A message from our Senior Rabbi

Confronting the Randomness of Life

The Lag Ba' omer tragedy at the tomb of Rabbi Shimon Bar Yochai seems to demand a theological response.

The Talmud relays that during the weeks between Passover and Shavuot, a plague killed thousands of Rabbi Akiva's students. And according to a medieval tradition, the plague ceased on Lag Ba' omer. Thus, the day became associated with great joy and celebration. When such a day becomes a day of death and tragedy, a believer cannot help but confront the deep question of "why."

Truthfully, whenever good people suffer, we are brought to ask the same question. It arrives at my desk in various guises, perhaps more than any other question. If God is loving and all-powerful, how could He permit this to happen?

When my mother was diagnosed with terminal cancer at a young age, I also had to confront this question. But my answer came to me easily, having spent several months learning about chaplaincy at the Palliative Care floor of Baycrest. Instead of asking "why?" which gave me no comfort, I asked "why not?"

It is true that much of Jewish tradition connects good behavior with rewards and bad behavior with punishment. In the second paragraph of the Shema, we are told that if Israel is good, the rain will fall and the crops will grow. Megillat Esther can be seen as one giant polemic against randomness. Yet, our experience is different. Much of what we observe in the world is random. And there are voices in the tradition that express just such a realization.

In the Talmud, Rav Ami declares that people only die for sins they have committed. After some deliberation, the Talmud concludes: "there is death without sin and there is suffering without iniquity, and this is a conclusive refutation of the opinion of Rav Ami."

Psychologically, we understand why people need explanations for the challenges that confront them. If acting a certain way, or believing certain things, helps to avert misfortune, it can give us a sense of control for our own destiny. But sadly, this control is an illusion. The only guarantee in life is that good and bad things will happen to people at random, whether they deserve it or not.

We mourn together for the forty-five precious souls that were lost. We can spend our time speculating about the message being sent from the Heavens. And if that speculation leads us to become better Jews, then there's nothing wrong with it. But instead of speculating, consider the "why not" proposition. In accepting life's randomness, we can focus on the stronger inclination in Torah, which is to respond to tragedy with compassion, prayer, wisdom, and love.

Joy & Trembling: Blessings Bring Responsibilities

The Talmud teaches that "in place of joy, there is also trembling." This teaching stands out because we do not usually connect these two emotions. We separate occasions of joy/happiness into one domain and trembling/fear to another. Yet lately, I am understanding more and more what it means to experience both at once.

I am thrilled that my wife and I expect our first child to arrive later this summer. It fills me with joy to take this next step with Lauren as we build our home together and start to grow our family. It feels like everything I have worked for in my life has been leading to this moment.

At the same time, there are moments that I am nearly shaking from the uncertainty and responsibility that comes with caring for another human being. It is terrifying.

I can only really imagine what it means to be a parent at this point, but it's a unique experience. It is your child; they belong to you! Yet, the truth is that they do not. As they grow up, they develop their own hopes and dreams, their own identity. At the same time, they are a part of you and a separate and unique individual.

I imagine this experience of simultaneous joy and trembling will come up regularly as a parent. For me, this is a relatively new experience to feel both these emotions at once. The only other time I can recall feeling this way was when I received my rabbinic ordination. I was incredibly happy and excited. It was the culmination of years of work and study. I was also quite afraid of the responsibility that came with my new role and title.

I love Torah and Judaism; I'm lucky that my job is to do things that bring me joy. But as a Rabbi I was given a new responsibility, not simply to study Torah and be Jewish, but to also pass it on to others. To help others to feel the same sense of connection that I felt. To help others to not simply understand the lessons and messages that I find in our tradition, but to engage with themselves and find their own meaning in our traditions.

My Torah does not belong to me alone but to my students. If I do my job well, the Torah I pass on to others is simultaneously mine, and yet it will develop its own identity unique to how each person understands and incorporates it into their own life.

The truth is, I think we should all experience a sense of joy and trembling as we approach Shavuot. The holiday celebrates our ancestors receiving the Torah at Mt. Sinai, and the rabbis teach that we should feel as if we too were standing at the foot of the mountain.

If we really felt as if we were there, we should be joyful and excited about the gift we are about to receive. At the same time, we should be nervous because it brings responsibilities we might not realize. We should each feel as if the Torah belongs to us; it is our Torah. Yet, at the same time, it doesn't simply belong to us; it is separate and unique. It belongs to the generations that came before us, to all who passed it down into our hands. It belongs to our fellow Jews around the world. It also belongs to those who will come after us, to those we will pass it to one day.

We each have to make decisions on how best to incorporate Torah into our own lives. For some, that might be keeping a kosher home or traditional Shabbat observance. For others, that means caring for those in need or fighting for justice. For some, it simply means good food and family. As a Jew, the Torah belongs to you, and it is your choice to decide how you want to incorporate it into your life.

Yet, you have a responsibility to ensure that you are not the final link in the chain, the one that breaks a connection going back millennia.

As we prepare to stand at Sinai and receive the Torah, we should each be filled with joy for the gift we are about to be given, and if we truly understand the responsibility that comes with it, we should feel a bit of trembling as well.

Lauren and I wish each of you a <u>Hag Sameah!</u>

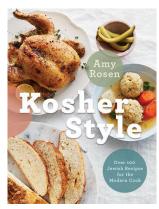

Life, a Short Adventure Through Time: with Anna VanDelman

I was born in 1934, which calculates that I am 86 years old today. I was born in Montreal. I lived there for forty two years, went to school there, Bancroft, Guy Drummond, Strathcona Academy, Commercial High/ Sir George Williams University and McGill University with an afternoon stint at The Workmen's Circle to learn Yiddish. I worked at various jobs, mostly in the Jewish Community (because I spoke Yiddish).

