### A Message from our President



It's hard to believe that Rosh Hashana is upon us once again. It feels like only yesterday that I was writing my Passover article, with chicken soup on the stove. Now, it's honey cake in the oven!

Honey cake is an interesting little delight. It's a fairly uncomplicated dessert, yet there are so many variations. First of all, one must decide

what type of honey to use. Each type of honey, like wine, has its own flavour profile, and therefore contributes differently to a recipe. Some recipes call for nuts; some don't. Some require coffee (not sure why...); mine uses tea. Some are moist; others, not so much. No matter what the recipe, however, once the ingredients are mixed together and baked, that honey cake manages to put a smile on a person's face at first bite.

Beth Tikvah is much like a honey cake. Each person who walks through our doors is an important ingredient that when mixed together with all of the others, makes our shul unique in its sweetness. It is, therefore, completely understandable that we would desire to retain the recipe as is, make it exactly the same way year after year, and even ensure that we pass down the recipe to the next generation so as to maintain the flavour and integrity of our recipe. And why not! Who doesn't love a good honey cake?

Funny thing is, I find that many of the younger generation actually don't really love honey cake. It doesn't appeal to them. I don't understand it, I love it. But they don't. They don't eat much kugel, either. And for some strange reason, a

good corned beef sandwich isn't as interesting to some as it used to be with us. Tastes change, so it seems. And that's a bit sad....or is it?

Truth be told, I decided not too long ago that it was time for me to assess my eating habits. After all, although they're completely delicious, corned beef contains an obscene amount of salt, kugels call for way too many eggs and honey cake is too....no, honey cake is still great! Fine, I can't completely throw everything away, but maybe, I decided, it was time to think about making some changes.

I still make honey cake, but now I also make honey cookies (I'll gladly share the recipe upon request!). The kids love the cookies, and the adults like them too (but still prefer the cake). I'm attempting to create new traditions while honouring the old ones.

We at Beth Tikvah are beginning to realize that just like with honey cake, not everything we do resonates with the younger generation. Indeed, change is inevitable for our long term survival. We are learning which recipes work and which might need tweaking. We are testing out different recipes to see which ones are most delicious. This takes time, effort and input. And we can't do it alone. Each one of you is a taste tester for our recipes. Your input is invaluable as we navigate this exciting yet challenging time.

I wish you and your entire family a Shana Tova U'Metukah. May this year bring you health, happiness and much joy. And may your honey cake, or honey cookie, or both, be delicious!


Let this year be the year that we become the Start Up Nation in the synagogue world – Be like Israel.

## It's All About Change

In Tractate Rosh Ha-Shanah (16b), Rabbi Yitzhak lists a number of actions of repentance that "tear up a negative divine decree," including changing one's name, changing one's name say changing one's place.


The common theme is that T'shuvah entails making changes in our behavior and life situation.

According to Rabbi Israel Salanter (1809-1883, Lithuania), change is the core strategy of the season of T'shuvah. Centuries ago, in traditional Jewish communities, the advent of Elul was enough to make people tremble and arouse every Jew to mend their ways and strengthen their Jewish commitments and devotion. Added to this was the custom to blow shofar each morning "to awaken a person from their sleep and the vanities of their distractions to pay attention to their deeds." Nowadays, complains Rabbi Salanter, we need more to shake us up to draw us closer to God and His service. The most effective strategy we have for Tshuvah today is to work hard to make changes in our routines, changes in our accustomed patterns of behavior that have become ruts of complacency. We do this by finding new opportunities to help others and dedicating ourselves to new, higher levels of careful practice of Mitzvot, and investing new energy in learning.

We can stimulate these changes by finding new ways to engage with Judaism. Focus on a mitzvah with which you might be less familiar. Maimonides (1138-1204, Spain) suggests selecting a mitzvah in which to become an expert and practicing it with detailed knowledge, observance and purity of intent as a way to uplift our entire spiritual practice. Find new opportunities to learn Torah. Join a lecture or class at Beth Tikvah, even find new opportunities to learn online. Look proactively, as a family, for worthy Tzedakah organizations to support and new ways to help others – have a family meeting about it and involve your children in the decisionmaking process. These changes are not artificial. They are valuable in themselves, they are educational and they prompt a critical self-awareness that helps us transform in positive and substantive ways. They are also wonderfully contagious, inspiring others to do the same, effectively changing the culture of our synagogue.

The season of T'shuvah is a time of moral and spiritual opportunity, in which our tradition says that God is especially close to us and we can draw close. In this season we can take advantage of this intimacy to awaken ourselves to a reinvigorated life and welcome a New Year of new possibilities for ourselves, our community and the whole Jewish world. ### High Holiday Messages from Our Rabbis





Tree of Life The High Holidays— Hashanah Rosh and Yom Kippur—are significant time in the Jewish calendar. They are moments for reflection, renewal, and return to our roots. Famously, the symbols of the New Year in Judaism are apples, honey, and pomegranates. This year, I find myself connecting these holidays with a rather unusual symbol: my cherry tree.

