

# "The Golden Age of Jewish Life in Sepharad/Spain – Guide for the Perplexed" – A Virtual Historical Tour with Mike Hollander


For centuries, the Jewish community of Spain was one the world's most significant. It's creative achievements in the arts, sciences, literature, medicine, diplomacy, etc. were unprecedented for a Diaspora community, largely because of the interaction and integration of the Jewish community in Muslim Spain. All this ended during the same year that Columbus set sail to discover America. What is the legacy of this important community? We will visit some of the more important Jewish centers, including Córdoba, birthplace of Maimonides, Granada, home of the beautiful AlHambra Palace, where Ferdinand and Isabel issued their expulsion order, as well as the beautiful synagogues of Toledo. The presentation will also touch upon the complexity of minority/majority relations, the tension between integration and assimilation, and celebrating the rich legacy of Sephardic Jewry.

### "THE TRIANGLE SHIRTWAIST FACTORY FIRE: Out of Tragedy Comes Social Justice"

On the first day of Spring in 1911, a terrible fire broke out in Manhattan's garment district. When it ended, half an hour later, 146 workers, mostly young immigrant Jewish women, were dead. This horror capping years of worker protests against intolerable conditions propelled a powerful coalition to enact factory safety legislation that would become a model for the Nation.

# RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



While the holiday of Tu B'Shevat has not yet penetrated the American greeting card cycle ("Thinking of you on Tu B'Shevat"?), most Jews know that this minor holiday is connected to the natural world, that it is deemed the New Year for trees, and that in our time much effort is exerted to emphasize our connection to nature generally and our connection to the land of Israel specifically. One of my favorite Israel facts: It was the only country to have more trees at the end of the 20th century than at its beginning!

The early sages designated the fifteenth of the month of Shevat ("Tu" is simply the pronunciation of the letters tet and vay, 9 and 6 respectively,) as the official measure of the age of fruit trees. The fruit of trees under three years of age by that date was not used; the fruit of trees older than three years by that date could be enjoyed, and was also subject to tithes. These practices date to the time of the Mishnah (c. 200 C.E.), when the Temple in Jerusalem had been in ruins for a hundred and thirty years; as a practical matter, the tithing rules have never been observed.

But what was important to the early rabbis was not the fact of the Temple's then-current state; rather, imagining the world as it should be, as God intended, was their concern. They were looking far beyond the circumstances of their particular moment, to an idealized world that was set in its daily and yearly patterns, where the people, the land, and God all interacted with one another. The great miracle of their mental world-building exercise was that to a very great extent, they imagined that world into reality. The course of the last two thousand years of Jewish history, down to the details of the fiscal years for trees, was set by those early masters, and we are the inhabitants of their dreams.

We should therefore let Tu B'Shevat remind us that current circumstances are no bar to imagining a perfected world, where our appreciation for, and use of, fruit trees, no less the way we respond to one another, transcends the particulars of our moment. We must never cease to strive toward the improvement of ourselves and our world, with the goal of the ultimate redemption of humanity always before us.

# FROM CANTOR LARRY



The Talmud in Mishna Sanhedrin states "...Whoever saves a life, it is considered as if he saved an entire world." This is a very powerful statement. The first part of the quote is actually, "Whoever destroys a soul, it is considered as if he destroyed an entire world."

We tend to focus on the second part more as its impact is more positive, and it shows that the rabbis of old and today want us to improve on our lives and focus on how to make a positive difference.

How does one save a life? How can one save a life? Does it mean jumping in front of a bullet to save another person's life or performing CPR on someone who has gone into cardiac arrest? Can it mean giving Tzedakah to help a person purchase food for themselves and their family? Perhaps it is the simple gesture of a kind word inspiring someone who suffers from a depressed state.

We have multiple opportunities to help one another. In the Book of Leviticus, it states the Mitzvah of "V'a-hav-ta L're-a-kha Ka-mo-kha" or "You should love your neighbor as you love yourself". According to some Rabbis in the Talmud, this Mitzvah is perhaps the greatest Mitzvah of all the Mitzvot.

