Counting Our Blessing at Shavuot

Why is it that "two's company" and "three's a crowd?" After all, in math, three points are needed to create a stable plane. But in life, three can sometimes be a tricky number to manage. Two of the three can appear more significant, leaving the third to be the proverbial "odd person out." We read that in the Biblical time there were three major holy days – Passover, Shavuot and Sukkot. Known as the three pilgrimage festivals, these were the holy times of the year when Israelites made the trip from their homes to the holy Temple in Jerusalem. These three were the major agricultural festivals – marking the harvest of first grains after Winter (Passover), first fruits in the Spring (Shavuot), and the final major harvest of the field (Sukkot). Started at a time when we were primarily an agrarian society, it is understandable that these three holidays were more significant than any other – even over Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

While grouped as three, two stood out for their length of observance. Passover and Sukkot are both 7 day festivals, while Shavuot is only one day. Marking the start of the annual harvest and its final conclusion, Passover and Sukkot were the bookends for the agricultural season. When our ancestors shifted away from agriculture – Passover and Sukkot remained major holidays with lengthy observances. Passover focused on the story of the Exodus, and Sukkot became a Jewish version of Thanksgiving.

Despite being only one day, the Rabbis wanted Shavuot to remain as important. They shifted the story of the holiday from first harvested fruits, to revelation at Sinai. The Sages explained that the seven weeks counted off from Passover to Shavuot symbolized the amount of time that passed from the moment we became redeemed from Egypt until the giving of the Ten Commandments at Sinai. Shavuot thus became a festival of study and learning. Some communities embraced the mystical notion that on the night of revelation at Mount Sinai, one has more access to the Divine through study. They began the ritual of *tikkun leil Shavuot*, studying texts throughout the night.

The weeks leading up to Shavuot are counted off one day at a time with the ritual of counting omer. Once a way to mark time between agricultural events, the counting now became a time to prepare oneself for revelation. Each day making an accounting of our own actions and readying ourselves to be partners with the Holy One. This year we are engaging in our own counting, doing mitzvot to prepare ourselves for the festival of Shavuot and revelation. The Tikkun Olam Volunteers have organized a series of activities titled, "Counting our Blessings – A Journey to Shavuot." Volunteer opportunities to count our blessings will include working with Empty Bowls, Meals of Hope, Café of Life, Meals on Wheels, the Baker Senior Center, Bikes for Tykes, Habitat for Humanity, and Harry Chapin Food Bank. With each activity, we will repair our world and be more prepared to for that moment at Sinai. Spaces will be limited – so watch your email for the chance to sign up.

May our preparations for Shavuot this year lead us to not only count our blessings, but to add to the blessings of those around us.

Passover has always been a time for gathering and reflecting on Judaism's commitment to freedom and social justice. For many families, Passover is a time steeped in tradition. The Haggadah that is used to tell the story of the Jews' Exodus from Egypt, like the recipes that complement the Passover meal, has often been passed down from generation to generation.

In recent years, Jews have created new Seder rituals and themes, updated the Haggadah, and incorporated new traditions, in order to make their celebration of the holiday more meaningful. Innovations in the Haggadah and what is included on the Seder plate are certainly valuable for keeping things fresh at the Seder while still sticking to the centuries-old script.

For those of you who want to make your Passover Seder a little more interesting, meaningful, or just plain different, here are some ideas for you to keep the young and old interested. Mix one or more together!

- Prepare children and grandchildren far in advance for the Seder so that they will look forward to it with eager anticipation.
- Invite someone who has nowhere else to go. It is an important mitzvah to do so, and an act of great kindness.
- Invite children or grandchildren to act out the plagues.
- Have all the adults look for the afikomen. They aren't motivated? Show them a prize such as a fine bottle of wine or chocolates!
- Have a dessert tasting. Have everyone bring a dessert for Passover and compare.
- Give blank paper and crayons to children and have them draw their own stories.
- Play Jeopardy Seder. Give answers to the Passover story, and have guests ask questions about the story.
- Try a different culture. Serve only Ashkenazi or Sephardic food and include cultural habits. For variety, try Turkish or Chinese food and learn about the Jews in those or other countries.
- Have a wine tasting during the meal. Each one of the four cups is a different variety.
- Charoset around the world tour. Serve different charoset from different Jewish cultures around the world.

Here is my mom's Persian Charoset recipe:

1 unpeeled pear, cored and finely chopped
1 unpeeled apple, cored and finely chopped
1 cup finely chopped walnuts
1 cup finely chopped almonds
1 cup finely chopped hazelnuts
1 cup finely chopped pistachio nuts

1 cup chopped pitted dates
1 cup chopped raisins
2 teaspoons ground cinnamon
2 teaspoons grated ginger root
1 tablespoon apple cider vinegar
Sweet red wine

Combine pear, apple, walnuts, almonds, hazelnuts, pistachio nuts, dates and raisins in a large bowl, and blend well, being careful not to chop the mixture into a paste. Add cinnamon, ginger root, cider vinegar and enough wine to bind.

