# RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



Jews like to think of ourselves as the people of the Book. That book, of course, is the Tanakh, the Hebrew Bible, and we include reading and studying it on every Jewish holiday of note. On Shabbat, Mondays and Thursdays we read from Torah, adding words from the Prophets as haftarah readings on Shabbat. Major holidays have specially designated Torah and haftarah readings. And there are five holidays on which we also read megillot, in addition to reading Torah and haftarah: Pesakh, Shavuot, Tisha B'Av, Sukkot, and Purim. Usually the texts we read are specific to a holiday, and express God's involvement in the events related to that holiday.

But not so on Purim! Megillat Esther doesn't mention God even once. Perhaps its story is too lighthearted for invoking God and sullying the Divine Name. But we should also consider Purim's place on the calendar. Purim comes at the end of a long

sequence of holidays that are heavily focused on God's providence. It also falls during the last month of the Jewish calendar year. These facts might provide us a small insight into the theological importance of Purim itself.

Unlike other holiday texts, the events of the book of Esther are driven by people, specifically by Mordecai and Esther. Nowhere in the book of Esther is it suggested that God saved the Jews of Persia. On the other holidays, we remember how God freed us from slavery, gave us a code to live by and continues to maintain the physical world. By the time we come out of winter's cold, ready to begin again, we have gone through an entire cycle of praising and thanking God for all God has done. But on Purim, we celebrate the power of human beings to take charge of our own safety and our own destiny. It is as if, having gone through all of the other emotions that are attendant upon a holiday cycle devoted to God, Purim provides us a year-end party to celebrate ourselves and our own hand in our survival as a people. Like the secular New Year's Eve, we look forward to the beginning of another vear with singing, merriment and drinking. Saying goodbye to a year filled with thanks to God, we end it by congratulating ourselves on our accomplishments.

We will read Megillat Esther at EBJC on the evening of March 9th

and the morning of March 10th. In addition to celebrating the themes of Jewish survival and victory over our foes, our celebration this year can also include an awareness of our own efforts in our redemption from danger, then and now. In our revelry, we can proudly affirm the value of acting for ourselves. Then, having concluded another year as winter turns to spring, we look forward to beginning the cycle over, with the Pesakh which. fittingly, haggadah mentions Moses only once! But more on that next month.

# FROM CANTOR LARRY



During this month of March and the Hebrew month of Adar, we celebrate the holiday of Although Purim is Purim. considered a minor holiday, our Rabbis of the past teach us that during a future messianic time holidavs the will remembered as they were at the time of the Holy Temple, except for Purim, which we will continue to commemorate and celebrate the same way as has always been done. Purim reminds us of the hatred and anti-Semitism towards Jewish people. This hatred dates back to the history written in our Torah, and seems to be so relevant today.

On the Shabbat before Purim, we are told to remember this dangerous time period. When the Children of Israel journeyed through the Sinai Desert after they had left Egypt, they were attacked by a people and evil ruler called Amalek. According to the verses in Deuteronomy, Amalek attacked the weak and old people who

marched at the back of the Israelite camp. However, Joshua led his best soldiers against Amalek and won. The people were then told to "blot out the remembrance of Amalek."

Years later when King Saul led Israel in battle, Samuel told Saul that God wanted him to destroy Amalek because of their attack in the desert. However, Saul disobeyed. He let the soldiers take sheep and oxen and he let Agag, the Amalekite king, live. According tradition, Haman was а descendant of Amalek. In Megillat Esther, he is called Haman the Agagite, and the rabbis of old felt that Agagite refers to Agag, the King whom Saul failed to kill. Regardless, the actions of Amalek and Haman represent wickedness and evil to us.

Therefore, on the Shabbat before Purim, we read the story of Amalek's attack. The Haftarah is the story in the Book of Samuel I of Saul's failure to obey God.

The important part of both portions is God's commandment to us: "Remember what Amalek did to you ... Erase the memory of Amalek from under heaven. Do not forget!"

The Shabbat takes its name from that verse, Shabbat Zakhor or Shabbat of Remembrance.

Perhaps it is painful for some to

remember Amalek and Haman and others, like Hitler, who wanted to destroy us, even our children, our old people, and the sick among us. Evil is not a pleasant thing, but it is something we must remember even at the joyous time of Purim.

On behalf of my family, all the best for a blessed, peaceful, and happy Purim.

But the truth is, I enjoy performing, so I got up and sang and played the tambourine and danced around and had a very enjoyable time. From there, I went to Jackie's funeral.

