Rabbinic Reflections



Jews the world over celebrate Purim this month by reading megillat Esther on the 14th day of Adar (the evening of March 20th and the morning of the 21st this year). The story of Esther teaches us several things about identity, specifically about Jewish identity. There are two modes of Jewish identifica-

tion in the story, that of Esther and that of her cousin (yes, cousin) Mordecai. Esther is said to conceal the fact of her Jewishness when she becomes the king's favorite, and she does not reveal it after she becomes queen. It seems that simply by not stating her identity she is able to conceal who she is, which suggests that Esther does not appear to be any different from anyone else in dress, behavior or language. In short, Esther is an assimilated Jew. Mordecai, on the other hand, is repeatedly called 'Mordecai the Jew' in the text, and when he refuses to bow down to Haman, Haman immediately decides to kill the Jews throughout the kingdom. Unlike Esther, Mordecai's Jewish identity is obvious to all who see him. He does not hide it, nor do others show any confusion over it.

By the story's end, Esther and Mordecai have together saved the Jewish people by revealing Esther's identity as a Jew to her Persian husband, the king. One lesson we derive from these two different kinds of Jews, one whose Judaism is private and has even intermarried, and the other for whom it is public, is that there is great value in having a variety of approaches to our identities as Jews. Had it not been for Esther's hidden Jewishness, the Jews of Persia may have been destroyed. Had it not been for Mordecai, Esther may never have felt compelled to either hide or, later, reveal her identity. The story teaches us that the public and the private Jew have a common bond and that each is responsible for the other. In Hebrew the name for that value is klal Yisrael, meaning the sum of all the constituent parts of the Jewish com-

We see that dynamic in play in American Jewish life. While the beliefs and practices of Conservative Judaism sometimes differ from those of the other modern movements, we all gain from those differences. An emphasis on social action, on musical innovation and the move toward egalitarian practice in the Reform movement have had obvious and positive influence on Conservative Judaism. And the adherence to daily prayer, serious text study, and Jewish ritual in the Orthodox world are ideals toward which we should also strive. Our movement has also had a positive effect on the other two, pulling the extremes back toward the center.

And the relationship between Israeli and diaspora Jews is also one of interdependence despite difference. Without the financial and political support of American Jews, Israel may have had a much harder time of things over the years. And without a Jewish state to create an allencompassing culture for Jewish living, many American Jews would have little access to a life shaped by Jewish time, holidays, Hebrew language and so on, not to mention the safe haven that Israel provides for Jews threatened by anti-Semitism.

On Purim we celebrate the distinctiveness of all kinds of Jewish life, whether we are a Mordecai or an Esther, or any other type of Jew. Each needs the other to survive and to thrive. On this holiday more than any other, we should all drink to that.

Executive Director



I'm starting to hyperventilate... Passover is coming. The moment January 1st comes, I instruct my husband not to buy anything that requires freezer space or pantry space. The fact that he doesn't listen, doesn't help ("but they were on sale!").

How does a year fly by so quickly? How is it that I still have Matzoh in my house from last Passover? Why do I get the 5 lb. box when I know I will NEVER use 5 lbs (honestly, it's free at Shoprite so I can't resist)?

The thing I hate most about Passover is the cleaning and the change-over. I don't mind the cooking and I don't mind the food restrictions because it's not that big of a deal for me. What I love is getting together with family. We all gather at my Cousin Jill's clubhouse because we have gotten too large for any one house to accommodate. We all help out, but Gail, Jill's mom and the matriarch of our family, does most of the cooking in advance in her house and schlepps it to the clubhouse where everything goes onto hotplates! Everyone brings fruit and dessert and wine. I think we're up to 60 now! For a long while, there were no children and the youngest to read the four questions was in their 20's! But now, we have a new sprouting of children from birth to 8 years old! They are most delicious and the numbers are increasing... 8 year old twin boys, 6 year old boy, 3 ½ year old girl and boy (not twins), and 4 under the age of 2! Whoo Hoo! Stanley brings gifts for EVERY child and is the patriarch of our family. He takes responsibility for hiding the afikomen. The kids go wild trying to find it and when found, he rewards the child (and usually children) very nicely! I've often thought of finding it myself!

Passover takes a huge chunk of my personal operating budget. It is not unusual for me to spend \$500.00 for the one week (I do have people over for the second Seder). I don't spend that much for the High Holy Days...Passover wins the prize of spending in one week, what I usually spend on food in a month! Oh well, what are you going to do, right?

