individual's obligation is to hear the sounds of the shofar in person. The Rabbinical Assembly has ruled that this year, while it is preferable to hear the shofar blown in person, one will have been deemed to have fulfilled his or her obligation by hearing the shofar on a streamed service. We will, however, have an in-person shofar blowing on the afternoon of Sunday, September 20th (as you know, the shofar is not blown on Shabbat) in our parking lot for those who do not feel comfortable attending an indoor service but who still wish to hear the shofar in person.

For the past several years, we have charged a fee for High Holiday tickets. We are acutely aware of the financial strain that the COVID-19 pandemic has placed on many of our members. There will, therefore, be no charge for attending our services this year, either in person or online. We are asking those of you that generously give a Yom

Kippur pledge, that you consider adding what you would have normally paid for tickets into your donation. For those of you that do not normally give a pledge, we ask that you make a pledge in lieu of purchasing tickets. Whatever you can do, however much you give, will be greatly appreciated.

Of necessity, there will be a separate Kol Nidre/Yom Kippur appeal as in previous years. Like most synagogues, our budget relies on the generosity of our members at this time of year. We hope that even in these difficult times, you support our biggest fundraiser of the year.

Throughout the pandemic, we have striven to keep EBJC together as a community. The number of people who view our weekly Shabbat services and online classes on Zoom has been remarkable. We will continue to offer online services and classes this coming year, as well as several programs that we believe will be of interest to our members. Look on our website or in Tidbits, our weekly announcements, for details.

We pray that the coming year will bring an end to the scourge of the COVID-19 pandemic. We wish each of you a happy, sweet, healthy, and safe new year.

MEN'S CLUB



Shalom!

As you read this, we will be very close to the high holidays. While these times contain traditions that are core to Judaism, this year those traditions can't be taken for granted and need to be rethought. Something as obvious as going to synagogue for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur, something done by even the more secular in our community, becomes a fault line in a different direction. Instead of going to shul showing our feelings towards our religion, or our religious community, it now also becomes a measure of how we feel about the spread and seriousness of the corona virus.

The virus, at least at the time of my writing this, is kind of invisible to most people. Infection rates right now are low in New Jersey and it is easy to want to get back to "normal" and to avoid all this business about masks and social distancing. But over 175,000 people have died in this country of the virus in just the last few months, about three times the number that died in the Vietnam conflict, which traumatized our country for a generation, and which was spread over seven years. So it is also easy to understand our anxiety.

For many, our high holiday traditions, ranging from attending services, to other more personal traditions such as getting together with family at Rosh Hashanah or with friends to break the fast after Yom Kippur are being

disrupted this year. We hope that next year we can return to those traditions, perhaps with a new and deeper sense of how much we value them. For this year we must be creative and look for new ways to connect with our values and to renew our relationships.

The requirement to "social distance", and the new internet-based technologies are calling into question our assumptions about time and space. It is now easier for us to connect with my kids and grandchildren who are farther away that it was previously. And this has a Jewish dimension. We have shared Shabbat dinners with them more frequently than we used to. We have said Kiddush at a virtual table and listened as thev blessed But it has made things grandchildren. more difficult with those who live nearby. We will not be having Rosh Hashanah dinner with our New Jersey children this year, for the first time, ever. So, some traditions are being reinforced as others are broken. Life changes.

Zooming, obviously, makes it easier to connect to people in Israel. Foladare is working with Deena Oren to plan an upcoming program on Israeli startups. This will be a panel discussion by several Israelis, live, from Israel, over zoom, of course, who are involved in the founding of several new high-tech firms the fields of digital retail, pharmaceuticals, and digital health. We are targeting this program for mid-November – stay tuned to your email and the online-events page on our website for more information on when and how to access this exciting program. Another program we are planning for early September has to do with men and the connection of their self-worth to their work. This has implications ranging from how we live our lives, to how we interact with our families and our communities to how we think about and plan for retirement. Of course there is a Jewish angle on this topic as well, in that we are taught to step back

from work on Shabbat, and not to idolize our jobs. This will be a small round-table discussion let by our own Jordan Feldman. Again, details on time and access will be forthcoming via email and posted in our website's online-events page.

We are always interested in new programs of interest to the EBJC community – please let us know if there is something you are interested in or would like to learn more about.

While this New Year we are challenged to find new ways of doing things, there is one old EBJC tradition that we were able to pull off, the L'Shana Tova New Year's greeting program. This year we send our sincere thanks to all those who participated in the program, and to the scores of people who purchased the goodies, assembled the bags, and distributed the greetings. It is always a lot of work, touching all the hundreds of members of the congregation. If you enjoy the challah, which is new this year please let us know so that we know to give it out again next year. Our gratitude for making something good happen and keeping something constant during these crazy times! As we do every year, Cindi and I wish everyone a happy and a healthy new year - L'Shana Tova Tikatevu!






