A Letter from a Congregant During COVID 19

March 21, 2020

My Dear Congregants:

As we all learn social distancing and the other advice to slow down the spread of the Coronavirus, I had some thoughts I wanted to share. First, I appreciate the electronic connectedness Steve Zeidwerg, Eric Rabinowitz and others devised to allow Rabbi Pivo and Cantor Larry to lead us in our novel services. I loved how we switched to Bob Salston's home this morning for the announcements. Very impressive.

Sherryl and I have been members of EBJC for 40 years and I know all the Congregation's presidents during the time. While we have had lawyers, businessmen, engineers and others, I don't believe we ever had a medical doctor serving as president, until now. And, a security expert. It has been said that one who fails to prepare, prepares to fail. Pesakh, particularly the seder, requires more advance preparation than any other holiday, but good planning can make it a wonderful family experience. This year we should all devote ourselves to these preparations to truly feel that we are telling the story of our deliverance as well as re-experiencing it. If there ever was a time to be mindful of our redemption from slavery after a plague, this is the year.

With Pesach on its way this month, we concern ourselves with cooking, cleaning, and all the preparations. The Seder always seems to be the focal point of this holiday, and why not? Great food, wonderful singing, and a hope that will bring us all closer to redemption and Israel.

Two important aspects of the Seder are inviting all those who are hungry to come in and be part of the festivities, and opening the door in hopes that Elijah will visit and bring us word of our future.

Elijah, the mysterious prophet, the one who was scooped up in a chariot and taken off into the heavens. The fifth cup of wine that we fill is for Elijah. The stories of Elijah center on acts of doing good and just, and helping the poor and those in trouble. Elijah will announce the future of peace for all people. However. before this happen, we need to do our part. We need to show that we are ready. Here is a story that can explain how:

"It happened a long time ago when Elijah the Prophet wandered unknown through the Land of Israel. There lived a poor farmer and his wife who worked hard, but were unable to earn enough to feed or clothe their children.

One day an old beggar appeared. 'Have you anything to eat?' the beggar asked the farmer. 'We have little enough for ourselves,' sadly explained the farmer. 'But come, share the bread that we have.'

As the meal ended, the beggar turned to the couple. 'In thanks for your kindness, you will have seven good years, with plenty to eat and clothes to wear. Do you want those years now or at the end of your life?'

At first the couple did not believe the old man, for what could a beggar give them. But when he insisted, they decided to take the seven years right away so they would be able to feed their children.

Within a few months, the farm started to do well, and the money began to pour in. The farmer wanted to build a fancy house, and hire servants, but his wife thought better of it. 'Let us build up this farm, so that when our seven years of good fortune end, we will still be able to support ourselves and the children.' Her husband agreed. So they enriched the soil,

The *Recorder* went to press late this month due to circumstances relating to the COVID-19 (Corona) virus and its effects on EBJC. After nearly 2 weeks of sheltering in place, we are taking a collective breath and reflecting on how our community has responded to this unique challenge. And although this is still a work in progress, the response of EBJC from it's clergy, staff, lay leadership, and membership has been phenomenal.

On Wednesday, March 11th, with the advice of a committee of physician members (Dr. Laura Brandspeigel, Dr. Richard Drachtman, Dr. Louis Friedman, Dr. Philip Schiffman, and Dr. Robert Salston) EBJC decided to close for 2 days to thoroughly clean and sanitize our building. The following night, our religious Committee met off premises and, after a long discussion, recommended that we no longer hold Shabbat or other services communally. The

administration and clergy met late into that evening and decided to accept the recommendation and close our building to all activity. In less than 24 hours, thanks to the technical help of Eric Rabinowitz and Co-President Steve Zeidwerg, we were able to implement virtual services led by Rabbi Pivo and Cantor Larry. To date, over 50 families have viewed all or some of these services. It was heartwarming to still feel part of a greater kehilah while being socially isolated, especially when, at the conclusion of services, members unmuted their microphones to wish everyone else a Shabbat Shalom.

Our usual schedule of classes (Judah Landa's *Science and the Bible* and Talmud classes, Rabbi Salston's *Hands on Judaism* class, and Rabbi Pivo's *Lunch and Learn*) are already or soon to be viewable online. Our preschool and Kesher teachers have been reaching out to their students via the internet, and Rabbi Pivo continues to play his guitar and sing Shabbat songs to our preschoolers via the web.

From the moment that the decision to close was made, Rabbi Pivo's concern has been how to reach our senior citizens who would be most vulnerable to social isolation. Our Membership Committee under the able leadership of Ken Gerson and Taryn Webber has been calling all members over 70 to say hello, see how they are doing, and asking if they required any help in obtaining groceries or any other needs. *Yasher Koach* to them. And Rabbi Pivo and Cantor Larry will be reaching out to all our members over the next several weeks as well.

We would be remiss if we didn't thank our maintenance staff, Jose and Leo who worked tirelessly to clean our building. And thank you to Ellen Botwin, our Executive Director, who has overseen all the efforts necessary to close our physical plant as well as continue to keep the EBJC family connected.

As we approach Pesach, also known as Z'man Cheirutenu, the season of our freedom, we should all pray that we will be delivered from this current plague to the freedom of good health for ourselves and our families. We should also be thankful that we have an amazing community that we can rely on, even when we must stay apart. Chag Sameach.

Hello Kesher Families and Youth,

It is hard to believe that we are already in the month of April. This year is flying by. We have some exciting and interesting events ahead. First, normal Kesher classes will be held on Wednesday, April 1st (no foolin'), Sunday, April 19th, Wednesday, April 22nd, Sunday, April 26th, and Wednesday, April 29th. Youth Night for USY, Kadima, and Chaverim will be on Wednesday, April 1st. We will have Shabbat School, Shabbat B'yachad, and Shabbat Y'ladim on Shabbat, April 4th. We will not have sessions during Passover from Wednesday, April 8th through Thursday, April 16th. Kesher High School will meet on Wednesdays, April 22nd and 29th. For our families, there will be a Yom Hashoah commemoration service on Monday evening, April 20th and there will be a Yom Ha'atzmaut celebration on Tuesday, April 28th at 6pm. For our Heh (5th grade) class there will be a special pre-Bar Mitzvah meeting on Sunday, April 26th from 10:15am-11:15am.

The May calendar will be sent out in the next Recorder. Please mark your calendars that the last day of Kesher for our Gan, Aleph and Bet will be on Sunday, May 17th and the last day for our older grades will be on Wednesday, May 20th.

Registration for next year will be coming out soon, so please check your emails, so that you can register early for Kesher and our Youth Groups.

Of course, please look out for emails and other announcements regarding any changes to our dates and programs.

Finally, a little tidbit for your Passover celebration...

At the beginning of the Passover Seder we are instructed to take the middle matzah, break it in half, and put half aside (hide it) and use it for the Afikoman, the dessert, nearing the conclusion of the Seder.

Some people allow the children to hide it, while the adults search for it, hence, a reward is given to the children for its return. Some households will have the adult hide the Afikoman and the children will search for it, hence a reward is given to the children for it being found. Somehow, the kids always seem to make out pretty well.

Alas, the Afikoman must be eaten by midnight, so that the Seder will go on and everyone can go to sleep, which is usually pretty easy after eating all the food and drinking the wine.

Afikoman is a Greek word and we think it means dessert. However, some say that the word has an Aramaic meaning and that it was "afiko man", meaning "take away the food." Obviously, we had enough. Others said it was "afiko neima", meaning "go to sleep". I think most of us will vote for the latter.
