





RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



Given how often Jews flaut the mitzvot, even the 10 Commandments, yet how devoted they remain to Jewish traditions, the old joke has it that God would have had much more success in shaping their behavior if those mitzvot had been called "the 10 Traditions." For a long time now, I've thought that a better translation of "mitzvah" than "command" would be "demand." A command cannot be refused, which runs counter to Jewish belief in free will. Demands, however, are made of us every day, in all spheres of our lives, and each of us decides how to respond to them: Demands of work, of family, of friends, push us each day to make decisions, and to balance the needs of each against the other.

Demands from God are no different. A commanding God cannot be disobeyed without severe consequences; a demanding God allows us the space to weigh our actions and make choices, even if those

choices sometimes run counter to Jewish tradition.

Each year on Shavuot (June 5th-6th this year), we recall the giving of Torah at Sinai. That moment of revelation shaped Jewish belief and behavior for the rest of time. Imposing sacred demands upon us, as a community, the revelation forces us to recognize God's authority and to constantly grapple with those demands. Some are easy: Do not murder, do not steal, honor your parents and Shabbat. Others are challenging: Love your neighbor as yourself, do not covet. Yet others are unfathomable, to the point of seeming arbitrary: Do not eat certain things, do not mix wool and linen.

God demands all of these things, Rabbi Jeff Pivo whether we like them or not, whether we understand them or not. Our part of the relationship is the response. To the degree that we can live up to these demands, we conform to classical Jewish expectations. And sometimes, as far back as the early rabbinic period, we push back against them, making demands of our own to God. That dialectic is the relationship between us and God: we respond positively to as much of our tradition as we are able: when we cannot, we reassess the terms of the relationship.

We come together on Shavuot to recall, to celebrate, and to reaffirm our commitment to God's demands. We do so as a

community; just as our ancestors stood at Sinai and freely accepted God's demands, so do we. For too many of us, though, that communal affirmation is relegated to the synagogue building, during services. We would do well to acknowledge that the same demands apply to us at home and on the road, when we lie down and when we arise. My prayer for this Shavuot is that we have the wisdom to admit that God's demands require a response every day, and with every decision. Let's make this festival an opportunity to recommit ourselves to lives filled with the joys, and the challenges, of responding well to God's demands.

CANTOR'S CORNER



Unfortunately, at some point in our lives, we all get ill. Hopefully, for many of us, it is just recite, Barukh Attah Adonai, a cold or a minor pain. However, for some, it can be something more serious. Each week during services, we have the opportunity to say the names of our loved ones and friends who may be battling a health issue. For those in services, a name can be added while the Mi Sheberakh for the Holim or sick is being recited. There is also an ongoing list of names recited by the Rabbi and me, and anyone can add the name of someone who needs this prayer recited for them on an ongoing basis by calling the office. Usually, we request the Hebrew name of the person and their mother's Hebrew name. If the Hebrew names are unknown, then the person's English name can be used. I believe Gd knows who we are asking for healing.

In addition, we thank God in many ways and we thank God for many things. When we are

sick and in the hospital, when we have escaped disaster, such as a bad car accident, when we return from a long trip (particularly overseas), or for women, after giving birth to a child, it is customary to receive an Aliyah to the Torah and recite the "Birkat Hagomel", the special blessing after any of these occasions.

Following the conclusion of the Aliyah to the Torah, one will Elohenu Melekh Haolam, Hagomel L'hayavim Tovot She'g'malani Kol Tov - Praised are You, Adon-ai our Gd, Who rules the universe, showing goodness to us beyond merits, for bestowing favor upon me. The congregation will respond, Mi She'g'malkha/She'g'malekh Kol Tov Hu Yi'g'malkha/Yi'g'malekh Kol Tov Selah - May God Who has been gracious to you continue to favor you with all that is good.

Please remember to inform the Rabbi, me, or a Gabbai (ritual usher) of the congregation that you are in need of saying this blessing. Even if you are not able to receive an Aliyah that day, you may still approach the Torah and recite the prayer. For those unable to do that, they can recite the prayer from their seat.

My hope and prayer is that we all should be healthy and well.

As we approach the summer months, take some time to relax, enjoy time with family and friends, and be free from all illness and harm.

From my family to your family, wishing only sunshine and goodness always.

The sign said...Due to Staffing Shortages, the dining area is closed. What? So I thought, okay, I'll do the drive through, pick up the ice cream and we'll sit outside in their outdoor seating area. Nope. Their outdoor seating area had the tables and chairs stacked and chain locked. Bye, Bye DQ!

The same week, I was going to go with some friends to dinner when I received a text stating that we were going to a different restaurant because the original restaurant was short staffed and didn't have servers. Really?

We're all being asked to stretch our dollar to the breaking point. Think about the old Stretch Armstrong doll.... It can only stretch so far! Gas is up, food is up, building materials, clothing, dining out...all more costly. Are your salaries going up as quickly as everything else? Social Security? Pensions? Probably not. So we're tightening our belts. Maybe not eating out as much. Maybe not traveling as much. Maybe not shopping as much. It's a choice. We all have to make choices.