As many of you who watched my Yizkor Sermon in the previous year know, in Ukraine, I had a beloved cherry tree. It was a simple tree, one among many, but to me, it was special. Its beautiful pink blossoms in the spring and its delicious cherries in the summer brought joy to my heart and connected me to the cycles of nature.

Trees are potent symbols in Jewish tradition. The Torah is often referred to as עץ היים "Etz Chaim", a tree of life. Each time we return the Torah Scroll to the ark during the services, we sing together, "She is a tree of life to those who grasp her, And whoever holds on to her is happy. Her ways are pleasant ways, And all her paths, peaceful". (Proverbs 3:17-18) When we refer to the Torah as "Etz Chaim," we are acknowledging her as a spiritual resource that is continuously renewable, like a tree. Just as a tree's roots draw sustenance from the earth, so do we draw from the teachings of the Torah, nourishing our souls and guiding us on the path of righteousness. "And whoever holds on to her is happy. Her ways are pleasant ways, And all her paths, peaceful" - these lines reaffirm that the lessons of the Torah lead to a path of peace, tranquility, and happiness.

Trees represent growth, stability, and resilience, traits that resonate deeply with the journey we undertake during the High Holidays. Like the annual cycle of a tree, we go through our own phases of growth and shedding, joy and sorrow, accomplishment and regret. Just as the tree stands tall through the changing seasons, so do we stand in front of our Creator during these Holy Days, acknowledging our shortcomings and aspiration for growth.

My first year at Beth Tikvah was just like that—full of growth and accomplishments, with some challenges added for good measure. But one thing I did not share with anyone; my Ukrainian cherry tree got cut down while I was in Canada. I was very saddened by that and by the feeling of utter helplessness. There was nothing I could do to save it. After the speech that I gave on Yom Kippur, I could not bring myself to tell anyone that the tree was gone...

Imagine my surprise when I came back from my summer vacation and found a young cherry tree waiting for me in my backyard! Turns out that the members of Beth Tikvah came together to present me with a new tree, not even knowing that my old tree was gone. I was filled with deep gratitude for the thoughtful gesture of our loving community. The new cherry tree that was generously gifted to me symbolizes much more than a replacement for the one left behind. This tree represents the extraordinary kindness, understanding, and compassion that has made my transition to a new home in Canada more bearable. Just as a tree thrives best when nurtured by a caring gardener, so too have I felt nurtured by this community's benevolence and support. Now this new tree is growing under my window and every time I see it, I am reminded of your warmth and the sense of belonging that you have instilled in me. For this, I am deeply grateful, and it fills my heart with joy.

This sense of gratitude underscores the beauty of our High Holidays, a time when we can come together, express appreciation for each other, and strengthen the bonds of our community as we look forward to a new year of growth and renewal.

Each of us is, in many ways, like a tree. We have roots, we grow, we sometimes lose our leaves, but we always have the potential to blossom again. This is the essence of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. We reflect on the past year, make amends, and resolve to better ourselves in the coming year, just as a tree sheds its old leaves in autumn and grows new ones in spring.

As we head into these High Holidays, let us be like the cherry tree - resilient, hopeful, and always ready to grow. Let us embrace the chance for new beginnings, to forgive and be forgiven, to grow and to learn. Shana Tovah — may we look forward to a sweet new year full of growth and renewal and may we be all inscribed in the Book of Life!



### The Spiritual Condiments of the High Holidays by Bracha Feder

Until a recent *tiyul* up north, the words Beit Hashita only called to mind cans of pickles

and olives I see on supermarket shelves. A visit to the 'secular 'Kibbutz Beit Hashita has changed that. Now I identify it with two different 'spiritual condiments'.

**First:** It is home to the Shitim Institute - Hagim Center. It was established in the 1950's by Aryeh Ben Gurion, nephew of David Ben Gurion. Aryeh's vision was to **preserve** and **rejuvenate** the celebration of the Jewish holydays and culture in ways that speak to the diverse members of Am Yisrael. He created an archive in a small hut adjacent to his home on the kibbutz. Over the years this collection of documented texts, haggadot, and ceremonies has evolved into a national educational resource.

Aryeh sought to educate the new generation of pioneers including his own family. He shares:

"When my grandson reached Bar Mitzvah age he asked me: "What kind of holiday is Rosh HaShanah?"

