

Don't forget if you know anyone interested in our school, registration is now open for our 2020 -2021 school year. You can find the information @ EBJC.org.


July/August Update

RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



We are all going through a rough time. I have had many phone and video conversations with our members over these past few months about the toll of the COVID-19 pandemic. Members and their relatives have suffered from the disease itself, some have lost jobs or income, all feel isolated. It's a hard time to find words of encouragement, with only slight glimmers of hope for a vaccine this year.

Because of Judaism's longevity, we have seen every possible cause for both joy and sorrow. As I write this we are about to commemorate Tisha b'Av, on which we recall the many times that Jews, and even Judaism itself, were under siege. The primary event we remember is the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in the first century. shattered event practices and beliefs of Jews. With the Temple gone, sacrifices to God came to an end, and rabbinic Judaism arose to hang on to what was left of Jewish life - Torah, holidays, life cycle events - and to create new traditions that would continue to flower for the last two thousand years.

It is possible that we are living through a period of change in the Jewish world just as significant as that of the first century. If the current pandemic, or others like it, continue to threaten public gatherings for the long term, there could be very serious consequences for synagogues, and indeed for all houses of worship.

Religious life is predicated on being together in prayer, study, celebration, and mourning. The social aspect of all these activities is not an add-on, but an intrinsic part of their meaning. At a deep level, we need each other. The human touch, or embrace, a shared laugh or tear, are essential to how we experience life. As the gift of touch disappears, so too do our connections to the services, classes, weddings, b'nai mitzvah, and funerals when we most want to reach out to each other.

I have been thinking about these issues a great deal lately, and hope that I will be proved wrong, that we will soon return to life as we knew it. But if we do not, the age of pandemic may prove to be, like the age of the Temple, an inflection point for Judaism. We must be ready to experiment and innovate, just as the early rabbis did, in order to maintain our

sacred traditions in this time. We must find the courage to generate new understandings of what Judaism means, perhaps with less of a focus on a synagogue building, and more of an emphasis on electronic interconnectedness. We should be open to whatever solutions will keep us together in order to live out our destiny as a nation of righteousness, a beacon to all people in a time of darkness. We are no less committed to that endeavor than our predecessors, and no less talented; our love of Torah, Jewish holidays, learning is no less fervent.

Let's continue to think and talk together about what is possible in an age after catastrophe; if the past is any indicator, what we lose can be the impetus for new thinking that will last thousands of years. Living in this moment, we are impelled to design Judaism's future.

FROM CANTOR LARRY



As we continue to find alternative ways to pray on our own or even when we pray together from afar, there is the need to feel connected. As I write this, I hope that sooner than later we are going to be able to come back together, even more frequently than we ever did before, both in person and through alternative gatherings.

Recently, I was discussing with a friend the level of respect that one should have inside the sanctuary. We also spoke about the personal Kavannah, desire and intention, when engaged in prayer. Each of us must find our Kavannah that guides us when we pray, at home or in the sanctuary. However, when in the sanctuary there is a certain attitude and respect that we must give while we are there.

The following is from Journal of Jewish Music and Liturgy, Volume XXII, 2000.

Seligman Baer in his Siddur, Avodat Yisrael writes that, "Before entering the synagogue one should tarry somewhat and utter the verse 'As for me, through Your abundant kindness I will enter Your house; I will prostrate myself toward Your holy sanctuary in awe of You' (Psalm 5:8). After, one should walk quietly with fear and humility and say 'In the House of God we would walk in company'(Psalm 55:15) and 'How goodly are Your tents' (Numbers 24:5) followed by Psalms 5:8; 26:8; 95:6; and 69:14. When saying the word eshtahayeh (I shall prostrate myself) one should bow toward the Aron Hakodesh, the holy ark, and when saying the word ve'ekhra'ah (and bow) one should bow, bending the knees somewhat."

It is related that when Rabbi Jacob Emden (Yavez) would enter the synagogue, he would be trembling with fear as when entering the palace of a king. And then when he approached the Aron Hakodesh, he would bend his head and walk toward it and utter several verses. Others, however, felt that one should not bow in front of the Aron Hakodesh or in front of the Sefer Torah without Tefillin. The Ari, therefore, would arrive at the synagogue wearing his Tefillin and would recite the verse, "As for me" etcetera, and then bow in front of the Aron Hakodesh. It also became a custom to bow opposite the Aron Hakodesh even when one is not wearing Tefillin. Rabbi Jacob Moellin (Maharil) would bow three times to the Holy Ark when he passed it on departing from the synagogue "like a disciple taking leave of his master". When he left the synagogue or walked away from the Aron Hakodesh, he never walked with his back toward the Aron Hakodesh, but would turn sideways.