It's a choice to join a Synagogue. In a way, we are blessed that in East Brunswick alone there are at least 5 synagogues from which to choose. Within the five options, there are still choices to be made. Do you prefer Reform, Conservative, Modern Orthodox, Orthodox Judiasm? Do you want to sit with your spouse? Do USY. For those of you that choose to stay with EBJC and continue to support the Synagogue, we thank you. We understand this is a choice. If you joined because you wanted your children to become a bar/bat mitzvah and then continued to remain a member, we thank you. This is a choice. For those of you that really only attend services three times a year, but pay dues so that we may remain open the rest of the year, we thank you. This is a choice. For those of you who not only pay dues, but volunteer their time and energy. we thank you. This is a choice. For those of you that pay dues, volunteer and give what they can for high holiday pledges as well as support various events and functions, we thank you. This is a choice.

EBJC is blessed to have a thriving congregation, preschool, and Hebrew school. We have an active and award winning synagogues in our area and surrounding areas have had to close their Hebrew schools and preschools for lack of families with young children. We celebrate that our preschool, which was close to shutting down 4-5 years ago, now has 30 children and next year we're on target for 35! We recently received a grant for preschool improvements and are hoping to add a bathroom to the classroom and if there are funds left over, possibly some playground equipment. We are the only Jewish preschool in the area. That's saying quite a bit.

We have a lot to be proud of. I certainly hope you feel the same way.

FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



After three years, this will be the final Recorder article I will be writing as president of the congregation, and I would like to reflect on our accomplishments over the past three years as well as my hopes for the future. I have reread the first article I wrote, and I began that by stating that then co-president Steve Zeidwerg and I had two major goals for our presidencies: securing the financial stability of EBJC and easing the tensions between those who prefer traditional services and those who prefer egalitarian services.

When I first decided to accept the position, several former presidents gave me the same very foreboding advice. They told me that I did not want to be the last president of EBJC. The message was clear. We were a synagogue with deep financial problems, laden with debt, and struggling to make payments in the last quarter of each year. I am very proud that this situation no longer applies. We endeavored to keep a close eye on our budget and imposed fiscal restraints on unnecessary expenditures. We were also lucky that during the Covid-19 pandemic we applied for and received two Paycheck Protection loans from the Small Business Association. And when the anticipated closing of the sale of part of our building to Netivot occurs, we will be free from debt for the first time in years. As Steve Wohl assumes the co-presidency with Jack Goldberg, I feel confidant that they will definitely not be the last presidents of EBJC.

We have made some progress towards easing the tensions between the worshipers of our two minyanim, but we still have work to do in that

area. On the positive side, during the pandemic when we did not have the necessary in-person attendance to support two separate services, we alternatied services between egalitarian and traditional styles.

Thankfully, there have been few complaints about this accommodation. I am disappointed, however, why so few people will attend services each week, wishing to attend only their preferred style of service. I am also disappointed that there are members who still believe that my ultimate goal is to turn the congregation completely egalitarian. At my first address to the congregation at the Congregational Meeting at which I was elected, I promised I would not do that. I am proud that I have kept my promise. One of the strengths of our congregation is that we can support both types of service, and still come together for Musaf and Kiddush.

When the pandemic hit, we were prepared. Before the world shut down, we had already formed a Covid -19 advisory committee consisting of several physicians and an attorney from our congregation. Thanks to Laura Brandspiegel, Rich Drachtman, Lou Friedman, David Libowsky, Jules Plafker, and Phil Schiffman for guiding us through these past two years. We have made some mistakes, but we have also avoided any super-spreader events at EBJC. I have mentioned, ad nauseum, how we had our services streaming online on the same day we closed our doors for in-person services, keeping our community connected during those dark days. Let's pray that we have seen the worst of this plague.

I would like to convey thank you to many people. I am indebted to both of ex-president) of EBJC my co-presidents, Steve Zeidwerg and Jack Goldberg. They were great teammates, and I will miss the many late night phone calls we shared. I have been blessed to work with very conscientious Executive Committees

and Boards of Directors who were civil in their deliberations and discussions. Thank you to our Executive Director, Ellen Botwin. It would have been impossible for me to fulfill my duties without her support. And it was my great honor to work with our clergy, Rabbi Pivo and Cantor Larry, who helped me focus on moving our Kahal forward.

When George Washington gave his farewell address, he warned our country against foreign entanglements. Likewise, President Dwight Eisenhower warned to beware of the Military Industrial Complex in his farewell address. My parting advice to our congregation is to remember what really matters; we are a community who cares about each other. Don't let our petty disagreements blind us from the beauty of this wonderful fellowship we have.

People have often commented about how thankless a job being a synagogue president is. I have found this to be far from the truth. I am grateful from the bottom of my heart at how many people have expressed their gratitude and encouragement to me during these past three years. I now look forward to sitting with the love of my life, my wife Liz, in the pews during services. I wish Steve Wohl and Jack Goldberg continued good luck in their roles as the new leadership tandem. And in the words of Psalm 84, may this holy congregation continue to go from strength to strength.



The late 1940s-50s marked a dark time in history. Fueled by the efforts of Sen. And we won't forget about Shelley Winters!

June 23 at 8:30pm: Spielberg!

Steven Spielberg is an artist whose work is so ubiquitous and instantly identifiable that his name has inspired its very own adjective — "Spielbergian." One of the most commercially successful directors of all time. Spielberg's modern classics include Jaws, Close Encounters of the Third Kind, E.T. and the Indiana Jones and Jurassic Park series. 
