

### Ch-Ch-Changes

It has been two and a half years since the onset of the pandemic and many of you have not been in the building to see all of the work we've been doing and how much we are improving our spiritual home. It is a very exciting time at EBJC and while we take the time and carefully select a new Rabbi to become a part of our family, we are leaving no stone unturned when it comes to improving our building, our programs, and our services. This article will provide you with accurate information as to what we are accomplishing and have accomplished.

- We replaced the unsightly and broken accordion wall with a new, catering quality movable wall with a pass-through door. The money came from our operating account and was not taken from any restricted account.
- We replaced the roof over the rug wing. It was in dire need of replacement. The constant repairs was just wasting money. The money for the roof came from the restricted account funds from the sale that are not subject to reimbursement.
- We poured a new cement walkway and fixed the entrance at the Ryders Lane side to the preschool wing, and we are adding a shared bathroom between to two classrooms. This money is through a special grant provided through the State. If there is money remaining, we will make continued improvements to the preschool wing and playground.
- We replaced all of the windows in the preschool wing and the youth lounge. The money came from a Department of Homeland Security Grant.
- We will be adding a new state of the art Public Address system throughout the building for added communication and security. The money is coming from a Department of Homeland Security Grant.
- We have begun getting quotes to fix the Kroll Ballroom replace and paint the walls, replace the old sconces with newer more modern ones, replace the floor with either a new rug/dance floor or new flooring entirely, replace all of the ceiling tiles so that they match. The money for this is coming from dedicated donations, money in the restricted account that was dedicated to the ballroom, and operations. This project will hopefully be completed by late spring. We are at the mercy of contractors and supply chain issues.
- The addition of a new Audio Visual system in the sanctuary sponsored by Men's Club which has significantly improved the quality of remote participation in our services.
- The Lobby walls will be painted a bright new color.
- We will be replacing the antiquated boiler off of the meat kitchen with a new, much more efficient one. This boiler heats the entire building (not the Netivot wing). 80% of the funding is coming from a PSE&G grant. The balance will be paid over 5 years with no interest.
- The Rabbi's house has been repaired. Steps and a cement walkway were made so that the Rabbi can walk to the Synagogue without stepping in mud. The back porch was repaired, water-proofed and stained. Window blinds were added to all of the windows for privacy. Bookcases on either side of the fireplace and a mantle have been installed. All of this will go a long way as we show prospective rabbinic candidates their new home. The money for this has come from donations and operations.
- In terms of financial responsibility, any monies donated to the restricted account or any designated accounts go into those
  accounts and are spent ONLY for the purpose for which it was intended. We have safeguards in place to make sure this
  happens.

We haven't even broached on the programs and events we have offered to keep our families involved and engaged. Over 100 programs via Zoom have been presented, 95% for which there was no charge. Through the generous donations of our families and the extended community, these programs have been self-sustaining and extremely popular. As long as there is interest, we will continue to offer them! Our Hazak program for seniors 55+ is extremely popular. We meet in person from September through June! We have the Rabbi's classes, Family Services, Judah's classes, active youth groups, a strong Kesher, and so much more!

Our Preschool has grown to 30 children! Whereas 5 years ago, we were close to closing this important EBJC footprint due to a lack of registration, in a vote of confidence, we gave it one more year and we grew from 8 students to 15 that first year and we are now at 30! Thank you, Lynda, for your dedication. The families love you!

We have Israeli dancing, Jazzercize, and Freedom Gate Church that rent our premises regularly. The gym is fully rented thanks to the efforts and dedication of Lloyd Shepetin.

Our Long Range Planning Committee is actively working to find ways to sustain our shul and ensure a future of many years to come.

We have amazing staff of clergy, office workers and maintenance people who are very dedicated to EBJC and work very hard to provide the best service possible.

So there you have it. Now you know. Spread the word. We are here to stay, we are here to create a strong spiritual and social community and we want you to be a part of it.

### RABBINIC REFLECTIONS



Change is the only constant in life. We grow up, grow older, and have families. We either change jobs and neighborhoods, or staying in the same place, watch as those places change around us. For Jews, change is not merely a passive process, something that happens to us, but rather a dynamic one to which we must respond. Jewish thought insists that we have an active role in maintaining tradition as well as improving tradition when called for. And in addition to the expected life changes, the last two years have added the dramatic effects of pandemic altering how we live in myriad ways.

Over the High Holidays, our obligation is to reflect on the past year and account for our mistakes, not only to cleanse ourselves of transgression against others or against God, but also to learn from those mistakes; which is to say, to change. These days are about judgment and are infused with the symbolism of life and death; the stakes could not be higher. When we engage actively in the process of teshuvah, of return, we are shedding the bad habits which we have adopted in the past and replacing them with loving and

constructive ones. Teshuvah requires effort, as all positive change does. A favorite saying of mine from Pirkei Avot: L'fum tza'arah, agra - the reward is commensurate with the effort.