Lou attended Fairmount School, Baron Byng and Concordia University. He worked in publishing then at Yad Vashem and finally at Jewish War Veterans of Canada.



In 1976, due to the unrest sparked off by the late Rene Levesque and his Partie Quebecois, our family moved to Toronto where I landed the job of a lifetime, Senior Social Worker in the Day Care Programme for seniors at the famous Baycrest Centre, world renowned for its exceptional geriatric care programs. I worked there for twenty-two years. At Baycrest I had the opportunity to meet the amazing late Srul Irving Glick ZI, as his parents were clients. I also had the good luck to work with the also amazing late Cantor Ephraim Sapir ZI. He came to perform for all my major programmes. As a bonus, we treasured the spiritually enhancing Rabbi emeritus, Rabbi Avraham Feder ZI; three dear friends who enhanced our lives. After returning to our Synagogue in Montreal for High Holiday services, we decided it was time to find a Synagogue here in Toronto. We attended every synagogue in the city. However it was at Beth Tikvah where we received the warmest welcome. After all, I already knew Srul and Ephraim. I ran several women's tallit workshops with Raizie Jacobson. We started the first Sunday Blood donor clinic. This Synagogue felt like we could call this our home away from home. We both got involved in many committees. Lou served as Gabbai Rishon, sat on Ritual and social action committees. And who could ever forget his amazing Shofar blowing? On Social Action, Lou and I had 14 projects running at the same time. With Rabbi Allen we started the Yom Kippur food Drive which still sees the North York Harvest Food Drive truck parked at Beth Tikvah every Kol Nidrei night. When Rabbi Shlomo Carlebach came to Beth Tikvah, I had the privilege to walk him from the Novotel Hotel to the Shul. He sang all the way. (He was Srul's brother-in-law). Beth Tikvah truly became our home away from home. In fact, before we had grandchildren, we quasi adopted six of our friend's children as our grandchildren. They had no grandparents.

And now in our time of need, due to unexpected illness, both Lou and myself, our Beth Tikvah family is there for us. For financial help, for home cooked meals; for Passover Seder food and food for the entire Passover. Members became our lifeline, as in addition to food for sustenance, members offered prayers and believe it or not, an electric wheelchair for Lou. Clergy provided, in addition to prayers, financial help, as did several Shul members. Last week, a Shul member who sat on our social action committee, delivered us food to last over the entire Passover week. What a treat! Morally the entire staff is there for us. Thank you Rabbi Jarrod Grover, Rabbi Louis Sachs, Cantor Tibbi Kovari. Irv Kirshenblat, Doris, Gayle, Yardena, Rick, Renee, Danny etc., etc. With our restrictive disabilities, knowing that so many Beth Tikvah staff and members care about us gives us incentive to continue through our time in the closing years of our journey through our time here on earth. We are grateful to everyone at Beth Tikvah who contributes to our well-being. MERCI, A SHEINEM DANK, TODAH RABBAH. Our gratitude has no bounds; we have truly been blessed. Your generosity is overwhelming. May the Almighty grant you all the blessings of good health so that you may continue working each in your own way. Ellie's Shavuot Blintz Recipe!

Blintz Recipe & Ingredient List

Wrappers

4 tablespoons unsalted butter, melted and cooled slightly
1 cup milk (fat level shouldn't matter, but I use whole)
4 large eggs
1 cup all-purpose flour (I swap 1/3 to 1/2 regularly with whole wheat, and did so here)
Few pinches of salt

For our Blintzes with a Twist: have a package of phyllo sheets and 14 cup melted butter handy as well



Filling

- 2 cups farmer's cheese, quark, a thicker cottage cheese or ricotta 6 tablespoons sour cream, mascarpone, creme fraiche or softened cream cheese
- 2 tablespoons granulated sugar (or more to taste, see Note up top) 1/4 teaspoon vanilla extract (if desired)
 Few gratings fresh lemon zest (if desired)
- 2 large egg yolks or 1 large egg (optional, see Note up top)

For our Blintzes with a Twist: have your favourite berries set aside and ready to go

How To Make the Blintz

Make wrapper/crêpe batter: Combine wrapper ingredients in a blender, or in a bowl with an immersion blender, or whisk by hand until smooth. Cover with plastic wrap and refrigerate for an hour or up to two days.

Cook wrappers/crêpes: Heat a medium skillet or crêpe pan over medium-high heat. Once heated, brush pan lightly with melted butter or oil. If batter has gotten too thick to pour thinly in the fridge, you can add an additional tablespoon or two of milk or water to thin it. Pour 3 to 4 tablespoons batter into skillet, just enough that it coats the bottom in an even layer when you swirl it around. Let cook, undisturbed, until the crêpe becomes a little golden underneath or at the edges.

Cook the crêpe on the reverse side for another 20 seconds, then slide onto a plate to cool. Repeat with remaining batter, brushing the skillet with additional oil or butter as needed. You can stack the crêpe on top of each other even when they're hot; they will not stick.

Either use the crêpe right away, or cover the plate with plastic wrap and use them in the next 2 days.

Make filling and fill wrappers: Mix all filling ingredients together until smooth. Place 3 tablespoons or so filling across the center of the top wrapper/crêpe in your stack. Fold the bottom part of the wrapper up and over it; fold the sides in over the bottom and filling, then fold the pancake up to form an egg roll-like.

Finally, place the blintz in a hot pan with the folded side down to seal everything in!