I replied: "I will give you for this incoming year a diary with 365 pages and every morning you will try to write down all your hopes for that day and then before you go to sleep each night you will examine honestly and summarize how much of your expectations [of yourself] you realized. Know that whatever you wrote down in that book was the sum of your very own choices and decisions, the work of your own hands and the fingerprints you left on the world. No God and no superior force intervened to enforce its will on you [As Maimonides says, God gives us absolute free will in the realm of moral responsibility and only a fool believes that one's fate is sealed by luck or by the horoscope]. Your balance, your final accounting, is on the 365th page of your diary. That is Rosh HaShanah."

**Second:** The Yom Kippur War brought incomprehensible loss to the kibbutz. It lost eleven young men- of the next generation. The mourners never really felt satisfied with their memorial. Almost two decades later, one of Israel's greatest composers, Yair Rosenblum, visited the kibbutz.

Members of the kibbutz shared with him their desire to create a memorial ceremony for their fallen sons on the holy day and asked Rosenblum to compose a piece for the new ceremony. Until then, they had tended to ignore the traditional Yom Kippur.

Although Rosenblum knew this, he felt compelled to choose as the text the U'Netaneh Tokef. How strange for individuals who had negated God to speak of His eternal power.

On Rosh Hashanah it is inscribed, And on Yom Kippur it is sealed: How many shall pass away and how many shall be born, Who shall live and who shall die, Who shall reach the end of his days and who shall not, Who shall perish by water and who by fire, Who by sword and who by wild beast, Who by famine and who by thirst...

Aryeh Ben Gurion saw in Rosenblum's coupling of this ancient text with his new melody an example of sanctified preservation and rejuvenation. Ben Gurion wrote:

"I think *Kiddush Hashem* (sacrificing for God) exists not only for religious people, and that the cemeteries over 100 years of Zionism are mostly evidence of Kiddush Hashem on the part of parents who buried children because a young son gave his life for something that was more important to himself than himself... That is why this tune will continue to speak, and will outlive its time and its words."

Many of you are actually familiar with this uplifting melody. Interestingly, another of the kibbutz's attractions is "Reaching the Sky" with hot air balloons. Each of us needs to be lifted so as to then return to our earthly concerns reenergized.

Bracha Feder has shared her passion for learning and teaching with teens, adults and teachers for years. She holds an M.A. in Jewish Thought and Education from the Hebrew University. She was Instructor of Ethics in Jewish Living for the Florence Melton Adult Mini School of the Hebrew University in Toronto for 12 years.

Currently, she offers Synagogue Adult Education courses and on topics such as Jewish Thought, Tanakh, Tefillah, Shabbat and Holy Days.



## OCTOBER 17: NANCY MCDONALD THE KINDNESS OF STRANGERS: MEMORIALIZING THE PAST, ONE STONE AT A TIME

In November 2019, Nancy McDonald received an extraordinary email out of the blue. It was from a man in Berlin who explained that he was involved in the Stolpersteine Project, the largest decentralized monument to the Holocaust. He was researching the lives of Jews who had lived in his neighbourhood of Mariendorf, among them, the Avigdor family, her late husband's family. Thus began a journey of discovery for Nancy – and the start of a lifelong friendship with a total stranger. Come with her as she unravels the past, one stone at a time.

Nancy McDonald is a former broadcast journalist, turned script writer, turned novelist. Her first two books, Boy from Berlin and One Boy's War, are based on the Avigdor family's desperate flight from Nazi Europe.

## OCTOBER 24: DAVID EISENSTADT UNDER THE RADAR—30 NOTABLE CANADIAN JEWISH MUSICIANS

David Eisenstadt shares his perspective – the journey of a hobby which began with select music from his recently-released, second book *Musicians Under the Radar-36 Notable Canadian Jewish Performers*.

David Eisenstadt is a respected Canadian Public Relations Consultant. One of the Public Relations Society of America's first two elected Canadian Fellows, and the first of two Canadian Public Relations Society Fellows.

### OCTOBER 31: JACOB STEINBERG THE LOST ARMY

It is the personal story of their only surviving prisoner. The Lost Army was fighting for 34 years in the remote jungles of Myanmar, Thailand and Laos. Who were they? What were they fighting for? And are there any Jews in these jungles?

After graduating from University, Jacob travelled around the world for five years. He climbed mountains, crossed deserts, explored jungles and spent more than a year travelling across South East Asia, where his unexpected arrest led to the story he will talk about at his session.

### NOVEMBER 14: KATHY KACER BOOK BANNING AND THE HOLOCAUST—A DANGEROUS TREND

It is impossible to talk about Holocaust literature for young people without raising concerns about books that have been removed or banned from library shelves. Award-winning author Kathy Kacer will explore the current dangerous trend toward book banning along with its disturbing implications. In addition, she will talk about her own writing and her many books about the Holocaust that are acclaimed in schools and libraries around the world.