Sadness. Jackie was 80 when she passed and was truly a force to be reckoned with. She was a very active and involved member of Beth El in East Windsor and was loved by many. She was involved in many organizations outside of Beth El and the funeral was standing room only (and they had all three rooms open at Mt. Sinai). She was the only 80vear-old that I knew who loved Metallica, Guns n' Roses and any hard rock band! A big hint was that email started with GranmaRocks. She was one of the first people I met when I joined Beth El, and we have been friends ever since...that was 30 years ago. She will be remembered and she will be missed.

Calm. Then I came back to EBJC, because it's quiet on a Sunday (the only other person here is the Rabbi who is also here because it's quiet and we can work uninterrupted). It's amazing how much work you can get done when the phone isn't ringing and no one is walking into your office.

**Excited.** At 6:00 tonight, we gather in the sanctuary to rehearse for the Broadway Revue which is taking place on March 21st (hint, hint). Bobbi Blumenthal is directing, Dave Schlossberg is our musical director and Jill Rubin is our stage manager. The Rabbi, Cantor, Steve Zeidwerg, Ron Sucher, Meredith Ascher, Steve Wohl, Sara Ullman, Barbara Pollak, and I are all performing. 19 songs all together, some solos, some duets, and some ensemble pieces. I'm sort of the chair of the program so I do all of the scheduling, printing and

What a So. difference. when people question why should they belong to a Synagogue, what's in it for them? I'll tell them about Jackie and about Rabbi Kornsgold and how he spoke from the heart because he knew her, and his sadness touched us all.

Dear Fellow-EBJC Member,

If this email offends you in any way, I apologize; but, I still want you to read through it.

For those of you who do not recognize my name, Anne and I have been EBJC members since the early 1980's and you may recognize me if you attend services.

Some of you have heard one or more of my Divrei Torah, and may remember that I started saying the Mourners' Kaddish for my father when I was seventeen. I am now seventy-two.

You may have noticed that the Hebrew words used as the heading for the "Mourners'" Kaddish are קדשי ַיַםות (Kaddish Yatom). If you've checked your Google Translate, יחום directly translates as, "Orphan."

My Great Uncle Charlie, whose 33rd Yahrzeit will be in a few months, was the person who taught my brothers and me how to say the Kaddish. After attending three services a day we found ourselves at the end of Shloshim (thirty days from burial) when he told us that he had taught us how to do what was right and the "rest" was on us. We asked what that meant. He told us that the next one-day-less than ten months were our responsibility. When I questioned if we had to continue, he told us that we only had to continue for as long as we thought our father was worthy of respect. (The commandment [mitzvah] to honor our father and mother is referenced eight times in the Torah. The Torah doesn't repeat unless the repetition emphasizes importance.) We were tour or bring the kids to add another at just about every service (morning, afternoon and evening) until the end of that time and we all have tried to not miss a Yahrzeit or Yizkor since.

So, what does this have to do with any-

thing? For those of you who have never said וקדשייַיםות, pray that that responsibility will only be yours after many, many more years of happy and healthy familial relationships. However, for those of us who say

עות, we know that it can only be said in the presence of a Minyan, a quorum of Jews (ten men during regular, traditional daily services).

Lately (the last few months), we have had problems maintaining our morning AND sometimes evening minyanim. Because of illness, business, personal travels and personal responsibilities at home and/or at work, we have had to make phone calls about three or four times a week to make a minyan so that people needing/wanting/required to say the Kaddish can—and we have turned off the lights in the Beit Midrash more than a dozen times in the last few months without the benefit of having a minyan and people needing/wanting/ required to say the Kaddish not having the opportunity to do so.

We all have personal commitments that take time out of our day-and time is the only commodity that cannot be replenished. I get it. But one day, as sure as the sun rises, every one of us will need others in the community to take time out of their day to help us, to make a minyan for us, making it possible for us to say the Kaddish-every one of us.

8:00 PM or on your way to spending a few minutes before bedtime with your kids, make a short fifteen-minute dedirection in their moral compass, and come to shul.

Please, in the morning, if you pace your living room, unable to get back to sleep or can spare a few minutes on your way

to work to guarantee a minyan, come to shul.

You don't need to read Hebrew. You don't have to participate in formal prayer (offer your own). If you don't have a Talit, we have them. If you don't have a set of Tfillin or you don't know how to put them on-we have them and we teach.