Speaking of Operating budgets...I know that this word to some congregants dredges up negative thoughts. I've heard some people say that they don't like to make donations because it goes into the "Operating Budget" as if that was a bad thing. I've also heard people say "You better designate where you want the money to go or it will go into the "Operating Budget"! Really? Yes, we have restricted and designated accounts, but those monies don't help pay the

mortgage, payroll, insurance, utilities and supplies to keep EBJC functioning. That's what "Operating Budget" means... to keep us "operating". Why is that bad? I guess in a made up utopian world, we would all work for free, the government would give us the building at no cost and PSE&G would say "for you...gas and electric, no charge". But we don't live in utopia and we have to pay our operating costs. So for those of you that think money going into our Operating Budget is bad, please think again. And for those of you that understand that we also have bills to pay, salaries to meet, and a mortgage and are okay with your donations going into the Operating Budget...Thank you.

Thank you to all of you that pay your dues, your tuition, and your pledges. Thank you to all of you that make donations for yahrzeit and in honor or memory of a loved one. Thank you to all of you that donate to the Simcha Cake. Thank you for supporting our programs and our fundraisers, our events and our Gala. Without your support our doors would close. Keep in mind that dues alone only pays about 60% of our Operating Budget. If everyone was required to pay dues to cover the Operating Budget, dues would be about \$4,000 per family and there would be no Special Circumstances, Senior Dues, Individual Dues, etc.

It is around this time of year that EBJC starts experiencing cash flow issues. If you have a balance on your account, please do not wait until the end of the fiscal year (June 30, 2019) or right before Rosh Ha'Shannah to pay this balance. We cannot tell the bank to wait. We cannot ask PSE&G to wait and we cannot tell our employees to wait. If you'd like to understand more, feel free to give me a call. I will be happy to explain to you what our costs are. I will be happy to explain to you how, over the past several years, we have shaved tens of thousands of dollars from our expenses by switching vendors, renegotiating contracts and reducing our overall costs wherever we could.

Please share with your friends all the new and wonderful activities happening at Kesher, USY, Kadima and Chaverim, as well as all of the programs being offered at EBJC. It truly is a place for everyone and for everything!

Did you ever hear the saying, "If you think you're alone, you're not." Well, it is true. Many times, many of us think that we are alone, not technically on the physical side of things (I would hope you would realize if someone is actually standing next to you or near you in a room), but on the spiritual side of things.

I was speaking with a friend of mine who asked me to explain Hagbah. Apparently, my friend was invited to a Bar Mitzvah and was given the honor of Hagbah (actually it is supposed to be called Hagbahah). My friend, a non-observant, non-synagogue attending, very secular Jew, did not understand the word or the honor that he was being given. I explained that Hagbah is the honor for lifting the Torah when the reading is complete. This he understood. In essence, it was not the honor that he was misunderstanding, but it was the terminology.

Many of us walk into a setting and listen to a service, a speaker, or a presentation and then walk out saying, "I didn't understand a word." This is the case far too often in a synagogue, especially if there is a language barrier. So what does one do? Well, the first is to begin to come to services more often. Okay, so this may be a ploy to get more people in the door on a regular basis; however, my intention is more to teach the jargon.

There are so many terms that we use in any given service, and so many of us do not take the time to say, what is or was that?

Here are a few terms: <u>Davening</u>: Davening is the act of prayer. This is a Yiddish word and not Hebrew. We tend to use many Yiddish phrases in Shul (by the way, Shul is Yiddish, too). <u>Layning</u>: this is the act of reading Torah (again, another Yiddish word). <u>Chag Sameach</u>: Happy Holiday. <u>Ba'al T'filah</u>: the lay person who may lead a service. A professional person who leads the service is the <u>Chazzan</u> or Cantor (that's me). <u>Ba'al Kriah</u>: the person who reads the Torah, not to be confused with <u>Ba'al Tekiah</u>, the person who blows the Shofar on Rosh Hashanah. Okay, I think we can get the point.

There are many terms which are important to know, but too many to list in this article. However, don't be afraid to ask. After all, you are not alone.

On behalf of my family we hope you have a good and word-filled season.

Men's Club is continuing another busy year with a focus on expanding our reach to include younger families.


We had several successful events in February. We started off with the annual World Wide Wrap on Feb. 3 when

Words from Sephardic Shabbat

During Shabbat on January 25 and 26, EBJC held Sephardic Shabbat honoring Uziel Sason and Raymond and Adela Sasson. A number of individuals spoke during that Shabbat and their speeches were included in the previous Recorder.

