UPCOMING PROGRAMS





RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



It's Adar! Purim time! It was two years ago at Purim that we were forced to suddenly shift into an online community. This year at the holiday, we are cautiously, hopefully, re-emerging from the terrible suffering of the pandemic. As I write this, Ukraine is under assault as well, with war on Europe's eastern front. The Jewish history of Ukraine has been one of both tears and triumph over the centuries, with terrible pogroms alternating with surges of intellectual and artistic achievement. Having lived in Ukraine for a thousand years. Jews have been a constant presence there; in the 20th century it was another place where both traditional Judaism and assimilated Jews were a significant part of the society.

Like the Jews of ancient Persia, whom we remember in Adar, Ukraine's Jews are able to "pass" as Ukrainian if they wish. One's public Jewish identity in the post-Communist era has been a matter of choice. Unlike the threats Jews faced in Persia during the time of Haman, the current hostilities are not primarily

aimed at Jews, yet this too can be a time for Jews to stand up and fight for freedom, for democracy, for the right to be either Mordecai or Esther in Ukraine.

The lesson of Purim is to assert our Judaism when it is needed most, to publicly embrace our identity and heritage, despite the dangers to which that may expose us. Nearly the entire world is focused on the defense against aggression, which should give us the courage to support those Jews who are refugees in Ukraine at this time. We are not alone and, as in the case of ancient Persian Jewry, we are in a position to defend the innocent and support a struggling democracy. This war is no Adar joke; as we emerge into the free air of a post-COVID world, let us also come out in force of justice in a place where it was sometimes hard to come by for Jews, but where we are now part of the democratic majority, fighting for freedom.

FROM CANTOR LARRY



It is always at this time of the year that I am reminded that history always has a way of repeating itself. More so, during this crucial period of world uncertainty, I can closely compare the tyrants of yesterday with our terrorists today, whether it be humanistic terrorism or biological terrorism.

With the holiday of Purim upon us, we will read Megillat Esther, the Book of Esther, one of the most cherished books in Jewish literature. The book is from the last of the five Megillot (scrolls) that are part of the third division of the Bible, known as Kittuvim (Sacred Writings). Megillat Esther tells the story of a Jewish woman who used her influence as queen of Persia to save her people from a general massacre which Haman had plotted against them. Philip Birnbaum writes simply, "It is a tale of plot and counterplot, showing the downfall of the arrogant and the vindication of the innocent."

Queen Esther is depicted as dutiful toward Mordecai, her cousin and guardian, and faithful to her people. Haman's fate reminds us that pride goes before a fall. King Ahashverosh, who agrees to Haman's plot without thought, is described as a pompous and feeble-minded monarch.

Additionally, on the Shabbat preceding Purim and on Purim morning, special Torah portions are read about the evil Amalek, who also wanted to destroy the Jewish people. Through Israel's faith, the Jewish people persevered and were triumphant.

Whether we are reading the Megillah of Esther with Haman as the enemy of the Jewish people, or reading the Torah portion known as Parashat Zakhor, which deals with the battle against the terror of Amalek, or engrossed in the reading of the daily newspaper detailing the sinister ways of dictators and hatemongers...we are reliving and living our past for it has become our present. What we pray for is that it will not be our future.

In Megillat Esther, the name of Gd is not mentioned, but the author clearly implies that Gd used Mordecai and Esther as Instruments for the deliverance of a persecuted people.

As we approach this holiday, we examine our faith. It must be strong! Through Gd's help and through our own positive actions, we too will write history. We too will once again cause those who rise up against us to fall. The "Amaleks" and the "Hamans" of

yesterday are here with us today. Through our faith, we will once again be reading a book. A book containing the stories of today that will help us to overcome our boundaries of tomorrow.

On behalf of my wife, Laura, our children, Samantha, Avi, Heather and Jeremy, I wish everyone Mishenichnas Adar Marbim B'simcha, a month (of Adar-both I and II) filled with much happiness.

in-person services. We understand that there are many who continue to avoid crowds due to the pandemic, but there is also a sense that we have made it too easy

for those who go shopping, attend theater, and dine out to remain at home rather than come to shul.

At the time of the writing of this article (mid-February), the Omicron variant surge has decreased significantly in Middlesex County and New Jersey as well. We have reopened for daily services, and, Baruch Hashem, in-person Shabbat services will have sumed on February 18th. As I have often noted, the ability to stream services on the Zoom platform has enabled our community to stay connected during the worst days of the pandemic. We have also come to realize that the ability for our members who would otherwise be March 16th and Thursday March unable to attend services in person to connect with our services and participate in the post-service Zoom sessions has great value, and we are committed to continuing the streaming of our services going forward.

We have come to the realization that streaming our services has, however, had a negative effect. The convenience of viewing our streamed services has made it very convenient for anyone to eschew attending services in person. On Shabbat mornings, members can sleep-in, avoid having to dress in Shabbat clothes, and enjoy a cup of coffee and breakfast while praying. We have noticed a significant decrease in attendance at all our

At EBJC, with mask wearing and social distancing the rule, we have so far avoided a super spreader event. And, although we cannot predict whether there will be future variants or shutdowns, we also can anticipate that at some time, the Covid-19 virus will become endemic, and we can then resume a more normal life. When this occurs, I am urging all our members to come home to EBJC. Purim this year falls on Wednesday evening 17th. Won't it be nice to dress up in a costume, bring a gragger, and hear the Megillah read in person? Won't it be wonderful to interact with fellow congregants without using a screen? 