The Aron Hakodesh ("Holy Ark") in the synagogue houses the most sacred object in the religious life of the Jew, the Torah. Generally placed at the eastern wall, the Aron Hakodesh is a reminder of the biblical Ark of the Covenant in which the two Stone Tablets were placed. In the synagogue, the Cantor/ Sh'liah Tzibbur/Prayer Leader and the worshipers face the Holy Ark which is in the direction of Jerusalem. During the service proper, the Holy Ark is opened when the Torah scroll is taken out (hotza'ah) to be read on Sabbath, holiday and weekday and when it is returned (hakhnasah). The Holy Ark is also opened during the recital of numerous prayers and piyyutim (poems) recited at high points in the service. Whenever the Holy Ark is opened, it is customary for the congregation to stand in reverence for the Torah Scrolls.

Numerous laws, customs, and practices have evolved in the relationship between the Aron Hakodesh and the prayer service. Standing, sitting, reclining, facing and bowing in front of the Ark are postures that responsa and rabbinic literature have dealt with in detail. Many practices in regard to the Aron Hakodesh within the prayer service are well known to most synagogue attendees. Little is known,

however, as to why these laws and customs are observed.

In Mishnaic days, the Holy Ark was called Tevah ("chest" or "box")'. It housed the Torah and was kept in an anteroom and brought into the synagogue during the prayer service. The Cantor prayed in front of the chest that was called the Tevah. Thus, the expressions used in the Talmud for the position of the prayer leader were Yored lifne hatevah ("He who descends before the Ark") and Over lifne hatevah ("he who passes before the Ark"). Today the Holy Ark is built on a platform, on a higher level than the congregation, and the reader's desk is made for the prayer leader and is called Amud (reader's stand). In the Tosefta, the place where the Torah scrolls were kept was called Kodesh ("Sanctorium"). Another name coined for the Holy Ark was Aron or Aron Hakodesh ("Holy Ark"), the biblical name of the Ark of the Covenant. The expression Aron Hakodesh became prevalent among Italian, French and German Jews. Sephardic Jewry use the word Heikhal ("palace" or "Temple") in which the Solomonic Temple designated the sanctuary. Since the Ark was elevated, one had to ascend to it by a few steps. In our days, the Aron Hakodesh is fixed in the form of a double-doored chest or a niche built into the wall. The Rambam writes. "It is a mitzvah to designate a special place for a Torah scroll (i.e. an Ark) and to honor it and glorify it in an extravagant manner."

Although this year is quite different than what we are accustom to, the message is the same no matter when or where we are. As we look forward to entering our sanctuary, sooner than later, I call your attention to the Ark and the respect and reverence we must give it and the prayer service. May the beauty of the Ark and the Torah Scrolls inside inspire us to pray together and may its light be more radiant than the sunshine of the summer months. Wishing everyone a continuous enjoyable summer.

FROM OUR PRESIDENTS

Last Friday evening, July 17th, EBJC held our first in-person (outdoor) Kabbalat Shabbat and Maariv services since March. We have been very deliberate in our pace of reopening realizing that insuring the safety of our members would always take precedence over trying to be among the first synagogues to reopen. By all accounts, our first service was a success. Attendees obeyed the social distancing guidelines, and everyone wore face masks. It was wonderful to hear Barchu, the call to prayer, recited and to hear the traditional Mourner's Kaddish recited. Our plan is to continue monitoring the situation, and if people continue to obey the guidelines, if the current New Jersey regulations do not change, then we will begin to open other services to in-person, outdoor attendees. We also look forward to other outdoor events such as a Shabbat dinner in our parking lot (with social distancing) as well as an outdoor dinner for graduating USY Seniors before they go off (actually or virtually) to college. At the time of this writing, the High Holidays are just two months away. Our High Holiday planning task force with advice from our Religious Committee and our COVID-19 physicians committee have begun planning for services. A recent poll indicated that a majority of those responding would not feel comfortable attending in-person indoor services at this time. As stated previously on several occasions, we are committed to continue to have all of our services available on a virtual platform (such as Zoom) for the We do. foreseeable future. however, want to have as complete High Holiday services as possible including repetitions of each Amidah, and a full Torah reading. To accomplish this, we are planning to have enough people present in our building to have full participation in our services. We are working out the logistics to insure the safety of our clergy and of all attendees.

A particular concern is hearing the shofar. One is obligated to hear the shofar blown in person on Rosh Ha Shannah. Rabbinical Assembly has ruled that although it is preferable to hear the shofar blown in person, if one only hears the shofar blown virtually this year, it will fulfill that person's obligation. We are planning not only to have the shofar blown during our services, but also to arrange to have the shofar blown in our parking lot after services on the second day of Rosh Ha Shannah (the first day is Shabbat and, of course, the shofar is not blown on Shabbat) to enable anyone wishing to hear the shofar in person to do so.

Please note that all of these plans are subject to change as circumstances warrant. We will endeavor to keep the congregation informed in a timely manner as these plans are finalized over the next weeks. We pray that our community stays safe and look forward to the day when it is safe for all of us to congregate together.
