

Art History through a Jewish Lens: From Bezalel the Israelite to Agam the Israeli

Join us in discovering 3,300 years of Jewish art, from the interior of the Tabernacle in the desert, to the Agam room in the Pompidou Museum in Paris. As the Second Commandment was interpreted as a prohibition against representational art, Jewish artists turned instead to ritual objects. These objects varied stylistically, thematically and emotionally, crafted by Jewish artists who were born in different countries and came from different socioeconomic backgrounds.

Discuss the reasons why nineteenth-century Jewish painters such as Moritz Daniel Oppenheim, Isidor Kaufman, and Maurycy Gottlieb went mainstream, and learn how Impressionism, Fauvism, and Cubism laid the groundwork for Chagall, Modigliani, Soutine, Rothko and other Jewish giants of twentieth-century art.

For more than 90 years, the Streit's matzo factory sat in a low-slung tenement building on Manhattan's Lower East Side. While other matzo companies modernized, Streit's remained a piece of living history, churning out 40 percent of the nation's unleavened bread on pre-War machinery as old as the factory itself. In a neighborhood where the Jewish immigrants long ago moved on, in a nation where progress and profits trump all else, where manufacturing has left the cities if not the country, where family businesses are bought out by giant corporations and workers move from job to low paying job, filmmaker Michael Levine captures the Streit's saga and echoes the American Dream. Rabbi Kushner sadly passed away this year after a stellar career as a pulpit Rabbi and author of a dozen books on Judaism, religion, and living a Jewish life in the modern age. Rabbi Kushner was the first rabbi in centuries whose books were read by people of all faiths, and which appealed to a mass general audience. Rabbi Kushner's ideas have influenced two generations of rabbis, and have comforted millions who have suffered loss and hardship. In recognition of Rabbi Kushner's literary achievements, and to make the wisdom in his books accessible to all, a monthly series on Sunday mornings from October to May will be offered at Temple Shalom, each session devoted to studying one of Rabbi Kushner's books in depth.

Jonathan Comisar

Jonathan Comisar has a Masters in classical composition at the Manhattan School of Music and is an ordained Cantor with a Masters in Sacred Music from the Hebrew Union College School of Sacred Music. He served the Community Synagogue in Rye, NY with distinction from 2000-08 and is a highly esteemed and sought after composer of Jewish themed music. He has received numerous commissions and artist residencies from synagogues and Jewish organizations, including Temple Emanu-El of NYC, Central Synagogue (NYC), and Congregation Emanu-El (San Francisco), The American Conference of Cantors, who commissioned Comisar to write a choral work for their 60th Anniversary, premiering it at the URJ Biennial in 2013.

Cantor Jonathan Comisar has served on the faculty of the Debbie Friedman School of Sacred Music since 2009, teaching classes on music theory, arranging, and composition.

Jonathan Comisar is also a musical theater composer and a member of the prestigious BMI Lehman Engel Musical Theater Workshop. Comisar's musical theater piece "Things As They Are," was awarded Best of the Festival Audience Favorite Prize at the NY Musical Theater Festival (2010) and was twice nominated for the Fred Ebb Foundation Award, 2009 and 2011.
