

RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



In this third summer of pandemic, with heat waves providing yet another reason to isolate ourselves. we would do well to reconsider our options. It is not good for us to be alone, to be inside, all the time. While taking proper precautions against infection is important, I am now also hearing a new take on living this era. It goes something like: "I understand the risks, and I am fully vaccinated, but at the age of (60, 70, 80...) I have a limited number of years left to be with family and friends. I am now willing to take some low-level risks in order to enjoy my life." This kind of cost/ benefit analysis is exactly what we should all be doing for ourselves, our elderly relatives, and our children. Conditions vary from place to place and season to season, but the costs of shutting ourselves away are beginning to show, and it's not a happy story.

The most important Jewish holiday of the summer season is Tisha b'Av, the 9th day of the month of Av, whose services commemorate the destruction of both the first and second Temples in Jerusalem, as well as other times of Jewish suffering. Our services at EBJC will take place on the evening of August responsibility, not rights. What will

6th and the morning of August 7th. Tisha b'Av is a sad occasion: it is a full fast day like Yom Kippur, we sit on low stools or the floor, sing dirges recalling the loss of the past, and chant the megillah of Eikha/ Lamentations in its own sad, lilting trop.

One of the themes of Tisha b'Av is of Jewish responsibility for the terrible things that have befallen us. This is not an act of self-hatred or victim-blaming, but rather a kind of soul searching, similar to that of the fall holidays, that forces us to seek understanding for suffering. For instance, the early sages claimed that the reason God allowed Rome to destroy Jerusalem in the first century C.E. was that Jews themselves had begun to engage in hateful behavior toward one another, with religious schisms and claims of heresy flying in every direction. We didn't literally destroy the Temple ourselves, the rabbis say, but we contributed to an atmosphere of distrust within the community which invited intervention and, ultimately destruction.

We are living in a parallel time of religious fracture and social upheaval. The questions we must confront this Tisha b'Av are: "How should I respond to an ever more divided, violent, and angry world? When gun violence kills so many each year, when violent mobs threaten the seat of government in Washington, when we are afraid to walk out our own front doors or attend any public function, how should we live?"

The answer is to return to first principles. Judaism emphasizes community, not independence, kindness, not accusation, and

we do this year to return to lives of joy, righteousness, and kindness? Will we take the proper health precautions, and then attend the synagogue services, programs, and classes that uplift us and deepen our connections with God and one another? Will we improve our online connections with those unwilling or unable to join in person? Will we ask questions that earnestly seek answers, rather than accusations followed by a question mark?

We must find a way back to each other's presence in order to be in the presence of God. And we each must find ways to fight against violence, incivility, and extremism in all its forms. These are the moral bequests of our ancestors and of our tradition, and we must take them up with enthusiasm and joy, even in the face of danger. It is time to come out of our shells, and to recognize our responsibility to build a better future. Our three-thousandvear-old culture has much to offer us and the next generation of Jews to whom we will bequeath it. Let us take up its challenges by recognizing our own role in improving this world. It is time to come back

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



In a few short weeks, I will have been in my "new" home for one year! I have no idea how that happened! When I look back and realize all of the work that went into the move, I am stunned at how I survived! Rob, having had open heart surgery was in no condition to really help me and the process of moving (even before we purchased a home) started a year before the actual move. Cleaning out the basement was the most logical place to start. My husband had been hoarding all things electrical for 27 years. Our basement was filled with Epson and Atari computers and peripherals. In addition, all of our friends who wanted to "get rid" of their big tower computers, gave them to Rob for "parts". They remained in our basement... all 19 of them (not even joking). I lugged them all upstairs, put them in my van and brought them to the community recycle area. Didn't even make a dent. Then I sold almost all of the Atari computers, peripherals, games, joysticks we had. That more than paid for our move! I went through everything and bagged up the true junk (I do have some family members to thank because I couldn't lug those big black garbage bags up the basement steps). When everything was categorized and

organized, I had Hollie's son Andrew, come in with his truck and get rid of most of it. I kept more than I wanted because my husband was going to have a stroke with what I was doing, but we couldn't take it with us and he wouldn't address it for years and years. To this day, if he can't find something he thinks he needs or wants, he says I "threw it away". I just smile and walk away.