What we learn from this is that we have a responsibility to care for one another. In the paragraph that follows the Alenu prayer, we find the words, "L'taken Olam" or "To repair the world." As a Jewish people we have a great responsibility to set the example by following this creed. The idea is that if we as a small group of people can perpetuate this task, then imagine if the rest of the world would do the same.

From a personal level, I see what a simple phone call, text or email can do for another person. I see the impact of a short prayer of healing for someone. I see the greatness of a small donation in honor of someone's need or celebration. We all can make a difference in even the smallest of ways.

This past month, I became one of the one's to fall victim to the terrible pandemic we have been facing over the past two years. Although I was not stricken with such severe symptoms that I was required to be hospitalized, I still had some days of "suffering". I know that there have been others in our EBJC family that have endured the same kind of pain and turmoil in their lives.

What made me feel better, along with Gd's hands, was the outpouring of emails, texts, and calls from all of you. A gesture of "How are you?" made the pain fade away, even for a few moments, but those moments got better and better as more emails and sentiments of good tidings

were sent my way. I can say that I am thankful for the prayers and outreach that I received which made me strive to be better.

If at any moment one could ask themselves, did my call or text make a difference, the answer is "yes." Prayers, a good word, or a nice gesture do make a difference. They can save lives. Knowing that someone cares makes all the difference in the world.

So, "Whoever saves a life, it is considered as if he saved an entire world." Always consider doing what is right and doing good for someone else. By doing so, it will come back to you. You can make a difference and you can save a life, knowingly and unknowingly.

# FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Have you ever met people or had friends or acquaintances who like to talk...about themselves? People who rarely ask how you are doing and really don't want to hear an answer or response if they do ask, because they really only want to talk about...themselves.

One example prompted me to write this. There is someone I've known for years.- not a friend but certainly an acquaintance. I don't see him very often any more but on the rare occurrence that I do see him (usually in Shoprite of East Windsor), his first act is to take out his phone and show me pictures of his grandchildren. I don't ask to see them. I don't know his grandchildren and I've never met them, but there he is, hand on phone, searching for every picture he can of his twin grandchildren. He doesn't ask how I am. He doesn't ask "what's going on" and he NEVER asks about my four grandchildren. What's with that?

Then there are the people who never let you finish a thought and interrupt you assuming they know what you're going to say. They wait eagerly until you take a breath and pounce! I know several people that do this. Look, I know we all interrupt, but I'm talking about the major interrupters...the ones that for lack of a better explanation...only want to hear their own voice and opinion. I've actually taken to

saying, "let me finish my thought." Amazingly, this actually works (for the most part). Although I have a strong feeling that they let me finish my thought while not listening to a word I'm saying so that they can get their thought in. Oh well.

Why am I bringing this up? Well, I've noticed the world has gotten a lot ruder. In the last 6 – 9 months I've been cut off on the road more often than in the past 6 – 9 years! A few days ago, I witnessed an argument between a customer and cashier. The customer loaded all of their items into a canvas bag (this was Dollar Tree) and expected the cashier to empty the bag for her (without exaggeration there were at least 30+ things in that bag). Could each one have been a bit nicer or patient with each other? Absolutely! But apparently this did not cross their minds. If I wasn't 4th in line and didn't have to push my way through, I would have emptied the bag for the customer who, for whatever reason, didn't want to do it (ultimately she did).

It takes a little more effort to be nice and not to yell and complain when something goes wrong or someone annoys you. It takes some thought. On a rare occasion, you can certainly be justified in an angry response, but for the most part we jump the gun and start yelling. We're all guilty of this.

Let's bring this back to EBJC. There are only three of us that handle the day to day operations and business of the Synagogue. There are times we are understaffed and depend upon volunteers to help. Have we made mistakes or errors? Sure have. Do we always try our best to rectify the issues and make everything right? Absolutely. Do we get yelled at? Unfortunately, yes. Especially when there is an error in the billing or accounting. More often than not,

it's a mistake on the part of Kesef that we have to fix.

I'm grateful that it is not often (and actually rare) that we are treated unkindly. As Executive Director, I can handle it. However, it's not cool to yell at Cheryl and Nicole. They work hard and only want to help EBJC and do the work that is asked of them.

