MESSAGE FROM THE RABBI

Shana Tovah! Happy 5784!

In traditional synagogues throughout the world, penitential prayers, selichot, are said everyday throughout the month of Elul, the month preceding Rosh Hashanah. The prayers are meant to help us prepare for the drama of the Days of Awe. They are designed to get us ready to truly investigate our behaviors, our dreams, our relationships and our commitments.

Like everything else in life, preparation is the key to success. No professional athlete or musician simply begins to perform. Years and years of discipline, guidance and instruction are required to reach a level of competence, let alone excellence.

Why is it, then, that so many Jews enter the High Holy Day Season without realizing that our Jewish life stage—the place where we execute the moving parts of our souls, and hearts, our yearning and our commitments—also benefits from preparation?

All of us know that Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are the most hallowed of days of the Jewish year. Most of us also feel at least somewhat unprepared for the importance of this season.

We expect the prayers and the words, the tunes and the reading of the Torah to move us—and sometimes they do. But the reality is, to have services move us, we first need to move ourselves. Spiritual examination and introspection are helpful tools on the path to High Holiday meaning. We benefit from struggling and wrestling with our spiritual practice before Rosh Hashanah begins, before we hear the Shofar, before we fast on Yom Kippur. Our preparation does not have to be complicated. S'lihot, penitential prayers, are the mechanisms we use to prepare us to do that. The daily recitation of Psalm 27 helps our focus and is within all of our reach.

Traditionally, we should have begun a month ago—maybe longer. We are rusty, sluggish and unpracticed. But it is not too late to begin and prepare as best we are able. A little transformation is better than none.

This High Holiday guide focuses primarily on pragmatics, but a little spiritual focus is important too. On the side is Psalm 27: try reading it and thinking about its message morning and evening between now and Yom Kippur. Hopefully its words will speak to you and through these words the experience of the Days of Awe will hold more meaning.

YOM KIPPUR PERSONAL PRAYER & MEDITATION

Many of us have missed our communal tradition of holding a Torah and offering a personal prayer/meditation before and during Neilah on Yom Kippur. This custom holds great meaning for us. We suspended this practice due to health and safety concerns during the pandemic and are pleased to announce this tradition will resume this Yom Kippur.

This year we will be offering two different meditative options. The Ark will be open for private meditation starting at 4:30 PM on Yom Kippur afternoon. The ark will close at the beginning of Mincha (5:15 PM). During this meditative period members of our community can stand before the Ark and offer personal prayers.

Additionally, during Neilah a Torah Scroll or Scrolls (depending on demand) will be available to hold during your personal prayer time.

During either of these personal meditative options we ask everyone to respect the personal space of others. There will be enough time for everyone who would like to hold a Torah and offer a prayer to do so.


