

RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



On the evening of March 6th and the morning of the 7th, we will read megillat Esther as part of our annual Purim observances. The story of Esther, Mordecai and Haman can be understood on many levels, but the one I find most meaningful is the partnership between Esther and Mordecai, two very different kinds of Jews. On many occasions in the megillah, Mordecai is called "Mordecai the Jew." His identity is clear to all, so much so that when he refuses to bow down to Haman, the latter sees it as a clear representation of Jewish otherness, a brush with which he paints an unflattering portrait of the Jews as a whole. Esther, on the other hand, is referred to by only her name. In addition, Esther enters a beauty contest with non-Jews in Persia, is picked by Achashverosh to be his queen, and serves as monarch without anyone being aware she is Jewish. It is only when she stands up for her people, and publicly identifies with them, that she is able to exert the influence that saves them from destruction. Without Mordecai,

Esther would not have risen to a position of influence; without Esther, redemption from violence may not have happened.

Each one of us is a Mordecai or an Esther. There are times when our identity as Jews is front and center, when our Jewishness is the primary attribute. At other times our Jewish identity is below the surface, unknown to others but always there, the inner spark of connection to Jewish, belief, behavior and belonging waiting to be fanned into flame. But without either of these kinds of Jews, or phases in our personal Jewishness, we would not continue to exist as a people. Neither is more important than the other; neither claims more authority or legitimacy than the other as real Jews. The observant and the secular Jew, the Jew of any modern movement, the Sefardic, Ashkenazi, Greek, Ethiopian, Romaniot...you get the picture. Each has its particular flavor, and each adds to the vibrancy of klal Yisrael, the entirety of the Jewish community.

Here at EBJC we also have our Mordecais and Esthers. Some of us come to the building regularly, some less frequently and some hardly at all. There are members who give a great deal of time or financial support to the shul, and some who do not or cannot. Some attend only religious services; others prefer educational and social gatherings. All our members are vital to the survival and future growth of the synagogue, and meeting the various needs of all our

members is of great importance to me

Whether you are a Mordecai or an Esther, or alternate between them day to day, your participation in all aspects of synagogue life are crucial. Help to create a community marked by civility, understanding and real compassion as we look toward the future where every EBJC member feels affirmed in their own Jewish identity and also affirms the sometimes very different identity of fellow congregants. We need both Mordecai and Esther to ensure our future.




Who Wrote The Torah?

The Torah contains the first prose writing on earth. Before that there was only poetry. If it is factual, it is the first history ever written. If it is fiction, then it is the first novel. But either way it is the first. What moved a single Jewish writer to invent this new kind of text 3,000 years ago? And what moved him or her to write these particular stories: why go all the way back to creation? Why include so many stories of brothers killing brothers? Did the author just invent the stories, or learn them from past generations, or rewrite them from songs and poetry? Above all, who were these first writers on earth who gave us the Torah?



Dr. Richard Elliott Friedman, Ann & Jay Davis Professor of Jewish Studies Emeritus, University of Georgia, Katzin Professor of Jewish Civilization Emeritus, University of California, San Diego

Richard Elliott Friedman is one of the premier bible scholars in the country. He earned his doctorate at Harvard and was a visiting fellow at Oxford and Cambridge, a Senior Fellow of the American Schools of Oriental Research in Jerusalem, and a Visiting Professor at the University of Haifa. He is the Ann & amp; Jay Davis Professor of Jewish Studies Emeritus at the University of Georgia and the Katzin Professor of Jewish Civilization Emeritus of the University of California, San Diego. He is the author of Commentary on the Torah, The Exodus, The Disappearance of God, The Hidden Book in the Bible, The Bible with Sources Revealed, The Bible Now, The Exile and Biblical Narrative, and the bestselling Who Wrote the Bible? He was a consultant for the Dreamworks film "The Prince of Egypt," for Alice Hoffman's The Dovekeepers, and for NBC, A&E, PBS, and Nova.