I sold furniture, I sold knick-knacks, I sold kitchen items...you name it, if I didn't need or want it, I sold it (or gave it away). You'd be amazed at what people buy or want. I took my dining room set table, but not the chairs and I took the breakfront, but not the top of it. I had this genius idea to put a granite top on the bottom of the breakfront and turn it into a "buffet server". When we moved, this was one of the first things I did and I must say...I LOVE IT. I'm patting myself on the back as I write this.

There are still a few things I want to do... nothing major because the house was pretty much "move in condition", but we always want to make it our own. I can wait. But when it comes to doing things around EBJC...well, some things just can't wait. We have an aging building that needs to be rejuvenated! A new fresh coat of paint won't do the trick.

So I find myself sprucing up my two homes...The one that I live in and the one that I work in...both I care deeply about. If you've been in the building and in the ballroom or sanctuary, you will notice our new moveable wall. It is a sight to behold! Replacing the broken accordion door with a beautiful "catering hall" quality wall made a huge difference. I am very proud of

that accomplishment. It took 6 months from start (getting bids) to finish (the actual installation).

What are we doing now? Here are some items that are being addressed that through various grants will cost EBJC nothing:

- We will be receiving a new boiler for the building. Our current boiler is 32 years old...
 12 years past life expectancy.
 We are very lucky that through PSE&G Direct Install and a government efficiency grant, we will be receiving a new boiler, a much more efficient model for only 20 cents on the dollar!
 Payable over 5 years on our PSE&G bill with no interest.
- Through another grant, we will be adding a shared bathroom between two classrooms for our preschoolers in the "lost" wing (we really need to rename that wing). The grant will more than cover this cost and any monies remaining will be used for further improvements.
- We poured a cement walkway
 for the preschool located at the
 rear drop off. The path was a
 muddy mess and now it's
 beautifully cemented (this came
 from that grant as well).
- Through a National Security
 Grant, we are replacing all of
 the windows in the preschool
 wing and youth lounge. We are
 hoping the windows come in
 before school begins.
- Through the same Grant, we will be taking bids for a P.A. system throughout the building which will enable communication from all wings of the building.

including a speaker system that will go to all of the rooms/wings in case of emergency.

However, there are some items that are not covered by grants that absolutely need to be addressed:

- In order to create a revenue stream, the walls in the ballroom need to be fixed. To this point, the heating elements need to be removed (we no longer use them), the walls need to have new 1/4" sheetrock placed over them (cheaper than repairing those walls) and then painted. electrical outlets need to be added and/or moved and the sconces need to be replaced. We are currently taking bids. This is just the second step in bringing our ballroom up to a "catering" level. The next part to be addressed will be the floor.
- Our air conditioners in the Kroll Ballroom and Sanctuary are not

- running efficiently. We need to have them repaired or replaced.
- The roof over the ballroom and sanctuary is old and needs to be replaced.
- The playground needs to be brought up to date. We need new playground equipment for our children. We hope that there will be money left over from the grant we received, but playground equipment is expensive. Perhaps when the building is sold, Netivot will share in this expense.

The above is just the short list. For those of you that complain that dues are too high, please remember that the total dues received cover only two-thirds of our expenses (possibly less). The true cost of sustaining EBJC would be approximately \$4,000 per member, no matter the category! The rest is made up through your generous donations and unfortunately, there have been years where the donations did not

cover our expenses. This is an issue many synagogues face and why they are merging.

Well, this is one of the longest articles I've ever written, but I wanted to give you a picture of what's going on in the building. I wish you all a happy summer and here's to hoping that come September, we see you all in the building again!


Other activities included a successful hike in Rutgers Gardens, led by David Libowsky.



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
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
