





RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



A recent Pew study suggests that the era of a Christian majority in America is rapidly approaching. Attendance at religious services is plummeting, as is affiliation with a house of worship, particularly among young adults (sound familiar?) Pew suggests that self-identified Christians will be less than 50% of the population, perhaps as soon as the year 2040. The drop-off in religious affiliation is a huge concern for Jews directly: If our own young people do not join synagogues. there will soon be few synagogues left. But another question must also be asked: Is the diminishment of American Christianity good for the Jews?

On one level, it is tempting to say yes. Jews have suffered under Christian majorities for centuries, in many lands. As the majority religion, the church as an institution and individual Christians often made life difficult for Jews. So we would be excused for feeling some kind of relief that the Christian era may be passing, that the suffering that

Jews associate with it will also pass.

We must resist such thinking. For one thing, we could easily imagine an alternative history in which Christianity never existed, where some other majority religious system (Roman paganism, Zoroastrianism, Islam) was just as widespread and influential. Would Jews have suffered less throughout history? I expanding Jewish community. If would suspect not. More to the point, despite our history of tears, and the current rise of antisemitic incidents here and abroad, there are more Jews now than in the time of King David, and Jews have been accepted into all fields of human endeavor, many times excelling in circles where we were previously excluded. In some ways, there has never been a better time to be a Jew, and part of the reason for that is the great change in how Christianity has come to view Judaism over the last 70 years.

Simply put, most mainstream American Christians understand that non-Christians are equal citizens, with equal rights. Attitudes toward Jews have culture? shifted both above, in official Christian theological circles, and below, in the attitudes of the average Christian. They may still believe ardently in their own tradition, but they do so less and at the expense of competing beliefs. Having served on interfaith councils in three different communities. I can tell you that despite theological differences, most Christian clergy are fully supportive of the Jews, of

Israel, and of Judaism. There is some concern that a weaker American Christianity may lead to a weakened sense of respect for Jews

But perhaps the coming multicultural era will also be a time of growth for Judaism. As the majority religious culture wanes, maybe there will be more space to make the case for a vibrant and even the reality of a majority religion itself fades, and America becomes "majority minority" religiously and ethnically, this may be a time of great flowering for American Jews. We already see that non-practicing Christians are very much interested in marrying Jews (and vice versa); perhaps it is time to map out how to capture some of that good will to the advantage of Judaism. Is it too much to hope that Jews become, if not a majority, a much larger minority in America? What would that mean for issues of justice, of fairness, of inclusiveness? Let's think big: If one of five Americans were Jewish, how would that affect the nation, and how would it affect our Jewish religion and

In some ways, the coming demographic changes will challenge us as Jews. But if we approach these changes with good will, and even with a joyous affirmation of Jewish life, the outcome may yet be one that is very good indeed for the Jews.

There is a story that I read about not taking the easy way in life and assuming that things will just happen. Better to take on the responsibility to ensure things happen for the best of the situation and what will be the best for everyone.

Then it happened! A green shoot poked up through the dusty ground, and in a few days it became a tomato plant! Full and green with many big red tomatoes on each stem!



FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



For close to 35 years, my family has been going to Orlando and spending a week or two in our time share, Vistana. In the early years, we took my mom and Rob's mom and we visited the parks, swam, and enjoyed the getaway. We never felt we had to be in the parks every day. As we came every year, there was no need to make everyone miserable. 35 years ago, the park passes were good forever. You could get a 5-day hopper and use it over 3 or more years! We visited Disney, Sea World and then Universal. Every year the parks grew, adding new sections to entice park goers. Every year the parks, especially Disney, got more and more expensive. They took away the passes that were good forever. They stopped selling a one-day park hopper. Parking fees kept going up. The lines for each popular ride became a wait of 1 or two hours! They had to invent entertainment while waiting on line so that you wouldn't want to kill everyone. Then they invented the Fast Pass. For free, you could stand at a kiosk and get up to four fast passes. This gave you the ability to scoot right on the ride and eliminate the wait on four of your favorite rides. Then, two years ago, they started charging for the fast pass...\$20.00 each, I think. So, a family of four not only has to pay \$2,000 just to enter the park,

they now have to pay another \$80 just to be able to get on some rides or attractions! Disney pretty much charges for everything now. Things that were free 30 years ago you now have to pay to do or see. Disney actually issued a warning...if you can't be nice, don't come. Well, I think when people are pushed to their limits, they have difficulty being nice. I no longer go to the parks. I've had enough. My kids may go... but I don't. Even though I'd love to experience the parks through the do it. I'm annoyed with Disney. I'm annoyed with their Greed. Do they do good on occasion? Yes, I'm aware...but the millions that visit their parks are asked to fork over thousands of dollars for just a few days in the park. I'd rather go on a Mediterranean cruise. It's about the same price. I'm lucky we got to experience the Disney parks in the earlier years when it was more family oriented and less greedy.

Let's circle back to EBJC. I have been here for a bit over 7 years. Granted, we're not a theme park with rides and attractions on a Disney scale, but what a bargain we are compared to Disney! Our "entrance" fee hasn't gone up in four years and most of the "attractions" are included even though that entrance fee doesn't cover the expenses of running EBJC. So, yes, there are times we do charge for an event or a dinner and yes, donations into the EBJC "park" are greatly appreciated, but never mandated. And we do one thing that Disney doesn't do... offer discounted rates for those that want to come, would love to enjoy our events, but can't afford it. 25% of our members receive discounted membership. We don't ask for proof of earnings; we don't make you fill out dozens of forms. We accept you at your word

and welcome you with open arms! Can you imagine going to the Disney site and asking for a discount because the entrance fee is just unaffordable? I don't think so.

We all make choices as to where our hard-earned dollars are spent. My decision not to spend it on Disney is a choice. My decision to belong to a synagogue is a choice. I have very strong feelings about supporting Jewish institutions and especially eyes of my grandchildren, I just can't local synagogues. Synagogues are struggling to "reinvent themselves". How do you attract young families who feel they do not need a spiritual or social connection? How do you create a dues model that is "voluntary" or based on income or what one "feels" is the right amount? How do you do this while trying to keep the doors open? Salaries still need to be paid, utilities still need to be paid, maintenance and upkeep on aging buildings is costly...what do you do? There are no simple answers to these questions. We have to keep trying to involve our community and remind our members of how special they are to us. We have to reach out and engage. If vou have ideas or thoughts as to how to sustain our shul, let us know. We are always exploring and seeking to improve. We want you safely back in our building. We want you involved! Share your thoughts. Give me a call. I am always open to exploring new ways and methods of keeping our community together!

East Brunswick Jewish Center's three youth groups, including Chaverim (4th to 5th grade), Kadima (6th to 8th grade), and USY (9th to 12th grade) came together on November 16 for the annual EBJC/EBUSY Thanksgiving/Social Action Tikkun Olam (SATO) event. This included 4 Chaverim, 6 Kadima, and 9 USY members, totaling 19 participants.

USYers led a dynamic event involving three mitzvah projects. Participants brought cash donations for Make a Wish Foundation (they raised \$63), wrote Hanukkah cards to send to the Jewish Soldiers Project (they made 24 cards), and bagged toiletries for Jewish Family Services of Middlesex County (24 filled gallon-sized ziplock bags).

Participants enjoyed pizza and listening to a speech given by USY leaders about the meaning behind the USY "pillar" of SATO as well as the impact the nonprofit organizations featured in the mitzvah project do for the community. It was beautiful seeing the three groups work together.