So, here's my suggestion. If you are going to call because you are annoyed, frustrated or angry with something, please call me. Vent with me. Yell at me. Don't yell at the staff. They don't deserve it.

So now I'll end on a positive note. It is a pleasure to work here. We laugh and we joke and we've become friendly with so many. We love visits from members who stop in to say hello. We chat on the phone and care about our members who are struggling. We call members when we know they are not feeling well or in the hospital (if given permission). All of the staff members that are here every day, office staff, maintenance workers and preschool teachers get along. We're a great team and enjoy being here every day.

We're waiting for the day when our doors are wide open and EBJC is a hoppin' and a boppin' as it was before the pandemic. There wasn't a day that went by that something wasn't happening in this building.

Let's hope 2022 brings us there! Wishing you all a happy, healthy and fun 2022!

# FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



As many are aware, the latest Pew Research Poll contained a very startling statistic for Conservative Jewish communities: seventy-two percent of non-Orthodox Jewish marriages are intermarriages. Our movement has struggled to come up with solutions to this trend but has not succeeded in adjusting to this reality. Clearly, with such a large incidence of intermarriage in our movement, this issue has affected many of our members.

Our Long-Range Planning Committee has been studying ways to publicize EBJC as a welcoming community to all. This includes not only welcoming intermarried couples, but also Jews of color, Jews with disabilities, and Jews of the LGBTQ community. In addition to revising our website by highlighting EBJC as a welcoming community, they have also recommended that we revisit our policy of not announcing the engagements, marriages, and the births of grandchildren to intermarried couples. This policy has angered some of our members who, although often disappointed by their children's choice of a marriage partner, are nevertheless happy for them and wish to share their joy with our community. Likewise for grandparents of a grandchild born to a mother who is not Jewish. Some congregants have even resigned from EBJC because of our current policy.

In the past, we have felt restrained by a T'shuvah, (responsa) of the Committee on Jewish Law and Standards of the Rabbinical Assembly which discouraged

Conservative congregations from making such announcements and did not allow those congregations even to accept donations in honor of those events. It is important to note that the Law Committee states on their website: "Rabbis have the authority, though, as marei d'atra [masters of the house for all halachic matters], to consider the Committee's positions but make their own decisions as conditions warrant." This T'shuvah was discussed at a recent Zoom meeting of synagogue presidents in our region moderated by staff of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. They promised to check with Rabbi Blumenthal, the CEO of both the Rabbinical Assembly and of United Synagogue for the current opinion of our movement. His response follows:

While there is an opinion from the 1980's that discouraged a congregation from expressing congratulations to an intermarrying couple, in recent years many if not most congregations have adopted welcoming practices for intermarrying couples, including public announcements and private and public rituals outside of the wedding ceremony to welcome and celebrate with the couple and their family. This also includes congratulations to grandparents of grandchildren born to intermarried couples. Congregational leaders should partner with their rabbi to

determine appropriate practices for their congregation.

After consultation with and approval of Cantor Larry, our Long-Range Planning Committee, Jack Goldberg and me, Rabbi Pivo has decided to allow the announcing of congratulations to acknowledge life cycle events of the family members of all of our congregants. Non-Jews still will not be allowed to participate in rituals reserved for members of the Jewish faith such as aliyot or ark openings. By making these announcements and welcoming intermarried couples into our community we continue to foster the Jewish value of hachnasat orchim, welcoming the stranger.

We realize that change is often difficult. At an earlier meeting, Rabbi Blumenthal suggested that when someone is uncomfortable with change, they should visit Rochester, New York. Why Rochester? Rochester is the home of Kodak. When many of us were young, a camera wasn't called a camera, it was called a Kodak. They also made film (I'm not sure millennials know what that is!), flashbulbs, and developing chemicals. They dominated photography. But they were late to the digital camera revolution and are now a shell of their former selves. They were once the leading employer in Rochester. Not so anymore. We at EBJC do not wish to be known as the Kodak of the Conservative Movement.

# "The Triangle Shirtwaist Factory Fire: Out of Tragedy Comes Social Justice"