Kathy Kacer has written more than 30 books focusing on the Second World War and the Holocaust. She lives in Toronto and lectures in universities about teaching sensitive material to young people. She speaks to children in schools and libraries about the importance of the Holocaust and keeping its memory alive.

## NOVEMBER 16: JOSEPH GILBERT MEDICINE AND HEALTH CARE IN THE SHTETL

The Shtetls were the home to a large population of Ashkenazi Jews from the 17th to the 20th Centuries. The majority population were in the Pale of the Settlement, a portion of Russia, Poland and the Ukraine. These regions were behind in development compared to western Europe. This also was the situation for Medicine and Health care.

The lecture will discuss what the Jews in these small towns knew about medicine: How was illness treated? What methods for public health existed until modern understanding

of disease became the norm? How did Halacha, and Minhag (custom) influence responses to illness?

Dr. Joseph Gilbert is a retired physician, researcher, research administrator and hospital executive.

Shalom Aleichem, dear members of our beloved community,










## B'not / B'nai Mitzvah



## What some of our members have to say about their Peace of Mind experience:

### **Howard & Leah Price:**

In November 2019, my wife, Leah, and I had the wonderful opportunity to host two former elite Israeli combat soldiers as part of Beth Tikvah's Peace of Mind project. It was an intensive week for these former soldiers who came to Toronto with the rest of their combat unit to deal with the lingering psychological stress that any soldier would have. As well as having full-day sessions with their co-ordinator, the young men had evenings off and got to have dinners with the host families as well as having the opportunity to see Toronto and Niagara Falls. As well, there was a very special Friday night dinner at the shul with the former soldiers, their host families and other synagogue members. Perhaps, the most moving event of the week was during the Shabbat morning service when the soldiers went up to the Bimah while the congregation cited the Prayer for Israeli soldiers. On a personal level, Leah and I formed a tremendous bond with our soldiers and that bond has persisted. When we were in Israel last year, they showed their gratitude and hosted us for dinner along with their wives and children.

In November 2023, Beth Tikvah will again be hosting a Peace of Mind group of soldiers and I would strongly encourage members to participate. I would encourage you to consider hosting a couple of soldiers for the week. I guarantee that you will find it tremendously eniovable and have a chance to form a lifetime bond. I would especially encourage members with children to host since it's so important for Diaspora Jews to show our gratitude to Israeli soldiers and show that we are one big family.

We shared our home with them and taught them about Canadian culture, while at the same time having the opportunity to find out more about them as individuals, and what their life is like in Israel and what it has been like since completing the army years before. They too shared their culture with us through conversation and our time spent together.

All in all it was such a meaningful and memorable week as a host family. We were so happy to be a part of their lives through this program and have them both in our home and in the Beth Tikvah community.

### Nancy & Gerald Machtinger:

We were skeptical but in hindsight, we should have been honoured to have been asked.

In the Fall of 2019: Beth Tikvah approached us asking if we would like to host two of the Chayalim who were part of

the Peace of Mind program coming to Beth Tikvah. Over the next week, we spoke to a few people who had hosted others who had been part of their synagogue's Peace of Mind program one even hosted a second time.

Like most people, we were wondering what state of mind the men would be in; after all they were participating in this program! We were assured by those who had previously hosted that the young men will have had healing therapy at home for the past six weeks and will continue with an intensive week in Toronto and Beth Tikvah.

We are all in it because of our love for Israel and the soldiers. It is a small way of showing our appreciation to them for protecting Israel.

There is so little time that you get to spend with these guys, but we learn as much as we can about each other in these short moments. Quick breakfasts before dropping them off at synagogue for the day; one or two dinners with you at your home; group get together at one of the participant's homes; Shabbat Dinner at Beth Tikvah; Shabbat Morning services. Saturday afternoon at various activities. Many evenings are arranged with programs and social outings for them.

What I'm trying to say is that what you think might be a burden on your time, will turn out to be a craving for more time with them. We have asked to host again, but will certainly (reluctantly) bow out if there is another family who wants to do this. The impact on you and your whole family is immeasurable. We continue to message each other off and on through out the year. Even now, I'm smiling, thinking about "the boys", all of them.

### Laya & Jeff Weissberger:

Hi, my name is Laya and my husband Jeff and I hosted two POM soldiers at Beth Tikvah in November 2019. At the time our children were 16, 13 and 9. The two men who lived with us that week were matched up with our family so well. For instance, our sixteen year old son was in a theatre arts school and one of our men had a job in theatrical arts. These men were so grateful we opened up our homes to them for the week. We made it clear that we were more grateful to them for serving in the army to protect homeland. Our kids were fortunate to get to know Idan and Ari as the men they are now years after the army. When these guys were not with us, they were at their sessions immersing themselves in workshops and meetings allowing for post army healing and closure.