Temple Shalom Preschool and YESh students are getting very excited to celebrate Passover this month!

For weeks now the students have been preparing for the holiday with songs, food, crafts and dramatic play. On Sunday, April 2, students in YESh will enjoy a special Chocolate Seder led by myself and Miss Jane Galler. This annual tradition has become beloved and one that our students wait for all year! Instead of the traditional seder foods, students will enjoy a whole seder experience with chocolate seder alternatives. Instead of 4 cups of grape juice, students will enjoy 4 small cups of chocolate milk. Instead of matzah, students will have chocolate covered matzah, and so on! By adding the element of chocolate into the seder, students experience the excitement of the holiday and have a positive association with the seder ritual.

From our rabbinic literature, we learn that Rabbi Akiba would give treats and snacks to his children during the seder so that they would not fall asleep, and would take an interest in the seder. A chocolate filled seder is surely a good way to keep children's attention!



Beit Guvrin Caves

Hidden beneath the Judean Lowlands, this gob-smacking subterranean site is one of the most extensive artificial cave networks on earth, yet relatively few tourists visit the site.

Dug out from beneath an area that was once known as the cities of Maresha and Beit Guvrin, the network of caves, named after the latter city, seem to have been created for a number of different reasons down the ages but stand today to amaze contemporary travelers.

Maresha was the first city to stand on the site, dating back before the common era, however it was eventually sacked and replaced by Beit Guvrin. This new city thrived in the area until it too was conquered by the Romans, leaving behind little but ruins and the caves.



The original chambers were built for defense and storage below the ancient city of Maresha, which flourished during the age of the First Temple. The settlement was eventually leveled, and a new town called Beit Guvrin rose in its place. The Romans later conquered and destroyed Beit Guvrin, leaving little but ruins in its wake. Nonetheless, its extensive underground chambers remain relatively unscathed.

The network consists of some 3,000 rooms dating from various eras: Sidonian, Israelite, and Roman, to name a few. Judean's soft chalky earth meant each tunnel and chamber could be chiseled and carved by hand—no mechanized drilling technology was available back then.

Affordable Workforce Housing

I've been thinking a lot about housing lately. My own condo was flooded during the hurricane 6 months ago, and Judy and I are living in a rental while our home is rebuilt. Building housing these days is complicated and quite costly. The wonderful community in SW Florida makes it worthwhile for us to rebuild, but what if we could not afford it? Would I be willing to drive 90 minutes to work, play and pray in Naples? Not likely. If I couldn't find affordable housing locally, would I commute 1-2 hours each way for a job in retail or teaching or hospitality or landscaping or hospital work, especially when there is a shortage of workers in almost every community in the U.S. and it wouldn't be too hard to find a job where I live? Would I stick around if I had to pay 70% of my income to share a moldy trailer, as some of the agricultural workers in Immokalee do? That's the situation for some of our Collier County neighbors, as we learned at our two recent TOV educational forums about Affordable Workforce Housing.

Other facts we learned:

- Over 48,000 workers in Collier County can no longer afford to live here. You can see them in their cars driving up to 3 hours daily, to and from neighboring counties. As jobs near to home present themselves, we will lose them.
- The City of Naples police department is now facing a 25% gap in unfilled positions, with 17 openings.
- Lack of teachers has caused classroom sizes to increase.
- Virtually all of the clients at St. Matthews and similar charitable organizations are working families who rely
 on these organizations for food to meet their budgets. Their clients include teachers and health care
 workers.
- While the housing budgets are normally 30% of the average income in the US, their clients are seeing housing as 70% of their income.
- Our situation is not sustainable when the people we depend upon for services cannot afford to live here.
- Some families have had to send their children to other parts of the country while they continue to work locally.
- One example we learned about was the teacher who started the autistic services in the school system. She finally left, leaving the position vacant. She had over 30 years' experience and finally gave up when she could not afford a 400 square foot apartment.

As Jews and neighbors, we have an obligation to help solve this problem. But what can we do as individuals and as a congregation? Where should we apply our many talents as a congregation? For what exactly should we be advocating?

Join us in sorting out the many ideas floating around to help solve the shortage of affordable workforce housing. We have a subcommittee of TOV devoted to this issue. One important aspect of the Men's Club charge is to help with the welfare of the community. Accordingly, we are deeply concerned about the rise in antisemitism and the effect this is having on our youth. It is important that we educate on the positive impact Jews have had on America and society.

An example: Dr. Arthur Kornberg, born in 1918 in Brooklyn, attended prestigious City College of NY, and was one of the top students in his class. Like the majority of his classmates (90% Jewish) he was unable to be admitted to the top medical schools because of antisemitism. He was finally admitted to U of Rochester Medical School (to fill one of the two Jewish slots allowed). He graduated top of his class but was denied prestigious residencies by the Dean. He turned to research and his seminal work on DNA earned him a Nobel Prize. He was eventually invited to become Dean of the Medical School at Rochester but declined. He faced antisemitism and stared it down. He provided the same fortitude to his children one of whom also won a Nobel Prize.