Empathy often requires greater effort than sympathy. Please make the extra effort to place yourself in the shoes of others who are trying to do what they need to do and attend services only as often as you are able: mornings and/or evenings-bring family and friends; carpool, stop off at Shul before going for ice cream, bagels or coffee; ask your employer to accept a lateness or an early departure one morning or evening each week. Any help you can offer those who need your help will be appreciated and remembered and maybe returned in kind. Do you have children or grandchildren that you drive to Kesher on Sunday mornings? Don't drive and drop! Drive, drop, park, enter and pray-your-own-way.

# Mickey and Sherryl Kaufman's son, Alex, was one of the visitors to Auschwitz on the 75th anniversary of the liberation of the camp. Below is a very personal observation by Alex.

# Sunday at Auschwitz

The main events commemorating the 75th anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz-Birkenau began last Thursday at Yad Vashem, the world's most compelling and most impressive Holocaust memorial, in Jerusalem. World leaders from 49 countries, including Vice President Pence and Speaker Pelosi, joined in the largest diplomatic event in Israeli history. I visited Yad Vashem in September - my third time. The United States Holocaust Museum in Washington, DC is impressive, but there really isn't any comparison.

So many of my friends and business partners in Israel are also descendants of survivors or those killed, so my post-Israel rendezvous with history was a natural topic of conversation and curiosity. All Israeli high school students spend one week in Krakow, visiting the Jewish quarter of Kazimierz (more on that later) and Auschwitz, which is about an hour away by car, so a large percentage of Israelis have been. Still, I shared an awkward silence (or sometimes an even more awkward chuckle) with friends last week in Tel Aviv. There's only so many times you can hear "Have a good time in Auschwitz...I mean...you know what I mean" - but we understood the strange camaraderie. The bond made possible by shared memory. And by the power of humor to maintain sanity, as Victor Frankel so eloquently described in his landmark book, Man's Search for Meaning.

The hour drive from Krakow to Auschwitz is bleak after you leave the outskirts of Krakow, Poland's second largest city. I stared out the window at the fields and forests wondering only one thing - whether my relatives marched naked in the winter through this forest or through some other identical forest nearby. Whether my grandpa's little brother died on that march or on some identical march nearby. Too much to process, so I turned back to my iPhone and pretended to be interested by the news.

I arrived at Auschwitz I - the original camp - just in time for my 10:30am tour. Around 1.3 million people were brought here and over 1.1 million were murdered - most within hours of arrival. Around 90% of its prisoners were Jews. Countless other undesirables (priests, Poles, homosexuals, Roma) died here too.

The SS selection process occurred immediately upon arrival. You were either sent to work or to the gas chamber immediately. Cattle cars filled with hundreds of people arrived around the clock for years. One plaque that I read mentioned that between May and July 1944, half a million Hungarian Jews were deported here. Nearly all died. But we knew that.

I was pleasantly surprised to see how "popular" the tours are. Auschwitz hosts 2 million visitors a year from all over the world, and they do a phenomenal job. The guides are absolutely terrific. The official tour of Auschwitz I takes two hours, after which you can take a shuttle bus to Auschwitz II-Birkenau, which is 3km away. Auschwitz II-Birkenau is about 10 times as big as Auschwitz I, and while Auschwitz I is extraordinarily well preserved and main-

tained (you can enter the barracks and other awful places), Auschwitz II-Birkenau can only be described as an enormously vast field of death.

The two camps hit you differently.

At Auschwitz I, we walked through one barrack that has been preserved to house shoes which prisoners removed before being led to the "showers" where they were poisoned and suffocated with Zyklon B pesticide. Imagine mountains upon mountains of shoes, tens of thousands of shoes. In the next barracks, mounds of eyeglasses. And in the next, human hair piled like stacks of hay. The Nazis turned the hair of the dead into blankets, sheets and other textiles. German efficiency.

At Auschwitz I, I was amazed to see so many professional videographers walking in small groups in front of survivors. Nearly 200 survivors are here this week and they're mostly approaching 100 years of age. I spoke to many of them - "Did you know my family?" To visit Auschwitz is impactful. To see so many survivors visiting Auschwitz - most for the first time - is surreal.

Auschwitz II-Birkenau leaves you without words. Before I left for Tel Aviv, I called my grandpa's first cousin, Eva, who is somewhat of a great-aunt to me and one of our family historians. I asked her for the names of our Kaufman relatives murdered there so that I could recite their names in Kaddish. She said she would put together a list. I called her from Poland for the names. She said, "Too many.....But in the dirt you can still see pieces of bone."

That's enough.