This year we should exert the greatest possible effort to return (that word again!) to synagogue life. That, in itself, represents change. Many of our members have been fearful of crowds in these years; it will be an effort for them to return to public events. The convenience of online services, classes, and meetings has become normalized; it will require effort to return to in-person experiences. In so many ways, a return to meaningful shul life will require effort, but the reward is commensurate with that effort.

The change in personal behaviors that we seek directly affects our communal experience. Over the past two years it has been difficult to maintain our daily minyan, morning and evening. Even Shabbat and Yom Tov services are sparsely attended as compared with three years ago. The learning, celebration, and camaraderie that was once so prevalent is not only a memory. With a bit of effort, it can also be a prescription for a lifeaffirming return to communal life. Let's make these High Holidays the starting point for a new and vigorous engagement with Jewish practice and with each other. Let's embrace this change in an effort to revitalize our relationships, our learning, and our love for our culture and one another.

### CANTOR'S CORNER



"Shma Kolenu, Hashem Elohenu, Hoos V'rahem Alenu, V'kabel B'rahamim U'v'ratzon Et T'filatenu...Hear our voice, Eternal Gd, and be compassionate to us, and accept with compassion and favor our prayers."

This is one of the most powerful phrases that we recite each and every day during the Amida. During the High Holidays, we spend extra time and passion in reciting this line during the Yom Kippur service.

Rabbi Marc E. Berkson writes, "With our fears and our hopes, the words we turn to are the words in these books. It can be hard, I know. The language may be foreign; the concepts, at times, even more so. Trembling, we take words and cry out, "Shema Kolenu, Hashem Elohenu, Hear our voice, we say, O Eternal our Gd." To the Gd of which we are not fully sure, we implore, "Hear our voice, listen to us." Rabbi Janet Marder states, "Take words, use words, to connect with the Most High. Take these imperfect instruments of communication, and say them with all the passion you can muster. Take your

doubts and your hesitations and your purposely or inadvertently, then have profound embarrassment and put the courage to seek out that person and say "I'm sorry". Jewish law states that a person should ask your prayers."

We find ourselves at this time of the year begging for Gd to listen to us. "Shma!". Hear us, O Gd! At times, it may feel as if Gd turns a deaf ear. At times, it may feel that we are hopeless and that nothing will help. At times, we may feel alone. Shma Kolenu, written in the plural, says Hear OUR prayers. This tells us that if we pray together, if we find the passion together, and if we join together in seeking refuge and homage to Gd, then Gd will listen, and we will know we are not alone.

In this season of repentance, let us come back together in prayer, in song, in family, and in friendship to be heard. May all our prayers be accepted for a year of health, happiness, and peace.

In addition, some rituals are more straightforward than others. Some are found as Mitzvot in the Torah and others are Mitzvot written by our Rabbis, which are interpreted from the Torah. One of the Mitzvot prior to the High Holidays is asking forgiveness. Saying "I'm sorry" is not only the hardest thing to do when we do a wrong, but it is the first step in making things right. As we approach the High Holiday season, make a list of all the things that may have gone not so right this past year and think of all those who were involved. If someone was hurt because of something you may have done,

the courage to seek out that person and say "I'm sorry". Jewish law states that a person should ask forgiveness from another person, up to three times. If after the third time the recipient of the apology does not accept, then Gd forgives the requester and the recipient becomes the one at fault. Taking the first step is always the hardest, but in the end the Mitzvah of asking for forgiveness can be more fulfilling than actually being forgiven. Of course, having both the asking and the receiving, gives us the opportunity to ensure a truly happy, healthy, and prosperous New Year.

From my entire family to your families, Shana Tov...listen up and have a good year!

Every arm of the synagogue is involved, from Men's Club to Sisterhood to Mitzvah Corps to the Religious Committee...everyone has their role and their responsibilities. The staff, ALL of the staff, work tirelessly to put all of the pieces together. My background is in theatre, so I equate it with putting on a show. The "performers" are very important, but nothing much is happening if there is no director, producer, set designers, lighting engineers, prop people, etc. You get the picture.

We are welcoming everyone into that are still uncomfortable going indoors, we are streaming all

services. This is not ideal and this is not what we wish to be permanent, but we recognize the needs of our members and will do the best we can to accommodate. We have worked hard to upgrade our streaming capabilities and recently repaired and upgraded the sound system. A lot of work has been going on around EBJC and we'd love for you to come and see!

For the fourth year, we have not raised our membership commitment (dues). For the fourth year, we are not charging our members for tickets to High Holiday services (there is a fee for non-members and adult children of members and their families). With an inflation rate closing in on double digits, this is a minor miracle.

So when you come to High Holiday services, give some thought to the over 100 people that worked so hard to make you comfortable and to assure that things run smoothly. Thank a volunteer. Thank the Clergy, Thank the Staff. Make a meaningful donation to sustain your shul. It will go a long way.

### FROM OUR PRESIDENTS



As we flip the page of the calendar to September, we realize that Autumn is almost upon us. That also means that the High Holy Days are just around the corner.

For me, the childhood memories of this time are seared into my mind. I remember arriving at my synagogue, which was packed to the gills. There I was, looking up at the Rabbi and Cantor, who normally wore black robes, but for these days, were dressed in white. 




