

When she came to each starfish, she would pick it up, and throw it back into the ocean. People watched her with amusement.

She did this for some time when an elderly man approached her and said, "Little girl, why are you doing this? Look at this beach! You can't save all these starfish."

The girl became distraught. But after a few moments, she bent down, picked up another starfish, and hurled it as far as she could into the ocean. Then she looked up at the elderly man and replied, "Well, I made a difference to that one!"

The old man looked at the girl inquisitively and thought about what she had done and said. Inspired, he joined the little girl in throwing starfish back into the sea. Soon others joined, and all the starfish were saved.

In Ethics of our Ancestors, chapter 2, verse 21, Rabbi Tarfon says, "It is not your responsibility to finish the work of perfecting the world, but you are not free to desist from it either."

Surely, we can continue to be inspired even long after the holidays have passed. Each of us can make a difference. If we all just take a small part of the larger puzzle in life, we will be able to get closer to fitting all of the pieces together.

FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR



Several weeks ago, my friends and I went on a "girls" trip to Lancaster, Pa. Amish country. I have been there many times and enjoy the area and the sights, but for whatever reason, had never really done an in-depth tour of an Amish home or learned about their history, culture and traditions. It was certainly obvious that one could mistake an Amish man for a religious Jew, but I didn't realize that so many of their traditions mimic ours.

So, on a beautiful Sunday morning, we went to the "Amish Home and Farm" tour which is on about 30 acres of land, but strangely, right next to a Target. Go figure. We paid for the full package and spent an hour and a half in a small vanlike bus that took us throughout Amish country. The woman who drove the bus and was the "tour guide" was chock full of information about the Amish and although there were about 16 people on the bus, my friends and I were the only ones asking questions. We kept her on her toes! As with the Orthodox community, the rate of attrition among the Amish is about 5% or less. One similarity. The men dress almost exclusively in black and white and wear wide brimmed black hats. Another similarity. They average 8 children per family, similar to Orthodox Jews. They have a very deep sense of community and tradition, much like the Jewish community. Orthodox Jews do not use electricity or anything that may be

translated to "work" on the Sabbath. The women cover their hair. The Amish do not use electricity at all and on their Sabbath, all work stops and it is a true day of rest and recreation. The Amish have "arranged" marriages where the couple is supervised and is allowed to get to know one another (they can turn down the proposed mate), much like Orthodox Jews. They were persecuted and killed for their beliefs. So were we. So many similarities. What I also didn't know is that they own many businesses and can be guite wealthy. The way they get around modern technology is that they hire the "English" to work for them. Sort of like a Shabbos Goy only

It was fascinating. When we did the tour of the house and grounds, even more questions came to us. Again, we were the only ones asking out of about 22 people. I wonder why.

I found a new respect for these quiet people who do not recruit and do not proselytize. The only issue, which is relatively new, is that they are outgrowing the land in Pennsylvania. Farming is the mainstay of the Amish people, but because there is only so much land to go around, the Amish are going into business and have no need to live on farmland. Amish families are moving into neighborhoods and wanting to put barns with horses (for their buggies) in the building that is usually the garage. The local English population is having issues with this and, I guess at some point, this will come to a head and decisions will have to be made by politicians (Amish have their own government, but in this case, the local government will have to weigh in). It will be interesting to see how this pans out.

So, the more I learn about people, the more I learn that we are more alike than different. I don't know why hate is fostered... fear, insecurities, jealousy perhaps. It is such a shame and a waste. As I read the book "The Nightingale" by Kristin Hannah, which deals with the

Nazi occupation of France during World War II, my frustration grows, because it seemed so easy for the Nazi's to convince the French that the Jews were the enemy. Of course, there were Christians that saved Jews, hid children and did what they could, but history shows that the French helped the Nazi's deport all of the Jews in the country. I would like to think that this would never happen again, but what is happening in Europe and in America is frightening and should be a wake-up call to all of us.

That's why being a part of Jewish community is important. At least to me. We come together in joy and in tears. We celebrate together, we pray together, we learn together and we are one

As I write this, it is just a few days before Yom Kippor as we atone for our sins and start anew with what is hopefully a clean slate. To those of you that I may have slighted or hurt in any way, I sincerely apologize as it is truly not my intent. To those of you that were unkind to me, I forgive you. Let's move on and let's make this a wonderful year for all of us!
