



RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



It's December (or, more precisely, Kislev), so it must be time for Hanukkah! On Sunday 12/18 we light the first Hanukkah candle in celebration of miracles, divine and human. This corresponds to the 25th of Kisley, when our ancestors, the Maccabees, (also known as the Hasmoneans) reclaimed the Temple in Jerusalem from pagan worship and reconstituted Jewish rituals there. In memory of their victory, and of the miracle of a one-day supply of oil lasting eight days, we kindle lights every year at this time.

Here is the how-to: Each night, use the shamash (the 9th candle) to light the other candles, starting with one candle on that Sunday night and then two, three, and so on each night of the holiday. Candles are added from right to left, but lit from left to right, giving the honor of first lighting to that night's addition. They

are not required to be all at the same height, but must be in a single plane (remember your geometry?) Light the Hanukkiah just prior to sundown near a window, so that it will burn into the evening hours, and fulfill the primary mitzvah of Hanukkah: pirsum haneis, the publicizing of the miracle.

Before wax candles were common, oil lamps were used, to remind us of the miracle of the oil. But this is not the only oil-related custom. The foods we eat to mark this festival are holidays, we teach them the joy of also those cooked in oil. The European tradition is to serve latkes; the Israeli custom is to serve donuts fried in oil. These are good traditions, but there is no reason not to add in french fries, fried chicken, fried vegetables, or any other form of fried foods. Think of a county fair and the almost limitless number of fried things to be found there, and you can personalize your holiday observance.

Playing games of chance, such as dreidel, is another component of Hanukkah. Each side of the die represents a letter from the phrase neis gadol hayah sham/a great miracle happened there. Each player begins with a small pot of coins, beans, or candies, and spins the dreidel in turn. The outcome of

the spin depends on which letter faces up when the dreidel stops spinning: Nun=nothing; Gimel=take the whole pot; Hey=take half the pot; Shin=put one in.

Gift giving is also customary, but let me encourage you to make Hanukkah gift giving part of a yearly cycle: Whenever a Jewish holiday comes, give your children or grandchildren something special, even if it is small. By creating positive associations with the Jewish living.

Giving tzedakah is another custom of the holiday, as it is for most Jewish holidays. We want to be sure that no Jewish home lacks the ability to kindle the lights and to enjoy festive meals. Our Social Action group is currently collecting gift cards to enable anyone who needs it to get food and lights at this time of year.

A Hanukkah same'ach to all!

"The Syrian armies were beaten. They turned around and fled Jerusalem to their homes in the north. The Maccabees and their army had fought very hard, but were too happy to be tired. "To the Temple!" they cried. "To the Temple!" echoed the people as they sang and danced in the streets of Jerusalem. It was the story of the mighty Goliath

defeated by a small David all over see the light of Judaism from again. The small Jewish country was able to fight against mighty Syria and win!

Now, they could return to their beautiful Temple to pray to Gd in their own language, Hebrew, and in their own way. First, they would have to clean out the Temple and throw out the Greek statues. Antiochus had stolen many golden candelabras and tables, the velvet curtain, and the priestly robes that had belonged to the Jews. But the people would make new ones to replace the old and dedicate their Temple to Gd once again.

As they approached the Temple, the soldiers and the people grew quiet. Suddenly, a young girl cried out: "Look, the Syrians were in such a hurry to leave, they forgot their spears! Shall we send them back?" Everyone laughed. There, in front of the Temple, were eight spears stuck in the ground. One of the Maccabees had found some candles lying in the rubble. He stuck one on each spear and with a ninth one, lit the candles. "Thus shall the light of Judaism shine forever." The people cheered.

And so, said the Rabbis, "We light eight candles on the holiday of Hanukkah so that we may, too,

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



I've taken a particular interest in two shows recently. The first is East New York, primarily because that's where I grew up. When I was 7, we moved into the Louis H. Pink House projects off of Linden Boulevard. I lived there until I was 21, then we moved into Richmond Hill when my sister got married and we purchased a two family home.

The Second is a show on Peacock called The Calling, also filmed in Brooklyn. This one is about a former Orthodox Jewish detective who is not quite "conventional". He recites Mourner's Kaddish over every body, quotes the Talmud and has a special way in the interrogation room. The last episode I watched (there are only 8), had one of the detectives investigating something on St. John's Place...where I was born and lived until I was 7.

These shows, although dealing in current times, take me back to my childhood and there is something fascinating to me to see street names and places I was familiar with. It's very different now, of course, but my eyes are always peeled to the street signs and intersections of my youth. A more innocent time, for sure, but we left the projects because of how dangerous it became to live there. I would get off the train at Euclid and walk home with my keys between my fingers "just in case". When we first moved in, it was wonderful. Everyone kept their doors open for a nice breeze in the summer. Doors were unlocked, we'd sing in the stairwells because of the great sound, elevators were clean and it was

safe. Over time, things changed and the In addition, we're working on: danger level increased. Doors were locked, instead of a nice breeze, people put fans and air conditioning units in their windows, the stairwells became dangerous to climb and the elevators smelled like urine. Pride in your home. your community, your building was lost.

That's important - pride. I take enormous pride in EBJC and I hope you do too. I don't want to hear what happened 10, 15, 20 years ago. That's in the past. No one has a time machine that I am aware of, to go back and change anything that happened. Like Elsa in the movie Frozen sang..."Let it Go!"

So much has changed and all for the better. For those that are willing to open their eyes and see all the good, it is absolutely amazing. I've mentioned before all of the great improvements and plans for the building and it is certainly worth restating:

- We'll be getting in a new boiler soon, through a PSEG Direct Install grant.
- We're building a new shared bathroom in the preschool which is paid through a grant.
- We put in a new cement walkway for the preschool so the parents and kids don't have to walk In mud - paid for by the grant.
- We put in steps and a walkway from the Rabbi's house to the parking lot entrance.
- We replaced the broken accordion wall with a beautiful retractable wall in the sanctuary.
- We replaced the roof over the rug
- We replaced all of the windows in the preschool wing with windows that are laminated, higher security, and shatter proof through a government grant
- We painted the lobby a brighter, cleaner color.

- Two new HVAC units over the ballroom and sanctuary through the Direct Install program.
- Replacing the roof over the sanctuary and ballroom.
- Phase 2 of fixing up the ballroom removing the defunct and no longer used piping along the bottom of the walls, sheet rocking the entire ballroom, new sconces and painting the walls. The ballroom is a source of pride. Once, beautiful, is now in need of tender loving care. Phase 3 will be replacing the floors, but is not in the "works" for now.

There is so much we have to be proud of that has nothing to do with the physical building. Our classes, our services, our programming, our events... all something to be proud of.

So here's the challenge I bring to you. Talk EBJC up. Stop talking it "down". Focus on all of the positive things we're doing and how we did extraordinary things during the pandemic to keep our community involved. Not only through the zoom services and programs...we handed out Shabbat candles and challah on a Friday so we could pray together. We created "grab n'go" meals to keep our kosher restaurants in business and make it easier for our members to get a great meal. We had outdoor havdallah and handed out candles for everyone. We kept our community going and involved. This is a source of pride. This is who we are and this is what you should be telling your friends!