Here is another speech from Steve Wohl:

Shabbat Shalom and thank you for asking me to speak at this Sephardic dinner...even though I'm not Sephardic. I could be, actually, and I'm gonna take one of those DNA tests to find out for sure. I do suspect I might have Sephardic DNA because I've always loved stuffed grape leaves much more than cholent.

Back in the late 1980's there was a group of families who joined EBJC and had much in common. They all had young kids around the same age, they all came to shul on Shabbat, and they all sat in the back corner, in case they and their children had to make a quick exit. Maury and I were in that group and so were Rita and Uziel Sason. From the beginning Uziel was a standout in this group. He was the oldest of us. And while most of us were from New York, New Jersey, or Pennsylvania, he was from Turkey. And while most of us had kind of ordinary jobs, he was a designer and artist. And thus began a long and wonderful friendship between our families. For over 30 years, our families spent countless lunches, dinners, barbeques, and holidays together. My favorite was Passover, when we would have one night as a "friend's" seder, and all the families were given one part of the seder that they would lead. Regardless of who had the first part, it was always Uziel who would recite the Order of the Seder, the Kaddesh Urihatz before we began. And, as we got to each section of the seder, he would recite the order again up to the point that we were at.

In the Ethics of the Fathers, Pirkei Avot, the rabbi Yehoshua said, "kney licha chaver" – acquire for yourself a friend. The reason for this admonition was in large part that a friend could be a partner for study. But to tell you the truth, we might not have studied together much, but I learned a lot from Uziel. He was a man who had many great qualities. His faith was real and strong, yet he never wore it on his sleeve, never held himself up as superior, and didn't tell others how to live their lives.

He was very warm and kind. It didn't make a difference if he knew you for decades or he was meeting you for the first time. He always had a smile and an outstretched hand. I mistakenly thought that he always sat in shul next to Rita. But as she told me, literally a hundred people must have spoken to her and all told her how in a time of distress, Uziel had sat down next to them. I think it's become an urban legend that Uziel sat next to every member of the congregation.

He had what the French call a joie de vivre, an enjoyment of life. He enjoyed good conversations, good food, good wine, and he liked seeing foreign films. Admittedly, after some of those films, I needed some wine.

As a craftsman, when he made something, a cabinet or a display piece or a couch, it had to be done just right, no shortcuts. He could even point out on someone else's work where they had cut a corner or two. Evidence of his uncompromising craftsmanship is all over this building, and it was a labor of love. His "no shortcuts" approach did have a downside however, as projects in his house that he promised to Rita would sometimes go on for many months. But in the end, the product was always great.

In addition to the many things he built for EBJC, and the many things that he took upon himself to fix around the building, he also supported the daily minyan, was a gabbai, and would lead services when called upon. When he davened, his faith and humility always showed through. Two years ago at the beginning of the summer, there was a question as to whether Uziel would be able to lead the Morning Service on Yom Kippur. I was asked if I would be able, if necessary, to fill in for him. I considered that the biggest honor I've ever received here.

My favorite Uziel story in EBJC was many years ago, shortly after the departure of a certain long time rabbi - no names...and I was asked to be on a committee to try and inject some fun into the Purim service. The only reason I was asked to be on the committee, was that a year before, Avital Breverman had a separate Purim Bat Mitzvah, and Charlie asked if I would do some shtick during the reading, so I dressed up as Groucho Marx. So the chairwoman asked if I would do the same thing for the congregation. At the end of the meeting, everyone was stumped on what we would put on the flyer that might attract more people to attend. Certainly, my Groucho impression wasn't gonna do it. So I said we should learn from Chabad. Every time they do something, they have the world's tallest menorah or the world's biggest matzah ball or world's longest shofar. I said we should tell people to come see the world's largest GRAGGER! The chairwoman said, "Great...but where do we get the world's largest gragger?" And right away the answer came to me. My friend Uziel could make it.

So I took a wooden gragger that I had, which was given to me by Dov Pollak, and showed it to Uziel. And I asked him, can you make a larger version of this gragger. After a quick look, he said to me, "How big do you want it?" And I said, "As big as you can make it where it would still actually work". Well even I was surprised when he came into the sanctuary that night with a 6 foot high gragger, that had a special stand and took at least two hands to operate, and made a sound like thunder. And the kids loved it too.

Thank you for allowing me to reminisce about my friend...OUR friend, Uziel.
